

'Phantom Strikes Again', CM Says

"Lying Phantom Strikes Again with Junk News."

That's a headline that City Manager R.J. Turpin suggested Monday for another edition of "the yellow sheet" that was distributed at selected areas in the Cisco community Sunday afternoon and Monday.

The anonymous mimeographed two-page "city news" continued a theme in at least two previous editions - praise for Mayor Roy Cartee and Councilwoman Louise Allison and criticism for "the gang of four" and the city manager.

Reference was made to a councilman's suggestion at the last council meeting that the city buy a house to be rented to the city manager. This was strongly opposed, and the sheet indicates continued opposition to city airport improvements.

The sheet also takes issue with a dean at the college who ordered that the senior citizens' programs at the Corral Room each week be just that and not political forums.

"Progress is being made

at City Hall despite this type of harassment," Mr. Turpin said.

"The 'big four' council members as referred to held a meeting to make possible a \$600,000 street improvement project for Cisco at little or no cost to the taxpayers," Mr. Turpin added. "Is progress like this making our phantom unhappy?"

The "phantom" alleged that a court order had been issued to force the city manager to provide copies of city records to several leaders of the Citizens for Better Government movement.

Mr. Turpin said there is no record of any such thing taking place at the courthouse. He added that as city employees have time to comply with the numerous requests of the CBG group these records are being provided.

Mr. Turpin forecast a "showdown will take place soon as our business men and interested citizens and taxpayers decide to run the city - after all petitions are distributed and turned in despite the phantom's lies and accusations."

SPEAKING OF Christmas, we received an article from the Texas Medical Association which speaks about "Hitting the Holiday Blues Head On." In this day and time the article has a lot of truth in it and might help some people realize what they need to watch for so they can enjoy the After-Christmas.

It is being reprinted as follows:

After the whirl of holiday parties and good cheer have ended, the sobering colder months set in, often times bringing along the credit due slips from parties and gifts already given. While coping with continuing inflation and perhaps an ailing bank balance, the Texas Medical Association (TMA) urges people to keep their mental balance as well.

The short tempers and frayed nerves of last summer's gasoline crisis are relatively minor signs of what economic pressures of any type can do. Bankers leaping from windows during the Depression and gun-fights over positions in gasoline lines are extreme examples of the despair people can experience.

No matter how stress shows itself, bad economic times mean extra stress for almost everyone. Even financially and emotionally secure people must take time to count and conserve finances, possibly even altering lifestyles to cut back on expenses. These changes alone provide some stress.

Usually, people can handle such problems. The danger comes when a person who is already under stress is hit by economic problems as well. Then stress may show up as hostility, fatigue, depression, suicide, child abuse, physical illness, or some other problem. How stress is expressed depends on the person's emotional makeup, the amount of stress and other factors.

While eating well and staying healthy do not guarantee protection against stress, they certainly help. The TMA urges people to give themselves a physical and

financial boost by cutting back on junk foods and maintaining a well balanced diet.

TMA also suggests that people can often use low cost, healthy ways to ease excess stress and ride out this period of economic strain. Exercising can help relieve tension and improve one's outlook. Talking about problems with a friend can help vent frustrations and provide solutions. Doing something nice for yourself everyday, even just propping your feet up for five minutes and relaxing, or taking a brief walk outside, can help relieve the pressure. Many traditional stress-relieving methods work well and are more effective than going on a buying spree or getting drunk to feel better.

If problems become severe, mental and financial assistance is available for many sources. Many towns have mental health clinics and community counseling services. Churches, governmental agencies or telephone counseling services may also make referrals.

CISCO HAS a number of churches and ministers so anyone who is facing a problem has many opportunities to talk with someone. A talk with a minister usually does help to relieve tensions and make you feel better.

For a 10-day period beginning in early January, the Rev. Bruce Stovall of Cisco will become an active member of the Shepherd's Staff for the 15th time to lead a group to Mexico for work with a Missionary Baptist Church group.

The group includes Jim Webb, Arley Whitley, Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Winnett, Miss Kelly Stovall of Howard Payne University, Miss Keri Zellman of H-SU, and Miss Reg Reynolds of CJC, all of Cisco, and Martin Cuellar of Del Rio.

Mr. Stovall, a veteran of some 20 years as a Baptist minister, and the group will go in a van and a pickup truck to Torreon in central Mexico. This will be the 15th year for Mr. Stovall to lead a group to this particular area of Mexico.

The group will take supplies to do carpentry work on a church building and to hold a Vacation Bible School. Plans call for Mr. Webb, Mr. Whitley and Mr. Winnett to spend their days putting a new roof on an adobe church building. Mr. Stovall and

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Petition Not Legal City Council Told

Petitions signed by some 350 Cisco voters asking for an election on the proposition of doing away with the city manager form of government are not legal, City Attorney Billy Wright advised Mayor Roy Cartee and members of the City Council in a letter written Monday.

The petitions asked for abolishment of the city manager "in compliance with Article 1164-a8, Vernon's Civil Statutes, State of Texas." Mr. Wright told a meeting of business men Monday afternoon that his letter advised that the City of Cisco operates under a charter as a home-rule city and that the article cited in the petition has nothing to do with home rule cities.

Mayor Cartee told The Press early Tuesday that he had not received the letter from Mr. Wright and would not comment on the matter. He added that if the petition was illegally prepared it would be up to the petitioners if further steps were to be taken.

The Monday afternoon meeting at the Corral Room was attended by approximately 75 business men. Gene Abbott, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, served as moderator and reported that the purpose of the gathering was to discuss petitions being circulated asking for an election to recall Mayor Cartee and Councilwoman Louise Allison.

The group also discussed a petition filed at city hall asking for an election on the question of doing away with the city manager type of government.

If the city manager type of government is a failure here it is due to lack of cooperation, Mr. Abbott believed.

A number of people make brief talks, including: J.C. Warren-I think the majority of voters is being challenged by the minority. The best thing is to try to reach a compromise.

John Hood-Our problems are larger than two individuals and they won't be solved until people are ready to work together.

Ronnie Ledbetter-This is the first petition I ever signed, and I signed it because I see no other way for our council to work in the best interests of our city.

Joe Wheatley-I moved back to Cisco four years ago to go into business in my home town, and I have not seen a single progressive step by our city government in eight months. Apathy is our biggest problem. We must work together.

Bill Eudy-The petition filed at city hall misled the people who thought the city council was asking them to sign it. Some have withdrawn their names. I support the recall for we can't work together.

Bonnie Moss-The petition is legal and it can't be tampered with. It was drawn up properly.

Billy Wright-I wrote a letter today to the mayor and council advising that the petition was illegally prepared. As a city employee, I will not take part in the recall matter.

O.L. Robinson-I moved here over four years ago because I wanted to live in an ideal little town I liked. I have tried to do my part in community activities. I stopped going to city council meetings because I don't like squabbling. Most of the council members appear dedicated people.

John Moss-I signed the petition at city hall because I think there should be an election if enough people want one. I will sign the recall petition for the same reason.

Eddie McMillan-I'm tired of the publicity that our city government is bringing us. I know of one family that declined to move here because of the publicity.

Jerry Jeffcoat-I don't believe our city government will be better until there are changes at city hall. We of the council need help if conditions are to improve.

Gerald Winnett-I am a former city council member under the old charter, and our financial affairs were always in a mess. Nobody was responsible. Problems are different today and we must cope with them.

Lone Star Ready for Winter

Texas and Oklahoma residents have already had a taste of cold winter weather, but Lone Star Gas Co. residential customers can anticipate clean, reliable gas heat even on the coldest days.

'We don't foresee an exceptionally long, cold winter this year,' says Jack Cole, Lone Star's chief gas controller. 'We anticipate a relatively normal winter, and we base that opinion on forecasts from the National Weather Service.'

During the spring and fall when little gas heating or air conditioning is normally required, Lone Star takes millions of cubic feet of gas from producing fields and in-

jects it into one of the company's nine active storage facilities located near Athens, San Angelo, Denton, Pottsville, Cisco or Wichita Falls.

On cold winter days when customer demand for natural gas is high, Lone Star can withdraw the stored gas from these reservoirs and route it to the homes and businesses where it is needed.

Efficient storage operations like these enable Lone Star to enter into gas purchase contracts that help hold down the cost of gas and, at the same time, assure dependable service to customers.

In the event Lone Star

customers experience a long period of bitter weather, it is possible that some gas service to certain large industrial and electric generation customers might be curtailed.

'This does not mean that Lone Star does not have the gas to serve all its customers,' Cole explains. 'It simply means that the Lone Star pipeline network is designed to carry less than a peak-day load. Designing the system to carry the maximum load for only a few days per year would be like building a church large enough to handle the Easter Sunday congregation. The cost would be too high and would cause rates to go up.'

In addition, Lone Star gas suppliers may experience weather-related reasons for curtailing deliveries to Lone Star. Frozen wellheads are one example.

'Our underground storage is instrumental in helping offset these short-term difficulties,' Cole says. 'Lone Star has not curtailed human needs customers, such as homes and hospitals. But large industrial users and electric generation plants contract for gas knowing that their fuel may be cut back on a predetermined schedule during high customer demand periods.'

As a result of those contracts, all industrial and electric generation customers facing possible curtailment are expected to have an alternate fuel supply available in case curtailments are necessary.

Lone Star curtailment procedures were approved by the Texas Railroad Commission in 1973.

Dallas; Belo Horizonte and Fort Worth; Curitiba and El Paso; and Recife and Amarillo-Lubbock-Plainview. Other partners include Salvador and San Antonio-Austin-Waco; Fortaleza and San Angelo; Balem and Wichita Falls; Victoria and the Golden Triangle; and Brasilia and Midland-Odessa.

Each Southern Baptist Church in Eastland County has set its own goal and is expecting to reach it.

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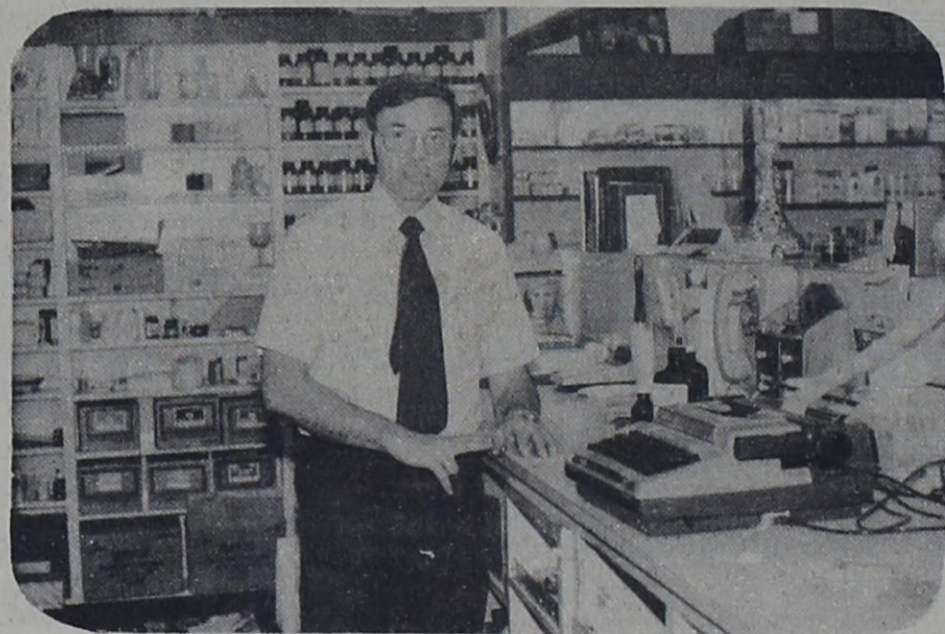
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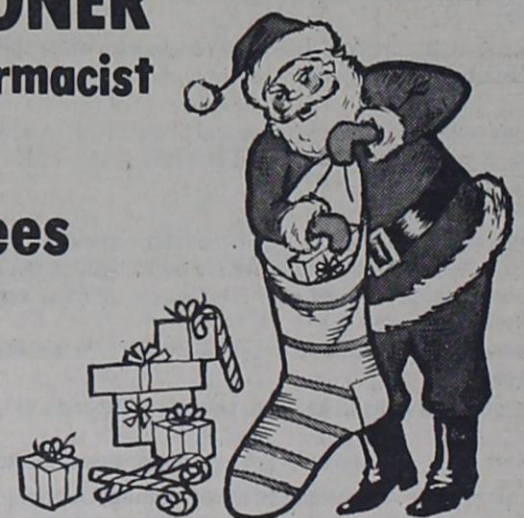

FACTS ABOUT FLU

If you're suffering from a fever, coughing, sore throat, runny nose, and generally just ache all over, guess what you have? January marks the beginning of the peak influenza season, so brace yourself to ward off or weather the attack says the Texas Medical Association (TMA).

Anyone can come down with the flu, especially if it is widespread in a community. It is more likely to be serious for those with chronic diseases, the aged or women who are pregnant.

The flu usually takes one to three days to develop. When it does come out into Thursday,

While most patients recover completely within a week, many continue to feel unusually tired for some

time. The standard remedies of getting plenty of rest, drinking fluids and taking aspirin still hold true says the TMA. Hot chicken soup coupled with tender loving care couldn't hurt either.

In most cases, the flu leaves no permanent after effects, but occasionally, people do develop other illnesses. The most common complication is pneumonia. Other sicknesses that piggyback the flu are persistent cough or bronchitis, sinus trouble and ear infections.

Cisco Enforces Local Fair Housing Ordinance

The City of Cisco has enacted and is currently enforcing a Local Fair Housing Ordinance. The City encourages all citizens to be aware of the provisions of this Ordinance and to report all violations to the City.

Major provisions of the City of Cisco's Fair Housing Ordinance are as follows:

1. Prohibits discrimination in the sale, rental, financing and brokerage of housing.
2. Excludes multi-family, owner-occupied units of four units or less from coverage.
3. Sets up a position of Fair Housing Administrator in the City government to handle administration and enforcement.
4. Provides specific procedures for the receipt, investigation and conciliation of complaints alleging housing discrimination.
5. Authorizes the City At-

On December 18, 1980, the City of Cisco passed a comprehensive Fair Housing Ordinance which defines specific discriminatory housing practices prohibited by the City of Cisco and provides for investigation of discrimination complaints and penalties for violations of the Ordinance.

Copies of the City's Fair Housing Ordinance have been distributed to local realtors, builders, developers and lending institutions and to public agency personnel handling housing programs in the City. Copies of this Ordinance are available free of charge to any interested persons or groups at the office of the City Manager, Cisco City Hall, 116 West 7th Street, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

To further promote effective enforcement of Cisco's Fair Housing Ordinance, the City has developed a set of specific procedures for handling all formal complaints of discriminatory housing practices filed with the City. These procedures are based on the provisions of the Ordinance enacted by your City Council. Copies of these procedures may also be obtained at the Office of the City Manager during the hours stated above by any interested persons or groups.

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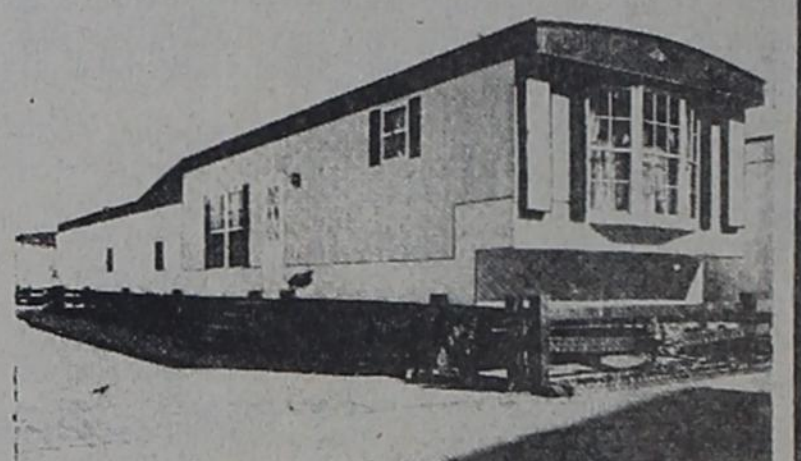

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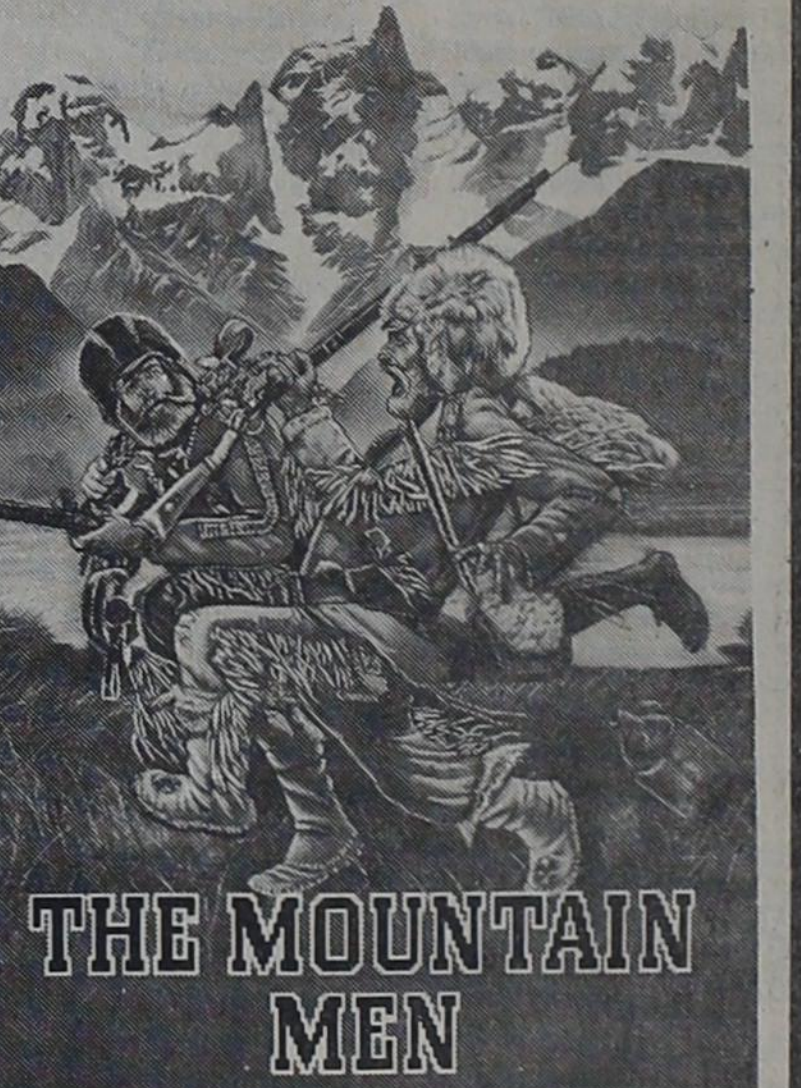

A LITTLE ADVANCED PLANNING

Might Prevent Jan. Blues

The December holiday season is often followed by a period of depression known as the January blues, says Cindy Wilson, a family life education specialist.

This depression period often occurs because of the heightened amount of activities most people enjoy during the season and because of a variety of other factors, the specialist says.

Taking a few steps to prevent or at least soften the January blues can be very effective, she adds.

Mrs. Wilson is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Here are her suggestions for preventing or softening the January blues:

- Plan ahead to avoid

commitments to too many activities during the December holiday period.

- Stay within your budget during the season rather than incurring heavy debts to keep up with the Joneses, or to have a "happy" holiday period. Material possessions do not mean the holiday season will be a happy one. Avoid going into debt.

- Be realistic in your

travel plans. Too much travel during a short period of time is not only dangerous to your health but can tax everyone's relationships when the travelers are weary.

- Be aware of and work to avoid stirring up old conflicts within the family or between friends.

- If unable to be with family or friends who live some distance away, make arrangements to be with nearby friends. This can help avoid the feelings of loneliness and depression. However, if you are one who chooses to be cheerfully alone during the holiday, don't feel pressured into joining others.

- Realize that some people have particular problems during this period of the year. Perhaps a loved one is sadly missed, or perhaps memories of holidays gone by bring out inappropriate behaviors. Accept these people and their problems and work toward helping them enjoy the holidays. Be cautious yourself in your behaviors and reactions during the holidays.

- If you travel during the holiday season, plan at least one day back at home prior to returning to work and school to recuperate from travel and the holidays. This will ease you and the family back into their regular routine and allow some transition time.

- Remember, by preventing the January blues, you can work toward having a truly happy New Year.

Social Security Issues

New Rules For Next Year

This 1980 tax year the Social Security Administration will post annual wage statements for the third consecutive year. Public law mandated a change in the reporting of wages from a quarterly to an annual basis. Employers now submit Federal W2 reports directly to the Social Security Administration. The quarterly reports (941s) showing a summary of wages, taxes and the tax deposit schedule are still required by the Internal Revenue Service.

All W2s are now sent to one of four data operations centers. The address of the data center servicing the Abilene area is: Social Security Administration, Data Operations Center, Albuquerque, NM 87180.

Employee copies of the 1980 W2 form must be given by January 31, 1981. However employers who go out of business should give the employees their copies within 30 days of the last paycheck.

Copy 'A' of the W2 form, should be submitted by February 28, 1981 to the data center. If an extension is needed, the employer needs to submit a written request to the nearest Internal Revenue district director or service center director. The copy 'A' is designed to be read by an optical scanner. The format, three forms to a page, makes processing more efficient. These forms should not be separated even if some of the forms are blank.

To enable the scanner to read the W2s, they must be neatly typed with no white out corrections, erasures or strike overs. Any defacement of the W2 results in the W2 having to be manually keypunched. This escalates the processing cost to the government, and eventually to the employer, in the form of taxes. The optical scanner reads 120 W2s per minute. To keypunch 120 W2s manually requires one and a half hours.

The copy 'A' is printed in optical scanner blind ink. This appears light red to the naked eye. Copy 'A' is shaded to facilitate optical scanning. All entries on the W2 must be made in the unshaded areas. Onlu copy 'A' is shaded.

The 1980 W2 format was changed to improve scanning accuracy. The biggest change appears in Block 5 which includes eight boxes. Depending on the record, none of the boxes may need to be checked or as many as five may apply.

Employers who have a computer capable of preparing magnetic tapes, diskettes, or disk cartridges have an option they can apply for. The copy 'A' data can be reported by this method instead. A wage reporting specialist can provide all the necessary information concerning reports by magnetic media.

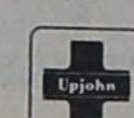

IWU Reflections In Perspective

It was a Palm Sunday in Bogota, Colombia, and there was a "peregrinacion especial" (special pilgrimage) to be observed at "The Cathedral of Our Lady of the Mountain", which was constructed on a spur of the Andes just below and to the north of the "Pico de nuestra Senora". The cathedral sits at an elevation of approximately eleven thousand feet, and from the western end of its steps one has the impression that a small stone could be hurled into the center of the city of Bogota.

Perhaps I had been a bit negligent, but I had not located a single protestant church in the city. And Palm Sunday is a day on which one, protestant or catholic, should at least put in his appearance in a place of worship. Around mid-morning I started to walk from my hotel toward the base of the mountain, from which a "teleferico" (overhead cable railway) or a "ferrocarril montanero" (translated into mountain railway...actually a cog railway) would carry the pilgrim to a point near the summit from which the pilgrim could easily walk through the formal gardens to the cathedral.

Walking down the wide avenue which lead to the station at the base of the mountain, I was joined at an intersection by a lady who appeared to be in perhaps lower middle-age and a teenage boy. The lady was dressed in a faded but spotlessly clean print dress of what appeared to be cotton material and once a shade of pink. We just sort of fell into step together, and after a short distance the lady shyly asked if I was going to the cathedral. I was. No more conversation.

There was a waiting line at the station, so I called to the boy to go ahead and to purchase tickets. I seem to recall the fare was fifty centavos...which at fourteen-to-one made it something like four cents. He accepted the money and sped off to obtain the tickets. The lady and I waited. No further conversation. Just waited.

We took the surface train, the cog railway, and the line melted quite rapidly. And reaching the summit, we strolled liesurely toward the Cathedral; still with no further conversation. It seemed that we, the three of us, were in need of simply being with someone on this occasion.

Reaching the Cathedral, where Mass was being said continuously for the faithful among the pilgrims, we climbed the granite steps to the entrance, which was at the back of the sanctuary. The place was filled.

The lady and the lad stepped up to a stand which was unattended, but where a candle could be purchased...or simply picked up. I accompanied them, laid some change on the table, took a candle, lighted it, placed it in a socket provided on the back of a rear pew, and we knelt and prayed. I prayed in my own way...they in theirs. I could observe that the interior of that sanctuary was one of the most beautiful I've ever seen.

Following our prayers, we, the three of us, left the cathedral and strolled up the wide walk to the very peak of the spur some hundred yards or so to the east and along which vendors of a variety of curios and stop-gap refreshments had set up shop with card tables and other portable furniture.

Having enjoyed the view of the valley and of the city, we began our return. It was noon, and there was a permanent restaurant along the pathway. The principal bill of fare was 'sachichas con papas' (sausages with potatoes). We had lunch of just that, then returned to the railway terminal where, for a change, we took the overhead cable car down the mountain.

Disembarking, we walked again down the wide avenue toward the city. At the point at which we'd joined earlier, the lady and the boy bade me farewell with profuse thanks for my favour of having allowed them to accompany me to the Cathedral. Then they turned off into a street which led to a row of houses toward the south which was known as 'El seccion de las maripositas de la noche'....The place of the butterflies of their night.

I never obtained the name of the lady, although the lad was called 'Manuel'. And she never learned mine. While not for a moment do I presume any position of sanctification; I cannot read the story in our New Testament of the woman at the well without thinking of that chance encounter on the way to La Catedral de nuestra Senora del Monte.

Congressman Stenholm Participates In German Conference

Washington, D.C.-Congressman Charles W. Stenholm met with leaders of the Federal Republic of Germany during a four-day conference in Bavaria following the adjournment of Congress last week.

Stenholm, along with 17 other members of the House and Senate, were asked to participate in the conference with their German counterparts by the Heritage Foundation, a tax-exempt public research institute headquartered in Washington.

The bi-partisan group joined members of the German Bundestag from the Christian Social Union party, the more conservative of Germany's two major parties, and representatives of the Bavarian Government in discussions of major issues. Topics included were defense, SALT and the Strategic balance; the future of NATO and East-West relations in Europe; economic problems of the West, inflation, unemployment and recession; and energy and strategic material.

International gatherings of this type provide an interchange of information that is particularly useful, Stenholm said. 'In light of the problems shared by both countries, the discussions were a candid assessment of the interests we share.'
