More Donations Needed To Help Needy Families

BY HERREL HALLMARK The number of applications received by the Goodfellows of Cisco this year has more than doubled

since the last edition of the newspaper. In Thursday's edition, I reported that 12 applications had been received but by Thursday afternoon a total of 26 applications had been filed with the Goodfellows.

At a meeting Thursday night, the Board of Directors set the cut-off date for receiving applications for Tuesday, Dec. 10, since supplies must be ordered Dec. 11, in order to receive them in time for sorting and

Donations are continuing to trickle in and will be accepted through the end of December, but the Goodfellows are hoping for a big increase ir funds before the supplies are ordered if they even hope to be able to help the applicants this year. There seem to be more applications than donations.

From the 26 applications, there are 58 adults and 55 children listed on the forms which need help this Christmas season. More applications will surely be received before the cut-off





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Does The IRS Owe You

A 1985 Refund?

December is list-making time and even the IRS has taken to the custom. Over 5,800 north Texas taxpayers' name appear on the IRS list of undeliverable refunds. According to Pam Whittenburg, Chief of the Dallas IRS Taxpayer Service operation, the IRS is seeking to match up these taxpayers with \$2,683,322 they are owed.

Six Eastland County residents are among those who have refunds due from the I.R.S.

They are: Richard and Willadean Fourd, Jeffrie W. Frye, Lloyd G. Gallaway and Laurie Mangum, all of Eastland; Luellen M. Bartolotta of Gorman; and Boby R. and Betty Freemen of Ranger.

"These taxpayers filed for refunds during 1985. We have processed their returns and issued refunds checks, only to have them returned by the post office," Ms. Whittenburg said. "With the average refund at \$460, and individual checks ranging from \$1 to \$24,790, it is frustrating for us and the taxpayers not to be able to get them their money."

The most common reason for IRS' inability to deliver the refunds is attributable to taxpayers' moving after they've filed their returns and neglecting to notify the IRS and the post office of the new address. Ms. Whittenburg says that even moving from one apartment to another in the same complex has caused the problem for some. "Of course," she explained, "another reason might be our inability to read a handwritten address correctly."

"We're asking the news media to publish lists of those to whom we owe checks in hopes that the taxpayers themselves, or maybe friends or relatives, will spot their names and contact us with the correct address. Often, this is the only way the taxpayer learns about the undeliverable check," Ms. Whittenburg

Homemaking Hints

County Extension Agent

Christmas time is a season of the year that we enjoy using candles. The rules of candles etiquette dictate simple tapers or votives, and white is the only appropriate choice for formal parties although other colors that coordinate with table ware and decorations are now considered acceptable for more casual event. Tapers should be tall - at least twelve inches - so the flames aren't at eye level when guests are seated. Votives in glass cups, either strewn along the center of the table or placed individually at each setting,

are nother alternate. Candle light, even on the most occasions, is only appropriate after dusk, when there is actually a need for illumination.

The best way to extinguish a candle, is to dip the wick into the pool of melted wax, which virtually eliminates any smoke. Snuffing is the next best alternative; if you must blow, do so gently and cup your hand behind the flame to avoid splattering melted wax on your table

If candle wax does get on your table cloth here are some guidelines. Prompt attention helps insure easier removal, for the longer a stain remains, the more difficult it becomes to remove. In some instances, removal may be impossible.

To remove table wax from linens, scrape off surface with a dull knife. Place stain between clear paper towels and press with a warm iron. Replace paper towels frequently to absorb more wax and to avoid transferring stains. Place stain face down on clean paper towels. Sponge remaining stain with cleaning fluid; blot with paper towels. Let dry. Launder. If any color remains, rewash using a chlorine bleach if safe for fabric, or an oxygen bleach.

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

There are many individual types of Chrysanthemums. Basically we have the Garden Hardy which grows outside in the landscape in mass plantings. Then we have the disbud which can be grown in flower beds or in pots. Basically the requirements of both types are the same. With the two above mentioned types we have additional breakdowns such as; The Incurve (Football Type), The Spider, The Decorative, The Reflex, The Pompon, The Amemone, The Spoon, The Quill, and the Brush and

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you will never obtain a true vultivar because of the cross polination. The professional and show grower always plants anew from cuttings. This insures a true cultivar. On the Garden Hardy type they will repeat year after year from the same root system. When the Garden Hardy type has completed its blooming cycle and the leaves have turned brown cut them back to the ground level and mulch with leaves and they will return in the

Chrysanthemums like a slightly acid soil with a good organic base. Mums do not like wet feet but to do their best and reward you with good blooms in size and color you should never let them dry out. When planting Chrysanthemums never overcrowd them. Plant the mums on fifteen to eighteen inch centers. They will fill in the open area as they grow. Chrysanthemums need to be fed on a regular basis every two weeks to obtain the maximum in bloom in clarity in color. Remember Mums as well as other plants have to have the fertilizer into a liquid form to begin with,

ready for the mum to use at once. If you will pinch back the Chrysanthemum you will get an abundance of blooms.

Some varieties of Chrysanthemums will bloom in the spring and again in the fall. The bloom for the Chrysanthemum is controlled by the amount of light. It takes twelve and one-half hours to initate the bud and eleven and one-half hours of light to set the bud. I speak of these two times in reference to the maximum amount of light to accomplish both functions.

There are many Chrysanthemum shows in the fall of the year and you must remember that all the Chrysanthemums shown in the shows were grown outside and not in greenhouses.

Through out the South and Southwest we have many Chrysanthemum Chapters that are associated with the National Chrysanthemum Society, which welcomes visitors to their monthly meetings and shows.

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
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IMPORTANT TIPS...

Richey & Co. of Fort Worth is planning to drill two new 4,200-ft. developmental wells in Eastland County.

The No. 1 Castleberry is to be located seven miles northnorthwest of Eastland. The operator has leased 40 acres in the H&TC Survey, A-2021. It will be in the Snow Field.

Drillsite for the No. 1 J.A. Miller is in a 100-acre lease in the SPRR Survey, A878. The well will be located in the Richey Field, three miles north-northwest of Cisco.

At a location six miles west-northwest of Rising Star, S.O. Operating has finaled a new oil producer in an unnamed field in **Eastland County**

The well is designated as the No. 2 Paul Harlow, pumping one barrel of oil per day. It was located in the ETRR Survey, A-1194. Bottomed at 2,550 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Caddo Formation, 2,349 to 2,405 feet into the hole.

The No. 5 H.L. Mauldin, a 2,000-ft. developmental well, is scheduled to be drilled in the Eastland Regular Field. H.L.M. Oil of Abilene is the operator. The well will be spudded in a 320-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-192, two miles north of Scranton.

Texas United Oil & Gas of Dallas has revealed plans to drill two 1,500-ft. developmental wells in the Nimrod Field, Eastland County. The operator has 80 acres leased, with drillsites in the H&TC Survey, A-111. The ventures will be known as the Nos. 6-A & 7-A Wright T.U.I. "A". Drillsites are one mile southeast of

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 1 Gattis, a 1,800-ft. developmental well in the Scranton Field, Eastland County. The operation will be located one-half mile northeast of Scranton in a two-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, Sec. 128, Blk. 3. The operator is Western Production of Fort Worth.

Flowing 118 barrels of oil per day, the No. 1 Whitefield was completed successfully in Stephens County's East Ibex Field by TXO Production. Drillsite is four miles south-southwest of Eolian.

The well was drilled to a 4,300-ft. total depth and will produce from perforations in the Atoka Conglomerate Formation, 3,841 to 3,851 feet into the wellbore. Production tests were run on 14/64 inch choke, and flowing tubing pressure registered 850 PSI.

Two new producers have been brought on line in the Stephens Regular Field, with Mobil Producing of Houston as the operator. The wells are designated as the No.s 605 & 606 Southwest Breckenridge Unit, with drillsites four to five miles north-northwest of Parks. The wells are in the LAL Survey

The two new producers indicated potential to pump oil at the combined rate of 111 barrels per day, along with 872 barrels of water. Each well reached a total depth of 3,300 feet. They will produce from perforations in the Caddo Formation ranging from 3,151 to 3,222 into the hole.

A 4,500-ft. wildcat is planned by Harding Co. of Dallas at a drillsite one mile northwest of Crystal Falls. The location is in a 20-acre lease in Stephens County's TE&L Survey. Well's designation is the No. 2 F. Robertson.

The No. 3 Cook Heirs has been finaled by Rogers Oil. It is a developmental well in the Nelson Scully Field, Stephens County. Drillsite is in a lease in the T&P Survey, five miles south of Caddo.

Daily potential of 279,000 CF gas was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 1,750-ft. bottom, and the absolute open flow rating was 800,000 CFD. Production will be from Strawn Formation perforations, 1,430 to 1,440 feet into the hole.

Flowing 1,267,000 CF of gas per day, the No. 1 Enserch-Roye was completed successfully in Palo Pinto County's Ringo Field by Walter Exploration.

Drillsite is three miles north-northwest of Gordon. The well is in a lease in the T&P Survey.

It was drilled to a 2,600-ft. total depth and will produce from perforations in the Strawn Formation, 1,704 to 1.826 feet into the wellbore. Production tests were run on an 18/64-in. choke, and the absolute open flow rating was 6,750,000 CFD.

A Dallas-based operator has staked location for the No. 1 Needham "A", a wildcat well to be located four miles north-northwest of Brazos, Palo Pinto County. With projected total depth of 1,280 feet, the well will be drilled in a 105-acre lease in the Robert Evans Survey. The operator is Dallas Production.

Production from one of the biggest wildcat blowouts in recent Eastland County history has now been brought under control.

The well in question is the No. 1 Jones, with Richey and Co. of Fort Worth as the operator. Location is five miles southeast of Ranger in

the S.N. Mathias Survey. At one time, the well was flowing over 9,700 barrels of oil and 11,500,000 CF casinghead gas per day from a

depth of about 3,600 feet. A spokesman for the Railroad Commission in Abilene said the well's flow

is now "fully contained". He said the question of whether the blowout has permanently damaged the future prospects for the well will depend solely on the characteristics of the producing zone.

Richey reportedly lost 1,100 feet of drill pipe in the hole at the time of the blowout.

Chapman Energy of Dallas has revealed plans to drill the No. 5 Carver "C," a 3,850-ft. developmental well, five miles northeast of Eastland in Eastland County's Snow Field. The well's target is production in the Duffer Formation. The operation will be in a 40-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-297.

Two undrilled locations have been abandoned by John Hoestenbach, Jr. in the Mary Ann Survey, A-51, Eastland County. A developmental well and a wildcat venture were to have been spudded two miles southwest of Romney. They were designated as the No. 2 Weise and the No. 3 Weise.

International Basic has finaled a new producer in Eastland County, flowing 250,000 CF gas per day on a 20/64-inch choke. Absolute open flow came in at 305,000 CFD. Drillsite was in the Harvey Kendrick Survey, A-340, six miles southeast of Eastland in the Eastland Regular Field. The well is designated as the No. 6 Lowrance "A." The operator took the hole to a 993-ft. bottom and perforated the Frye Formation for production at 534 to 558 feet.

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


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Blowout Under Control

History may wll be repeating itself in Eastland County with this recent oil discovery. In October 1917, the McCleskey No. 1 gushed

Ranger into a famous oil boom that would last for several years. The Mc-Cleskey No. 1 flowed for four weeks gushing 450 barrels a



Production from one of the biggest wildcat blowouts in recent Eastland County history has now been brought under control.

The well is the No. One Jones, with Richey and Co. of Fort Worth as the operator. Location is five miles southeast of Ranger in the S.N. Mathias Survey.

At one time, the well was flowing over 9,700 barrels of oil and 11 million cubic feet of gas per day from a depth of about 3,600 feet.

A spokesman for the Railroad Commission in Abilene said, "The flow is now fully contained. The question of whether the blowout has permanently damaged the future prospects of the well will depend solely on the characterics of the producing zone."

The definite zone has not been confirmed. The operator reportedly lost 1,100 feet of drill pipe in the hole at the time of the blowout.

day into pits until storage tanks and lines are readied.

And then on November 6, 1985, the Ora B. Jones No. 3 blew in with many thousands of barrels of oil daily. Some guesses were that it happened sixty-eight years, 18 days one and a half hours later.

It was first guessed that the Ora B. Jones No. 3 was producing as much as 20,000 barrels a day, but was later confirmed to closer to 10,000 barrels a day. The well, drilled to 3,600 feet has an estimated 11 million cubic feet of gas that is being flared that this time.

The well is being produced by Richey and Company of Fort Worth and is being drilled by Richey Drilling Company of Eastland.

When the Richey Rig No. 1 struck natural gas at about a half-mile deep, a blow out preventer, a device used to prevent the escape of pressure, failed and gas roared to the surface and spread a fog-like yellow cloud over the countryside for about six miles.

With the flow out of control the area was evacuated while the attempts to camp it were futile. Experts from Houston's Boots and Coots were called in. The flow refused to be capped and spread an oily film over everything downwind from the drillsite.

A Lafayette, Louisiana

firm, Stooksberry, Inc., arrived and set up a flow control equipment and piped the oil into a battery of 20 storage tanks. Two seperators, capable of handling 80 million cubic feet of gas and 10,000 barrels of oil were taxed to the limit.

At least 100,000 barrels of oil had been contained and moved to refineries by mid November. With no facilities to hold the gas, the Texas Railroad Commission granted permission for the flaring.

A four inch gas pipeline is laid and tied into an existing line 7,000 feet away to move the gas.

Experts estimate the well is capable of producing more than \$355,000 worth of oil every day. Industry observers report that this is the most prolific well in the area in the past 35 years.

State limitations will regulate the limit daily productions of the well. The Texas Railroad Commisison in Austin will allow only 80 barrels of oil a day to be produced. At this rate it would take more than three years to produce enough oil to match the well's potential

for a single week. Caroline Morgan of the Texas Railroad Commission, said the strike is the most significant she has seen in District 7B, the RRC nomenclature for the well's location.

Mrs. Morgan said it is a one-in-a-million thing, a freak of nature.

Alex Mills, executive vice president of the West Central Texas Oil and Gas Association said it would be nice if it wasn't a freak. He said you would see a real boom taking place. He likened the discovery to those of Texas' peak oil boom years of 1920

"It would open up a lot of people's eyes to that area," Mills said. If an offset well produces 10,000 barrels a day, I think your going to see a whole new interest in the Eastland area.

The well, named Ora B. Jones No. 3 was named for the daughter of settlers that moved to Texas from Alabama around the 1800's.

Ora Duffer was born in 1875 near the Leon River on the family farm. The Duffer oil and gas producing zone, a well known zone, gets its name from the Duffer fami-

Ora married Thomas Alexander Jones, an Eastland County farmer, who was a part of Eastland County history later in life. He was known as "Uncle Tom" around the county and was a constable.

"Uncle Tom" was shot during an attempted jail break by Marshall Ratliff on November 18, 1929. "Uncle Tom" was woring as a special jailer at that time. Marshall Ratliff was the infamous Santa Claus during the Santa Claus bank robbery in Cisco Dec. 23, 1927. He had been returned to Eastland jail for another

trial connected with the rob-

Angered over Jones' shooting, a crowd gathered at the jail, and broke in a guy wire between two telephone poles. "Uncle Tom" died a few hours later from gunshot wounds.

Ora Jones raised her eight children and after her death in 1951, the Jones land was passed on to her children and

T.A. Jones, Jr., a son, was born in the Chaney community and is a graduate of Eastland High School. He lives with his wife and their son Thomas A. Jones III. They have a daughter Kay Loy Cagle who lives nearby.

Jones and his sister Gwendolyne Clyatt, a retired home economist in Houston, own the family holdings of about 800 acres around the present well site and about 400 acres about six miles south of the Leon River. The heirs of the six other Jones children are owners also.

Several other wells are located on the Jones land near the Ora B. Jones No. 3 but are stripper wells producing 10 barrels or less of oil per day.

It has been reported that as many as 50 other wells are

Judge Bailey, Chairman of the State Advisory Council on Aging, is working with this group for the implementation of this special Legislature. The Texas Legislature approved this plan in 1985.

The counties of Eastland, Comanche, Brown, Coleman and Runnels will be in a District with one representative, and Callahan, Shackelford and Stephens will be in other. There will be four representatives from the 19-county West Central Texas area.

The Silver Haired Legislature process will begin with candidacy petitions, which will be available through Area Agencies on Aging. Candidates may file petitions Jan. 1, 1986 through Feb. 28, 1986.

Balloting will begin with absentee voting Thursday, May 1 through Friday, May 23. Election Day will be Friday, May 30, 1986. Only persons more than 60 years of age may vote in this election.

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

Candidates must be citizens 60-plus year of age prior to Jan. 1, 1986. They must be registered voters residing in the area of Texas from which he or she is applying for candidacy, and who will uphold the responsibilities of the office as an elected Silver Haired

The first Texas Silver Haired Legislature will meet in the Texas Capitol in Austin Sept. 29, 30 and Oct. 1, 1986. The group will consider and vote on proposed legislation that concerns the needs of older Texans. Recommendations will be passed along to the regular Texas Legislature for consideration when it convenes in January, 1987.

In the 22 other states that, have such a program, nearly 70 percent of the legislation forwarded to regular sessions has been received favorably.

"The Silver Haired Legislature will be a historic occasion," Judge Scott Bailey says. "I feel that some Eastland County persons might have a chance to win the District election and represent this area in Austin. I certainally hope so."






