Cisco Experiences Earth Quake Shocks

Cisco came in for a new experience last Sunday morning when distinct earthquake shocks were felt here. The shock was pronounced over a large area of Texas. No damage was done in this section, but the tremors were heavy enough to shake beds, rattle windows, shake pictures on the walls. They occurred at about 5:45 o'clock a. m., and aroused many people from their Sunday morning nap to wonder just what was happening anyway.

Out at Valentine, on the western edge of the state, many buildings were wrecked, and great damage done. Another distinct shock was felt in that section Tuesday, doing a good deal of damage, according to press reports.

Cisco has been invaded this week by a swarm of crickets which were many thousand strong. They make their appearance each night in greater numbers and gain entrance by every means possible to apparently the most impregnable buildings. Business houses find their doorways and walks lined with the pests, and they find entrance into the homes all over the city. They are probably harmless in their invading attack, but somewhat of a nuisance as visitors.

Postmaster Blankenbeckler announces that in compliance with the new law from Congress establishing a 44-hour week, there will be no Saturday afternoon deliveries of mail here in the future. The office will be open. But delivery of mail on Saturday afternoon will be discontinued.

Judge Eugene Lankford has been quite sick at his home here all this week. He is reported somewhat improved at this writing.

Gus Brandon Injured In Fall From Horse

Gus Brandon, stock farmer of the Putnam community who received a fracture of the jaw and other injuries when he was thrown from his horse at Putnam Sunday, is reported as improving at a Gorman hospital where he was taken for treatment.

Mr. Brandon was found lying on the ground at his barn a short time after he had left the house to saddle his horse, preparing to ride to his farm two miles from Putnam. Mrs. E. A. Hill, a neighbor who was passing the barn discovered his misfortune. He was at first unable to speak, it is reported.

His horse was found an hour later about one and one-half miles east of town, the saddle hanging. D. D. Jones of Pueblo returned the animal to the Brandon stables.

He will be end, and Waverly Massengale, with 185 pounds, playing in his second year, will be the other flank. Bryan, full, with 160 pounds, will be assisted by Little, Clemo Ray, Wilkins and Blackburn. Tackle positions may be chosen from McMahon, Norvill and Garret. Norvill tips the scales at 185 and the other two at 190 pounds. Forest Ray with 165 pounds and Hartman McCall with 160 are the promising choices for guards. Preston who came up from the third string men last year and did some excellent work at center, will probably officiate at the snapper-back assignment this year.

The tentative line-up is a very promising one, and the fans are looking forward to some good games this season, characterized by the unbeatable Lobo spirit which made the Cisco team a formidable foe for other teams in the past grasping at championship honors.

Many New Laws In Effect Tomorrow

Something like 150 new laws passed by the last legislature go into effect tomorrow. Probably the one most affecting the people generally is the new cigarette tax of three cents per package of twenty. All cigarettes now on hand by the dealers will require the stamp to be affixed before sale can be lawfully made. Some bank in each town will have these stamps for sale it is announced. On future purchases of cigarettes the wholesale dealers will be required to have stamps on each package sold.

One of the new laws reduced the size of trucks and busses, and imposes a 7,000 lb. load limit. The latter provision, however, does not apply until January 1.

Another law empowers juries to prohibit drunk or drug-addict drivers from driving cars for any period up to two years.

One law legalizes Sunday moving pictures.

Another law absolves the driver from liability on injury on an unpaid passenger.

Called Meeting of City Commission

The city commission had a called session Wednesday afternoon. Among other things discussed was the advisability of sending the city attorney, F. D. Wright together with one member of the city commission to New York to meet with representatives of the bond holders, looking toward developing something further in settling Cisco's financial difficulties. Suggestion had come from one of the New York committee that this be done, and that the expense of one of the two Cisco representatives be paid by the city of Cisco and that of the other by the bond holders. Move was made by Donovan that this be done, and was seconded by Elliott. Upon vote, however, the other commissioners, Clements, Burnett and Fee, voted against the motion. Some of these advised that they had not fully made up their minds as to the wisdom of such action, and asked for more time to consider it. It is probable that the matter will come up for discussion again at the next regular meeting of the commission, which takes place Monday.

A compromise was effected with J. G. Boggs on an account for \$150 which he claimed was due him on some land used in widening a road near his place. The commission agreed to allow him \$80 worth of water at meter rates in settlement of the account.

A resolution was adopted by the commission which calls upon the Railroad Commission to use its authority under an act by the Thirty-sixth legislature to "fix, establish and determine proper rate schedules and structures showing fair, reasonable and just charges to be made by gas utilities engaged in the business of producing and transporting natural gas from the wells to the cities and towns for domestic consumption, in order that the duty that has been imposed upon the governing body (city commission) to regulate the rates to be paid by its citizens for natural gas may be effectively discharged."

Appropriations, available on August 22, was made by the Forty-second legislature for this purpose, and the attention of the Railroad Commission is called to this fact, stating further that the city commission is unable to determine reasonable domestic charges until the pipe lines and producing company rates between wells and cities are thus fixed.

Children Enjoy Free Picnic

Some three or four hundred children took advantage of the free picnic and swim given for the benefit of children financially unable to enjoy such occasions of their own, Friday evening last. Contributions were made by various clubs, of the city to make this event possible. Mr. and Mrs. Albert Hunt had charge of the affair at the lake, and are very appreciative of the generous help given in making it a great success. The swims, together with the sandwiches, drinks and ice cream which followed, were hugely enjoyed by the youngsters.

A refreshing shower which gauged about one-fifth of an inch fell in Cisco Monday morning, cooling the air, and helped to revive shrubbery and lawns.

With all the rain with which Cisco has been blessed this year our town has been bothered very little with the pesky mosquito, and very few flies. Thanks to the constant vigilance of the Cisco health department, and the good cooperation of the citizens. Other places we could mention not a thousand miles away, have kept busy swatting.

The mosquito is not regarded so dangerous here as he is down in Panama, but he is certainly dangerous enough as a disease spreader—besides being a very disagreeable visitor in the home. Down in Panama we are told that when they find a mosquito they call a policeman. The city is so clean that flies are practically unknown. It is said to be a fact that one of the chief duties of native policemen is answering mosquito calls. When one of these little invaders is discovered the police come in great haste, and after the mosquito is made away with they hold an investigation. The reason for so great

caution, of course, is that any mosquito may be a carrier of some dangerous malady, and in Panama the health of the people is considered of first importance. It is related that one time the police took an entire desk apart to find a mosquito playing hide and seek.

A Poor Way to Cut Expenses

He asked us our opinion. We told him: "Business advice is a little out of our line, but any fool can see that you have a real idea. Certainly you will save money. You will not only save what you have been spending for advertising, but you will save much more on your pay roll, and you will need less help right along. Oh, Lord, Give Cisco Some Bill Murray Spirit!

What is the matter with our city lawmakers? Are they just sitting around waiting for cold weather before starting to talk gas relief—while there are wells just a short distance out whose owners are begging to sell gas at 5 or 6 cents a thousand.

The West Texas Utility is distributing Lone Star gas for 22 1-2 cents per thousand, according to their own figures claimed at the Commissioners gas meeting, and they would surely distribute gas for the city at the same rate. Add 22 1-2c to 6c for the gas makes 28 1-2c per thousand—I wonder if Cisco people would not be laughing up their sleeve if they knew they could get their gas this winter for 30c or 35c per thousand. Would it not require lots of brain power to get out and buy this gas from people who are anxious to sell? I think what we need around our city hall is more of Alfalfa Bill Murray spirit. If there is a Murray over there he hasn't appeared yet. Why can't they go after things like other law makers do? The City Commissioners are in reality our city legislators, and when the state legislators start to enact a law they let the people know something about it beforehand, and corporations and individuals go to Austin and discuss it pro and con. Why do not our city legislators do likewise?

No, I don't think there is a "negro in the woodpile." It appears to me that Cisco has an awful big woodpile and a lot of negroes hid away in it.

The old audit showed a shortage of more than \$1,000,000. We cannot believe that any one man got away with all that money. One million dollars would give 20 men \$50,000 each—and the remainder of the missing amount would throw several parties, hold a lot of influence, and buy a lot of booze for negroes (with their votes.)

What we need is leadership, with courage, character with backbone. We have all of this at present, but not enough—and it just appears that there is a "controlling power" somewhere that is having its weight.

One prominent citizen of Cisco was heard to remark that he believed some of our bond money built the swimming pool, and then turned it over to the amusement company, and the city then went on paying the cleanout bill; that the amusement company either couldn't or wouldn't pay. That kind of business may be all

right—but it doesn't look right to me.

We have heard that some of the controlling powers in our city affairs are manoeuvring around now trying to throw our town into the hands of receivers and try then to get one of the "old gang" appointed as the receiver. I do not know if this is true. I can hardly believe it possible that one could rake hell with a fine toothed comb and find a man low enough to desire to heap such havoc on our town as such action would bring about.

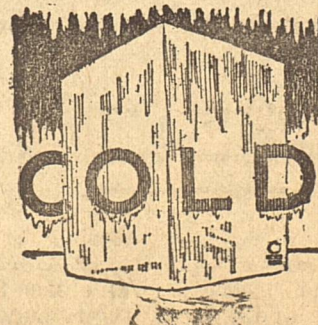
