BOARD PLANS ECONOMIES IN ORGANIZATION

He submitted a report of the fi-nancial operations and scholastic activities of the system for the past year and one-half.

The board adopted measure which are aimed at insuring contin-uation of the school term to the required nine months. Economies of various character were discussed. Next year's set-up will incorporate number of revisions and consolidations designed to permit the operation of the system upon a reduced inancial basis without affecting the efficiency of the system, it was indicated. 





UNIFORM TAXATION.

Mounting costs of government, high under prosperous economic conditions and staggering under depressed economic circumstances, are due for a violent decline if the movement toward the formation of taxpayers associations throughout the country means anything. The business slump that has struck the country at this time has had the effect of increasing the tax burden in the proportion that it has lowered the income of the taxpayers and increased the purchasing power of the dollar, for the costs of government have failed to decline in the proportion that income and values have declined.

As revealed in a recent article by County Auditor W. S. Michael published in these columns, government costs—if the instance of Eastland county can be taken as an example—are due in the largest degree to payments on bond issues which are contract obligations and cannot be lowered. Two-thirds of the county taxes are allocated to the liquidation of these obligations. Until some relief is afforded in this direction there is little hope, as Mr. Michael points out, for a material reduction of the tax burden.

Formation of taxpayers associations, if kept within pidity. their proper sphere and prevented from developing into a state propaganda organization pledged to the support of a particular and well defined ticket, should exert a healthful effect. The proper place for these associations is among the citizenship and not as a statewide organization with paid officials. In the latter event a taxpayers league becomes merely another party with its own ticket and platform, which logically and naturally occurs the political enmity of the established political organization.

It is estimated that one dollar out of every six dollars earned goes to the cost of government. The annual tax bill has reached a staggering sum, blamed upon waste and extravagance, so staggering that the people cannot bear the load. Taxes shall be equal and uniform, is a prime principle of the constitution but so involved and illogical is our system of meeting governmental expenses that this principle is violated on every side. While imposing burdens of unequal character, our present tax system provides innumerable opportunities for firms, corporations and individuals t their proportionate share of taxes which necessitates heavier impositions in other directions.

Until some fundamental and sweeping revision of the state scheme of taxation is effected—a revision that will do away with the "joker" in the method of valuating property for taxation—there is little hope for any permanent and equitable relief.

POLL TAX PROOF.

The action of the Texas Highway commission in requirmay feel the pinch of hard times county tax rate is poor and shorting that only Texas citizens be used in building Texas highways is a commendable action, but the method adopted for putting this requirement into effect robs the action of a large part of its merit. The commission recently announced that a poll tax receipt must be shown as an evidence of Texas citizenship when applying for work.

The effect of this ruling is to deny employment to the element most in need of it. The men most in need of jobs today are men who have not been able to secure poll tax receipts and if the man possessing such a receipt is to be given preference over the man not so possessing, the highway department employment program will fail in its ultimate object and a large section of the most needy citizens will be denied the relief that is meant to be given them.

It is quite true that such a requirement will prevent floaters from taking jobs that rightfully belong to the citizens of Texas and that it will serve to build a stronger citizenship, but at the same time it will make it harder than ever for a deserving citizen utterly without means to obtain any of the relief to which he is entitled.




