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

# **Notice Of** Tax Revenue Increase

The City of Cisco conducted public hearings on September 7th, 2009 and September 15th, 2009 on a proposal to increase the total tax revenues of the City of Cisco from properties on the tax roll in the preceding year by 5.6%.

The organized boosters, the economic stimulators and especially we folks in the local hometown newspapers. We personally offered help in the form of tailgate parties, publicity stunts, enormous tub-thumping and everything else we could muster to help them bring their sales up to the level that corporate bean counters would recognize as being a viable entity. Further our offers did not include paid adversiting, although that certainly would have been available.

Among the many things you heard about the closing was the word that the "local people" just didn't support it properly. Well: one, we don't think they choose that key I-20 spot based on local support; and two, if

they actually sought local support, their actions, when here, did not indicate it: apparently their national policy is "no local advertising." Could they have remained viable if they had advertised locally?

Probably not, for a number of reasons, mainly because most (some) of us aren't naturally attuned to exotic coffees, gussied up with this and taht to the point of not actually being recognized as a "cup of Joe". Most (some) of us drink a lot of coffee at home and away, but a touch of cream and maybe a dab of sugar suffice for many. The rest of us take it black, hot and frequent.

Maybe too, the addition of a coffee bar at the local McDonald's may have been a factor; they always serve a really good cup of just plain coffee, right strength, right heat, as well as the fancy models, just right for those who prefer them.

The some Louisiana natives among us who do go for power-, ful brews (usually with chicory), somewhat like the Italians who take a pinch of fine ground coffee, add maybe three drops of water, brew it to what they call espresso; gulp one tiny cup down, strained between their teeth, and that's it for them for the day. They don't drink coffee like we do all day long.

These "hopper blends," using half rates of each product mixed together, maximize both earliness and long-lasting effects of red imported fire ant treatment by combining a faster acting ingredient such as hydramethylnon with an insect growth regulator that prevent worker ant production by affected queens for months following application.

This performance profile resulting is often superior to either product applied alone at the same cost. The extended duration between needed treatments cuts treatment costs on an annual basis when the number of multiple applications is reduced.

The "ship swath" treatment is a first for Texas and the nation.
