

Flying Fortresses made a heavy attack on Citvitavecchia, Central Italian seaport 38 miles northwest of Rome, and other bombers raided Sardinian bases, the Allied High Command announced today as the Allies pressed a series of hammering blows against the southern fringe of Axis Europe.

The four-engined bombers scored direct hits on several ships in the Civitavecchia harbor, on fuel storage facilities and on an ammunition dump which exploded.

Medium bombers raided the Sardinian port of Albia, sinking three ships and seriously damaging a large tanker and other ships. The docks and industrial area of the port were damaged and three enemy aircraft destroyed.

Fighter bombers attacked northern Sardinia, bombing the air field and port of Alghero and the harbor at Porto Torres. Railroad points in that area also were attacked. Wellington bombers made a heavy attack on the southern Sardinia port of Cagliari causing heavy explosions.






GREAT DAY.

From the "Wabash Blues" which meant little to anybody, the musical sergeant suddenly swung into "Tipperary."

Then the party really started. Monsieur Roger Puig's cafe opened up everything. The British, French and American soldiers nearly sung their heads off. From "Tipperary" they passed to the Marseillaise, and by that time people were pouring in from the street. Madame Puig called for an American march, and the shattered town heard the "Stars and Stripes Forever."

Well, the correspondent couldn't stay there all day. He had a war to report. As he emerged to the outer daylight an American general drove past in a jeep, the first to reach Bizerte. 




