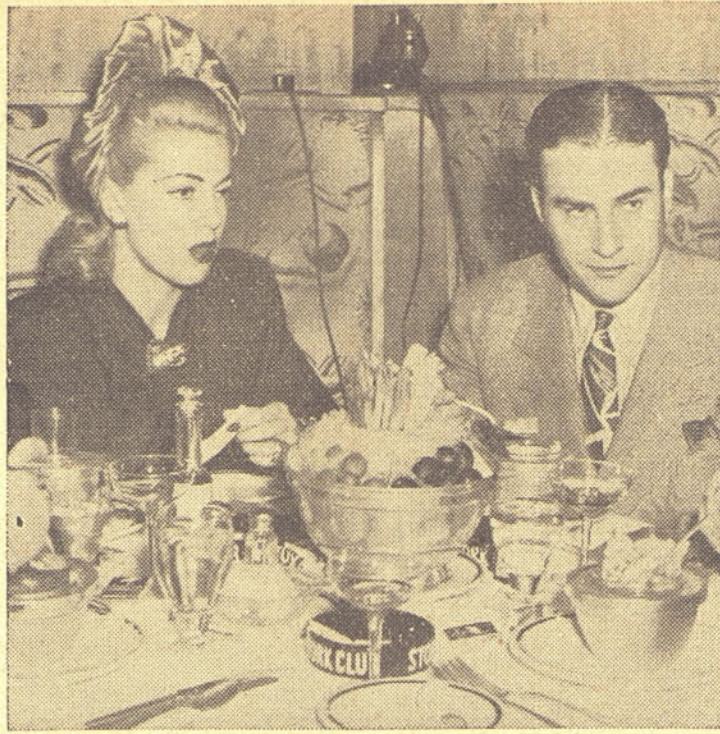
Larger Quantities of Food

CATTLE MARKET

Demand was rather narrow for the light run of cattle and calves on the Fort Worth market Saturday but the few sales reported showed little change in prices from Friday's levels. Low quality offerings predominated.

In the hog market prices were 5 to 15c lower than on Friday with the top \$10.35.

Killing classes of sheep and lambs were fully steady. Scattered sales were made on common and medium grades of steers and yearlings at \$6.50 to \$9. Most butcher cows brought \$5.75 to \$6.50, very few making \$6.75 upward. Canners and cutters cleared at \$3.25 to \$5.50. Most bulls were of kinds selling at \$7 down.

Slaughter calves bulked at \$6.50 to \$8.50 with odd head of good calves at \$9 and higher while rams sold down to \$5.50.

Not enough stockers were offered to make any test of the market.

The hog market was 5 to 15c lower than on Friday with most sales to packers. The top of \$10.35 was paid for good and choice 180 to 280 pound butchers. Most of the supply consisted of mixed grades and pigs. Medium grade butchers sold at \$10.25 down and the pigs were unsold at a late hour. Packing cows cashed at \$9.50 or weak. Compared with a week ago, good butchers were 25 to 35c lower.
