Crash Occurs 2 Miles East of City at 5:15 o'Clock p. m.

EASTLAND, Feb. 4.-John Foster, 55, and his son Rufus Foster, 23, were instantly killed at 5:15 o'clock Tuesday afternoon when the car in which they were riding was struck by the westbound Sunshine Special of the Texas and Pacific railway at a crossing two miles east of Eastland.

Rufus had been working as a tool dresser on a well near the crossing where the accident occurred and his father had gone to the well to bring him back to Eastland when they were killed. The car was completely demolished and wreckage was scattered for a distance of several hundred yards down the tracks.

The bodies were taken to an undertaking company's parlor in Eastland immediately following the accident.

The two Fosters live near Flatwoods about four miles south of Eastland. The elder Foster is survived by his wife and five chilriren, one of whom is Carl Foster captain of the Eastland Mavericks during the past football season

The younger Foster was unmarried. Funeral arrangements had not been completed this morning.
