EDITORIAL -

HOUSING SHORTAGE ACUTE IN BAIRD

There never were too many houses in Baird, except at the low ebb of the depression when all kinds of property everywhere could be bought for ten cents on the dollar value. For the last six or seven years, Baird has had some problem in providing houses and apartments to meet the demand.

Now that oil activity has picked up briskly here during recent weeks, to find a vacant house or an apartment is something to shout about. Oil field workers, seismograph crews, and new residents in general have been pouring into this town searching for places to live without much success. Many have turned away and are taking up residence in nearby towns and are driving back and forth to their work.

Quite a lot of this demand for more houses has been brought about by the fact that Baird now has an adequate water supply. People are just naturally turning to the friendly town of Baird as a pleasant place to live and make a living. The influx of new people has been a little too sudden, and there are not enough roofs in town to cover all of them.

A number of local people are talking about constructing rent houses, turning part of their homes into apartments, and other ways of accommodating new residents. Most of these new folks do not want to buy a home right off the bat. They would rather rent a while, then buy. For those who would like to build a new home or buy one that is already built, the problem is not at all serious. The new Ross Acres Subdivision has not filled up yet, and there are plenty of lots for many more houses. Key City Builders will build the house and finance it, so this leaves only the rent problem yet to be solved. If someone will come up with a plan to finance a low-rent housing project, they would hit the nail on the head and Baird would probably grow faster in the next few months than it has in a like number of years.

The bridge, named for one of Thialand's kings, was used as a transportation artery by the Japanese who had occupied the country.

B-29s took off ot fix that bridge. Luck was with the squadron. They scored direct hits and destroyed three spans of the bridge "I was so scared I didn't get much of a look at the damage, but I think it was good," Johnson said.

Chien, who was closer, says he believes the bridge is still out of use. A direct hit was scored, and the Japs couldn't use the bridge any more. I was within hearing distance

of the bomb but was not in danger, he said.


