Captain Little was in the front cockpit, and it is believed he was piloting the plane. It is believed by some witnesses that the flyers intended to land. As the machine was carried near the viaduct it was carried near the viaduct it for a certain grandmother who had headed straight up and suddenly as heard very little for fifteen years. After hundreds of people from the viaduct looked on, the plane whirled about and dived to the ground.

Captain Little was still living when witnesses reached the scene, but died while being taken to the emergency hospital for medical at-
