

Now the Wagner act guarantees labor's right to bargain collectively, makes any employer-attempt to interfere with employes' self organization an unfair practice, outlaws the company dominated union and gives the labor union representing a majority of the employes in a shop a right to speak for all the employes in that shop, "whether or they are members of the union.

Company unions (the closed shop), are found in many of the industrial centers of America. Collective bargaining and the outlawry of company unions is a moss covered issue. 

## LEAF WORMS **ARE INVADING** TEXAS FIELDS

CTLLEGE STATION, July 19-The leaf worm is invading Texas cotton fields ahead of usual schedule this year, according to R. R. Reppert, Extension entomologist at Texas A. and M. college.

Control measures have become recessary in most of the southern ounties, he said.

"Frequent showers for the past two weeks have been favorable to the pest's multiplication spread, although the hot days have tended to hold it in check. Should cool weather with showers at the same time develop, damage this pest will be extensive," Reppert

The leaf worm is easily control! ed, according to the entomologist pointed out, recommending calcium arsenate as the best method.

He recommended the application of the chemical in dry form where dusting machinery is available and under ordinary conditions.

"Five pounds an acre applied in an event dust cloud should be sufficient except where there is an ex ceptionally large growth of cotton when ten pounds an acre should be used. It should be applied early in the morning while there is dew on the plants, although it is effectice when applied in midday provided there is no wind."





Average weekly production per unit during June, 271,422 board feet, represented an increase of 12.4 per cent over the previous month and 33.8 per cent over June, 1934, it was pointed out. Shipments per unit 315,775 board feet, although 2.7 per cent below May, were 47.3 per cent above those of the similar month last year. Unfilled orders, however on June 30 totaled 631,565 board feet, or 26.8 per cent below the corrspending date a month earlier and 2.4 per cent below those of June 30 last year.






