## Poll Tax Payments Lagging Over County Area As Deadline Nears

Sales of poll taxes over Eastland County were reported lagging yesterday with the deadline — next Saturday, Jan. 30 — only a week away.

Edgar Altom, Eastland County tax assessor and collector, also reminds citizens that Saturday, Jan. 30, also is the final deadline for payment of currently due ad valorem taxes. Effective Monday, Feb. 1, he said, unpaid taxes will be subject to penalty and interest.

In 1964, a presidential election year, 4,747 poll taxes and 597 exemption certificates were issued in the county. Since this is an "off-election" year, substantially fewer polls are expected to be sold.

However, county and city officials remind citizens that there will be a number of important local elections and in order to qualify for voting in city, school and other important referendums a poll tax receipt or exemption certificate is required.

Assessor - Collector Altom has emphasized that over-age persons, who are not required to pay their poll tax in order to qualify to vote, or not required either to obtain an exemption certificate to be eligible to vote.

Through Friday at 5 p. m. there had been 687 poll taxes

issued at the County Tax Assessor - Collector's office at the courthouse, a report showed.

It is true, he said, that exemptions have been issued in the past to those who have insisted on having them, but are not supposed to be written because rules pertaining to the issuance of exemption certi-

ificates specify "A person 60 of age does not have to obtain an exemption certificate if he does not reside in a city having a population of 10,000 inhabitants."

Mr. L. E. Clark, Democratic precinct chairman at Desdemona and one of the deans of the election judges, explains voting requirement like this:

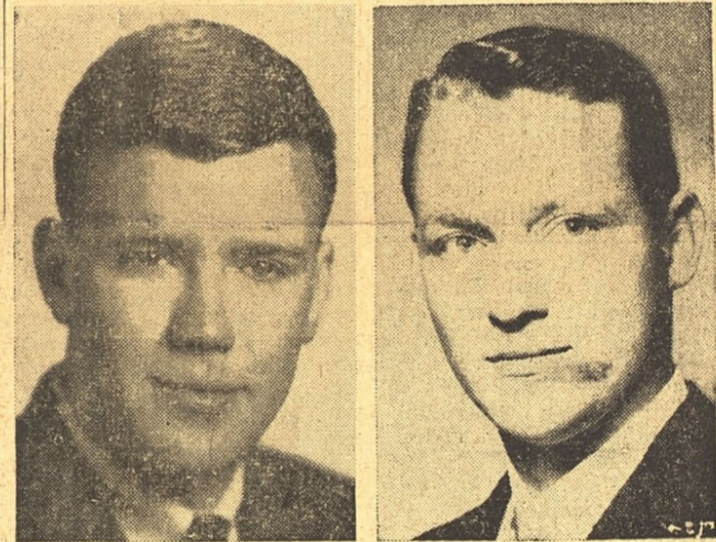
"All persons between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years are subject to a poll tax as a qualification to vote in any state, county, city or school election in 1965."

"Any person who attained his twenty-first birthday any time in 1964 may vote at any general, special, primary, city or school election by obtaining a certificate of exemption from the county tax collector before Feb. 1, 1965."

"Any person whose twenty-first birthday falls after Feb. 1, 1965, may obtain a certificate of exemption at least 30 days before any election at which he wishes to vote and be deemed a qualified elector."

"But any such person who has failed or refused to obtain such exemption certificate shall not be allowed to vote. Art. 5.17, Texas Election Code. "Any individual desiring to vote free, because of overage, must be 60 years of age before Jan. 1, 1964. No exemption certificate is required of such person, except in cities of ten thousand population or more."

"Persons desiring to register as a qualification to vote instead of paying a poll tax may vote only in federal elections, or for candidates for federal offices of the United States."

## Preliminary Plans for Museum Completed

Preliminary architectural drawings of the proposed Texas Oil Museum to be built in Ranger — tentatively on a 25-acre site located south of the city on the old hand-laid brick highway once known as the "Broadway of America" — have been completed and are on display in the offices of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce in downtown Ranger.

Charles Fox, executive director of the project, said Wednesday morning that copies of the plans are being shown to oil industry leaders in the Fort Worth-Dallas area this week.

Building site for the museum, now owned by Ranger Chamber of Commerce, would later be deeded to Texas Oil Museum, Inc., an independent, non-profit corporation formed here last fall. Plans indicate the Jaycees' rodeo arena would remain in its present location, but the Pony League baseball park would

be moved to another location on the plot.

According to the preliminary plans of Earl E. Koeppe, Fort Worth architect, the museum edifice will be 250 feet from end to end with an open entrance 44 feet wide separating two exhibit buildings each 106x50 feet.

A second floor housing an office, lounge, spacious conference room, and large kitchen will be located over the center of the ultra-modern structure.

Outstanding feature of the museum design are the five aluminum oil derricks which will protrude through the flat

roof of the building. A large 66-foot derrick with a 20x20-foot base will be in the center over the open entrance area. Stairs to the second floor would be built inside the base of that derrick. Two smaller derricks, each 40-feet high, are shown on each of the two exhibit buildings. Their bases, 10x10 feet, would be glassed in from the floor to ceiling, with flowing water fountains and colorful floral displays inside.

Flood lights will be erected on the crowns of the five derricks to light the front area and also the large block-long mall to be located at the rear of the museum. On each side of the mall later will be erected replica buildings of the old roaring oil boom era as were seen in Ranger and neighboring cities and communities in the field, scene of one of the most fabulous and highly-publicized petroleum explosions in the history of the industry.

# Eastland County Official Ends Long, Varied Career

"Yes, I retired January 1, but I'm still working every day, trying to get all the yearly reports in, as well as the final report of my last four-year term."  
This statement was made by J. C. Allison, who at age 82, has finally decided to retire from a long and varied career.

assessor - collector for Eastland County. He is winding up 14 years in the courthouse, where he started as chief deputy for the then tax assessor-collector, Stanley Webb.  
When Webb resigned the post, Allison was appointed for the remainder of that term and later won two four-year terms in the county elections.

Joseph Carroll Allison was born in Eastland County, four miles east of Carbon, on November 24, 1882, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Redmond Allison, farmers.  
He first attended school at the now extinct Bear Springs School. "I always wanted to be a school teacher, and when I finished the rural, ungraded school, my father promised me and my brother \$225.00 each for further schooling, if we would help him make a cotton crop."  
"Well, everything seemed against us and in the early fall we picked exactly one bale of cotton from 71 acres. Later rains made the cotton grow and we later harvested 30 bales."  
"My brother and I were off to Sam Houston Normal Institute in Huntsville, and I got my two year certificate and then a permanent certificate to teach and taught my first school in Hamilton County.  
"In Comanche County I taught in a rural school and two of my students are now prominent Eastland County citizens: T. E. Richardson, Eastland druggist and store owner, and the former Fannie Cannon, now the wife of Judge Elzo Bean and living in the southwest of Eastland County."  
His first teaching in Eastland County was done at a school — "I can't remember the name" — about halfway between Sipe Springs and May.

Also Attended UT  
He later attended the University of Texas for two years, furthering his teaching preparation but never getting a degree.  
He taught in Dickens and after marrying Edna Adkins, they both taught in Afton, near Dickens. She died in 1921, leaving him with two sons, Carroll, who died in California in 1964 and Joe Win-

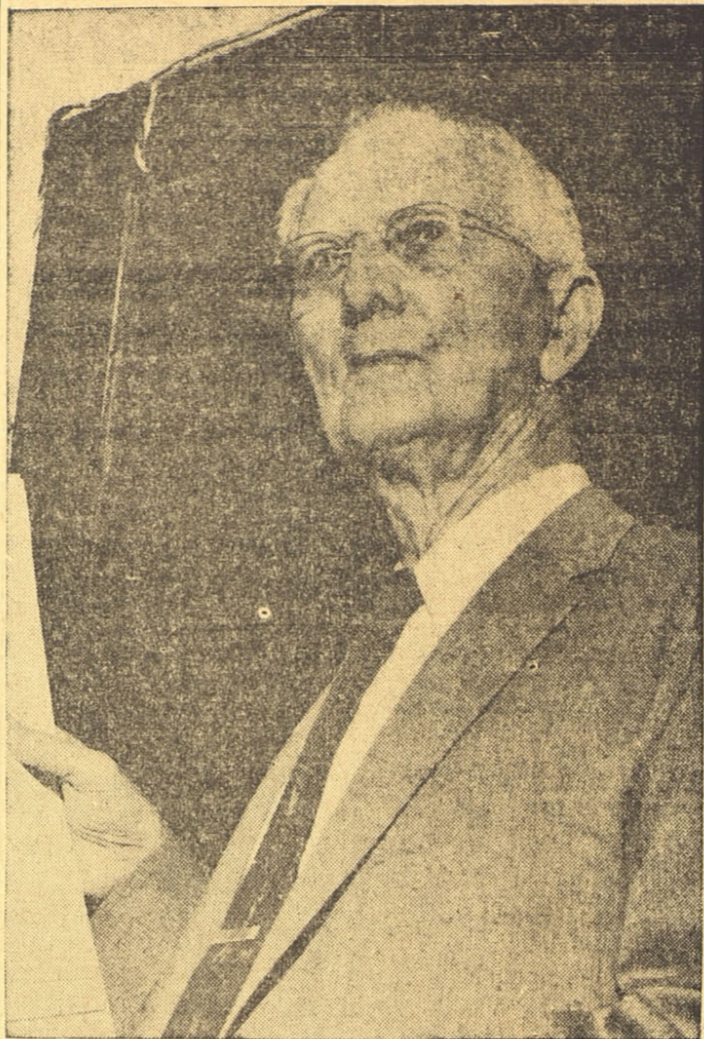
ston, now a Baptist preacher, living in Clarendon.  
In 1922 he married Lillie May Shelburne in Abilene. They have seven children: Mrs. W. S. Dikes of Irving; John Allison, a chemical engineer for El Paso Natural Gas Co. in Farmington, N. M.; Mrs. W. L. Foster of Eastland; Rev. Grady Allison of Baytown; Nelson T. Allison, principal of Gonzales Elementary School in Odessa; Mrs. Bill Beaty of Robert Lee; and Rev. James C. Allison of Loving.

Two of the Allison sons are Baptist ministers, the husband of one daughter is a Baptist minister and the husband of another daughter is a Christian Church minister.  
The entire Allison family has been active members of Baptist churches and Mr. and Mrs. Allison are now members of Bethel Baptist, where he teaches the Sunday School Class for men 45 years of age and older.

Formerly at Breck  
Before moving back to Eastland County, Allison was principal of Breckenridge High School for two years and superintendent five years.

In 1911 he, with a partner, bought the Eastland Chronicle and he worked as a newspaper-man for one year. He had done newspaper work while at the U of T.  
"The paper just wouldn't make enough to support two families so I started back at other work. I kept my interest in the paper for eight years, but sold it when I was appointed principal of Eastland High School in 1919 at a salary of \$2,000 per year."  
During the summer of 1922, he taught at Simmons College, (now Hardin - Simmons University.)  
Following seven years at Eastland High as principal and math teacher, he became secretary - treasurer of a paving and pipeline construction company.  
Then the depression days came and there were years of bookkeeping for different firms in Eastland; several at a time.  
Some of these jobs included city tax assessor and collector; 14 years with International Harvester dealers. These various jobs brought him along to the chief deputy's spot in the county tax assessor - collector's office 14 years ago.

Baptist of Year  
In 1958, he was chosen Baptist Father of the Year for Texas, being nominated by

his church here. He thinks having so many sons and sons-in-law in the ministry is what won the award for him.  
He has been a Baptist deacon since 1926.

An avid reader of the Abilene Reporter-News' two papers a day, he says "I had to take the paper for my children, five of whom are graduates of Hardin - Simmons. They wanted the college and town news. Then when they all were gone, the Reporter-News had become a habit."  
During the depression years, Allison, moved his family to a farm, 2½ miles south of Eastland. He walked that distance to and from work in

Eastland each day. To this day he has not owned another car. His family attributes his trim physique, healthy, unlined face and general good health to his daily walks of some 20 city blocks to and from his work.

For years he has been a familiar figure, always well groomed and with a light step, making his way on West Commerce Street.

"I'll watch a lot of television and I'll play dominoes with some of my shut-in friends," he said when asked how he will spend his retirement.

### KARNES EXHIBIT FEATURES COLLAGE, DECOUPAGE, TOLE

The public is cordially invited to see the Karnes Exhibit in the Cisco Public Library on Mondays, Tuesdays and Saturdays from 2 until 5 p. m. for the next two weeks. The display will feature woodcarving, collage, decoupage, and tole painting.

Tole painting was very popular in the 1700's, and although it was then done on metal, now many interesting things are being done on wood and other surfaces.

The collages on display are nearly all abstract - that is, having only intrinsic form with little or no attempt at pictorial representation. Modern movements in painting and sculpture have one common element, the belief on the part of the artist that line, form, color, and texture have in themselves expressive powers, convey moods and suggest feeling. Painting may convey tension or relaxation but does not arouse specific emotions like fear, hate, love, envy and others.

Mr Karnes' choice of form and color is exciting and dazzling and replete with dynamic vitality. One finds all the timbers of a great orchestra, from the riotous brilliance of the trumpets to the graceful melodies of the violins, thus reflecting this fine musicianship. Mr. Karnes expressed himself saying "So much of our visual existence is completely predictable that it is exciting to discover new shapes and color combinations, trying out new techniques can cause accidents, but solutions many times in-



roduce new ideas." Mr. Karnes lives in Breckenridge where he teaches piano and art, but he also maintains studios in Eastland and Ranger.

He is the Chairman of the regional National Guild Piano Auditions and is organist at the First Presbyterian Church. As a member of the well known Eastland County String Group he has appeared on many programs in this vicinity.

Last year a group of Breckenridge residents and college students participated in a refinishing and tole painting course and some of their work is on exhibit with Mr. Karnes. Mrs. Lester Clark is showing a decoupage'd canister and box; Mrs. Bill Black, a lovely powder box and an impressively huge candle holder made from an old fashioned porch post. Mrs. Phil Pitzer and Mrs. Robin Rominger are displaying elongated wood carvings and painted crockery; handsome boxes by Mrs. Eloise Guerant.

Collages are by Gay Sheets, Cecelia Weatherford, Dru Thompson and Lois Pardue. Among the collages is one which the students presented Mr. Karnes as a group project at the completion of a collage course which he gave last summer. "I feel it is one of the most interesting and dignified pieces that I have seen in this medium" Mr. Karnes said.

Two of Mr. Karnes' works are presently on tour and after being shown in Dallas, Beaumont, San Antonio, and El Paso, the exhibit will close July 4 at Texas University. During the State Fair of Texas, 55 pieces of painting and sculpture were chosen by San Hunter of Massachusetts, Brandes University, having been judged from 1036 pieces. Karnes was one of the six artists in the state who is represented by both entries.
