Quick I called out to the blower, Through the keyhole of my door, "Have you seen her, seen my white hen called Lenore?" Quoth the rooster, "Nevermore!"

We can conceive of Mr. R. L. Poe indulging his poetic inheritance and his poultrine predilection while drowsing after lunch time. But outside of that there is no doubt that his idea for encouraging chickens and eggs in the Cisco community is one worthy to be adopted.

PEACE ACROSS THE PACIFIC

"There is now no possible cause of war between America and Japan," says Michemasa Soyeshima, Japanese statesman, to a Chicago audience.

"I feel convinced that America and Japan will never fight, and must never fight; for a war between these two countries would be a crime against mankind and a sin against God."

Almost every war is that. But calmly considered, war between Japan and America is more than usually unthinkable, for the reasons given by the visiting Japanese gentleman, and for others.

The two countries have always been fast friends, until certain little unpleasantnesses developed in connection with the immigration problem. Old friendships are not wiped out in a minute. Japan does not forget the benefits derived from America, and America does not forget her

admiration for Japanese courage, industry and honor.

Peace sentiment, moreover, is growing throughout the world. And there is the practical consideration that effective warfare between these two countries, across the wide Pacific, would be a difficult matter, even if either country wanted it, and with all the aid that could be given by aircraft.

WASTED GASOLINE

How much of the potential energy is obtained from the gasoline burned in the 20,000,000 or more internal combusted engines used in this country? About 5 per cent of it, says C. F. Kettinger, president of the General Motors Research Corporation. "The other 95 per cent is thrown away."

This is an almost incredible waste, which belies the vaunted efficiency of our gas motors. The steam engine burning coal or oil does far better.

It is a waste, too, which Mr. Kettering pronounces unnecessary. He declares that motors can be built which will give at least 50 per cent efficiency.

The public naturally wonders, then, why such motors are not built and why the inefficient motors are not scrapped. The change from 5 per cent efficiency to 50 per cent efficiency would be equivalent to multiplying the gasoline supply—which means the petroleum supply—by ten.

VACATION FOR WORKMEN

An industrial commissioner suggests that the lure of the "white collar job" isn't necessarily its gentility, but may be the two weeks' vacation with pay that is frequently given large office workers.

He has been looking into this vacation business and the effect it has on employees. In a survey of 1,500 factories, he found that 90 per cent of them gave vacations with pay to their office men but only 18 per cent were equally generous with their "production workers." He also found that in the factories allowing annual vacations to the workmen as well as white collar people, there was no difficulty in getting good help, and the men were more contented, more faithful and loyal, and kept their jobs longer, thus amply making up for their vacation.

CLIMBING

Danger crops out in the new "super-power" electric systems, in an unforeseen way. Boys just will climb the steel towers, at risk of their lives. Within two days recently, in the same community, one young lad was instantly killed and another terribly burnt by shinning up to the lofty tops of such towers and coming into contact with high-voltage wires.

It might be possible to keep the kids off by barbed wire, but that is not at all certain, and the wire would interfere with the legitimate use of the towers by electric

linemen. What, then, is to be done as these dangerous wires spread and form a network over the whole country, in the process of natural electrification? Boys not only will climb, but boys ought to climb and have a right to climb. It is a deep-seated human instinct, especially strong in youngsters, and it serves a useful purpose in developing

their strength and self-confidence. Why not give them better facilities for natural and comparatively safe climbing? It is evident that a lot of boys are climbing electric light poles and high tension paralytic stroke.






