LONDON JAILS ARE BARE LONDON, July 31 .- One-third of the jails and penitentiaries in Engdown during the past ten years, according to statistics of the board of prison commissioners. Of the forty prisons now left only one-third have their full quota of prisoners, the rest being by no means full. This reduction in prisons is reflected on the figures that show that there has been to imprisonment since 1913. The total number of persons sentenced to imprisonment in the year 1924 was 8,216, as against 167,000 ten years reviously. Of the twenty prisons osed down most of them have been out to use either as apartment acks and training camps.

#### HOW THE GREAT COMMONER BECAME FIXED ON BRYAN






