Food Bank Is Set Up For Nursing Home Employees

Ruby Luna, who has turned her garage into a food bank for the employees of the Cisco Nursing Home, says she is not doing this for any self recognition but to help the other employees.

Mrs. Luna, her husband A.J., and son are employees of the Cisco Nursing Home. They have not received a check from their employers for October.

Mrs. Luna said about her job, "The residents of the home need help. Some of them are total bed care patients and we need to stay there to take care of them. We can't quit this job to find another one and just leave everyone." But the financial responsibilities are still with all of the employees.

"I just wish they would tell us the truth about what will happen. Or that they would have warned us from the start what was going to happen. The mental strain is very powerful now. It seems very hard right now because my husband has to have ma-

More Food Is Needed For Local People

Rev. Ronnie Shackelford of the Calvary Baptist Church in Cisco received a call from Ruby Luna Friday morning. Mrs. Luna has opened her garage to be used as a food bank for the employees of the Cisco Nursing Home. The employees have not received an employment check from the nursing home for October because of a new company buying the center.

She reported that all of the food has been given out to the employees and more is needed as soon as possible. If anyone wants to give food they may take it by Mrs. Luna's house at 1100 Front Street, Cisco.

Rev. Shackelford reported that quite a few donations have been given to the fund set up for the employees, but much more will be needed. The fund is to help the center's 55 employees with their financial needs until they receive their checks. The nursing center is the only financial income for several of the employees.

Citizens who would like to make a donation are asked to stop at the First National Bank in Cisco. The donation will be tax-deductible.

The day's program called for activities to begin at 10 a.m. with registration of ex-students at Maner Memorial Library. Refreshments were to be served until 11:30 a.m. and tickets were to be distributed for the homecoming and Parent's Day luncheon at the Laguna Corral Room from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Pre-game activities at the football game were scheduled to get underway at 2:40 p.m. A highlight was to be introduction of the 1985 homecoming queen. Some 10 CJC coeds had been

nominated for the honor. A dance at the SUB at 8 p.m. was the day's concluding event.

Coach Rick Frazier reported Friday that his Wranglers were ready and in good condition for the contest. National ratings published last Wednesday ranked the Wranglers No. 10 among the nation's junior colleges.

The Wranglers, 6-2 for the year and 3-2 in conference play, still had an opportunity to finish in a tie for the league title as Tyler and Henderson with 4-1 and 3-1 records, respectively, still had tough opponents to meet before the season's end.

The chief said that police had the identity of the forger and expected to arrest him soon.

At 5:30 p.m. Thursday, Mr. Rains arrested Cyrel F. Magnus, 63, of Cisco at East 16th and Beech Streets on third degree felony DWI. A breath test was run by DPS Trooper Robert Ralls before the man was placed in the county jail, Mr. Rains said. Bond had not been set early Friday.

Around midnight Thursday, Rebecca Sue Hardesty, 21, of Rising Star, called the Eastland County Dispatch office and told the attendant that "I want to give up." She had been charged with a third degree felony involving injury to an elderly person at the Cisco Nursing Center Oct. 12, 1985, Chief Rains reported.

Officers Larry Jernigan and Risa Livingston took custody of Miss Hardesty and placed her in the county jail. It was understood that her bond was set at \$7,500.

Fire Victim Is Identified

The remains of Richard Lee Brown, 37, who lost his life in the fire that destroyed a Canyon Road farmhouse last Oct. 30, were buried in graveside rites at Oakwood Cemetery in Cisco Friday. The Rev. Burdette Hitt of Childress officiated with arrangements in charge of Cisco Funeral Home.

The bones of the fire victim, which were taken to a forensic laboratory in Dallas after being recovered from the ruins of the home, were given a "circumstantial identification" by the lab, according to a report by Deputy Sheriff H.T. Fillingim.

The lab reported that while positive identification was impossible due to the severely burned corpse, they were "99 per cent certain from all evidence that the remains were those of Richard Lee Brown." The man's parents, Mr. and Mrs. R.L. Brown of near Cisco, agreed with the identification report.

The remains of Mr. Brown were returned to Cisco by the family Thursday. He was born Sept. 19, 1948, in Waltham, Mass., and had lived here and in Oklahoma for the past eight years. He worked as a carpenter and a mechanic. He was a member of the Methodist church.

Survivors include his parents of Cisco; six children who live in Maine and Massachusetts; two brothers, Frank Brown of Orlando, Fla., and R.D.

Deputy Fillingim reported that Ricky Steven Nance, 35, who suffered severe burns in the fire and who was flown to Parkland Hospital, Dallas, for treatment, was interviewed early in the week. His positive statement that "Richard Lee Brown did not get out of the house" con-

tributed to the identification verdict, the deputy said.

Mr. Nance underwent surgery Tuesday as part of the treatment for the severe burns he suffered over some 60 per cent of his body, Mr. Fillingim said. Mr. Nance could not sign a statement and his oral account in the presence of witnesses was notarized, he added.

Mr. Nance had been here for some time. His mother,

who lives in Phoenix, had been contacted and advised of her son's condition, Mr. Fillingim said. He and Mr. Brown had been living in the farmhouse, which was owned by the latter's parents, for some time.

"We have just about 'wrapped up' our investigation," Mr. Fillingim said, "and we are convinced that there was no foul play or anything illegal involved."

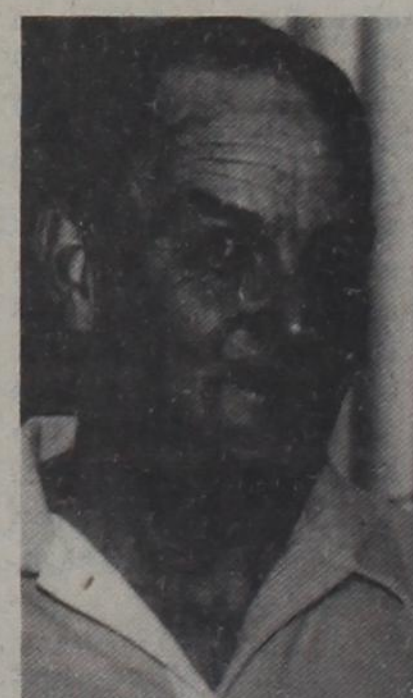
Will Recognize Cisco Jr. College

amounted to 27.3 inches, which is approximately the annual average for the county, Mr. Gordon said. This, he added, has been the big factor in a good crop yield.

The forage crops were the best in many years, Mr. Gordon said. Small grain crops have been excellent, and the peanut yield is expected to be average to above. Peanut harvesting, he said, is about half finished. Dry weather during July and August has cut the yield in places.

The average yield of peanuts for the past three years was about 1,090 pounds per acre. Mr. Gordon estimated that the 1985 crop would run around 1,500 pounds per acre. Some of the irrigated fields that have been harvested yielded up to 3,000 pounds per acre, he said.

The 1985 pecan crop will be large but the nuts some orchards yield may be light. The price is expected to be about the same as last year, Mr. Gordon said.

The county agent reported that a fire ant problem could be faced by Eastland County landowners. A small area with 60 or more beds of fire ants was found in Eastland last week, Mr. Gordon said. Steps are being taken to eradicate them.

Mr. Gordon urged

everyone to be alert for signs of fire ants and to report to his office when and if any are found. The state agriculture department will have technicians in the county in a few days to help with the problem, he said.

Lion Sutton Crofts was the

program chairman and introduced Mr. Gordon. Mr. Crofts noted that the county agent, a veteran of some 20 years in Eastland County, was awarded a plaque for outstanding work as an extension agent two years ago.

reported that the board of directors meeting last Tuesday morning approved a contribution by the club of \$250 to the Lions Camp for Crippled and Diabetic Children at Kerrville. The club also donated \$50 to the Cisco United Fund.

Mr. Gordon said the representative would use Amdro bait to control the mounds. Amdro is one of the recommended pesticides registered for the control of fire ants and has an active ingredient of 0.88 percent of amidino-hydrazone and is distributed by the American Cyanamid Company. Mr. Gordon also stated that he had checked with stores that carry pesticides in the area and that all stocked some sort of pesticide that is recommended for fire ant control.

Anyone having suspicions of fire ant infestation on their property may contact the County Extension Office at 629-1093 for information on identification and the control of fire ants. Homeowners and property owners will be responsible for treating their own infestations.

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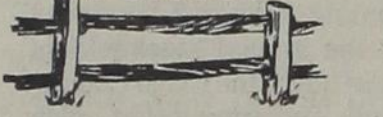
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TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

Many of the native plants you'll see this fall and winter can do more than add beauty to the landscape—they can be the source of excellent natural dyes.

With a few samples of undyed wool yarn, you can create your own rainbow tapestry with dyes from the wild. Dyes can be extracted from many flowers, fruits, leaves, roots and barks. Plants which produce dye materials in the fall include broomweed, which produces a rich gold dye; Maximilian sunflowers that yield a soft green from the blooms; and soapberries, which produce a bright yellow. Another good yellow dye can be extracted from the stems of the dodder, a parasitic vine that feeds off the plant it covers.

Plants in public lands are protected by law, but it's not hard to find neighbors or landowners who

will let you take samples from plants.



It's difficult to estimate exactly how much plant material you need, but you'll find a little goes a long way. A good rule of thumb is to collect two to three times as much plant material as wool you intend to use. For most weaving projects, you'll only need a few ounces of wool in each color and, therefore, need only a few ounces of each dye plant.

An excellent method of dyeing is through a simple solar process. Chop or cut all the plants into tiny pieces and place in glass jars. Then, fill the jar with water and set it out in the sunlight. In a few days, the water will begin to become colored

and you have a dye bath. Before dyeing your wool, it must be treated with a mordant, which is a chemical or metallic salt that assists the wool in accepting the dye. Once the wool is treated, you can add a skein to the dye jar. You can either leave the plant materials in the jar (wrapping them in cheesecloth if you do) or remove them when the dye water is the color you want it to be.

Add enough water to fully cover the wool and plants. With most plants, two to seven days will produce a nice color. Keep a tight lid on the jar during the dyeing process. When completed, rinse the wool in warm soapy water, rinse and hang it in the shade to dry.

A fire ant infestation has been confirmed in Eastland County, according to County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon. The ant mounds were found in the 1000 block of South Daugherty of Eastland. They were well established, with 25 to 30 active mounds. The city of Eastland and affected land owners are taking steps to eradicate the ants before they spread to other areas. The imported fire ant, now considered the most harmful ant pest in North America, is reddish-brown in color and about a quarter of an inch long. It has a venomous sting, and damages plant and animal life. Gordon says it will take everyone's cooperation to stop these ants and prevent their spread. Please report any suspected infestations to the county agent.

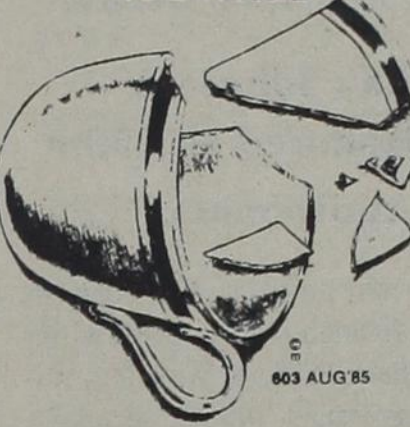
RANGER

Peanut growers were happy to see the sunshine in the last part of the week. Some peanuts had been dug for more than two weeks, badly in need of some sunshine and low humidity. The temperatures are getting low enough to stop maturity of those still in the ground. The best we can hope for is more sunshine and dry air. We are only 2 or 3 weeks away from the average first frost date.

Although we do not have official confirmation, we are sure that we have an Imported Fire Ant invasion in Eastland. Up until now this country has been free of this most destructive insect. Measures have already been taken to destroy the ant colonies, but it will take everyone's cooperation to stop these ants before they get a foothold in this country. Samples of the ants have been mailed to officials. As soon as official confirmation is received you will be getting information on control of the fire ant.

Some peach growers have been asking about doing their annual pruning this time of year. Based on all available research, this is probably the worst single time to prune that we have and is strongly discouraged.

All research on time of pruning for peaches indicates that pruning from now until about 30 days before bloom divitalizes trees and greatly increases risks of winter injury, short tree life, and bacterial canker. This is apparently because the wound healing mechanism for a peach tree

is very weak and when a wound is made at this time of year it is not able to wall it off adequately and as a result the tree is very susceptible to injury.

For these reasons, the closer to bloom a grower can prune, the more health his tree is likely to be in the spring of the year. Growers are therefore advised not to follow the practice of fall and early winter pruning unless factors beyond their control mandates that it be done at this time.

The outstanding 1985 pecan crop has cultivated interest in planting the state tree. Since there is a big demand for the new varieties early orders are needed to guarantee delivery of the best varieties. The following varieties are recommended for both home and commercial plantings.

The best varieties for West Texas are Western, Wichita, Cheyenne and Kiowa. These are the highest yielding varieties grown in the industry. They also come into production at a very early age and have a high quality kernel.

In Central Texas the variety list is longer and includes Cheyenne, Kiowa, Desirable, Choctaw, Wichita, Sioux, and Shawnee. All of these varieties are productive and have premium quality kernels. The continued planting of these varieties will make Texas the world leader in pecan quality. Since we are in West Texas we can grow varieties adapted to both areas.

There are some special interest varieties available

and may be worth trying in a very limited number. Podsednik is the largest propagated pecan in the world. Sioux has the highest quality kernel. Gratek has the highest percent kernel. The earliest ripening pecan is Pawnee. The Shoshoni variety comes into production in a very short period of time. Mohawk is the most beautiful lawn tree.

The first of a series of four horse shows has been set for Sunday afternoon, November 17, with registration beginning at 1 p.m. and the show starting at 1:30 p.m. The location of the horse shows will be at the Eastland County Livestock Show grounds. The order dates are December 8, January 12, and February 9.

There will be four age divisions: 8 years and under, 9-13 years, 14-18 years and 19 years and over. Classes will include: Showmanship at Halter, Western Pleasure, Western Horsemanship, Western Riding, Reining, Trail, Pole Bending, Barrel Racing, Stakes Race, and Flags. Awards will be given for high points.

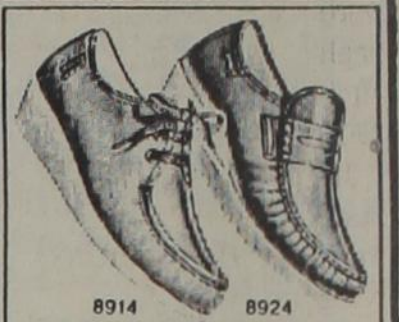
Awards to be given include 16 Halters, 4 Buckles, 4 Blankets and 4 jackets.

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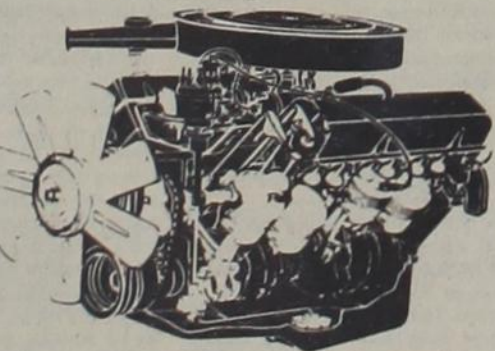

RRC Assesses

\$35,000 In Fines

The Railroad Commission issued a total of \$35,000 in penalties to thirteen oil and gas operators Monday for problems under the Commission's pollution and well plugging rules.

The largest of the penalties assessed in this group was \$8,000 to Tony Mathis of Houston for four unplugged wells on the Combs Smallwood lease in Hardin County.

Commission rules require operators to plug or produce wells that have been inactive for 90 days. Mathis' wells on the Combs Smallwood lease have been inactive since December 1982.

Other well plugging penalties included Hi-Tech Oil Co. of Eastland, \$3,000 for one well in the Caraway lease, Stephens County.

THE COLORS OF FALL

Each year as Mother Nature puts on her finery, I think it is more beautiful than the year before. This year is no exception. The magnificent color and color combinations will make an artist envious of the power of Mother Nature.

The colors of brown, red, orange, yellow, pink, white and green are controlled by the type of plant material as well as the weather. Recently I saw a tree standing alone on the top of a hill. The North side of the tree had dark red leaves with the center leaves being a light pink while the leaves on the South of the tree remained green. You could see where the frost or freeze line had come to this tree.

The North side of this tree had experienced a freeze or frost, while the South side of the tree had not experienced the frost or freeze. Then when spring comes next year the same tree that multi-colored today will leaf out all green with new leaves at the same time for the entire tree.

With in a grove of trees with all these colors you may see a tall stately pine tree that remains green and is standing tall as if to defy old man winter and his cold breath. Then you may see a large live oak which also is green standing against the forthcoming cold weather. Some of the other trees that are putting on colorful display may be the Red Oak, Pin Oaks, Sweet Gums, Maples, Sycamores and many others. The lacey red leaves of Japanese Red Maples adds not only beautiful color but, a very lacey textured leaf. Trees are not the only plant material that puts on a colorful fall display.

This time is the time of the

year that Chrysanthemums show their multiple colors and shapes. Here you can see tiny button types of Mums to the large incurves and spiders. There will be colors of yellow, white, red, bronze, pink, green and purples as well as combinations. These Chrysanthemums will bloom to the first hard freeze.

You may also see roses in bloom this time of the year. The Hybrid trees standing so stately with magnificent blooms on each stem. The Grandiflora with multi blooms to each tall stem and the Floribundas covered with the blooms to the point of obscuring the foliage on the short bushes. There will be colors of red, pink, bronze, orange, yellow, white, and salmon, etc.

At this time of the year you may see colorful foliage plants such as Sumac and Tobacco plants adding their beauty to the spectacular show Mother Nature is putting on.

This time of the year is a delight for the camera buff. However we can all enjoy the beautiful colors of fall. Let me encourage you to take full advantage of this colorful display.

Drilling Bits

At a location two miles southwest of Romney, Trinity Oil & Gas has finaled an oil producer in the Foster Field, Eastland County.

The well is designated as the No. 2 Bynum, pumping 31 barrels of oil per day plus 107 barrels of water. It is located in a lease in the Mary Ann Clark Survey, A-51. Bottomed at 3,510 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,060 to 3,078 feet into the hole.

Advance Exploration of Abilene has filed for permit to drill the No. 6 Hogan, a 2,000-ft. developmental well two miles north of Eastland. Location is in a 56-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-300. The well will be located in the Eastland Regular Field.

A Midland-based operator has staked location for the No. 1 R.K. Bond, a wildcat well to be located one mile southeast of Carbon, Eastland County. With projected total depth of 950 feet, the well will be in a 134-acre lease in the J.B. Craig Survey. The operator is Bill C. Burns.

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for the No. C-2 Hamilton, a wildcat venture of Mark H. Ellinwood in Eastland County's H&TC Survey, A-184. Spudded Nov. 3, 1984, the well bottomed dry at 1,460 feet. Drillsite was two miles south-

west of Nimrod.

Two 1,350-ft. developmental wells are planned by Kamb Inc. of Henderson at drillsites one mile southeast of Nimrod, Eastland County. The locations are in a 121-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-1318. Wells' designations are the Nos. 8-A & 10-A Broyles. They will be located in the Eastland Regular Field.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 2 Miller "B", a 1,900-ft. developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field. The operation will be located two miles northeast of Eastland in a 160-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, Sec. 2, Blk. 4. The operator is Pearson & Adams Inc. of Eastland.

Richey & Co. has given up its efforts to make a producer out of the No. 1 C.J. Kleiner "B". It was a developmental try in the Richey Field, Eastland County, three miles north-northeast of Cisco. Spudded

August 1, the well had reached 3,978 feet total depth.

Northridge Corp. of Duncanville has revealed plans to drill five new developmental wells in Eastland County.

The Nos. 1 H.H. Durham, 3 J.B. Harbin, 2 Victoria Harbin, and 3 J.M. Mulloy will be drilled in the Eastland Regular Field. The operator has 160, 80, 40 & 320 acres leased, respectively. The Durham and Mulloy wells carry permits for 4,000-ft. total depth, and the Harbin wells carry permits for 2,000-ft. The Durham well will be drilled two miles west-northwest of Eastland, H&TC Survey, A-844; the Mulloy well will be located one mile northeast of Eastland in the same survey, A-295; and the Harbin wells will be located four miles north-northeast & six miles north of Eastland, respectively, H&TC Survey, A-299.

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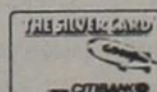

REFLECTING ON the results of Tuesday's Constitutional Amendments which all carried statewide, but which were "picked and chosen" by Eastland County voters makes one wonder what the mood really is.
 Of course not many turned out to vote - only about 10 percent of the qualified voters in this county, and think that is par for the state turnout. The mayors race in Houston and the bond votes in Dallas heavily influenced the outcomes too.
 One local suggests that the overall voting shows that the people of Texas are looking for changes; that they're not generally happy with the status quo.
 In Eastland County voters went heavily for the first two water amendments, but overall turned down No. Three which had to do with giving cities the right to run

Authority to the high courts was approved.
 A whopping majority here voted against setting up a board which could re-district the state's court system. The local Bar Association has spoken out on this issue asking that it not be approved for fear that Eastland County lose its one-county district court. A total of 890 voted with the bar and against the proposition, but 304 voted to approve the measure. Makes you wonder their reasoning.
 And of course the majority here voted their okay to do away with some offices in other counties.
 One wise citizen suggested that there should be one more Constitutional Amendment voted on:
 Proposition: For or against ever having any more Amendments to be voted on. This citizen suggested that the state's law makers are elected to make these decisions.
 What's the trend? If a person isn't sure what the proposed amendment means, does he vote against it automatically? We used to believe that, but not sure it's still true.
 Slightly connected is a suggestion by another citizen who believes that a "wet-dry" election should be held every five years (or a given time frame) as a matter of law, so that all citizens in every precinct could express themselves regularly on the matter. We're not advocating this, but it's an interesting thought. If it were law, then some dry areas could go wet, and some wet areas would go dry on a regular basis.
 So be it for the elections of '85. Next year promises to be an interesting one, what with the governor's race - and a number of local offices up for grabs.

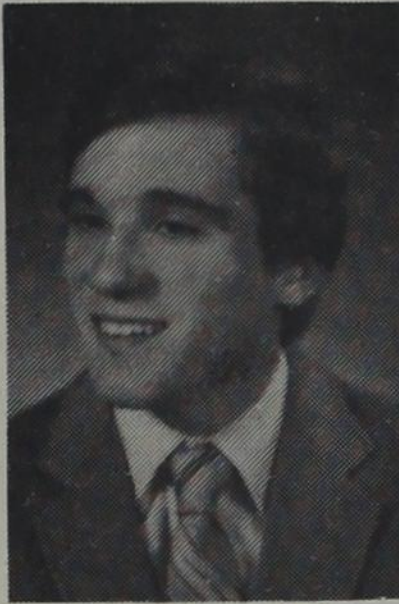
We have had several people who are becoming eligible for Medicare and it is felt this information is needed to be available to those under 65 years of age.
Who is entitled to Medicare A? If one is not eligible for a monthly Social Security benefit does not necessarily mean he or she is not eligible for Medicare Hospital Insurance (Part A). In general, however, Medicare Hospital Insurance is available at age 65 to people who have worked long enough under Social Security to earn a monthly benefit; to disabled persons under age 65 who have been entitled to Social Security disability benefits for at least 24 months; and to most people with permanent kidney disease.

New Law Affects Outdoor Advertising

A new law which will affect nearly all outdoor advertising sign owners was enacted by the last Texas Legislature. This bill, known as HB 1330, requires the owner of each off-premise advertising sign erected before September 1, 1985, along a roadside outside an incorporated city or town in Texas to register the sign by December 30, 1985, with the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. An off-premise sign is one which advertises a service or product not principally sold on the premises where the sign is located.
John M. Arthur, right of way engineer for the Brownwood district said the rules became effective September 5, 1985, and the Brownwood office has the forms available for registering these signs now. He explained that the law requires owners to register existing signs on all rural roads including U.S. and State highways, Farm to Market roads, and County roads. There is a \$25 nonrefundable fee required for each sign with the filing of the registration. The registration is valid for one year and must be renewed each year at a cost of \$10 per year.
Arthur pointed out that there are only two exceptions to the State registration requirement. If the sign was allowed under the Highway Beautification provisions of the Texas Litter Abatement Act or if the sign is in the extraterritorial jurisdiction of a city or town which is controlling signs in such extraterritorial jurisdiction, the sign does not have to be registered with the State. He said that both on-premise and off-premise signs erected after September 1,

Arthur said the rules and regulations have been published in the Texas Register and a Public Hearing has been scheduled in Austin at the main offices of the highway department at 2:00 p.m. November 18, 1985. The public is invited to attend and offer comments or request changes on the new rules. He added that HB 1330 in Article 2, Section 1, Legislative Intent states "It is the intent of the legislature to promote and control the reasonable, orderly, and effective display of outdoor advertising on all highways and roads located outside the corporate limits of cities, towns, and villages in Texas to promote the recreational value of public travel, and to preserve natural beauty."
