

DREPARATION of the premium list and other necessary details of the Eastland County Livestock show here February 25 and 26 has almost been completed by the committee of the chamber of commerce in charge. The committee has made an effort to prevent the show this year from being burdensome on local merchants from the standpoint of contributions. The manner in which it will be supported will reveal to a great extent just what Cisco business thinks of the importance of livestock to its section.

Whose Will Rules Congress?

WITH the anti-lynching bill about to be shelved and final disposition of the farm bill in sight congress is girding itself for battle over tax revision. It promises to become the outstanding issue before the 75th con-National advertising representatives, Texas gress, surpassing even the wage and hour bill in its economic and political effects.

The struggle will continue more or less under cover until the house committee reports a tax bill-which it evidently is in no hurry to do. In a Washington dispatch sum-1934, at the post office at Cisco, Texas, under the marizing the situation, the Associated Press says that tax revision will furnish a "critical test of administration leadership."

> It would be just as accurate to say that what congress does about tax revision will reveal whether it responds to the will of the people or of the president. The administration is exerting its leadership to force congress to accept tax policies which the country has repudiated. This is a strange kind of leadership for a democracy, but the administration has given no indication of yielding to the popular clamor for repeal of the undistributed profits tax and drastic modification or outright repeal of the capital gains tax.

The administration has halfway admitted that it might be advisable to modify the undistributed profits tax to exempt earnings of small corporations. But it has given no sign of receding from its demand that large accumulations be broken up. In this stand it has professed to have the support of small business men. But the little business men's conference in Washington last week handed the president an unqualified recommendation for repeal of the undistributed profits tax. It said nothing about retaining the tax on large corporations.

This narrows supposed public support of the administration tax policy down to organized labor. But organized labor's support is problematical. It is passive at best. Labor favors the tax if it will turn accumulated profits into work-producing channels. ut a fair trial has shown the administration's claims in that respect to have been

Gasoline Stocks Reach New High On February 5

Despite a moderate decline in crude runs to the stills of the nation's refineries, gasoline stocks continued to advance to a new peak, the report of the American Petroleum institute for the week ended Feb. 5, disclosed Tuesday.

Stocks of motor fuel continued upward, with a gain for the week covered by the report of 1,640,000 barrels, to bring the total motor fuel storage to 86,484,000 barrels, the highest in the history of the

Refiners cut back their charges during the week an average of 15,-000 barrels daily, to drop the rate of processing from 3,170,000 barrels daily to 3,155,000 barrels. Although this is a decline of 300,000 barrels daily from the peak runs of the summer season, it is estimated that approximately another 100,000 barreis daily must be cut from crude charges to meet the recession in gasoline consumption.

Gasoline stocks already have passed the peak reached in 1937 by 2,946,000 barrels, and are 15,-949,000 barrels higher than for the comparable week of 1937.

Despite tendency of Kansas and Oklanoma operators to take the bulk of their allowable production during the first week of the month, both of these states showed reduction in their daily average output for the week. Oklahoma was off 20,800 barrels daily, while Kansas was off 7,100 barrels daily. With the nation reporting a daily average drop of 41,200 barrels daily for the week to 3,316,450 barrels, Texas was in second place with a decline of 19,200 barrels

California showed an increase of 4,500 barrels daily.
