The Jacksons left Cisco for an extended tour in mid-December, with several stops on their itinerary, including a visit with son Robert in Midland; the Pat Ryan family in Marfa and the Fred Arrington family at Ventura, Calif., before sailing from the West Coast Jan. 16).

EDITOR:

It's about time to make another entry in my log. The days have passed all too fast and now it's about time to pack the bags again for going ashore Thursday morning at the Aloha Tower pier in Honolulu. In the meantime I'll try to bring you up to date on shipboard activities.

The Lurline is a ship of 26,000 tons and is 638 feet in length. Its power is derived from 25,000 horsepower turbines which drive the ship at 25 miles per hour. It is truly a City Afloat with accommodations for 770 passengers and a crew of 401 persons. There is a hospital aboard with staff, library, barber shop, beauty shop, all communications and a newspaper published daily. Some idea of the food requirements put aboard at Los Angeles reveal that 30,000 eggs came on the ship; twenty tons of fresh frozen meat, three tons of fish, fifteen tons of vegetables, two tons of butter, two tons of sugar, one ton of cheese and sixteen hundred gallons of milk. A complete bakery takes care of bread and pastries. The food is very excellent.

The daily program takes care of all ages on the ship, including Hula lessons for anyone wishing to enroll in the class. Needless to add that the classes are well filled. The class on this trip will graduate this afternoon at three o'clock at which time diplomas will be given.

Two musical organizations are regularly carried for entertainment; a full orchestra and a Hawaiian trio. A picture show runs for two or three shows daily. These shows are planned for both children and adults. The evening dinners are formal and are set to some particular theme; such as, Mardi Gras, Parisian Night, Captain's Dinner and Beachcombers Ball. The Mardi Gras featured costumes designed aboard ship, and will add that it was a fine show. Tuesday night featured a Talent Show featuring passengers, which proved good, also quite entertaining. For further review three front pages of the daily program are enclosed for your information.

Sunday morning programs included both Protestant and Catholic services. I am glad to report they were well attended. Sunday afternoon included a meeting of all service clubs. There were nine Lions in attendance, including four from White Deer, Texas, several miles east of Amarillo on Highway 60. These four Lions arranged this trip together, including their wives, and they are having a good time. Afternoon tea for the ladies is served at four o'clock. We met the Captain of the Ship at his reception and champagne party.

Believe it or not there is a golf tee aboard where we can drive golf balls out in the ocean. It amuses me to think what the fish does when he swallows a golf ball believing it to be a morsel of food. Trap shooting takes place daily, too. Bingo games are popular, also profitable to winners. So far the games of chance have been left to others. The horse race game is best attended and appears most popular.

We should be off Makapuu lighthouse early Thursday morning at which time welcoming festivities begin. We should pass Diamond Head at about 8:30 a.m. with docking times at ten o'clock. A Hula Troupe will board off port and will give a program alongside the swimming pool on the Marine Terrace. On arrival at the dock in Honolulu we shall be greeted by the Royal Hawaiian Band, official band of the City of Honolulu, which has played for

Missing Girl Found Safe At Home Of Friend

A 15-year old girl who had been missing from her home one mile northeast of Cisco since last Tuesday was found Saturday night at the home of a friend.

A search party of volunteers from Cisco, Eastland, and Ranger, the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department, city police, and the Highway Department instituted an extensive search after the girl's family reported her missing Saturday.

The young girl reportedly had left home on previous occasions but had never been missing that long before.

Justice of the Peace W. L. Lewis said today that plans have been made for Sheriff Lefty Sublett and his wife to take the girl to Gainesville State School for Girls Wednesday morning.

Two Youths Are Charged In Justice Court

Charges were filed Sunday in Justice of the Peace W. L. Lewis' court against a 17 year old boy and a 19 year old boy, both of Cisco, who have been charged with shooting numerous plate glass windows last Friday night, resulting in damages estimated at between \$3,000 and \$4,000.

The windows of business firms were shot with pellet pistols, beginning along in the Victor Hotel block on Ave. D and continuing on south to Reimers Cleaners. A telephone booth was also damaged.

The boys were put under bond and the case was bound over to the Grand Jury.

Mr. Lewis said that is was a very serious offense, and that he hoped other boys would realize the seriousness of it. Ordinarily in cases such as this the parents of the offenders make restitution for the damage, he added.

Fraudulent Insurance Sales Being Reported

"Beware insurance swindlers and report any recent improperly handled dealings with insurance agents."

That's the warning from County Sheriff L. E. (Lefty) Sublett, who reported Saturday that numerous fraudulent sales have been reported to his department this week, mostly by elderly, pensioned persons who have been slow in reporting improper handling of their insurance protection purchases.

"Apparently our county had a number of insurance swindlers last summer during June and July," he said, "offering policies and hospitalization protection to older, many of whom are otherwise uninsurable, taking their money and leaving town. We've had several reports from persons who said that they never received their policy, and when they

Oscar Schaefer, prominent farmer and rancher in the Cook Community was named President of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association at their annual mid-winter meeting in the conference room of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce recently.

Schaefer served several years as head of the group when it was organized in 1956 it was said. He replaces C. E. Smith, Rising Star, who will serve as vice-president. Ben McKinnis, Eastland, was re-elected Secretary - Treasurer. McKinnis, agricultural representative of a local utility company has served in this capacity for the past several years.

New directors named included A. D. Ellington, Cisco, retired oil company employee and considered an authority on walnut varieties, and Joe Bob Browning, Gorman. They will serve two years. They replace W. V. Fenter, Rising Star and Joe Philpott, Cisco.

Hold over directors to serve another year include C. T. Barton, Pioneer and Ben Freeman, Ranger.

In the pen of three steers fed under supervision of one County Agent or Agriculture Teacher, Eastland County placed 4th. These calves were shown by Cynthia Hounsel, Reggie Underwood, and Sandy Warlick and were fed under supervision of the Assistant County Agent, Bill McCutchen.

He explained that most of the calves were not quite ready. Seven out of the ten from Eastland County were entered in the lightweight class.

Two Students Approved For College-Work Plan

The first two of an approved 15 students have been qualified and accepted for the new Work-Study program being launched by Cisco Junior College and the City of Cisco under the federal employment-opportunity plan.

The two, both 18 years old, are Jeanne Morren, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Morren of Rt. 2, Cisco, and a 1964 Eastland High School graduate, and Elden Whitley, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. D. Whitley of Breckenridge.

Under the program, for which CJC was approved this past week, the federal government pays 90 per cent of a qualified student's salary and the hiring agency (in this case the City of Cisco) pays 10 per cent. The hiring agency must be a municipality or non-profit organization.

The two initial students were approved following interviews at the city hall Saturday morning. Present were College President Grady Hogue, City Administrator John Bohannon and L. E. Jenkins, director of technical vocational program, has been instrumental in inaugurating the new plan.

Young Whitley will probably be assigned to the city's water department beginning Feb. 1, Bohannon said, and Miss Morren will be assigned to the city hall office staff where she will begin clerical training. She is already a CJC student and Whitley will go into college immediately, he said.

The college currently has applications from 80 young people who are interested in the program. Other applicants should contact Mr. Jenkins at the college, it is reported.

Bohannon will meet with city department heads Monday to outline duties for the student workers, who are permitted to work 15 hours per week. More interviews are expected to be held next week, he said.

The city originally requested 30 job positions but only 15 have been approved thus far it is said. The jobs are considered "extra," permitting the city to perform services and tasks which it otherwise could not afford to have done.

The mayor and city commissioners have been enthusiastic about the program, Bohannon said, because it will allow the city to accomplish things it otherwise could not do, and at the same time, make it possible for youngsters to get an education if they are willing to work for it.

The program will be strictly supervised, Bohannon said, to see that the students are treated fairly and that they in turn produce the type of work required of them. Each is being carefully screened, he said, to determine how badly he or she wants to work for an education.

One of only 13 colleges in Texas approved for the program, and has been allocated \$13,700, President Hogue said.

Students may work with the non-profit sub-divisions of government such as city and county, and these jobs will not displace or interfere with regularly-employed persons, as this is a supplementary program, he said.

Three New Programs To Be Inaugurated At CJC Feb. 1

Young people, including high school drop-outs and others who have not been able to finish high school, will be offered an opportunity to "work their way through college" by the Technical-Vocational School of Cisco Junior College when the spring semester begins Feb. 1.

The two, both 18 years old, are Jeanne Morren, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Morren of Rt. 2, Cisco, and a 1964 Eastland High School graduate, and Elden Whitley, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. D. Whitley of Breckenridge.

Three new full-time programs will be inaugurated by the T-V School of CJC on Feb. 1 and the college has tentative approval for 100 campus jobs under the new federal College Work-Study Program of the Economic Opportunity Act, according to President G. C. Hogue.

The new courses are Industrial Drafting Technology, Industrial Engine Technology, and Industrial Welding Technology. Associate in Science Degrees will be awarded upon completing the two-year programs.

Eligible for the courses under the EOA program are students or individuals at least 18 years of age with a high school education or the equivalent. School drop-outs or those who have not been able to continue their high school education will be accepted on approval for certain phases of the programs, Mr. Hogue said.

The campus jobs will pay the students enough money to meet their college expenses, including room, board and tuition, Mr. Hogue added. In addition, the college has a broad National Defense Student Loan program available for regular students.

Graduates of the new T-V programs will be able to transfer to senior colleges to continue their studies or they will be qualified to accept jobs in industry, Mr. Hogue said.

The new program has been organized and will be directed by L. E. Jenkins, head of the T-V School at CJC. He

main objective of the course, Mr. Willis added, is to help those frustrated parents who in trying to help Junior with his math keep running into such remarks as "But, Daddy, that's not the way the teacher said to work it."

Wranglers, 5th In Nation, Meet Concordia Here, 7:30

Coach Leland Willis and his Nation's No. Five Cisco Junior College Wrangler basketball team continue to lead in Region V Junior College statistics with 16 wins and 1,701 points, averaging a giant 100.1 per game.

The Wranglers take on Concordia of Austin Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. in the local gym. Preston Sherrod leads the Region V scoring with a total of 377 for an average of 22.2 per outing. At fifth slot in Region scoring is Cisco's Harry Gunner, who has netted 334 for a 19.6 average.

Sherrod leads in field goal totals with 157 and Gunner has 133. Wrangler opponents through the issuance of the Region V statistics, had scored 1,223 points for an average of 71.9, per game.

The CJC team was named fifth best in the nation in junior college circles in polls released by the National Junior College Athletic Association, after impressive victories over Ranger, 109-88, and Fort Worth Christian College, 114-70. The top four teams are Dodge City, Kans.; Kilgore, New York City and Moberly, Mo.

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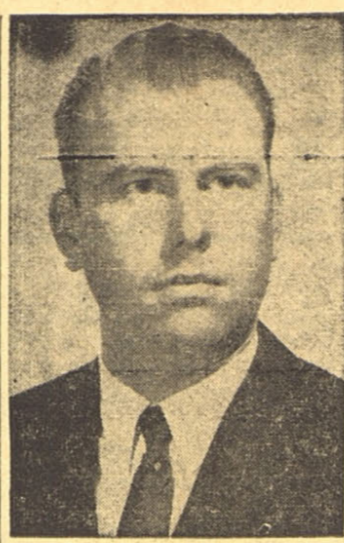
Legislative Panel Named By Association

A&M Tractor Short Course Underway Here

A tractor maintenance short course for adult farmers is underway under the sponsorship of the Cisco High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. T. M. Roach, Superintendent and Mr. Tommy Toland, teacher of vocational agriculture. The short course, sponsored by the vocational agriculture department of Cisco High School, began Monday and ends Thursday. Mr. Harold T. Wiedemann, tractor maintenance specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M College, is instructing. He is headquartered at Texas A&M College. Late registrations will be welcome, Mr. Toland said. Mr. Wiedemann, a native of Mission, received his B.S. Degree in Agricultural Engineering from Texas A&M College in 1956. During summer vacations he worked with the John Deere Implement Co. of Mission, and while serving 24 months active duty with the U. S. Army he was in charge of instruction and maintenance of both track and wheel type vehicles.

Tractor Maintenance Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each individual who attends all the training sessions.

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
