GREEN PROMISES A VIGOROUS BATTLE.

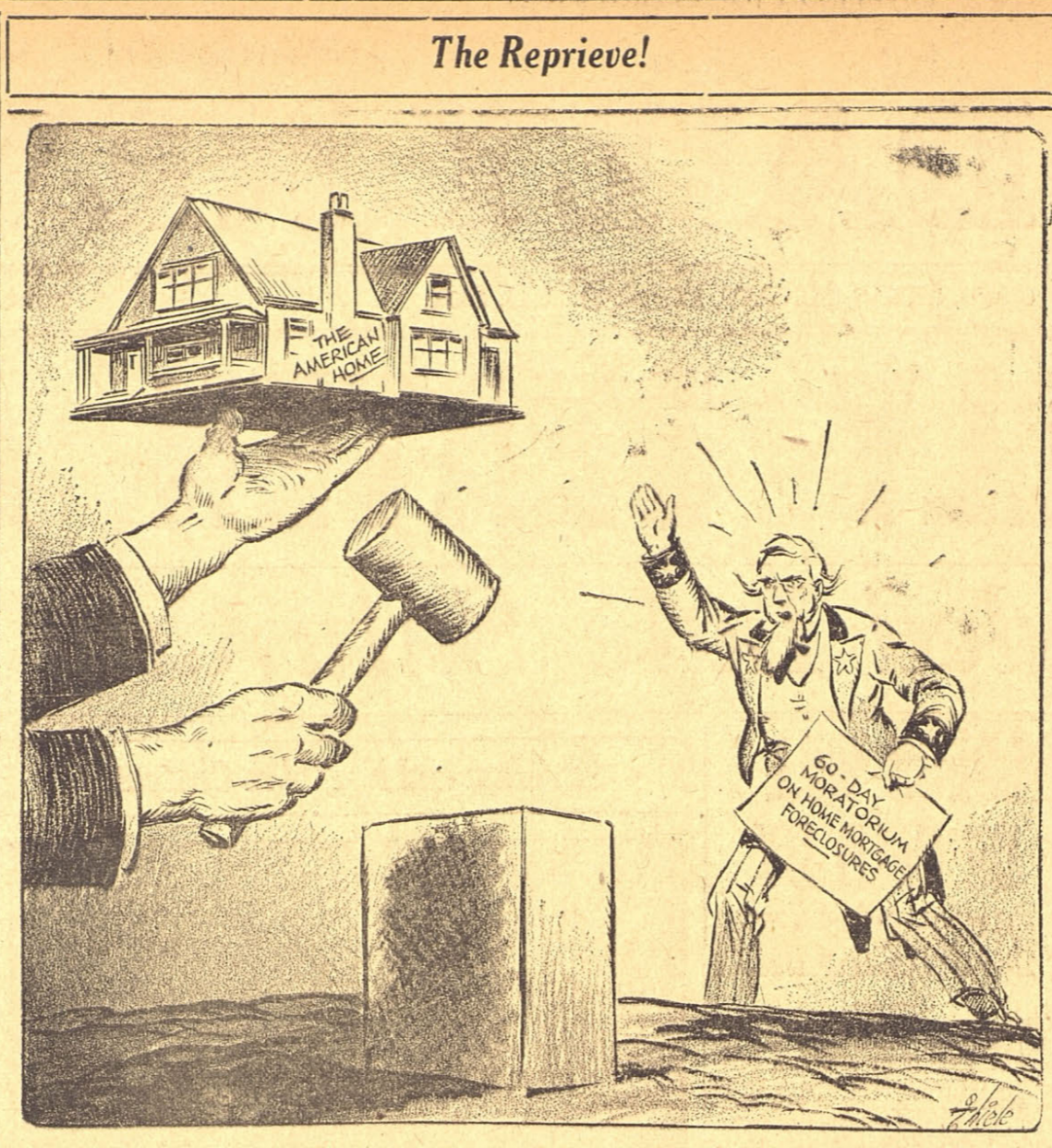
President William Green of the American Federation of Labor in his message to the American world, pledged organized labor "to a fight for the return to higher wages now that the economic skies are clear." He hailed the six-hour day and five-day week as a means for providing work for all seeking employment and declared that slowly but surely the shorter working hours are being accepted. He asserted that prosperity can only be restored through an increase in buying power and in commodity prices, "which can only be obtained through high wages and development of an employment policy which will provide and create work opportunities for all." BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON WITH RODNEY DUTCHER

BY RODNEY DUTCHER, NEA Service Writer. WASHINGTON.—Less than 10 years ago the late Wayne B. Wheeler of the Anti-Saloon League was ordering a president of the United States on the water wagon and telling him to stay there. Less than five years ago the organized dry leaders had an unduplicated entree to the White House, where their advice and admonitions were heard with respect and attention. Just a couple of years ago Bishop James Cannon, then field marshal of the dries, defied a Senate committee and walked out on it in angry contempt. Had Congress Buffaloed UNTIL even more recently the dries had most of Congress eating out of their hands and high prohibition enforcement officials appearing before their meetings to deliver inspirational speeches designed to retain their support. All those recollections emphasize the fierceness of the position in which the good men and women who head the numerous dry organizations, once so powerful, find themselves today. The avalanche of events which has landed them in their present sad plight cannot be detailed in limited space, but an epoch in history begins to close and there is no parallel for the story of this organized high-pressure group which rose to exert for a few years an unprecedented influence on the national government and then, apparently, suddenly began to cave in toward a resumption of its former relatively unimportant status. Left Dries Flat REGARDLESS of any other aspects of President Hoover's speech, it left the dries flat on their antecedents. Those who support him now will support the same sort of thing which in recent years has led them to launch all their fury against Al Smith and John J. Ras-kob. Hoover was their last prop, the one man upon whom they depended to give them some aid and comfort in a very bad storm. Not many months ago they were confident-

Lightfoot is a staunch advocate of the new idea. A PAGE FROM CONVENTION HISTORY.

James E. Ferguson in 1914 defeated Thomas H. Ball for the democratic gubernatorial nomination. El Paso was the place and setting for the state convention in that year. There was a famous contested election case handled by the committee of credentials. State Compt. W. P. Lane of Fort Worth contested the election of Jeff McLemore. They had been rivals for the office of congressman-at-large. On the face of the returns McLemore claimed the nomination. Lane, who had been a lifelong prohibitionist, declared that fraudulent votes and incorrect counting had robbed him of the prize. Well, the committee on credentials decided the contest in favor of McLemore. He won by a large majority at the general election that year. It was a bitter contest and there were many sensational side lines as well as startling incidents. Lane is dead. McLemore is dead. Gen. Jacob F. Wolters was the legal adviser of McLemore. All the stalwarts of that period who were counted as liberals "went down the line for McLemore." Now the stalwarts will assemble in the city of Lubbock the coming week. Copymakers will be in evidence. There promises to be history made while the convention is on. Gen. Wolters will be there. Gen. Wolters has figured in every convention held in Texas since the days of James Stephen Hogg and Charles A. Culberson. In his leisure hours the general should prepare the copy for a book carrying the title "Texas Politicians I Have Known." It would be interesting reading, if the general turned himself loose, as well as a very rapid seller. It is a matter of history that he has known all the big voices on the political stage and the roles they played in an era that was not tragic but very sensational in and out of the political ruts of the period.

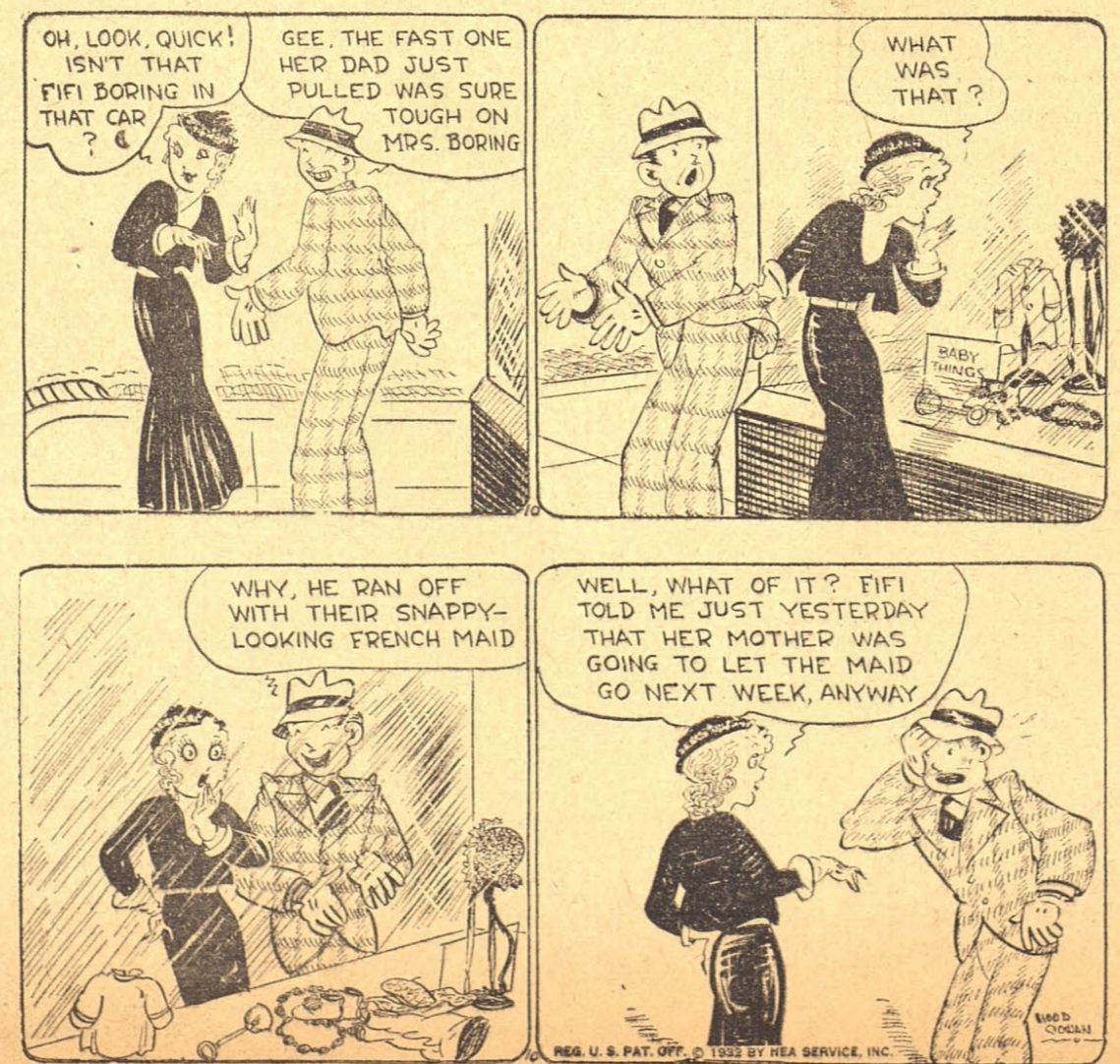
DISCARDS BEARD.

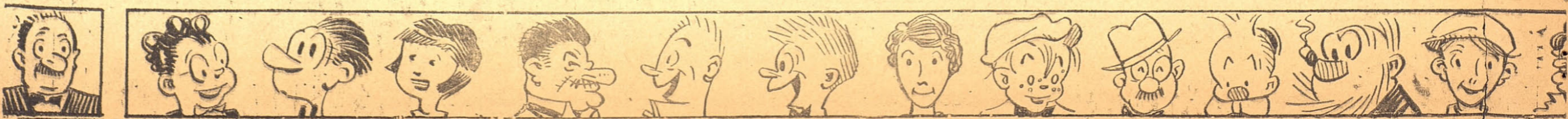
