## Bears Swamp Trent, 26-8

Before a Homecoming crowd Saturday night, Baird's Bears turned on the steam in the last half to score 20 points and defeat the Trent Gorillas 26-8.

Trent opened the scoring in the first few minutes of play after recovering a fumble on the Baird 20 yard line. Baird received the kickoff, ran three plays and fumbled, with Trent recovering. Nine plays later, the Gorillas scored with Johnny Healy going over from 9 yard out. Al Griffith plunged for the 2 extra points.

The Bears first TD also came in the first quarter on a pass from fullback Calvin Barnes to left end Tommy Higgins for 13 yards. The conversion try failed and Trent led at halftime, 8-6.

The Bears opened the third quarter with an 8n-side kick, recovering the ball on Trent's 40 yard line. They began to drive and Barnes plunged from the 2 yard line for the TD. Again the try for extra points failed.

Baird kicked off to Trent's 33 yard line. The Bears defense stiffened to force a punt. Johnny Swinney's punt was blocked by one of his own men and the Bears recovered on the Trent 27. Barnes, David Wills and Eddie Childers carried the ball to the 2 yard line, and Norman McWilliams went in for the score. Wills' pass to end Jud Gilliland was good for 2 points, making the score 20-8.

The Bears final TD was made by Eddie Childers, who intercepted a pass on the Trent 36, and went all the way for the touchdown. The conversion try failed, to end the scoring.

Baird led in the statistics department with 18 first down to Trent's 10. Baird attempted 8 passes, completed 6. Trent attempted 17 with 7 completions.

## About Your Health.

More than 9,000 Texas men and women were fatally stricken last year by strokes. That is one of the most ominous words in the language today. What does it really mean?

The medical term is "cerebral vascular accident," because it is caused by cerebral vascular disease. The body's cerebral vascular is the brain's network of blood vessels. Thus, cerebral vascular disease refers to diseases of vessels in the brain.

Brain cells require a good blood supply in order to work properly - more so than most other body cells. When something happens to that blood supply, the brain itself is impaired.

That something could be a hemorrhage, thrombus, embolus, compression or a spasm. Each one of those key words is

a major cause of strokes. A hemorrhage (bleeding) is the result of a break in a brain artery which allows blood to escape and damage surrounding brain tissue. Another name for strokes of this type is 'apoplexy.'

A thrombus is caused by a clot of blood working in a brain artery, stopping the flow of blood to the part of the brain it supplies. But when a clot is formed in a diseased heart or elsewhere in the body and pumped to the brain to plug an artery, it is called an embolus.

A tumor, swollen brain tissue, or a large clot in another vessel may press upon a brain vessel to stop the flow of blood. This is called compression. A spasm is caused when a muscular artery constricts or tightens up, reducing the flow of blood to a particular brain area.

Most strokes do not produce immediate death. A large number of victims live for many years. An estimated two million people who have had strokes are alive in the United States today - many of them disabled because of it.

Present medical knowledge can prevent some but not all strokes. Certain conditions causing cerebral vascular disease - high blood pressure, for example - can often be helped by modern treatment, and several conditions associated with blood clot formation respond to anti-clotting drugs. Too, blood vessel defects with which some children are born, can now be corrected by surgery.

### STATE CAPITAL

## Highlights AND Sidelights

Hurricane Carla had its impact on the State Capitol. But not like it did on the Coast.

Refugees camped on the Capitol grounds the first night of the storm. They were moved into public buildings as the rains reached Austin. Several giant trees on the Capitol grounds were blown down, and the Board of Control estimated damage of \$5,000 to Capitol grounds and buildings.

State officials were busy, too. Gov. Price Daniel's on the scene inspections led to several coastal counties being declared disaster areas. Thus they became eligible for Federal aid.

State Insurance Chairman Thomas Ferguson announced that several hundred insurance adjusters had moved into the coastal area to begin estimating damages to insured properties. So far no one had any estimate of the total damage Carla did to Texas.

One thing sure is that insurance companies, which have taken in about \$15,000,000 in premiums this year for windstorm and rain damage in the seacoast territory, will have substantial losses to pay above their income from this source.

MORE SALES TAX RULINGS - Comptroller Robert S. Calvert's till issuing rulings on how the new state sales tax applies to specific sales situations.

He has changed his mind for the first time. It's on the subject of repairmen.

New ruling declares that the repairman is the consumer of the tangible personal property which goes into a repair job, unless he has a contract under which he is to bill the customer separately for labor and parts or materials. In that case, he can collect the sales tax from the customer on the materials only. But if the repair contract is for a lump sum price, the re-

pairman must pay the 2% sales tax on the supplies and materials at his cost.

These and other complications of the huge new tax law led to two proposals for changes. Atty. Gen. Will Wilson recommended that it be changed to an across the board 2% tax, with no exemptions.

State AFL-CIO Pres. H. S. Brown called for complete repeal of the sales tax, and substitution of an income tax which he said "you pay just once a year. Instead of 15 times a day."

WHAT'S A FARM TRAILER? - The new revision of the law which used to exempt farm trailers from license fees has lots of people in a swivet. The law was revised twice during the spring sessions of the Legislature. Gov. Daniel vetoed the first bill to Rep. Grainer McIlhenny of Wheeler, so it was passed again in modified form.

It now requires larger farm trailers to have 'exemption tags' which cost \$5. It also requires owners of oil-well servicing and drilling equipment to have license plates if they are to be moved over the highways.

Oilfield servicing companies brought suit to set aside this interpretation of the law. License plates, based on weight, would be staggering, they claim as they maintain that the legislature did not mean to tax them when it wrote in an exemption for the water well drillers.

Rural legislators report some farmers aren't happy about having to pay \$5 to be exempt.

MORE ELECTIONS - Special elections will have to be held in Bexar, Grayson-Cooke, Galveston and Potter counties to fill House vacancies before Governor Daniel can bring the Legislature back into the special session he plans for it this fall. If he sets the special session for late October or early November,

as many think he will, the elections will have to be called soon to have the new lawmakers ready to go to work when the session opens.

Major item for the special session is the enactment of legislation to license lenders and regulate interest rates.

House passed a bill during the regular session in the spring to set up tight regulation with fairly high interest charges. But the Senate did not agree. So the bill died.

As the law now stands it is illegal to charge more than 10 per cent per year in interest. Courts have wiped out all the various subterfuges by which higher rates were being charged. So lenders, who contend they cannot get by on 10 per cent on small loans, are anxious to be legalized in some fashion.

NEW OIL POLICY-MAKER - Lieut. Gov. Ben Ramsey became Railroad Commission Ben Ramsey in ceremonies Monday, and went right to work at the statewide oil proration hearing held Tuesday.

Ramsey leaves behind a record that probably will never be broken - election to six terms as lieutenant governor. Some earlier holders of that office had won as many as three terms, but there had been few of them.

Ramsey's salary goes up from \$4,800 a year and an apartment in the Capitol to \$17,500 a year, but he will have to pay his own rent.

Senator Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi assumes the duties of lieutenant governor until the special session opens. Then the Senate will choose another senator to preside over its meetings. Choice lies between Senators Culp Krueger of El Campo, Charles Herring of Austin and Henry Gonzales of San Antonio. All three came to the Senate on the same day in 1957.

Senators Preston Smith of Lubbock, Crawford Martin of Hillsboro, Robert Baker of Houston, Wardlow Lane of Senter, A. M. Alkin Jr. of Paris, George Parkhouse of Dallas and Speaker James A. Turman of Guber are among the officeholders considered likely to run for the Lieutenant Governor's post.

Don Yarborough of Houston, who gave Ramsey his closest race for the office in 1960, is expected to run, also.

Maury Maverick Jr. of San Antonio is another potential candidate.

## Wheat Growers Cautioned on Acres

Some small wheat producers who have grown less than 15 acres of wheat in the past three years may be subject to marketing quotas and penalties under provisions of the wheat stabilization program for 1962, according to Tommie Harris, Chairman of Callahan Co. Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Under the previous programs, farms that had less than 15 acres of wheat, or farms that did not produce more than 200 bushels of wheat annually, were not subject to marketing quotas even though they had allotments of 15 acres or less. The 200-bushel exemption has been repealed, and the 15-acre exemption is no longer applicable under the new program.

For 1962, the marketing quo-

ta exemption for those who planted 15 acres of wheat during any one of the 3 years, 1959, 1960 or 1961, and whose allotment is less than 13.5 acres, will be reduced to 13.5. Exemption for growers who planted less than 13.5 acres of wheat will be the highest planted acreage in any one of these 3 years if the allotment is less than such highest acreage.

In addition to those quota requirements, some small producers may also be subject to marketing quota penalties under certain conditions. Mr. Harris pointed out. For example, farmers who have not grown wheat in any one of the past 3 years and who grow wheat for harvest without an allotment in 1962, will be subject to marketing quota penalties on the entire production.

Another group of producers who will also be subject to the wheat marketing quota penalties are those who have grown 13.5 acres or more in one of the 3 years, and whose 1962 allotments are 13.5 acres or less and who grew for harvest more than 13.5 acres in 1962.

Penalties may also apply to small producers who exceed the 1962 allotment when that allotment is greater than the acreage planted for harvest in any one of the years 1959, 1960, 1961.

On farms where there is excess wheat acreage, the amount of wheat subject to a marketing quota penalty would be twice the normal yield of the excess acres multiplied by 65 per cent of the May, 1962, parity price for wheat. Downward adjustment in this determination may be made if the producer furnishes evidence of his actual production. In those cases where a producer exceeds the exemption, the penalty is figured from the allotment rather than the exemption.

Approximately two-thirds of the wheat producers in the United States grow less than 15 acres of wheat, yet these small producers raise about one-sixth of all the wheat grown in this country, Mr. Harris explained. By reducing the wheat marketing quota exemption, these growers now have an opportunity to make a greater contribution in the national effort to bring wheat supplies more nearly in line with demand.

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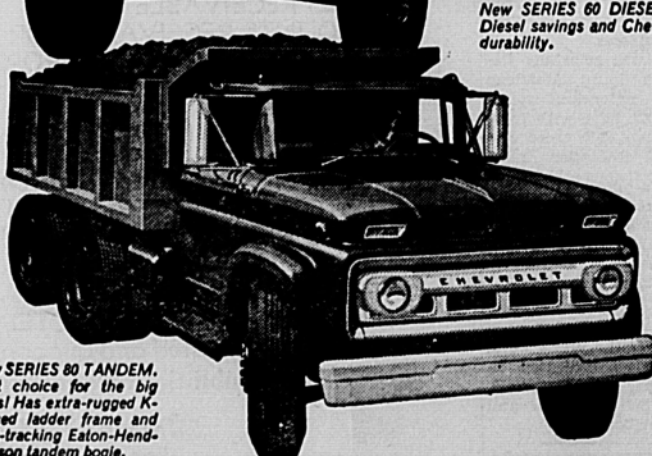
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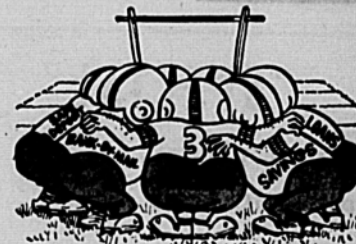
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## Accidental Deaths In The Home

Falls are the main cause of accidental deaths in the home. Fatal home falls in a recent typical year totaled 1,400, according to Bob McKennon, Lone Star Gas Company Manager here. Lone Star and The Baird Star are co-sponsors of the 1961 Home Safety Program in Baird.

"The 13,400 fatal home falls represented 47.9 per cent of all accidents. From year to year, only motor vehicle accidents outrank falls as an accidental killer, and approximately 64 1/2 per cent of all falls occur in the home," McKennon said.

The greatest number of falls occur in the bedroom. Falls on the stairs and in the yard and kitchen following that order. Fatal falls in fewer numbers occur in the living room, bathroom, dining room, hall, basement, garage and on the porch.

Approximately 86 per cent of the victims of fatal falls are more than 65 years old. Eight per cent are in the 45-64 group. The remaining 6 per cent are spread through the 0-44 age group.

A majority of fatal falls occur while victims are walking on a level surface. However, they also occur while the victims are standing still, ascending or descending stairs, working, sitting, playing, eating, drinking, climbing or reclining. Some occur while the victims are sleeping.

"Particular attention," Mr. McKennon said, "must be given to the problem of protecting the older people. Lighting, particu-

larly on stairs, must be adequate. Do not leave loose objects in the middle of the floor. This particularly endangers an older person. His sight may not be able to detect the objects. If he trips, he is less likely than a young person to recover his balance.

"Keep an orderly room. Arrange furniture so that it does not prevent free passage around the room. Do not let beds, vanity benches and other furnishings in the bedroom jut into the middle of the room. Keep doors closed. Close dresser drawers when not in use. Do not leave shoes in the middle of the floor.

"When a person gets out of bed in the middle of the night and tries to make his way to the bathroom or kitchen in the dark, he is more than likely to fall over any improperly placed object. This danger can be eliminated by keeping the house in order and by having a light located within reach of the bed and at the entrance to all of the principal rooms," Mr. McKennon concluded.

## Barley Program Details Told

More details of the 1962 winter barley feed grain program was announced recently by Tommie Harris, Chairman, Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The Chairman explained that barley producers diverting a share of their acreage will receive payments for the diversion and they also will qualify for price support. At the same time, they will be making an important contribution to the Nation in adjusting grain supplies and reducing Government costs.

A barley producer can forego the diversion payments and still qualify for price support if he elects to devote the diverted acreage to one or more of these crops: castor beans, guar, safflower, sunflower or sesame. Adjustment in the diversion payment can be made if only a part of the diverted acreage is so used. Special program provisions enable growers of acceptable varieties of malting barley to qualify for price support without participating in the barley feed grain program.

Payments will be made to barley growers who devote the diverted barley acreage to an approved conservation use. Such growers must also maintain an acreage in soil-conserving crops or practices, including summer fallow and idle cropland, equal to their 1959-60 average acreage in such uses.

According to the Chairman, only those barley producers who participate in the program with at least 20 per cent diversion will be eligible for the 1962 price support. Further, they will not be eligible for barley support if they exceed their corn and grain sorghum base acreages (1959-60 average). Support will be limited to the normal yield of their 1962 barley acreages. (Corn and grain sorghum producers who intend to plant barley this fall

must not plant more than their base acreage of barley if they want to participate in the 1962 feed grain program and be eligible for price support on these two crops.) A producer cooperating in the program who has an interest in the barley, corn or grain sorghum on another farm, must not produce more acres of these crops in 1962 than the 1959-60 average on such other farms.
