Malloy Johnson Dies In Odessa; Service Friday

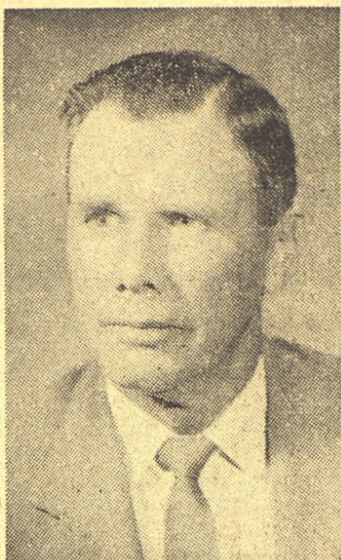

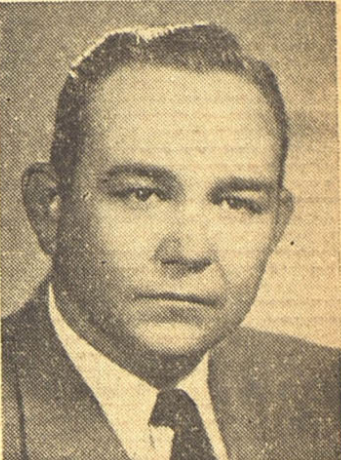
Mr. Hogue has been president of the college for some nine years, coming here in 1956 from Athens where he was affiliated with Henderson County Junior College. The local college has enjoyed considerable growth in the number of students as well as building several new dormitories and other buildings during that period.

A native of Brownsboro, Mr. Hogue attended Lon Morris and Kilgore Junior Colleges before graduating with BS and MS degrees from East Texas State College at Commerce. He has done additional graduate study at the University of Texas.

Mr. Hogue served with the U. S. Marine Corps during World War II and spent four years after finishing college as a member of the Texas House of Representatives from Henderson, Van Zandt and Rains Counties. He and Mrs. Hogue are the parents of four children. He is active in local civic and church affairs.

The local college is currently busy with another building program with another boys dormitory and a student union building expected to be ready for bidding in the near future. Plans were due to be submitted this month to the Public Housing Administration offices in Fort Worth.

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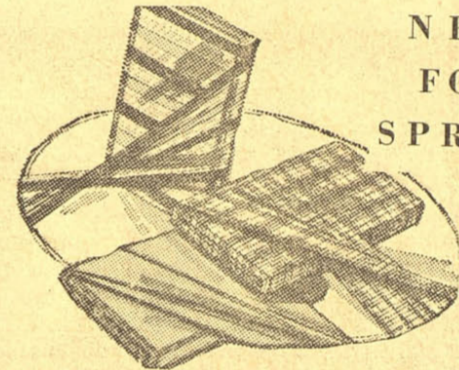

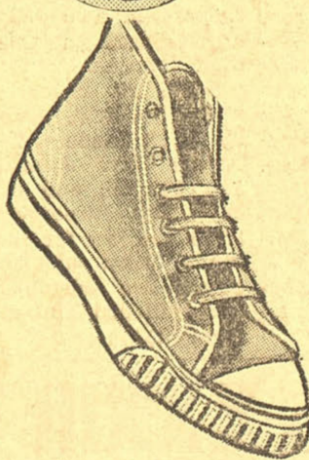

State Mental Health Act Is Receiving Local Support

A very worthy program which should be publicized throughout the county is the "Texas Mental Health Services Act," according to Dr. R. C. Ferguson, Eastland County Health Officer.

The act, designed to provide for conservation and restoration of mental health among the people of Texas, has been submitted to the present state legislature.

Introduced to the House of Representatives recently was House Bill No. 3, a bill which would pave the way for new dimensions in the present state system of treating mentally ill persons, in the form of community mental health centers located throughout the state.

It is expected to bring changes from custodial and institutional care of the mentally ill to early detection and prevention of mental illness; also establishing in or near a disabled person's home city, "community" facilities with which to treat them.

Last year, sent to either veterans or the state hospital at Wichita Falls, from Eastland County were 37 mentally ill cases; 4 mentally retarded; 15 alcoholics and one person with TB, reports show, making the year's total 57.

Acceptance and support given to the new system by local taxpayers and governmental units will aid in a gradual change to more "community" services located nearer home, it is reported.

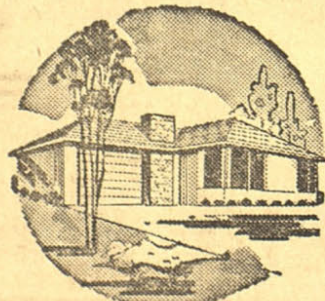

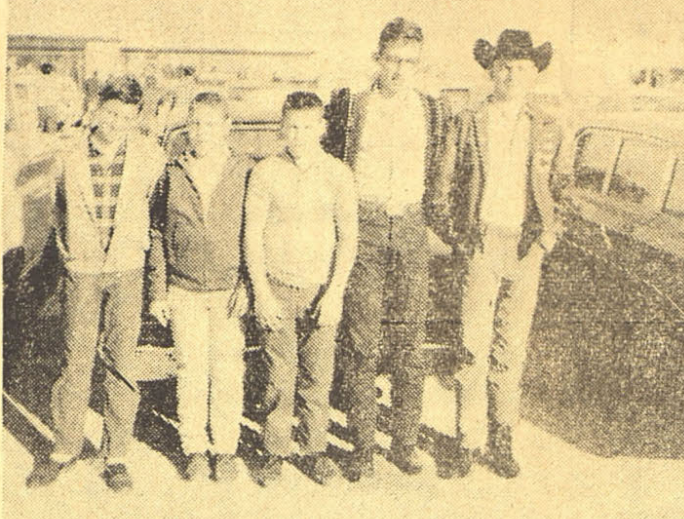

Eastland County furnished three of the 10 winners out of the 20 contestants under the 4-H Banner. Bobby Williams of Gorman was third place winner.

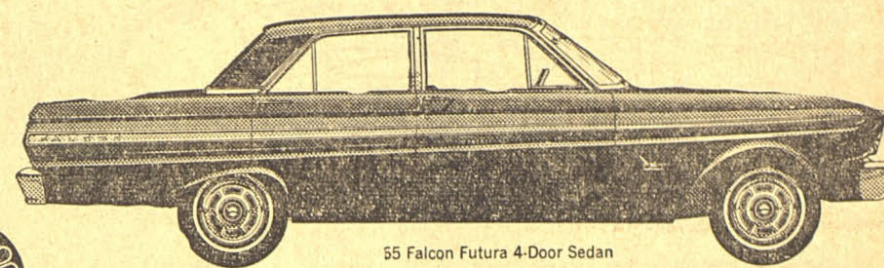
The prizes ranged from \$50 for first place, to \$40 for third and \$20 for seventh. The purchase certificates are used to purchase livestock for feeding programs.

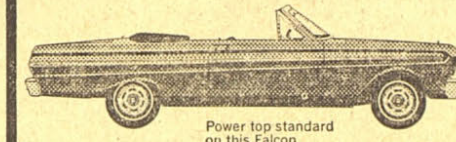

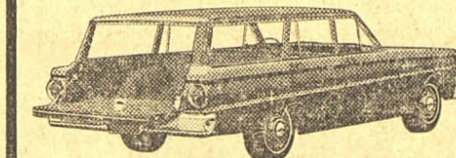

'Expense Item' Is Explained By County Official

"Every county official in Eastland County except one draws more salary than a county commissioner," Comm'r L. J. (Buck) Collins pointed out this week. "And yet the commissioners and the county judge have the primary responsibility for the conduct of a business with an annual budget in excess of \$400,000 of public money."

"The action of the commissioners court last week in approving a \$75 per month expense allowance for each commissioner was in line with the ruling of the attorney-general of the State of Texas which says that even though each of the commissioners precincts operates county pick-ups, expenses for travel on official business within the county can be allowed, providing the commissioners use their privately owned motor vehicles for traveling on official business within the county rather than the county vehicles."

Each of the commissioners, Comm'r Collins pointed out, uses his own car a great deal in the performance of his duties, and it is only fair that he be reimbursed for costs out of pocket. It is even more fair that he be paid a salary commensurate with his duties and responsibilities and with the salaries received by other officials of comparable responsibilities.

"The \$75 per month expense allowance made each commissioner will just about bring the commissioner's salary in line with that received by other county officials."

At the same session at which the expense account item was approved, Mr. Collins said, the court set the following salaries for county officials:

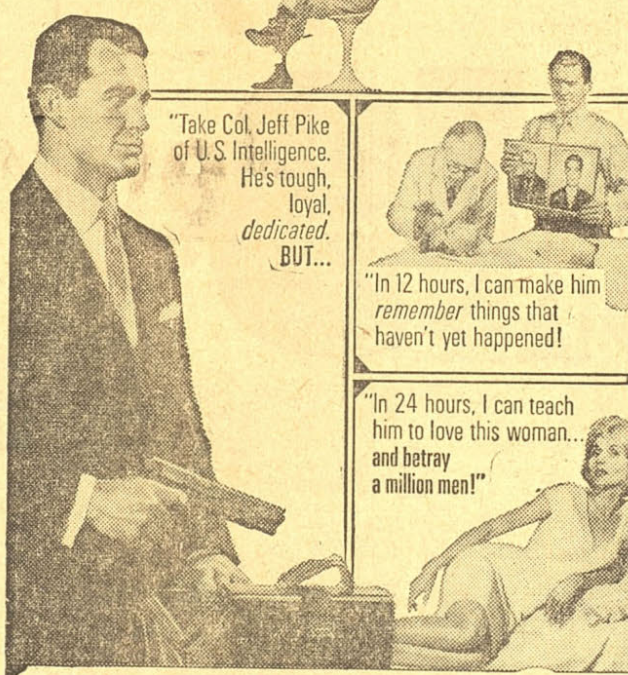
"These salaries are well in line with those paid by counties of comparable population," said Mr. Collins. "I don't think any of our county officials is over-paid, especially when you consider the costs of running for office and the hazardous nature of the job. Unless we pay our public officials salaries that are decent and attractive to men and women of ability we stand a poor chance of securing good officials. They can earn more and be more secure in private jobs."

"I believe that the county business, which is the business of all of us, should be given full publicity. It is the right of the people to know. But I do think they should be given the benefit of the whole story and not just a part of it." — Rising Star Record.

Gun-Theft Ring Broken; Five Students Are Charged

An arsenal of 17 weapons, including high-powered rifles and shotguns valued at some \$10,000, has been recovered by Ranger and Eastland County enforcement officers, putting an end to a gun-stealing ring that was operating in at least four counties. Five former Ranger Junior College male students have been indicted by a 91st District Court grand jury and fined on \$1,000 bond each. Sheriff L. E. (Lefty) Sublett reports, after one of the young men filed charges against another of the ring for stealing one of the stolen rifles.

Key officers in solving the robberies were Ranger Police Chief Bill Ogden, Ranger Constable Ralph Veal and Justice of the Peace M. L. Underwood. One of the five young men filed a complaint with Judge Underwood on Feb. 8, accusing another college student of stealing his broken open, County

Officials began questioning the students and after some 30 hours of close interrogation by the Ranger officials, Sheriff Sublett and Deputy Loy Williams, the case began "to crack." One of the five volunteered to give a statement immediately after being locked up after his round of questioning.

Loot recovered besides the guns which includes shotguns, .22s and high-powered rifles of every description, also includes valuable scopes, four foreign automobile bucket seats and a 15-foot canoe stolen from a Palo Pinto Boy Scout camp.

Gun thefts began to be reported to authorities as far back as last September, Sublett said, causing his and adjoining counties' sheriffs departments to launch an intensive search for clues, which were hard to turn up, because most had been taken from unlocked pickups. Of the 17 guns recovered, one was taken in Young County, two in Stephens County, five in Jones County and the rest from Eastland County. It is believed that these rep-

resent all that were stolen by the quintet of students, although about that many more thefts of guns have been reported, indicating that there are still gun thieves at work in the area.

Two of the college students are from Fort Worth, two from Jones County and the other from Young County, Sublett said.

These weapons, stored in the sheriff's department safe, at the courthouse, may be claimed by their owners the sheriff said by persons giving a complete description or numbers.

The students are charged with theft over \$50.

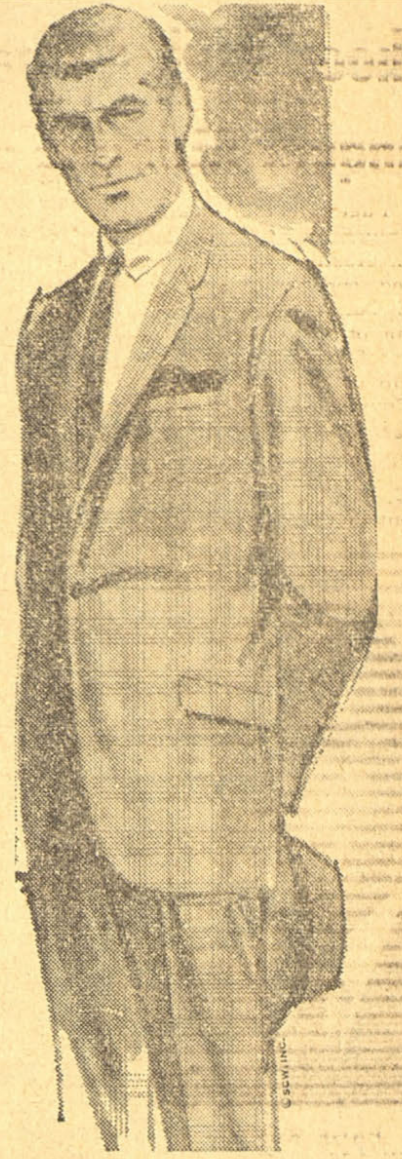



In the early days of Rotary, it was agreed that only one representative from each business or profession in the community would be admitted, a principle of membership that continues today.

As its 60th year begins, Rotary is growing at the approximate rate of one club a day. The organization's phen-

omenal growth indicates the strong appeal of Rotary fellowship and service to men of different vocational backgrounds.

Rotary's world leader for 1964-65, Charles W. Pettengill, of Greenwich, Conn., has focused the attention of Rotarians everywhere on the importance of applying the principles of Rotary in their daily lives. "Live Rotary," he urges members, "in your work, in your relations with youth, and in your contacts with people from other countries."

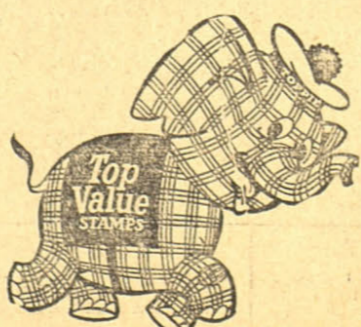

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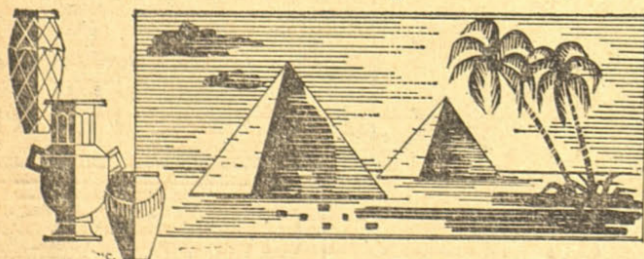
