CHS Lobo Varsity Will Travel To Mart Friday Night

The Cisco High School Lobo Varsity will travel to Mart this Friday for their final non-district game of the season. Next week, they will kick off District 11-AA play

when they face Coleman here.

Kick-off Friday night in Mart will be at 8 p.m. The varsity football squad will be traveling to the game by

chartered bus which will leave Cisco at 3 p.m. The squad will stop to eat, following the game, and then return home, probably arriving in Cisco sometime early

Saturday morning. Cisco Head Coach Doyle Walker said Mart is "big, fast, and good." Last year, Mart advanced to the quarterfinals in play-offs

and this year's team has nine returning lettermen. However, so far this year, Mart is 0-2, having lost both of their opening games. They were defeated by

Groesbeck (a 3A school) by the score of 24-to-14 and they lost to McGregor by the score of 8-to-0.

Cisco evened up their season record at one win and one loss here last Friday night when they defeated Rotan by the score of 37-to-6. Cisco lost its season opener to DeLeon.

Coach Walker reported Cisco came out of the Rotan game with no injuries and everyone should be ready to play against Mart. He said Cisco is going to have to put a lot of pressure on Mart's quarterback and make him throw the ball quickly.

He also said one of their main objectives will be to stop number 44, Timmy Franklin, a 160-lb. junior running back. Coach Walker said if Franklin breaks loose on a run "I don't think we have anyone who can catch him." Walker said Franklin is Mart's main running threat.

Others on the Mart team who are good offensive players, according to Coach Walker, are Hansel Wise, 190-lb. senior fullback (No. 40); Lee Miles, 143-lb. sophomore quarterback (No. 11); Terrell Pride,

165-lb. sophomore running back; Allan Neuman, 148-lb. junior receiver; and Packston Joiner, 131-lb. receiver.

Mart QB Miles "has an arm like a rocket and can throw the ball as far as he wants to," stated Coach Walker. He said he and the coaching staff had been reviewing films of Mart's games and they were impressed by Miles. Walker also said Miles' receivers catch the ball when he throws to them.

Mart's offensive line is not real big, according to Walker. Left guard is a senior and right guard is a junior, while the left tackle is a 196-lb. junior and the right tackle is a 211-lb. senior. The guards weigh 153-lbs. and 124-lbs. The center for Mart weighs in at 150-lbs.

The offense of Mart runs the wing tee, wishbone, and power-I. The defense is a 27 defense with four down

linemen and three stand-up linebackers.

The Mart defense is led by Wise, senior middle linebacker. Coach Walker said Mart is not a penetrating defense, but a "reading defense" which will wait on the play and stop the offense at the line of scrimmage. He said Mart's best defensive lineman is Darren Nobles (Number 72).

Seven players for the Mart team play both on offense and defense.

Coach Walker summed up about Mart by saying, "They have good quickness and a lot of speed."

Offensive starters for Cisco will be as follows: Shelby Nixon, quarterback; Steve Abbott, fullback; Kevin Kirk, tailback; Dale Page, center; Jeff Dennis and Bryan Nichols, guards; Robert Rains and James Deadman, tackles; James Berry, split end; and Ricky Chambers, tight end.

Wranglers Will Entertain HPU; CHS Jr. Varsity Will Play At 5:30

Impressive in their second outing here last week, the Wranglers of Cisco Junior College will entertain the junior varsity of Howard Payne University in a football game at Chesley Field in Cisco at 8 p.m. Thursday.

The college game will be the second half of a double header program that will start at 5:30 p.m. when the Cisco High School junior varsity plays the freshman team from Abilene High School at Chesley Field.

Coach Rick Frazier reported that his Wranglers

came through the game with Panhandle State University Thursday without injuries. Cisco won the game by a 55-to-26 score with virtually every member of the 105-member Cisco squad seeing action.

The CJC coaches were pleased that their passing game showed improvement over the previous week with 17 completions in 35 passing efforts for 312 yards. The passing game has been emphasized in workouts the past two weeks.

Penalties have plagued the

Wranglers in their first two games. They had 10 for 100 yards in the first contest and eight for 90 yards last week.

"We're going to try to put a stop to giving away so much yardage," the coach said. "We're studying the rules and plan to make a conscious effort to abide by them."

"As we gain experience, we're having fewer mental breakdowns," Mr. Frazier said.

The Wrangler defense drew a "well done" from the coach again in the Panhandle game. They permitted five pass completions and

allowed 141 yards on rushing plays.

Kicker Raymond Hernandez kept his performance record perfect. He handled the kicking in the first half and had a field goal and four extra points without a miss. He is a sophomore from Wichita Falls. Freshman kicker Bobby Nino of Dimmitt handled the kickoffs. In the second half, he missed one field goal try but converted after two touchdowns.

Tickets for the Cisco-Mart football game are on sale in the principal's office at the high school. Adult tickets are \$3.00 each and student tickets are \$2.00.

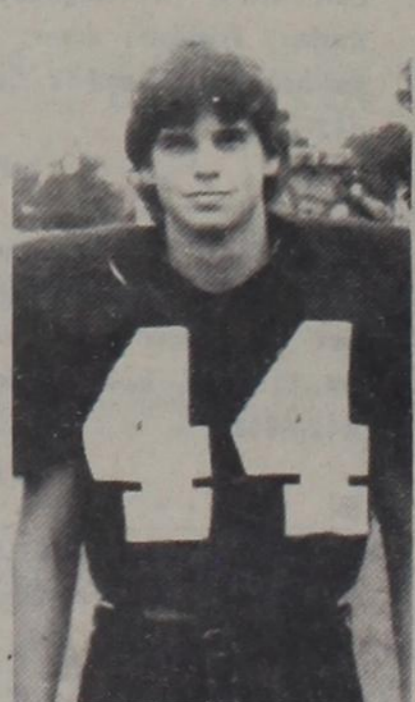
Student tickets purchased at the gate will be \$3.00. Tickets will be sold at the high school through the noon hour on Friday.

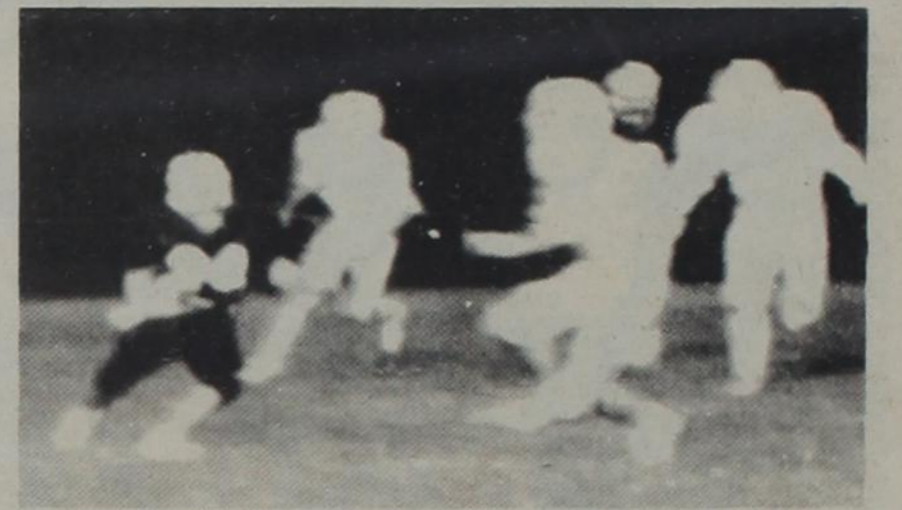

Dear Editor,

My nephew, Bill Latch, and NBC correspondent, was killed in Bangkok, Thailand, September 8.

Since the terrorists shot him and Neil Davis, many of you have asked, "What may I do to help?"

At long last, I have an answer. The men who led the coup are now in custody and are asking for visas to and political asylum in the U.S.A.

Our family is requesting that you help us flood our Washington executives with letters negating the issuance of visas and denying them political refuge.

Too many times we have allowed inadequately screened people to enter our country. Our mounting crime rates and overcrowded prisons are two of the ways we are paying for our laxity.

Will you write one of these leaders in the capitol at Washington, D.C.: Congressman Charles Stenholm, Senators Lloyd Bentsen or Phil Gramm, or Vice-President George Bush? President Reagan's private secretary has already been contacted by telephone.

May I tell how kind NBC has been in these dark hours? When our slain nephew's widow decided to bury him in Bangkok, the president of NBC, Larry Grossman, offered to send his father to Bangkok for the memorial service last Thursday.

Immediately following the slaying, NBC sent Jerry Lamphrecht to Bangkok to investigate. Lamphrecht will be in Durango, Colorado Wednesday, September 18, to confer with my brother and give him tapes, videos, pictures, and whatever date he has relevant to those last hours. In addition, NBC provided a trans-oceanic telephone call plus an interpreter for my brother to talk with his son's widow.

I would also like to commend the International Red Cross. My nephew lived six hours after he was shot down and carried to a hospital. He asked the Red Cross to get his father on the phone. The workers made a valiant effort but were unable to complete the call before the mortally wounded man died in surgery.

Bill Latch, Jr. was a master graduate of Colorado A&M University. Born in Abilene in 1950 to Bill and Emily Collins Latch, his father was transferred to Colorado when his son was a year old.

After young Latch's graduation, he began teaching in English at the Thai University in Bangkok. Four years later, he resigned his teaching to work as a foreign correspondent for NBC and had been with them for seven years when death came. He married a lady from Thailand and they have two children.

Thank you for answering this S.O.S. in our family's hour of sorrow. Individual thanks to our friends and neighbors will come soon.

Cattlemen's Round-Up Has Area Chairmen

ABILENE-- Jim Alexander of Abilene, general chairman of the Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children, has appointed 200 area chairmen statewide to help in the CRCC fundraiser which benefits the West Texas Rehabilitation center in Abilene and San Angelo.

The area chairmen include Jim Choate of Cisco; Lloyd Coan of Eastland; John McIntyre of Moran; John Doyle Isenhower of Putnam; Sid Waynick of Carbon; and Fred Rogers of Gorman.

Aubrey Stokes of San Angelo is general co-chairman of the event.

"The agricultural community has always believed in the philosophy of neighbor helping neighbor, and the Cattlemen's Round-Up is a prime example of that help," says Shelley V. Smith, WTRC president/executive director.

"Livestock donated by ranchers are collected at a designated point in each community and transported to the auction site," explains Alexander. "The area chairman's job is to make a personal pledge, then ask others to join them in this annual drive."

Sales of those livestock are converted to dollars and the amount helps provide treatment for the 11,000 handicapped persons who will be treated this year at the Rehab facilities.

The CRCC idea began in Bronte back in 1960 on the late Conda Wylie's Fort Chadbourne ranch. He came to Smith with the suggestion that 20 top steers be cut from his herd and sold to help defray operational expenses at WTRC.

Today the results speak for themselves. With a goal of treating the whole patient rather than just the handicap, services offered include physical, occupational and speech therapy, audiology, orthotics, psychology, education and social services, all without charge to patients.

Scheduled CRCC sale dates include Cattle Sale - Sept. 30, Abilene Auction; Horse Sale - Oct. 5, Abilene auction; Coleman Sale - Oct. 9; Stephenville Sale - Oct. 9; Junction Sheep and Goat Sale - Oct. 14; San Saba Sale - Oct. 17; and Brownwood Sale - Nov. 4.

Persons wishing to make a donation should contact the area chairman or call Smith at WTRC in Abilene, 915-692-1633. Donated livestock are collected at designated points in each community and transported to the auction site.

Spotlights and Sidelights

Where Opportunity Knocks
 From time to time (like whenever anyone will listen), I get wordy about open-ended schools and the advantages thereof.

This column will summarize the story of such a school that exists and works and has done so since before I was born, so why am I just now finding out about it? I don't know.

The dateline is "Denver," the byline is "S.J. Guffey," and the bottom line is "Opportunity."

"Opportunity" is spelled out in capital letters above the door of the block-long building that houses the Emily Griffith Opportunity School.

Emily Griffith was a teacher with an airy dream she transmuted into solid bricks. The parents of many of her students were immigrants—strangers in a strange land. Their plight decided Emily that education could not be just for the young nor by the clock nor calendar.

Disregarding the building code—and that was easier seventy years ago than it is now—Emily managed a stay of execution on the demolition of a condemned elementary school near the center of Denver.

Once she had her building, Emily went after whatever and whomever she needed to teach "all who wish to learn." She fed bodies as well as souls as she took a pot of soup with her to evening classes.

One million, four hundred thousand students later, the goal is still the same: to teach all who wish to learn. About eighty full time teachers and four to five hundred part time instructors teach students who spend two or three weeks or two or three years to learn what they wish to know.

The school runs fourteen hours a day, five days per week, and eleven months of the year. The closest thing we have, that I am aware of,

is our Texas State Technical Institute organizations. Our TSTI's utilize their buildings on about the same time basis as the Opportunity School. It is so much more cost efficient than spending the money we do on systems that function only part time.

The Emily Griffith school is part of the Denver School System. It has a nine million dollar budget (for the Opportunity school alone). About half of the budget comes from the local tax base and the other half comes from federal or state grants. There are about 135,000 students each year.

The open-entry, open-exit systems attracts interna-

tional attention. There are some structures that Emily Griffith didn't have to cope with, but on the whole, they are few. If you want to be a furrier, the school offers the only instructions west of the Mississippi. If your yearning is more exotic—or prosaic—

the school will try to meet your request. (Remember those 4-500 part timers).

For me, part of the common-sense appeal of this program is accepting that one can learn from anyone who knows more about something than the learner. Why aren't there more Op-

portunity schools? Many a home would be happier if Mom had learned to make lumpless gravy instead of cheesecake—if Pop had learned to rotor-root a sewer line rather than to wax a car.

ALASKAN WANTS TO GREET THAI REBEL WITH SMOKING PISTOL, IF GIVEN ASYLUM IN U.S.

On Monday, Sept. 9, I was watching the "TODAY" show when I saw my nephew, William Latch, shot down in cold blood while he was waving a white flag and calling for help for Neil Davis, chief of the Bangkok NBC Television news, with whom he was working as sound engineer at the time. The voice of Latch was quite audible as he pleaded for help for cameraman Davis who was filming the conflict between the Thai Royalist and the Thai Rebels.

Then Latch himself was shot down. He was clearly visible as he crawled from the line of fire and was dragged away by two members of the NBC News team who risked their own lives to save him.

News chief Davis died when filming the scene. Latch underwent what was seemingly a successful operation in a Bangkok hospital; but died suddenly some five hours later. There are many questions that this reporter would like answered.

It's hard to watch someone you love shot down on the T.V. screen, to hear him calling for help and realizing that he is in Thailand and

you are in Alaska. Whether it is right or wrong to see loved ones dying on the screen is debatable. Practically all William "Bill" Latch's family seemed watching at the time. Bill's nearest kin live in Colorado. Two of his aunt, an uncle and other kin and loved ones who live in Texas were watching. I, an aunt with whom Bill lived one summer in Alaska while helping me homestead, was watching. We all know Bill Latch died nobly, while trying to aid a wounded comrade. We SAW the action! But why did Bill Latch and Neil Davis die? And of greater concern yet, why is the United States considering political asylum for the leaders of this Rebel group?

Why was this pre-dawn, 10-hour siege called a bloodless coup when 59 persons were injured, one soldier and two newsmen were killed? Does it not seem strange that these two newsmen were hunted down and shot, not where the main battle took place; but at the television station. The main battle was fought and lost by the Rebels in downtown Bangkok, at the Supreme Command headquarters. The Rebels left 18 tanks they had commandeered sitting in downtown Bangkok's Royal Plaza. Some 400 Rebels surrendered.

Then why the assassina-

tion at the broadcasting station? It was long past daylight. William Latch could be seen plainly as he waved a white flag and called for help for the slain Neil Davis. Why were these two men shot?

Without a doubt the Rebel leaders, Manoon Rupekachorn and his brother, Manet, knew Davis and Latch quite well. They all played a role in the Vietnamese conflict. Manoon was trained as a battalion commander at Fort Knox.

According to a Loyalist spokesman; "Col. Manoon Rupekachorn, 50, a former tank and regiment commander, was dismissed from the army after engineering an abortive coup against the Thai government in April of 1981. Manoon, who served in the Thai forces in Vietnam, was cashiered from the army along with 37 other officers, receiving no further punishment." This information was taken from a story in The Washington Post and carried in the Anchorage Daily News Sept. 10.

Then, on Sept. 12 comes the news that Manoon and

two other Rebel leaders escaped to Singapore on, of all things, a Thai air force plane. Worse yet, comes the report that they are seeking political asylum in the United States.

According to a New York Times story by Barbara Crossette: "State Department spokesman, Bernard Kalb, said the Reagan administration was reviewing their applications. Kalb said he was unable to identify the three."

Does it not seem strange that Kalb could not identify these men? Identities of Manoon and his brother Manet were published in both the New York Times and The Washington Post on Tuesday, following the coup that failed.

Why did our State Department deny knowing these men? Why did the American Embassy in Bangkok not respond to questions about Manoon?

The writer of this story believes that Neil Davis and William Latch were singled out and shot down because

they knew too much.

Both Davis and Latch were in Vietnam during that conflict. Davis received world-wide recognition for his filming off the front lines in action. Both Davis and Latch remained in Thailand after the conflict. Both Davis and Latch had a family living in the area. Bill Latch was an English instructor in the University of Thailand. Latch married the daughter of a Taiwanese Ambassador to the United States. It is very likely that both newsman knew too much about what was going on behind the scenes.

According to the New York Times the escape of Manoon and his rebel leaders was arranged through negotiations sanctioned by King Phumiphon Aduldet, always a strong, but silent, power behind political developments in Thailand.

The plot thickens. One fact remains quite evident, it will never be explained by Davis nor Latch.

Bill Latch, Senior, father

of William Latch, refused N.B.C.'s kind offer to send him Bangkok because he was afraid he might start his own war. Bill Latch, Sr., was in Pearl Harbor serving with the U.S. Marines when his ship, the U.S.S. Helena took a direct hit. He was in the Soloman Island area when the Helena sunk in three pieces in Kula Gulf. Bill Latch, Sr. was reported "missing in action"; but he managed to swim to Vella La Vella Island from which he was later rescued.

There is no second chance, no rescue for either Bill Latch, Jr. nor the great cameraman Neil Davis, who filmed their own demise.

Both Latch and Davis served their countries during the Vietnamese conflict. They were both still serving as "eyes and ears" for the world while in Thailand. Yet

many questions remain unanswered.

Will the United States grant political asylum to these assassians who tried to overthrow the Republic of Thailand? If so this reporter would like to welcome them in a predetermined manner.

To paraphrase Longfellow in one of Bill Latch's favorite poems:

"It matters not how straight the gate,
How charged with punishment the scroll,
I'd like to meet Bill's assassians face to face;

When they enter this land of stripes and stars
.....It's forever!

"Our reduced-price ticket for youngsters under 42 inches tall was very well received by parents and, finally, the weather was with us during the spring and summer."

Garcia was having difficulty breathing, and the deputy praised the attendants with Patterson's ambulance service for giving possible life-saving aid to Garcia.

Two suspects are being hunted in connection with the beating, Fillingim said.

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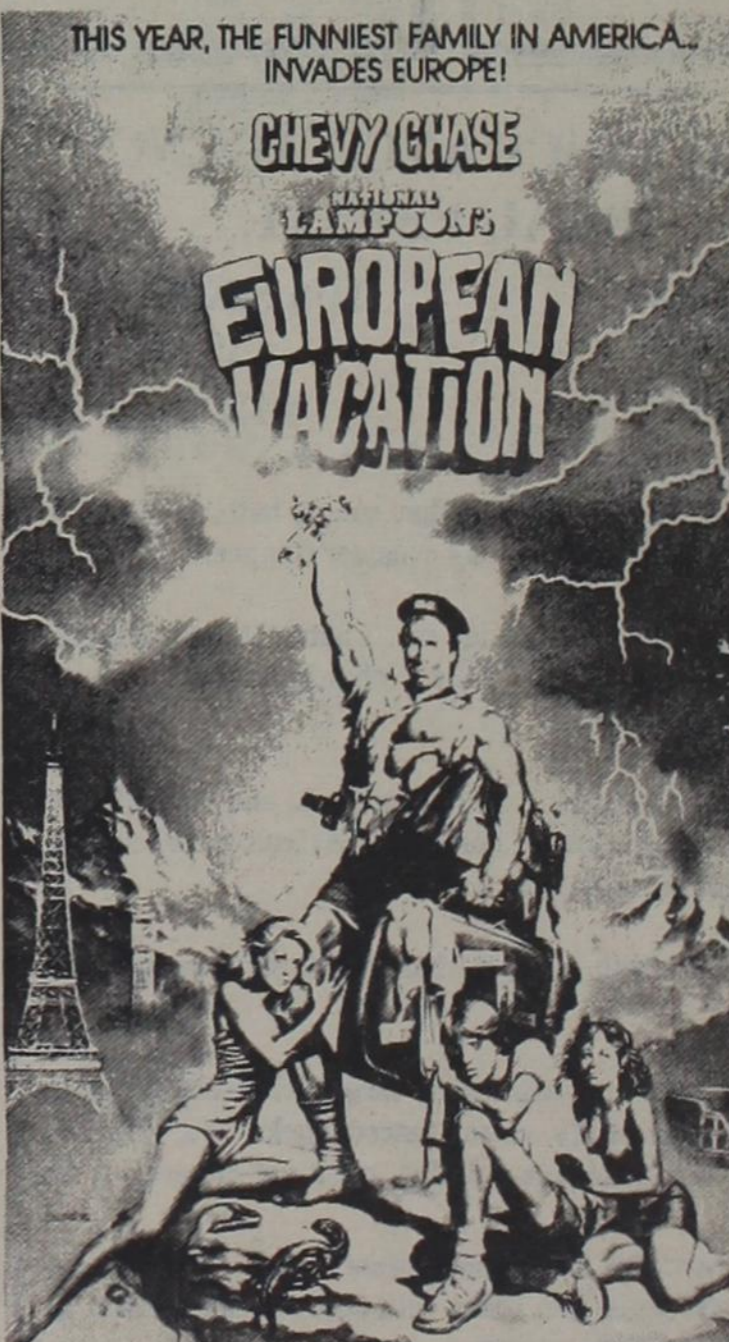

Drilling Bits

RISING STAR

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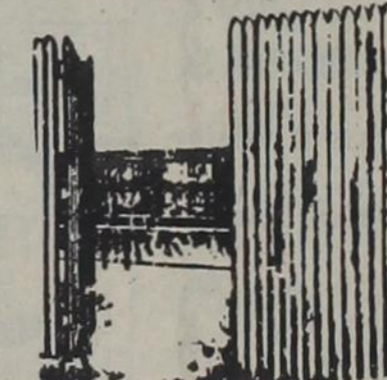
