LONDON, June 21 .- Civil war conditions prevail in Londonterry, Ireland, and the authorities are rendered powerless, declared the Exchange Telegraph here today.

Several additional persons were killed today following the renewal of rioting, in which a number of people were killed last night by pistol and rifle firing.

One mob openly fired upon the troopers this morning.

City Scene Latest Riot; Destroy American Flag

CHICAGO, June 21 .- All Chicago police are busy today scouring this city searching for R. D. Jonas, an alleged riot agitator, and three negroes, in connection with the rioting in Chicago's "Black Belt" last night, in which two white men were killed and two negroes were seriously injured.

The fight last night followed an attempt of the negroes to burn an American flag which was being carried at the end of a parade.

Seven negroes, who it is said led the parade, were arrested today.

REPORTER LOCATES JONAS.

CHICAGO, June 21 .- R. D. Jonas was found late today by a newspaper reporter, and told his version of the rioting here last night.

Jonas said he had met a fellow by the name of Redding, who posed as an Abyssinian, and other "Abyssinian princes," whom he had denounced as radicals to the federal authorities, without results.

Jonas said the Abyssinians called a meeting yesterday to boom Mayor William Hale Thompson of Chicago as their presidential candidate of the proposed third party.

The meeting was composed of Irish, negro and trade unionists. and was considering a treaty that was negotiated under the Roosevelt administration, which, if restored, woul invalidate the Jim Crow laws of the south, as negroes who are claiming protection as Abyssinjans could demand the right to travel on the same terms as the whites.





Hughes Exercises His catorical Abilities in An Add ess Delivered Before Harvard Law School Today

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 21 .-- Charles Evans Hughes, speaking at the Harvard Law School today, declared that "in the art of governing ourselves we not only fall short of the attainments we should expect of a iree people with so great an intelligence, but we frequently present a sorry spectacle.

"Passion for legislation is not a sign of democratic progress," he said, "and in the mass of measures introduced in the legislatures of our free commonwealth there is too little evidence of perspective and an over-abundance of elaborate, dreary futilities.

"Occasionally a constructive measure of great benefit is skillfully planned, but we are constantly impressed by the lost motion and vast waste in the endeavor of democracy to function wisely."






