Santa Claus - Friend or Foe

COLLEGE STATION --Treat Santa Claus as the spirit of joy and giving, advises Diane Welch, a family life education specialist.

"Children will then probably place Santa beside their pleasant imaginary friends of childhood.

"Santa can help a child grasp abstract concepts, learn about fantasy and reality and develop a caring, sharing and giving nature," the specialist points out.

Mrs. Welch is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Parents greatly influence how their children react to Santa, she says.

"Some parents are concerned about honesty. They feel their child will see the Santa Claus myth as a form

of deception. "At the other end of the spectrum, some parents use Santa as a means of getting 'good' behavior from their children in exchange for pro-

"In between these two groups are parents that tolerate the myth but do not exploit it," Mrs. Welch explains.

mises of gifts.

These parents allow their children to exercise their fullest imaginations about Santa, participate in the excitement of preparing for Santa's arrival but encourage them to revise their understanding in terms of their age and maturity, she

For example, the preschool child is often fascinated by all the arrangments surrounding Christmas. They are anxious to take an active part in getting ready.

However, their sense of time is limited and they are continuously asking when Santa is to arrive.

Many parents are innovative in the way they use the "mark-off" techniques to give the child a sense of knowing how many days are yet to pass, the specialist suggests.

At five or six years of age, children are interested in the details and spirit of Christmas. This goes along with their interest in fan-

Although still involved with imagination about reindeer and a "fat man" that takes cookies, children ages five and six can better grasp an understanding of what Christmas is all about.

By ages seven and eight, a child probably knows about the reality of Santa but may want to continue the illusion of mystery and legend.



Man Short In Statue Large In Achievements

On a bright November afternoon O.C. (Stubby) Warden, Manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce since 1975, takes time in his office to discuss the town and his work. Warden, a small man with a big smile, glances at the sunlight beaming across Main Street. It is one of those Indian-summer days full of warm breezes and burnished oaks, and life seems good indeed.

Ranger people affectionately call their Chamber of Commerce Manager "Stubby", or "Coach", referring to his years as a football player and his work with the local teams. They realize he has a history of putting a lot of effort into a job, whether it concerns football, school administration, or keeping a town moving the right direction.

Anyone would be impressed at the good things which have happened to Ranger within the last few years. For the town, now governed under Mayor Jack Allen, has developed in a number of areas. Ranger Junior College has grown considerably, and an Elementary, Middle Grade, and a High School have been constructed. Parks have been improved, and the town has a new hospital. A Boy's Club building has been constructed, and a fine Senior Citizen's Program has been developed. The American Car Company and other businesses have expanded. Not bad at all for a town of 3,138 people.

"Friendly people," declares Warden. "You know our slogan - 'Never a

Stranger in Ranger'. Board of Directors, and our concerned and dedicated members, for all the progress since I became Director. Fifteen citizens serve on this Board, and they really come up with some outstanding ideas. Jerry Edwards is President of the group, with Larry Stone as Vice President. Opal King is Secretary-Treasurer.

'The Chamber of Commerce was founded to promote the welfare of the Community, and we try to do that the Lion's Club. He serves on here. We work in several areas - community service, economic progress, and cultural growth. We work with all the Civic groups to make Ranger a better place

'We support our FFA Chapter, especially at the Eastland County Livestock Show. We promote clean-up projects and 'Beautify Ranger' programs. Around Christmas time we have a Christmas Parade with Santa for the children. We furnish and put up the Christmas decorations, to make the town look festive.

'All during the year we try to find a place for newcomers to live, and give them any other help we can. We always support fundraising activities for organizations in our City, and promote trade for Ranger merchants.

'The Ranger Industrial Foundation promotes new business and Industry for Ranger, and we work with them in every way. We also support various Educational and Athletic programs in the local schools and College. And I should mention our Public Relations work - we try to tell people the good things about Ranger every

'Right now one of our projects is to fix up the old Depot, which will house the Chamber of Commerce office and a Historical Museum. This will interest the whole area, and we are really looking forward to its completion."

As O.C. Warden discusses

town projects his face lights up just as it does when he looks across the room at the picture of the Ranger Football team he coached to a State Championship in 1953. And no wonder, for Ranger has been a part of his life since he came here as a child, in 1927. He finished High School here, playing on the Football team, then went to Texas A. and M., where he received a Degree in Physical Education - and played on the Aggie Football team. Later he received a Master's Degree at Hardin

During World War II he served in the Navy as an Officer, but more than 30 years of his life were spent as a Coach, Teacher, and Administrator in the Ranger School System. Upon retiring from the schools he became Manager of the

Chamber of Commerce. During these years O.C. Warden has received various honors, and they 'Now I praise the Chamber cover different facets of his life. First of all, he is a family man, Church-going, and a Deacon in the Baptist Church. He, his wfie Juanita, and their two children were honored by the Abilene Reporter News as "Family of the Year" in 1954. He was chosen the FFA Honorary Chapter Farmer of the Year in 1978. He is currently serving as an officer on the Board of Directors for the Ranger Boy's Club of America, and is a member of the Board of the Industrial Foundation, and has served as a Counseler of the Boy Scouts of America. He has been a member of the American Legion for a number of years, and has helped this Organization in all ways possible.

MID-WEST INDUSTRIES LOOK TO WEST TEXAS

Evaluation of an industrial prospecting tour to Detroit, Cleveland and Pittsburgh sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has indicated a strong interest by a number of midwest industrialists toward expansion to West Texas despite efforts of the Greater Cleveland Growth Association to thwart the effectiveness of the WTCC visit.

The main thrust of the West Texas visit was to impress upon industrial prospects in attendance the attributes of West Texas for future plant relocations and

expansions. West Texas representatives participating in the tour were met by memebers of the Greater Cleveland Growth Association, upon arrival in Cleveland, for the second of a series of three industrial briefing luncheons with area industrial represenatives who responded to an invitation from the WTCC. Representatives of the Cleveland Organization were deeply concerned about the competition their area was receiving from West Texas and evidently



felt West rexas posed a threat to their future in-

dustrial growth. WTCC tour officials were interviewed extensively by news media representing the Cleveland area as well as the Wall Street Journal. WTCC Executive Vice President, Ed Coltharp, was asked by one reporter if he was aware that the West Texas Chamber group had been labeled as "West Texas And Distablish Distabl

Bob Brummai of Lubbock, Chairman of the WTCC Private Enterprise Development Committee, which was responsible for organizing and conducting the promotional tour, reported that a total of 147 industry representatives attended the luncheons.

Raiders."

Brummal stated that of the six tours sponsored by West Texas beginning in 1975, more interest was shown by prospects than on any previous tour. "There is a very strong possibility for industrial moves to West Texas as a result of the 1980

tour," stated Brummal.

The WTCC has received word that a California-based industry has selected El Paso as location for a 300 employee operation directly as a result of the West Texas Industrial Tour to California last October. Several cities that participated on previous tours are working with additional industries that have

indicated definate interest in the West Texas area.

Towns represented on the recent tour included: Abilene, Amarillo, Austin, Bedford, Big Spring, Brownfield, El Paso, Euless, Fort Worth, Lubbock, Midland, Mineral Wells, Munday, Odessa, San Angelo, Waco, Weatherford and Wichita Falls.

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Reflections In Perspective By I. Will Ussery

Now I am not a Francophile, nor even an authority on French history. I've studied it, though. And it would appear to me that the average Frenchman stopped his clock just prior to the Battle of Waterloo. He still lives under the impressions of France as 'The Empire of France'. That empire was never better than Number Two, even by the most charitable appraisals, but don't try to tell that to a Frenchperson.

Perhaps being forced to accept the fact, even though not admitting it, that France is no longer an Empire of any big league significance lends to the air of belligerent arrogance one encounters now and then with the French. Don't get me wrong, now. I love and admire many of the French with whom I've associated, although I never fully trusted any of my best French friends in a business deal.

When the French language was generally replaced by English as the Diplomatic Language of the world, your manon-the-street Frenchman got all out of joint. That meant accepting the uncontrovertible fact that France was No. 2, at best. And the inbred hautuer of the French just will not allow him to public admit to being less than top banana in any league. Maybe it is a way of showing his resentment of the fact that except for a gross political miscalculation London would perhaps have been the capital of the Empire of the French, who knows?

There was a cable message on the desk one Thursday morning. 'Proceed Home soonest'. And that meant on the following day, as all U.S.-bound flights departed before the office was open. Frantic preparations for the morrow's departure went into full forward gear, and as I was boarding the flight next day I remembered that I was sorely in need of a haircut.

Not to worry. There is a very good barber shop in the transit lounge of the airport in Rome. Not to be. Although there were four chairs in that shop, its popularity must have been spread internationally. There was a long waiting line. Oh, well. Maybe Paris, which was the next stop where there would be something of a delay for re-fuelling for the Atlantic crossing.

And there was indeed a barber shop in the transit lounge of the airport terminal in Paris. One chair, leaning against the back of which was about as supercilious a Frenchman as it has been my fate to meet. When asked if one could be served in his excellent establishment, Jean Pierre lifted his eyes from concentration on the polishing of his nails and questioned; 'Does M'sieu have le appointment?'

Now it had been a short night prior to boarding the flight, and perhaps I was not just as bright as I should have been. But, somehow, that struck me as about the strangest response I'd ever had to a direct request for the services of a barber. In the transit lounge of an international airport terminal, accessible only to transit or departing passengers.....'Does M'sieu have le appointment?' M'sieu was puzzled. Still is.

Landing at or around midnight in New York, after some ten hours' flight from Paris, and while awaiting the departure of a connecting flight I espied an all-night barber shop. Seven chairs, but only one red-haired barber who was far from as tall as the Frenchman. Explained the problem, and realised with considerable relief that I was on U.S. soil when he responded as he whipped out a fresh linen...... 'Mister, you can have anything this shop has to offer, so long as you have the money to pay for it'. And he made with an infectuous grin I remember to this day.

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
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




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Hints For The Aged

DEAR PAT-Can you tell me what the "Year of the Disabled" means? I occassionaly come across an item that refers to it but the meaning has never been explained.-Y.M., Oklahoma

DEAR Y .- The United Nations has proclaimed 1981 as the International Year of the Disabled Persons, continuing its tradition of designating a year in which to focus world-wide attention on the needs and potential contribution of selected

groups of people. The U.S. Council for the International Year of the Disabled Persons was formed last year by individuals from the public and provate sectors. It will promote participation by the 35 million Americans with disabilities, and will guide participating organizations in providing public understanding and support for reaching eight IYDP goals:

* To expand access to educa-

* To provide greater opportunity for employment;

* To improve access to housing, buildings, and transportation;

* To provide broader recreation and social activities to integrate the disabled fully into community life;

* To expand and strengthen rehabilitation programs and facilities; * To increase biomedical

research aimed at conquering major disabling conditions;

* To reduce the incidents of disability through accident and disease prevention;

* To increase the application of technology on behalf of persons with disabilities. DEAR PAT-I know the

weather has been hot; we are all in a hurry; we hate to walk any distance longer than we have to; and we all hate to look for parking places. BUT what if you had all this combined with the fact that when you did find a place, and park your car, you then found you couldn't open the door and get out.

I use a wheelchair and I have made it a point to seek out managers or owners of business' and tell them how much I appreciate the fact that they have provided special handicapped parking

I don't even get angry when there is not special parking places--what irritates me is when a business is nice enough to consider his disabled customers and adds special parking but all of the able-bodied fill them up as fast as they become vacantby some other able-bodied who didn't want to park farther down an incline or by a curb, neither of which the disabled can negotiate. We need the extra width provided by the special parking places to open a car door as wide as it will go and then unload our equipment.

As a reminder to the ablebodied, the Architectural And Transportation Barriers Compliance Board, Washington, D.C. 20201 has reprinted (in 50 sheets to a pad) "You'll Do It Every Time" parking ticket. The cartoon ticket helps get the message across. The tickets are available free of charge from the ATBCB .-- M.B. Missouri

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


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Loboes Defeat Ranger 40-6 At C.H.S. Homecoming Game

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

Farmers in Eastland County are eligible to apply for emergency loans through the Farmers Home Administration for damage caused by drought and extreme temperatures.

Emergency loans are made to farmers to cover losses resulting from disignated major disasters. In order to qualify, a farmer must have suffered production losses or physical losses to buildings or other structures. Crop production must be 20 percent or more below normal in order to qualify for loss loans.

Loan applicants must be unable to obtain sufficient credit from local commercial sources in order to qualify.

Farmers who sustained losses may apply for assistance at the local office which is located in the Eastland National Bank Building, Room 312, Eastland, Texas.

It's a sand from two to 10 feet thick that has been found immediately under a 12-foot thick limestone rock at around 1,200 feet.

Ridgeway Oil Co. discovered the sand on land owned by Ralph and Leona Morton, and the discovery well is still a good producer a year or so later. Ridgeway has three wells in the sand, all good ones, and Danny's company, Trinity Oil and Gas Co., Inc., has an adjoining lease that they plan to drill soon.

Danny is production superitendent for the Trinity company, which is headed by Mike Dardeman, as president and owner. Trinity has 29 producing oil wells in Eastland County. Danny lives a mile south of the Pleasant Hill church in a new brick home. He's a graduate of Rising Star High School, attended CJC two years and has other college training.

Robert Stephans. They have two sons, Sean and Matthew. Danny is the son of the Don Schaefers. His dad has a drilling rig that he keeps busy in this region. Don formerly was employed by Parker Drilling Co. of Tulsa, the world's largest drilling company. Don spent three years in Pakistan for Parker as a drilling superintendent. He has been in business here

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
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


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
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
