## COMPETENCY IN OFFICE

The following editorial is clipped from the Waco Record, but as its provisions apply to every city and county in the state, we deem it worthy of reproduction. When a candidate asks your support use your head in ascertaining if he is the man you would care to entrust your business affairs. If not, you will be slow to give him your support. Better vote for a stranger whom you know has a clean record, than for a friend with a shady or incompetent reputation:

If you own a business that was sick unto tottering, what manner of man would you try to secure to assist in pulling that business out of the hole? Would it be a man whose achievements in the past were such that you had confidence in his ability to act honestly, wisely and decisively or would you give the job to someone whose chief ability was that of telling a good story, slapping you on the back and getting along without much work.

If a member of your family were seriously ill, would you in selecting a physician, choose a man simply because he had three or four children of his own and needed the practice, or would you place your loved ones under the care of a man whose analytical mind led you to believe he could penetrate to the root of the trouble?

The voters of Waco, McLennan county and the state of Texas are going to be called upon this year to choose between men whose ability is equally as important to you as would be the case if you were faced with either of the above situations. If you are content with the condition as it has existed for the past several years, then you will be willing to vote for a man simply because he is a friend of a friend of yours. But if you seriously want to do your part in righting the conditions that have so sorely tried our city, our county or our state for the past several years, then no matter who asked you to support a candidate, and no matter what office that candidate is seeking you will ask yourself what has been this man's record in the past. Is he a man in whose hands I would be willing to trust my personal affairs? If you have not sufficient confidence in a man to unhesitatingly trust him in the direction of your personal affairs, then you are unjust to your city and your state to cast a vote to place him in any office. Let us all search the character, honesty and abil-

ity of every candidate and try to select men for every office who will endeavor to do for us locally what Franklin D. Roosevelt is doing for us nationally.

## Cooperative League Enjoy Enthusiastic Meet Tuesday Night

An interesting and enthusiastic session of the Cooperative League was the session last Tuesday night, held for the first time in the city hall auditorium, though the anticipated musical features did not materialize.

Talks were made by Joe Clements, Judge Eugene Lankford, the Citizen editor, H. A. Bible, W. J. Parsons, Mr. Smith, Henry Kleiner, W. W. Altire and others, all endorsing the movement, and speaking for the good of the cause. Mr. Clements' talk was more of an explanation of an erroneous impression that had gained circulation regarding projects for CWA workers in Cisco. He spoke of visiting the CWA headquarters in Eastland with Judge Clyde Garrett, when it was proposed to make the sanitary work project No. 1 in Cisco. "I did not oppose this work, but objected to it being classed as No. 1, but proposed that the graveling of the unpaved streets in Cisco be No. 1, and make the sanitary work the project for the rural section, as Cisco was now the cleanest city in Texas. I understand the report came from the CWA headquarters, and I attempted to get in touch with Mr. Fleming Waters, county sanitary supervisor, to correct this report, as I heard Cisco had no sanitary project and it was the intention to send Ranger men here to do the work, but I was unable to contact Mr. Waters. However, with the support of our city commission and Judge Garrett I was able to get about \$5,000 allotted to Cisco to gravel the streets," he said. Mr. Bible verified the statements of Mr. Clements.

Judge Lankford was called upon and made a strong talk favoring the organization of those who work with their hands, but told his hearers that the crowd seemed to lack interest in the movement, which could not succeed unless they gave it their attention. He pointed out that bankers and other private interests looked after matters in which they were interested, which accounted for their success. "You must give your work your enthusiastic interest if you succeed. I have seen the errors of other labor organizations. These you must eliminate if you win. When any body of men, representatives of private interests or labor unions, seek to serve selfish ends to the detriment of the public welfare, they are wrong, and labor bodies, especially, must work for the general good," he told his hearers. At the request of the secretary Judge Lankford read a portion of the constitution of the League, which gave all a better understanding of the purposes of the organization.

The expected attendance of visitors from Ranger, who were billed for talks, did not materialize. During the proceedings it was stated that there were about 180 enrolled as members, and all except possibly 15 had reported payment of their poll tax. There were about 100 present.

Delivery price is now being advertised by Ford and Chevrolet dealers in Cisco. The same policy is adopted by distributors of other makes, according to advertisements appearing in Texas papers. This is sane and comprehensible. The former policy of pricing cars "F. O. B. Detroit" was never satisfactory to buyers, and I have wondered why it was not discontinued long ago. The public wants to know the price before the purchase is made. F. O. B. Detroit means nothing to the average man. ## RAMSEY GETS CONTRACT BEAUTIFY P. O. GROUNDS

Postmaster W. H. Craddock has just been advised that the contract to seed and landscape the grounds of the new federal building has been awarded the Ramsey Nursery, of Austin. The approximate cost will be near \$400, but if the plans are carried out—which they will be—the postoffice grounds will be the most attractive beauty spot in the city, he said.
