ABILENE, Nov. 28.-Twentyone persons connected with the operation of eight of Abilene's smaller hotels were named defendants in petitions for injunctions filed in 42d district court late vesterday afternoon by County Attorney Theo Ash and Chief of Police T. A. Hackney.

The petition asks that the deed and enjoined "from permitting iny person to reside or resort to said place for the purpose of prostitution or for the purpose of payng the trade or the vocation of a

"Or from allowing and permitting any lewd women to reside in said place, and from hiring or employing any person to act as porter or in any other capacity for the purpose of soliciting, assisting, or aiding any lewd women or prostitute women to ply their vocations."

To enforce the order, the petitions ask that the houses be closed for one year from the date of the judgment, unless the defendants make bond payable to the state at the county seat of not less than \$1,000 or more than \$5,000.

In asking the injunctions, the petition allege that the establishments operate under the name of notels, and purport to be hotels, but in reality are places where prostitutes are permitted to reort or reside for the purpose of olying their trade

Petitions further allege that the hotels employ negro porters to work in the hotels and work at the bottom of the stairs for the purpose of soliciting and taking care of any customers for the prostitutes who reside in the hotels, and that the operators keep and set aside special rooms for the purpose of the practice of prostitution.

Ash said that the petitions had een under consideration for some ime, and were adopted as probably the most effective immediate measure to tend to eliminate prostitution in the city.

"We have had two killings in town within the past six weeks as a direct result of the hotel situation," Ash commented. "Something has got to be done about it.

Ash and Hackney participated in a series of raids on the hotels last week in which 13 women were taken to the city jail on charges of vagrancy. Eleven of them forfeited cash bonds of \$5 each by failure to appear in city court, while the other two were fined \$5 each in city court.

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

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
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
