



As there are many oil men operating in the Cisco field who formerly lived in West Virginia, and others who hail direct from Clarksburg, the following story of a deep test ten miles from Clarksburg is published in the Daily News, believing the story will be of interest to the Cisco people who are familiar with the situation in that state. A remarkable feat of this well was the running of a string of eight inch casing down 5,053 feet without a mishap. The well also claims to have the longest string of ten inch casing of any well, eing 2,961 feet, and weighs about 85 tons. The weight of the eight inch casing is given at 110 tons.
