## Commissioners Vote To Use Private Autos; Qualify For Expenses

Eastland County Commissioners were expected to finally draw their \$75 express allowance check this week after three months of trying. In a special called meeting Wednesday, the last day of March, the commissioners passed an order which appeared to clear the way for their expense allowance — an allowance which they had originally voted themselves back in January.

There appeared to still be some question as to whether the order Wednesday would permit the measure to be retroactive and allow \$75 checks for January and February. Indications are that it would not.

In the special meeting the commissioners passed the following order:

"Upon motion duly made and seconded, the commissioners voted to use their private vehicles, instead of pickups, in traveling around the county on official business, and to allow each commissioner the sum of \$75 per month for the use of such private vehicles, said pickups to be used on road maintenance work.

"All members voting 'Aye', the motion was declared passed."

In an opinion written by District Attorney Perry T. Brown, County Treasurer Helen Justice was told: "In response to your request as to the present status as to paying the Commissioners Court \$75 per month for the use of their private vehicles in their traveling about within their districts and the county on official business: When you have been furnished with a copy of their order of this date (March 31) in which they have elected to use their private vehicles for such traveling, in pursuance of the Attorney General's ruling on Article 2350c, it is my opinion that such payments are authorized beginning with the month of March.

"As under the law officers are presumed to do their duty, it should be presumed that the commissioners entered such order in good faith and will use only their private vehicles in such traveling and will use, care for, and maintain the pickups furnished by the county as they do their road graders and other maintenance equipment furnished by the county."

Expense checks for the commissioners had not been written by noon Thursday, but were expected to be written before the weekend. These written by the county auditor, signed by him, the treasurer and the county clerk.

Commissioners received their checks Friday. The expense allowance was voted by the commissioners, citing Art. 2350c — Allowance for traveling expenses and automobile depreciation.

Sec. 1. In any county in this state having a population of not more than twenty-one thousand, five hundred (21,500), according to the last preceding or any future Federal Census, the Commissioners Court is hereby authorized to allow each member of such Commissioners Court the sum of not exceeding Seventy-five Dollars (\$75) per month for traveling expenses and depreciation on his automobile while on official business within the county. Each member of such Commissioners Court shall pay all expenses in the operation of such automobile and keep same in repair free of any...

C. E. (Ed) Johnson, 67, resident of the Romney community south of Cisco most of his life, died at 3 a. m. Saturday after a brief illness. He was stricken Thursday night at his home and was en route to the hospital in an ambulance when death came.

Mr. Johnson was a retired stock farmer. He was born in Coryell County on Dec. 22, 1894 and lived at Romney all of his adult life. He attended the schools there and was a member of the Pentecostal Church. He was a veteran of World War I. He was married to Ila Hogan on March 20, 1920, at Desdemona.

Funeral services for Mr. Johnson will be conducted at 2 p. m. Sunday at the Mountain Top Pentecostal Church, south of Cisco, with Rev. H. L. Flowers of Fort Worth officiating, assisted by Rev. ### Long Distance Telephone Rates Lowered April 1

Lower long distance rates became effective April 1 on station-to-station calls within Texas after 8 p. m. daily and all day Sunday, Steve Simmons, Manager Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, announced today.

The night rate formerly was in effect after 9 p. m. Now it is effective at 8 p. m. daily, and applies all day Sunday. The "Evening" rate, which applies from 6 to 8 p. m. Monday thru Friday, is effective all day Saturday.

"Since Sunday is the day families usually get together, this change in rates will make it possible for family calls to be made all day Sunday at the lowest rate of the week," said Mr. Simmons.

The changes in rates will apply only to station-to-station calls. The "Night" and Sunday rate will not apply to intrastate collect or third-party.

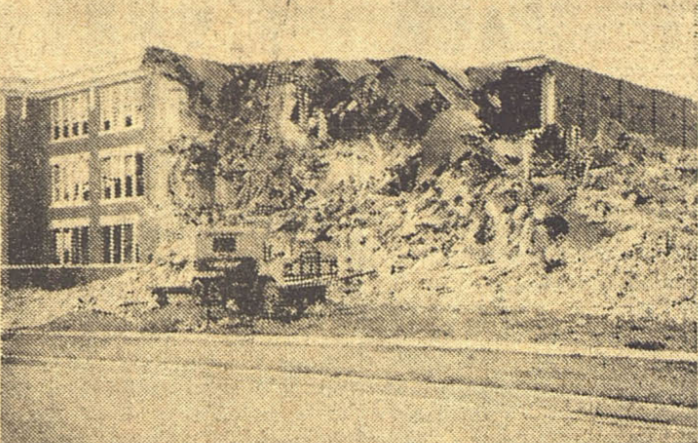
### Lone Star Sales Meet Held Here

## Three Teams Stressed In Crusade Against Cancer

During its 1965 Crusade against Cancer in April, Cancer Control Month, the American Cancer Society will stress three themes.

"All are especially important and vital in helping save lives from cancer," according to Mrs. Ann Justice, county Cancer Crusade chairman. They are:

1. "Tell Your Neighbor." This means passing on to neighbors facts about cancer that might save their lives. Facts everyone should know about early diagnosis and prompt treatment as a precaution against death; also what people should know about the value of an annual health checkup. Early diagnosis and prompt treatment save lives.

2. "To Help Cure More, Give More." There are about 1,300,000 Americans, now alive, cured of cancer. A large contributing factor has been broad public and professional education programs and research efforts. The American Cancer Society needs more money to help carry on and expand these programs.

3. "Fight Cancer With a Check and a Checkup." Many die from cancer today because they do not have an annual health checkup which can usually reveal the disease when it is early and most curable. Early diagnosis and prompt treatment is the difference between one out of two saved instead of one out of three — the number being saved now. If cancer exists, an annual checkup will usually disclose the disease when it is most curable. The check is self evident; without finances for important future research we can not hope to save half of those who develop cancer. Also the check will help provide greatly needed funds for broader pub-

lic, professional and service programs. "The effectiveness of these themes," Mrs. Justice said, "depends on the public's response to them. They are meaningful because anything that helps save lives has great meaning."

## Rainfall Is Above Average, Below 1964

Officially, rainfall in Eastland County during the first quarter of this year is above average, but below that which fell during the same period last year. Rain in both January and February was above average, but moisture in March fell far below average. Only .54 of an inch was recorded by Official U. S. Weather Observer James Smith of Eastland. Average for March is 1.59 inches. There's been a total of 4.74 inches this year, compared to 5.48 inches during the first three months last year. Average for the three months is 4.34 inches. ## Up To 1000 Due To Cast Ballots

A mayor and two commissioners will be elected as the voters of the City of Cisco go to the polls on Tuesday, April 6, in the annual city election. The voting will be from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. at the city hall.

Between 700 and 1,000 persons are expected to visit the polls. Voters will be required to have poll taxes or exemptions.

The ballot lists Roy Benton, Douglas Fry and E. L. Jackson as candidates for the mayor's office, which is being vacated this year by John H. Webb.

Mr. Benton, who is completing two terms as a city commissioner, is an instructor at Cisco Junior College. A resident of Cisco for some 11 years, Mr. Benton is a veteran of World War II, past president of the Lions Club and the Little League, and is active in various community affairs. He and his wife, the former Gloria Henson, are the parents of four children. They are Methodists.

Mr. Fry is a partner in the M. E. Fry and Sons Polled Hereford Ranch in northwest Eastland and Callahan Counties. He grew up at Brownwood and moved here more than 20 years ago. He is a Lion, a Methodist and is active in various community activities. He and Mrs. Fry are the parents of two children, both of whom are graduates of Cisco High School and Junior College.

Mr. Jackson retired last year after a long career with West Texas Utilities Company. He has lived in Cisco for more than 30 years and is a past president of the Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club. He is a past local, district, regional and state commander of the American Legion and currently is serving on a national committee. He is a Baptist and he and Mrs. Jackson have four children, all of who are graduates of the local schools.

Candidates for the two commission vacancies are: J. F. Coats — Former commissioner, retired mail carrier, native resident of the area. Baptist, Mason, and long identified with community activities.

Winston Heidenheimer — Department store owner, World War II veteran, commander Legion Post, active in Chamber of Commerce, Credit Bureau, Boosters Club and other organizations.

W. L. (Row) Phippen — Completing first term on council, native of area, stock farmer, World War I veteran and commander VFW Post, active in community for many years.

W. W. (Jack) Sawyers — Native of Scranton, vice president Reynolds Drilling Co. and veteran oil man. Baptist, Mason, active in community for many years.

### Free Enterprise Is A Continuing Story

An Editorial

In preparing a script a Hollywood writer must re-motivate the theme of the movie, at intervals, so that a person entering a theater after the picture has started will be able to pick up the thread of the story.

It is just as necessary, we firmly believe, to treat our free enterprise system in much the same way. Americans should be reminded, from time to time, of the meaning of free enterprise and what it does so that they will better be able to see how certain proposals for governmental programs that deviate from the true principles of free enterprise could ultimately prove damaging, rather than helpful, to national well-being.

Free enterprise, briefly, is the right of a man to go into any business he chooses; build up a product or service and try to sell it. Free enterprise also means your right, as a prospective buyer, to accept or reject any product or service offered.

Thus free enterprise — alone among economic systems — means that the person who has something to sell, and the person who is in the market to buy meet on terms of equality and freedom, without compulsion or interference as long as common laws of justice, decency and fairplay are observed.

Free enterprise is the right of all who live within it to offer whatever they have created — whether products or services or skills — to other individuals who are just as free to take them or pass them up.

What does free enterprise do? It brings out the best of our abilities, for two reasons. First it assumes that people want more than a bare, bleak existence and are willing to work for better lives when given the opportunity.

Second, free enterprise is competitive, necessarily. Having to compete is no bed of roses. But the right to compete is one that we can't afford to lose. It would mean losing all opportunity and freedom itself.

Only competition breeds champions — in sports, industry, or anywhere. Because of competition, the typical American company has to be efficient. It must produce goods of quality, at marketable prices. It must pay good wages. It must earn profits for growth and for payment to the investors. Should it fail to do any of these, it cannot stay in business.

Free enterprise is not perfect but it gives full scope to many of man's highest virtues; his imagination, inventive genius, determination and his self-reliance.

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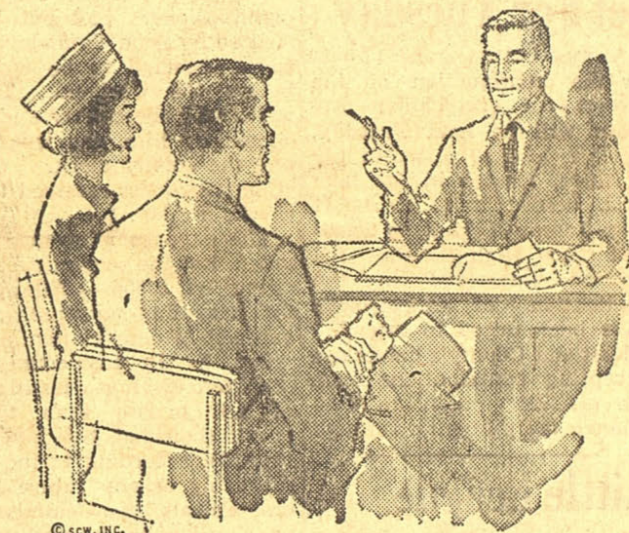
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# Importance Of County Industries Is Stressed

Eastland County industry is in the spotlight during "Texas Industrial Week" — Thursday, April 1, through Wednesday, April 7.

One of the newest industries in the county is Southwest Machine & Engineering Co., Ranger, aircraft parts manufacturer. The firm, little more than a year old, is currently handling several contracts on parts for Convair's TFX.

The seven-day observance giving special recognition to the county's industrial enterprises is even more important this year since Eastland County has embarked on an educational industrialization program in cooperation with the Texas Industrial Commission.

Four of five seminars covering various phases of preparation for industrial expansion have been held. The fifth session of the EC-65 group will be held early in May, according to Henry W. Clark, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission.

It is probable, Clark said, that Governor John Connally may be present at the final Eastland County industrial meeting.

Texas industrialization has been more rapid than that of the nation as a whole or adjoining states since 1960. Records for 1962 show that total new plant locations of all industries in Texas were 240, exceeded only by New York and Pennsylvania.

There are still other factors attractive to industry such as rapid population growth and concentration in metropolitan areas, good climate and living conditions, a variety of natural resources, geographic location, deepwater ports and other essential transportation facilities, and — this is very important — strong growth prospects.

The yearly observance of Texas Industrial Week was designed to focus attention during a seven-day period (April 1-7) on industry in the state, to show its importance to everyone, its contribution to the state economy and call attention to those things which help encourage industrial expansion and those things which need changing because they are a deterrent to industrial expansion.

The 1964 edition of "Texas Manufacturers" — compiled by the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas — lists the following industrial enterprises in Eastland County.

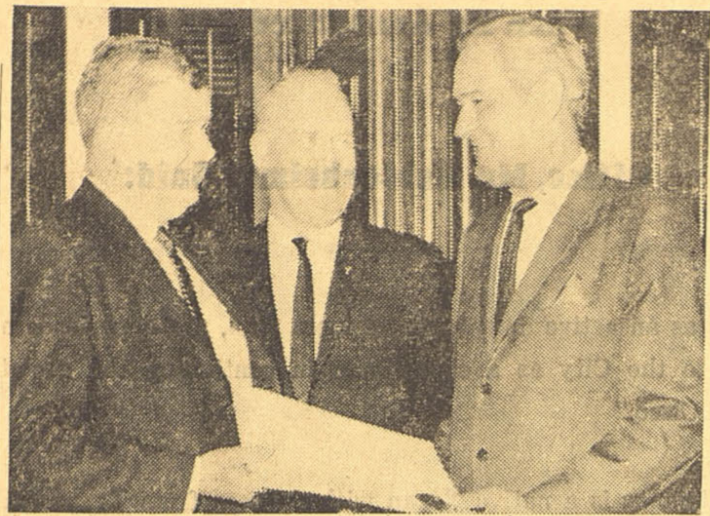

Sec. 2, 3 and 4 (pertains to counties with larger populations.)

Sec. 5. The term "members of the Commissioners Court" when used herein means the County Commissioners and the County Judge.

Sec. 6. The provisions of this bill shall apply only to those counties not furnishing in automobile, truck, or by other means providing for the traveling expenses of its commissioners, while on official business within the county.

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## REPORT ON PEANUT DAMAGE BY NEMATODES EXPECTED

Hordes of microscopic sub-soil animals may be robbing West Cross Timber peanut acreage of up to \$500,000 a year, according to a report which is to be published soon.

The culprits are worm-like creatures no larger than 1-50th of an inch in size, but capable, in numbers, of reducing the some \$8,000,000 peanut economy of Eastland, Erath and Comanche counties by as much as ten percent, the report shows.

County Agent J. M. Cooper and two county farmers have assisted in experiments which show the danger of the "nematodes."

Norm Spray, representing Dow Chemical Co., is preparing the report which will be submitted to the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association newspaper for publication.

"I think nematodes are our No. Two problem, after Southern Blight," D. B. Warren of Gorman has said. Warren is a grower and a director of the S.P.G. Association. The report shows that the Cross Timbers area has 113,000 acres or about 60 percent of the peanut acreage in Texas, and produces only about one-third of the state's yield. Damage by nematodes is believed to be the reason for the loss in production in the area.

The tests have included six test locations, including Mr. Warren's and Mr. Herman Schaefer's, of the Nimrod Community.

Cooper has said that he thinks as many as 20,000 acres may be seriously affected by the crop-damaging creatures.

## Shrine Club To Hold Cisco Meet

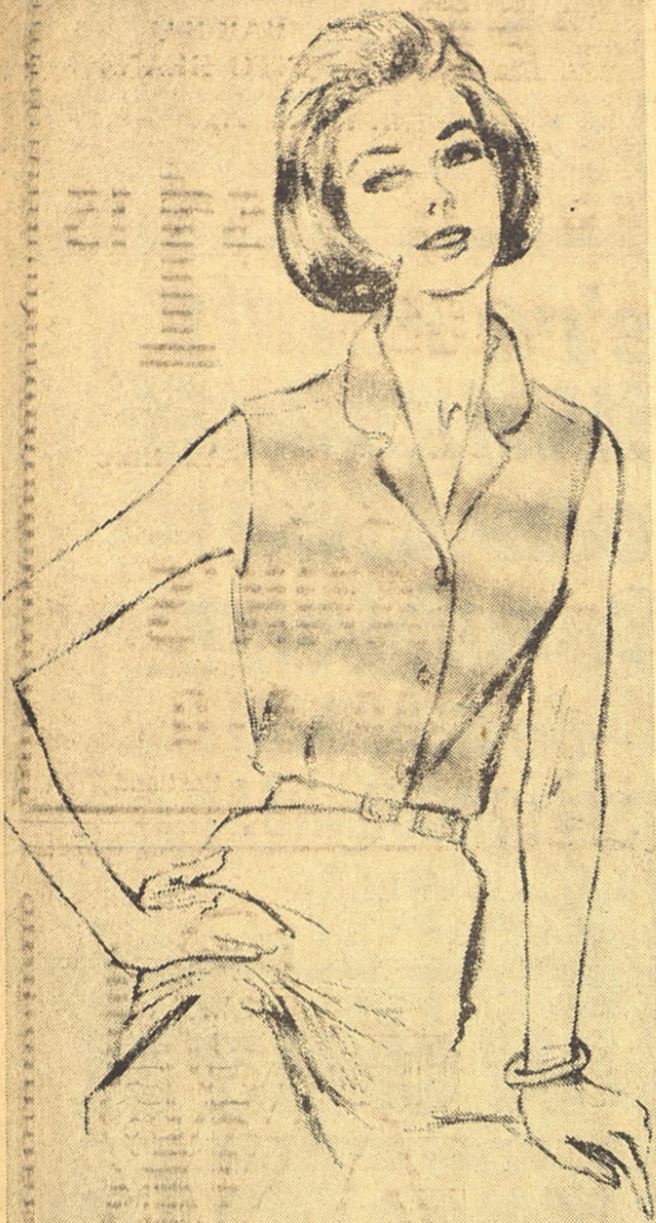

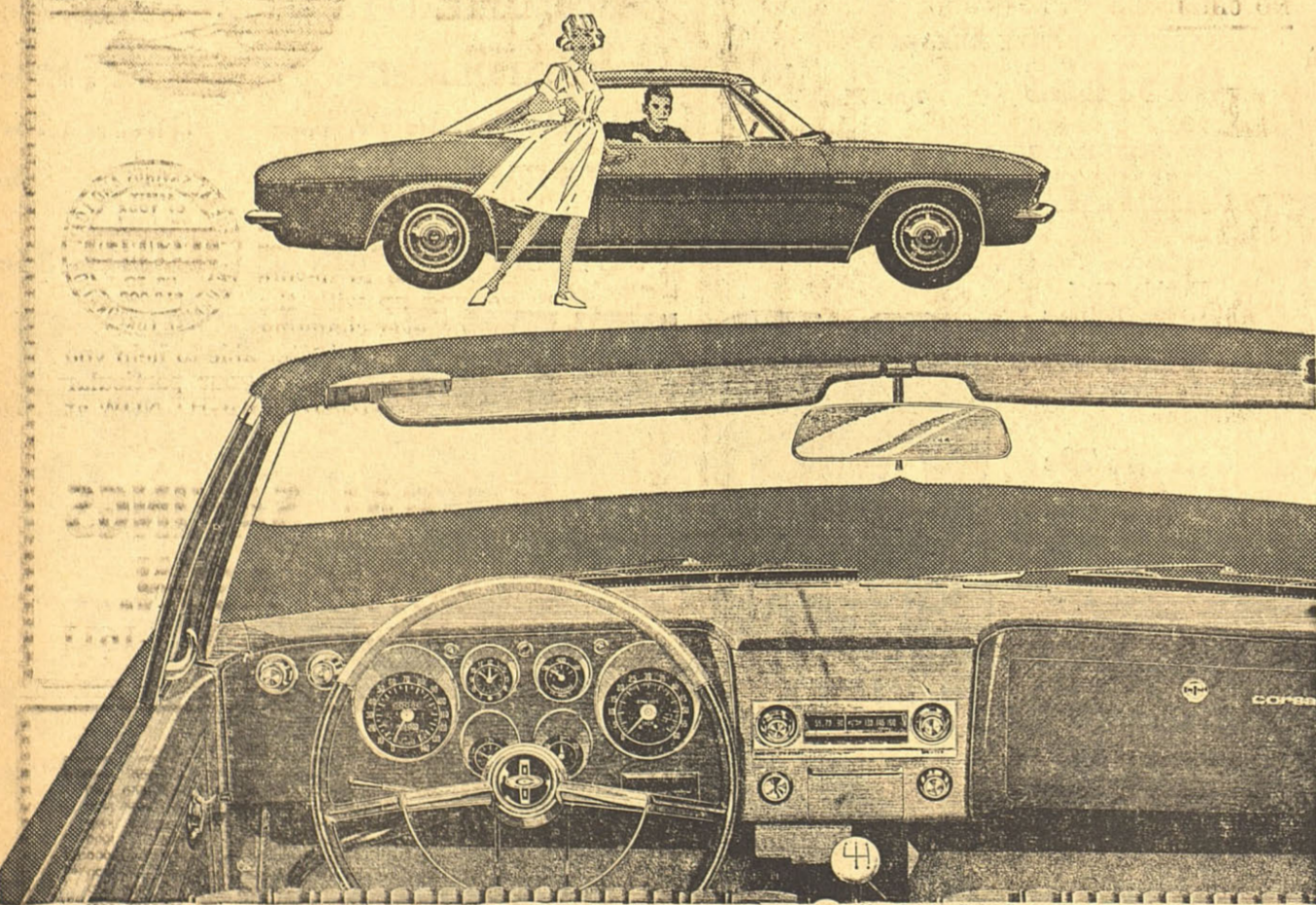

## NROTC Program Ready For Junior College Students

LAFAYETTE, Ind. — A group of college sophomores, with eyes on Navy careers, will take a "cruise" at landlocked Purdue University this summer to begin a new Navy program leading to a commission. The program is designed especially for junior college and transfer students who in the fall will enter one of 52 U. S. universities where NROTC programs are offered. Purdue is one of three U. S. universities where the unique summer preparation program will be held.

Students who plan to continue their college work now will be able to compress the freshman and sophomore years of naval science study into a six-week period and become eligible to enter the advanced NROTC program for their last two years of college. The Purdue program begins about June 21. Students will come here for classes in naval orientation, history and seapower, naval science laboratories, naval weapons and organized drills and physical training.

Following the summer session, successful candidates will be eligible for acceptance in the NROTC program at the university they have selected. They will continue there in naval science as part of their regular academic work. Upon graduation, students may be offered a commission in the Navy or Marine Corps. During the special summer tour at Purdue, students will receive \$78 a month from the Navy.

The Navy program is stringent and seeks only NROTC students who will make superior officers, said Capt. John W. McManus, commander of the Purdue NROTC unit. Applicants must have no less than a "C" grade average in their first two years of college work, be unmarried, have no physical handicaps

and already be accepted at a university offering NROTC work. Application deadline is May 1. More information can be obtained from any Naval Recruiting Office, any NROTC university, or from Capt. McManus at Purdue.

A sick stray dog, frothing at the mouth, was shot in Humbletown. A child's pet dog, because he was bitten by this stray, is having to be confined on a short chain for 180 days.

Why? Two reasons: (1) Because of the inconvenience of carrying several children and a dog (not used to traveling) in a car twenty miles to get a vaccination at the proper time and (2) Because when local police were summoned and, after they shot the stray dog, they did not deem it feasible or necessary to send the dog's head to a laboratory to determine if the dog was rabid.

I ask the citizens of Cisco if something can be done to remove both of these reasons if indeed either be reasons.

Is the city so poor that we cannot afford to have a veterinarian come at regular intervals to vaccinate our animals? Why isn't there a regulation stating that whenever ANY animal is sick enough to be destroyed — this animal's head should immediately, and as a matter of course, be sent to a proper laboratory? Whether or not the animal is THOUGHT to be rabid. (Symptoms are not always visible).
