While here the official conferred with County Agent C. Metz Heald and W. B. Starr, both of whom appeared optimistic that the price would be raised to around the \$65 per ton figure asked. Starr was a member of the federal peanut crop control board.



TO BE GOOD

FOR 100 BBLS.

The Hickok Oil Corp. well on the old dump ground property, north of Cisco, was drilled in Saturday with good prospects of oil production. The well cleaned itself with a head of four or five barrels when tools were removed from the hole Saturday morning and shortly after filled 2,000 feet in fluid. Making about a million and a half feet of gas, it began spraying steadily during the afternoon, forcing the crew to close it in. It was estimated to be good for 100 barrels daily.

The well Friday started drilling out the plug where casing was set on top of the upper streak of Eastland Lake sand at 3,394. Thirty thousand gas was encountered at 3,402 feet and this increased to 1,273,000 feet at 3,-406 where the expected shale break was picked up. The bit entered the lower streak of the Lake sand at 3,417 feet.

The well is now bottomed at 3,425 feet. It was possible that further drilling would be done Monday although it was expected to complete as it stands.

Encouraging

THE statement of R. O. Whiteaker, in a letter to President Johnny Cox of the Cisco Boosters, that Cisco State Park will be included in requests for CCC camps to be allotted to state park development projects next April is encouraging. This assurance, coupled with the promise of Cong. Thomas L. Blanton at the Boosters dinner last month that Cisco would receive one of the first two camps to be alloted his district, makes hopeful the prospect that by next summer the canyon area to the north of Cisco will be under a process of park development designed to prove extremely attractive to tourists who pass through here by the thousands every week of vacation weather. By the time the trek to the Texas Centennial celebrations at Dallas and other major Texas cities is well under way, Cisco ought to be in a position to offer inviting park attractions to these prospective citizens.


been the subject of much discussion. Wet sentiment openly feels that this is an inequity and that, if a dry area may be permitted to exist within a territory whose general maority is wet, a wet area ought to have the same privilege.

THE American concept of government starts from the assumption that the individual is free to do anything he wants to except as he may be restricted by a majority vote of his fellows. Without law, he would be free to steal, murder, rob, and drink as much liquor as he wants to. American law s restrictive and not liberative. Where three citizens get together and two of them determine that stealing is a crime and therefore prohibited by law, it is not within the privilege of the dissenting individual to make a law of his own legalizing the practice. He must bow to the will of the majority. The same doctrine must be applied uniformly to the rest of the field of lawmaking and government. American government is based on majorities.

LIQUOR prohibition laws start from the basis that the right to drink liquor is universal except as these laws abridge it. Therefore this regulation is a progression from total unregulation toward total regulation. There is no necessity of laws to permit the use of liquor; but there is a necessity to prevent the legal distribution of such. If it was permissible under the present theory and system of government, for a subdivision or an individual to legally go behind a general negative, one has to think but a pace or two ahead of the issue to discover what a general, unmitigated mess the whole field of law enforcement would be thrown into. Respect for authority would summarily be destroyed. We here in Cisco could organize a district and refuse to subscribe to the federal mandate that we must pay income taxes or obey the laws prohibiting indiscriminate sale of narcotics. In short, the country would be in one hell of a mess if we could change the basis of law enforcement to suit our personal or local feelings on every occasion.


A wet area within a larger territory must

succumb to the restrictive vote of the larger area. But because a larger territory cannot compel a smaller, internal area to continue in untrammelled liberties of indulgence, it cannot prevent it, therefore, from voting to remain tdry. It requires no voting to make an area wet, the repeal of prohibition to the apparent contrary, notwithstanding. Repeal simply nullified a restrictive vote and returned the country to its primary status. A section is naturally wet, in the sense that the liberty of its citizens to drink liquor does not require a law. The same doctrine is true of the crime of murder. Before ever there was a law against killing another, one man could end another's life without incurring legal penalties. It took no law to make the murder legal, either.
