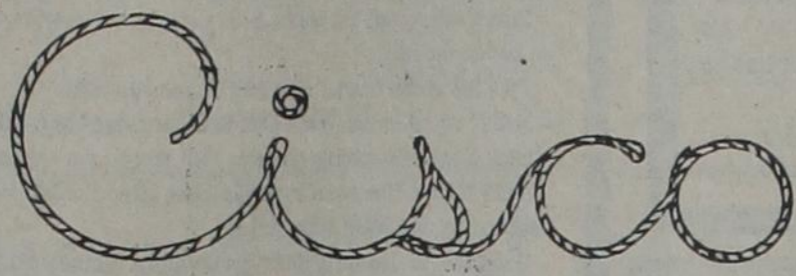

according to announcements.

The public schools will dismiss students at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday and classes will be resumed Monday, Dec. 2, Supt. Ray Saunders reported.

Dr. Henry E. McCullough, president of the college, said that CJC students would be free after their last classes Wednesday until Monday morning, Dec. 2.

Most business firms are expected to be closed Thursday for Thanksgiving.

The Thanksgiving service, an annual event, is sponsored by the Cisco Ministerial Association. The main goal of the Association is to pull Cisco churches together with a common cause to reach Cisco for Christ.

An offering will be taken up during the service. The money will be used to help people throughout the coming year.

Last year the Cisco Ministerial Association helped local citizens buy gas and groceries when the citizens had a hard financial time due to unexpected events. They also paid for some local people's utilities. The latest project for the Ministerial Association was helping the employees at the Cisco Nursing Home.

Goodfellows Ready For Helping Needy This Year

Thanks to the citizens of Cisco, who donated the funds, and the Goodfellows last year's holiday season was a little brighter for those families.

Goodfellows also request that families more fortunate than the destitute contribute funds to help those families in need who can not help themselves. The local organization has a tax exempt status, so all contributions are tax deductible.

All letters seeking aid should contain the complete mailing address of the persons requesting help, along with brief directions on how to find the home. A telephone number also needs to be included, if the family has a telephone. All requests for aid must also include one of the application forms.

The Goodfellows have received \$500 in donations already this year through its Board of Directors, but much more is needed if they are to provide very many families with food. The Goodfellows will mainly concentrate their help in the area of food baskets, with toys being bought if, and when, enough money comes into the organization.

All solicitation for funds will be made through The Cisco Press and everyone is urged to donate to this worthy cause. The money you donate will be used to help the needy of our community. The Goodfellows have stated they have a responsibility to contributors to spend the money wisely and aid as many persons as possible.

Donations may be mailed to Goodfellows of Cisco, Box 1072, Cisco, Texas 76437, or given to one of the directors. A donor list will be published in The Press listing donors and their contributions. Anyone wishing to remain anonymous will be listed as such upon request.

All checks are to be made payable to: Goodfellows Fund of Cisco. Goodfellows have 11 directors which were named in May of this year. Among the 11, eight are hold-over directors from last year and three have been newly named to the Board.

Eastland Police Chief Re-Appointed As "Man In Charge"

The Eastland County Cooperative Dispatch Board approved a plan that will put Eastland Police Chief Lyndell Underwood back in charge of the dispatch. Chief Underwood had gone to Austin some time ago and removed his name from a document that would hold him responsible for all materials entered and received through the teletype terminal at the dispatch. According to federal guidelines issued by the Na-

tional Criminal Identification Center, a Criminal Justice Agency must be in charge of the telecommunications center. The problem arose when the dispatch requested connection with Austin for a new terminal. It was then that Bob Mercer, dispatch supervisor was informed that no one was on the document for responsibility. A subcommittee had submitted to the board at their meeting Wednesday, November 13, a suggestion

of putting Eastland County Sheriff Don Underwood in charge. The suggestion showed that the manager (Sheriff Underwood) would rate higher than the board. The board disapproved, and drew up their own plan keeping themselves in actual charge of the dispatch. The manager, when appointed, would make decisions at the dispatch with the board's approval. This new policy was approved by the board, with

Chief Underwood's name added and sent to Austin for final approval. Underwood will serve this position until October, 1986. Deadline for the new policy is November 30, 1985.

Elderly citizens of Eastland County are warned and asked to be alert to a possible insurance and jewelry fraud which is apparently reported being done by an out of county man.

Deputy Sheriff George Yeilding is currently investigating a case wherein a 70 year old Eastland County lady was approached by a man that she knew to be an out of county field insurance agent to renew her policy at which time he collected \$633.00 for the supposed annual premium. Subsequently, the lady learned that her premium should have only been \$387.00 and that the man was no longer with that particular insurance company.

The man also tried to entice the lady to invest \$500.00 in some jewelry of which he had pictures and promised her that she would double her money with a month. Fortunately, the lady did not

buy the jewelry story and turned him down. In the meantime, she thought her insurance premium was paid but learned it was not because the man was not employed by the insurance company and did not turn in her money in to the insurance company.

Deputy Yeilding requested that any citizen who believes he or she may have been the victim of a "ripoff" like this to contact him at the Sheriff's Office immediately so that he can check it out.

District Attorney Emory Walton stated that periodically we have these fly-by-night peddlers of various kinds of insurance and home improvements, such as siding, roofing, paving, etc., come into the county from various parts of the state. He said that these type of people are predators who move around and are not easily apprehended because they are always on the go

from one county to another. He said that Deputy Yeilding has good information as to the whereabouts of the man who took the \$688.00 from the elderly lady and anticipates his arrest soon.

Walton said he joined Deputy Yeilding in requesting that people be cautious in dealing with door to door salesmen, particularly from out of county, because nearly anything that can be bought at the door can be bought from a local store or insurance agent. He stressed that anyone who had been contacted or is contacted in the future on any similar type of insurance, jewel, or home improvement scheme to immediately notify Deputy Yeilding, Walton's office or the local police department.

Crime Stopper Program Is Topic Of Lions Club Wednesday

The Crime Stopper program that had its beginning in 1976 is a growing state and national movement that is making a valuable contribution to convicting law breakers, according to Don Dillard of Austin, assistant director of the Texas organization.

Mr. Dillard was the guest speaker last Wednesday noon at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club, along with Lieut. Jack Dieken of the Abilene Police Department. Lion Earl Ray arranged the program.

Mr. Dillard pointed out that in 1970 one out of every 100 persons could expect to be the victim of a major crime each year. By 1982, the ratio had dropped to the point that one out of every 60 children born that year could expect to be murdered.

Nation-wide only one out of every five crimes were being solved and only one out of every 100 persons arrested for law violations was being convicted. Fear among the citizenship was such that virtually nobody ventured out alone on the streets at night,

Mr. Dillard said.

In Albuquerque, New Mexico, the crime situation was worse than in any other city in the nation, he said, and a young police officer came up with the Crime Stopper idea--offering cash rewards for anonymous tips on criminal acts. The idea has been called the greatest innovation in law enforcement since the two-way radio, Mr. Dillard said.

Since the beginning of Crime Stoppers, 550 cities of the nation are involved, including about 130 in Texas,

the speaker said. El Paso had the first Texas program.

Lieut. Dieken told about the success of Crime Stoppers in Abilene. He suggested that "if your town doesn't have the program, get it." In four years since the Crime Stopper program began, Abilene has recovered more than \$1,000,000 worth of stolen property and solved 430 burglary cases due to crime Stoppers, he said.

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Total Of 58 City Blocks Were Seal Coated Or Paved In 1985

A total of 58 blocks or 20,880 linear feet of streets in the City of Cisco were seal coated or paved in the summer improvement program during the current year, according to a report Friday by City Manager Mike Moore.

The 58 blocks included 33.5 blocks of new paving. Work on the 1985 street improvement program was due for completion during the past week as winter weather was being felt more forcefully.

The city spent a total of \$99,131.00 not including labor or maintenance costs, in the 1985 program. Of this sum, some \$60,000 was received from oil revenues, the city manager reported.

Plans for street improvements were worked out by the city manager and the street department each year and submitted to the City Council for final approval. Consideration is given to the volume of traffic in determining the streets that are included in the annual program.

Streets paved or seal-coated during 1985 were listed as follows:

Avenue L from West 8th to I-20 Access, 9 1/2 blocks; Harrell from Front to Wright, 4 blocks; Mancill from Front to FM 2943, 6 blocks; Wright from Harrell to Mancill, 1 block; Pershing from Harrell to Park, 2 blocks; Pershing from Bliss to Leggett, 1 block.

Beginning as weather permits, city street workers will start filling pot holes and doing patch-work, the city manager reported. Seal-coating work can be performed only when temperature conditions permit.

The street department expects to upgrade its paving equipment before beginning paving work next year, Mr. Moore said. Some 62 blocks of streets were improved in 1982.

Work has been completed on the new putting green that was financed by contributions to a memorial fund in honor of the late Letha Stafford, long-time member of the club. Mr. Wende noted that much of the labor, including welding by Dr. Chief Brown and painting by Mr. Crofts, was donated.

Mr. Robinson reported that the club recruited some 40 new members in a drive during the past spring.

A family night supper was served prior to the business meeting.

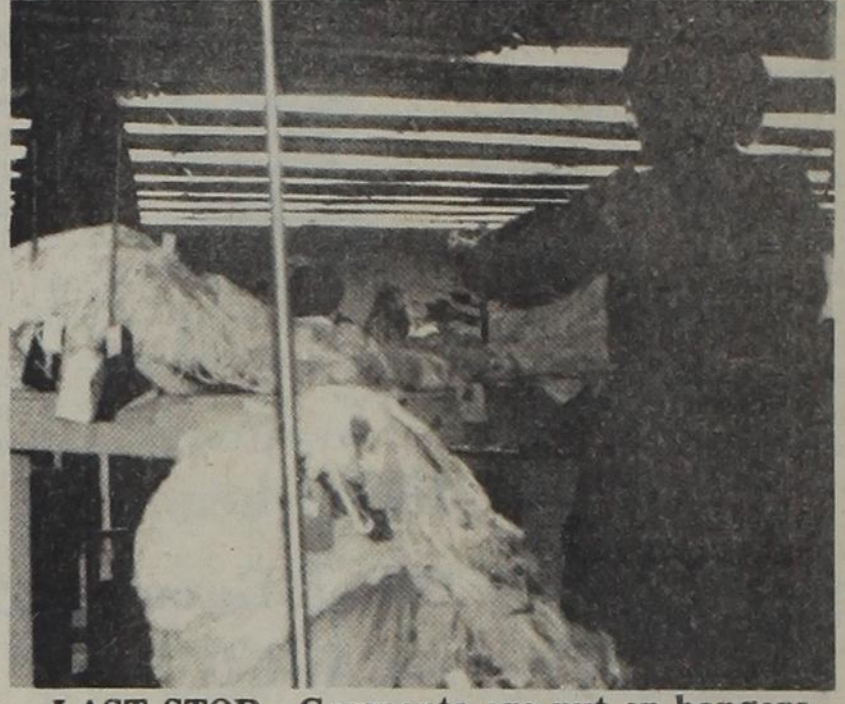

Approximately 100 people turned out Thursday night for the annual stockholders meeting of the Cisco Country Club at the clubhouse. Two new board members were elected and reports on activities for the past year were made.

Sutton Crofts and Tim Jones were elected as directors of the club to join the hold-overs, including Ronnie Ledbetter, O.L. Robinson, Ed Wende, Dorothy Farnsworth, and Deborah Whitley. Retiring directors are Bobby Smith, who served as president during the past year, and Harold Reich.

The board of directors met

briefly following the stockholders meeting and decided to postpone the election of officers until all board members could be present at the regular meeting on Dec. 16th.

Mr. Smith presided at the business meeting and Mr. Robinson served as secretary in the absence of Mrs. Whitley. Mr. Robinson determined by roll call that a quorum was present from among the club's 114 members.

Mr. Robinson read a financial statement that showed that the club collected dues in the amount of \$21,251 in the past year along with

other income that included \$5,386 in green fees for a total of some \$33,300. Expenses for the year amounted to some \$35,000 that included \$11,137 on club house upkeep and activities, \$18,500 on the golf course, \$2,400 on tractor repairs and \$1,000 for a new mower.

The club had a cash balance of some \$2,000 as the fiscal year ended, the report showed.

First Bond Issue Is Completed

The Eastland County Industrial Development Corporation has announced the completion of its first bond issue. The Eastland County Commissioner's authorized the formation of the Eastland County Industrial Revenue Corporation in 1981 in response to a request by local businessmen led by David A. Keener of Lake Leon. The purpose of the Corporation is to authorize the issuance of tax-free revenue bonds to finance projects that promote the general health and welfare, without liability to the citizens of Eastland County. Because the bonds are issued on behalf of a political subdivision, the interest rates are 2% to 3% below prime lending rates, offering substantial savings to the user. Purchasers of the

bonds enjoy a tax-free interest income.

Burgess-Manning, Inc., has been approved for the issuance of \$1,150,000 in bonds. The application indicates that the bond issue should preserve some 40 jobs at its Cisco plant.

The Texas Industrial Commission has adopted rules governing the issuance of industrial revenue bonds. In general, costs associated with the development or construction of facilities and equipment are subject to IRB financing.

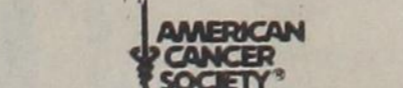
Annual Yule Parade Is Set Here Dec. 7

WTU Promotes Former District Sales Manager

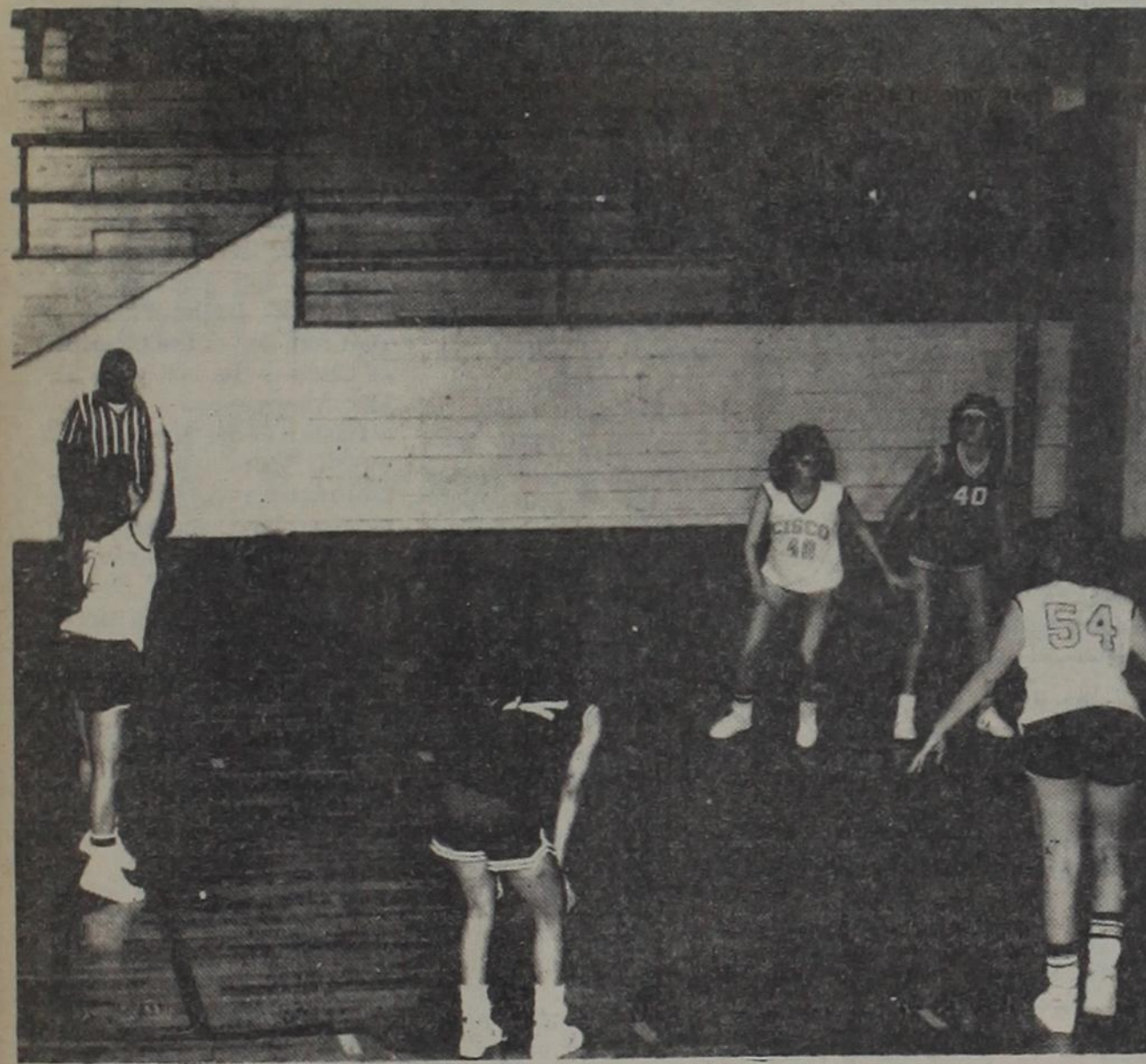

The F.C.A. had a lock in Friday night after the boys and girls basketball game lasting from midnight until sunup. Hope evryone had a good time.

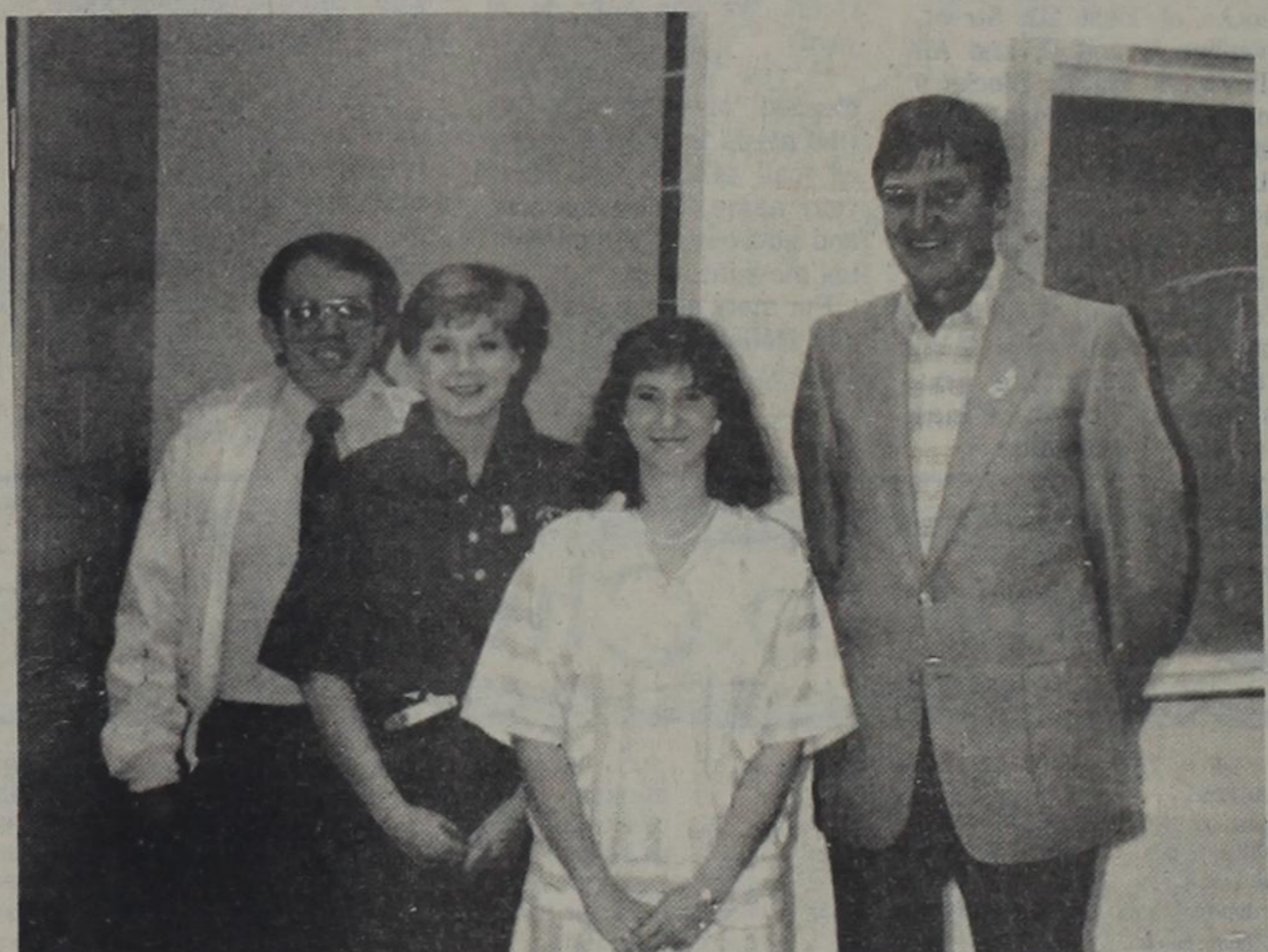
CJC Club Hears Charlie Jordan

Mr. Charlie Jordan, renowned throughout the Big Country for exotic vegetables and excellent weather forecasting, spoke to the CJC Science Club on Friday, November 8. Mr. Jordan, or "Charlie" as he prefers to be called, presented an informative program to over 80 CJC students and faculty. Charlie, a native of Petrolia, Texas, spent 25 years in the Navy as a chief meteorologist before moving to Abilene. He has two children, a daughter teaching at Paint Rock, and a son who is a senior at McMurry. Charlie has published several papers in his career while earning his

bachelor's and master's degrees from Pepperdine in meteorology.

Charlie spoke to the group on the changing weather patterns throughout the world and presented several reasons for these changes. He pointed out that only a 3 or 4 degree temperature drop worldwide is needed to cause an ice age. During our great ice ages, temperatures were only 5 degrees cooler than today today as an average. Reasons currently causing worldwide temperature drop include most anything that prevents the sun's energy from reaching earth. Currently, extensive volcanic activity has caused a worldwide dust cloud which black out some of the sun. Also high level clouds left as jet streams from high-flying aircraft are beginning to have an effect on our worldwide temperature. Most indications and measurements show that the glaciers are beginning to move south and many predict a partial ice age with 100 years.

The next meeting of the Science Club will be December 6, when Dr. Charles Barnes, former practicing veterinarian and scientist for NASA will present a program on "Careers in Science". Dr. Barnes developed the plutonium battery which currently is sending signals back to earth from the moon. The services were directed by the Rev. Bill Weeks, pastor of First Presbyterian Church, assisted by her son, Father George P. Fee, Jr., of Garden Grove, California. Burial was in Oakwood Cemetery.
Mrs. Fee was the widow of the late George P. Fee, Sr., a pioneer business man and rancher of Cisco, who passed away in August, 1975. She

was born Katheryne Thurman on Jan. 1, 1902, in Fort Scott, Kansas, and was married to Mr. Fee on Feb. 17, 1927.

Mrs. Fee attended Pittsburg (Kansas) Teachers College and qualified as a teacher. During the summer months, she traveled over the nation with a Chautauqua entertainment group, a famous organization that took cultural programs to the small towns of the nation.

During her Chautauqua travels, Mrs. Fee came to Cisco as the advance agent for the group and remained to direct ticket sales and make arrangements for the program. She stayed at the home of the Mancill family, pioneer residents, and it was during this time that she met the late Mr. Fee. He was on the community committee that sponsored the Chautauqua's appearance in Cisco in the year 1926. They were married the following year in Kansas at the Thurman home.

The attractive home at the Fee Ranch was built in 1928 and Mrs. Fee lived there since that time. In 1938, they doubled the size of the Ranch home and the remodeled residence was entered in a national contest sponsored by Better Homes and Gardens Magazine. The magazine's September, 1938, issue pictured the home and announced that it had won their 4th prize in national competition. During the years after the picture and story appeared, the home was visited by many people from throughout the country.

Over the years, Mrs. Fee was active in the First Presbyterian Church and some time ago her service in the church was recognized when she was made a life member. She was also active in the 20th Century Club, of which her late mother-in-law was one of the founders. For some 20 years, begin-

ing in 1950, Mrs. Fee owned and operated The Gift House in the old First National Bank building. Her business was recognized as one of the most complete stocks of fine merchandise in this region. She was active in the Chamber of Commerce and other community organizations and worked in the American Red Cross during the WWII years.

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Avoiding Or Treating Head Lice

Head lice are a common problem, especially among school age children. This problem can affect anyone and is not a sign of poor personal hygiene or an unsanitary environment.

Prompt treatment is important because a daly may spread the lice to others, says the Texas Medical Association. Head lice are small grayish-white insects, 1/16 to 1/8 inches in length. The eggs of lice are known as nits, and they too are visible. They look like tiny white grains clinging to the hair.

Lice are usually transmitted through close personal contact. They are occasionally transmitted through the sharing of personal articles such as combs, brushes, hats, or helmets, or through the storage of these

items in shared lockers.

Head lice attach each nit to the hair shaft at the scalp with a waterproof cement-like substance. Although lice and nits are most commonly found at the nape of the neck and behind the ears, they can be found anywhere on the scalp.

While itching is a common symptom of head lice infestation, most persons with very light cases experience no symptoms at all. A thorough examination of the hair and scalp is necessary to detect head lice or nits.

Several medicated shampoos are effective in killing head lice and their nits. Follow a physician's or druggist's recommendations or seek assistance from the health department or a school nurse.

Treat the hair according to instructions on the label of the medical shampoo. Because none of the shampoos will kill all the nits, treatment must be repeated in 7-10 days to eliminate newly hatched lice.

School children may return to class as soon as they have received their first treatment with an effective medication. The entire fami-

ly and school contacts should be inspected and undergo simultaneous treatment if necessary.

Treatment of the hair must be accompanied by laundering of bedding, clothing, and towels in hot water and detergent. Wash combs, brushes, and other hair care items with the same preparation used on the hair.

FMHA Issues Loan Assistance Information

Temple--The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has issued new regulations which spell out, in detail, the various loan servicing alternatives which may be available to farmers who are having economic difficulty to Texas FmHA state director J. Lynn Futch.

"All borrowers are expected to pay back their loans to a planned repayment schedule," Futch said. "However, when that is impossible, we want borrowers to be aware of what kind of assistance may be available and under what conditions."

The servicing alternatives available to eligible borrowers include a deferral of a portion of payments for five years, reamortizing payments over a longer period of time, restructuring the debt, or subordinating FmHA's lien position on

security to another lender. The regulations spell out how FmHA determines eligibility for various loan servicing alternatives and under what circumstances FmHA would propose to take steps to resolve delinquency or other problems.

Borrower's appeal rights are details as well as FmHA's agreement to continue the release of sales proceeds until final loan servicing has been determined.

The new procedures were developed to give FmHA borrowers with delinquent and problem loans clear, consistent and predictable guidelines on how their accounts will be serviced by the agency," Futch said.

Homemaking Hints

Every year thousands of children are injured by their favorite possessions - their toys. Falls on or against toys are probably the most common type of accident. But serious injuries have also resulted when little ones choke on small parts, place tiny toys in noses and ears, and cut themselves on sharp edges and points.

With the holidays approaching and toy buying and playing at it's peak, it is a good time to remind everyone about the basics of toy safety.

Safety should be a prime factor from the moment a toy is selected and purchased. Here are some guidelines for grown-ups:

-Toys should suit the skills, interest, and age level of the child. Those playthings that are too complex for young children will usually have small pieces or loose, moveable parts that can do harm. A good rule of thumb: The younger the child, the fewer pieces the toy should have, and keep all toys with electrical connections away from preschoolers.

-Crib toys should bolt securely to the side of the crib and remain stable. Never hang toys with long strings, cords, loops, or ribbons in cribs or playpens - children can become entangled in these.

-Check for sturdy, well-sewn seams on stuffed animals and cloth dolls. Be certain that eyes and noses are securely fastened and cannot be pulled off.

-Avoid hand-me-down toys with small parts (some might be missing); sharp edges, dents, or rusted areas, especially for children under three.

-Check indoor and outdoor toys periodically for damage. Rust, dents, loose or broken parts, tears, and broken or sharp edges should all be repaired if possible and the toys discarded, if not.

-Make sure that toys used outdoors are stored in a garage, shed or protected area after play. Rain or humidity can rust or damage many toys.

-Encourage children to put toys away to avoid breakage or prevent others from tripping or falling over them.

-Take the time to establish toys storage areas in the home. Toys and games can be organized in plastic bins or baskets, on shelves, or in a toy chest. Store older children's toys on a high shelf or in a locked closet so little ones cannot reach them.

-Toy chests should have lightweight lids that can be opened easily from inside. It's vital that the lid be easily removable or sprinkloaded to stay securely open. A number of unfortunate accidents have occurred as a result of a lid slamming down on a child's head or neck. Wooden toy chests should have smooth edges and hinges, and ventilation holes for extra safety.

-Beware of toys that produce loud noises - these can damage hearing, particularly when used indoors or close to the ears.

-Avoid toys that shoo or propel objects - they can injure eyes or become lodged into the throat. All arrows and darts used by children should have blunt tips (rubber or flexible plastic suction cups, cork, or similar protective points). Be certain that these tips are attached securely to their shafts.

-Older children flying such items as kites, model airplanes, or frisbees should be advised to take special precautions in avoiding electrical power lines. Under no circumstances should anyone attempt to retrieve a flying object that hits a power line. The proper authorities should be notified to rescue the item.

A \$5 CLOSE-UP LENS FOR YOUR CAMERA



If you read nature or science magazines, you've probably marveled at the incredible close-up photos that professionals take of tiny insects, flowers, printed circuits, and a myriad of other minuscule subjects. Those pictures were shot with a macro lens, which is designed to cast a magnified—or close-up—image onto film.

Believe it or not, to make the supplementary close-up lens shown here, you'll need only (1) a small, round 2X to 4X magnifying glass about 1-3/4" in diameter (be sure to get one with a glass lens, as plastic isn't good enough for this purpose) ... (2) a PVC slip-ring pipe adapter (1-1/2" PVC to 1-1/2" male) ... and (3) a can of flat-black spray paint.

Coin and stamp shops are good sources for usable magnifying glasses. The kind that swings around into its own cover when not in use is excellent and should be available for just a few dollars. And, of course, just about any hardware or plumbing supply store is likely to carry the PVC pipe adapter you'll need.

To assemble the device, screw the slip ring off the adapter and give both parts a coat of flat-black paint inside and out (this will eliminate unwanted light reflections). Then remove the glass lens from its plastic frame, place it into the adapter's slip ring, and screw the ring back onto the pipe. Presto! You've just made yourself a super-low-cost photographic magnifier.

Exactly how you'll go about mounting the macro converter onto your camera will depend on the diameter of your standard lens. If you file the outside of the adapter's female end, it fits perfectly into a 56mm filter ring. Or you can slip it snugly over a 49mm lens. As the accompanying illustration indicates, slipping a short length of 1-1/2" PVC pipe onto the device's open end will allow you to use the close-up attachment with lenses as small as 40mm or so. (Incidentally, if filing the adapter or pipe doesn't provide an acceptable fit—or if you want a more permanent arrangement—you can glue a used filter ring, camera lens cap, or sunshade ring of the appropriate size right into the adapter or pipe and then screw that attachment onto your standard lens.)

Of course, this little \$5 lens supplement isn't as effective as a \$200 "real" macro attachment. A store-bought lens allows you to use much smaller aperture settings, which give you a better depth of field, and eliminates the "soft" areas around the perimeter of the photo. Nevertheless, this humble invention can introduce you to an enjoyable hobby ... a pastime that will give you a new perspective on your surroundings!

Goode reports that the price per point is greater for the Spanish than the popular runner varieties. The peanut business is an important factor in the local economy.

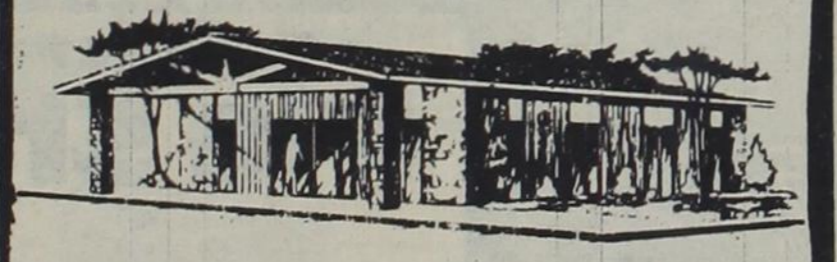

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CAMPUS CLIPS

Recipes: Variations A La 5th Grade

Somewhere out there are people who will cook their first Thanksgiving turkey this year.

Some of these individuals are the ones who just automatically know how to do everything from the day they dismantle their baby beds, so we won't offer any fowl advice to these achievers.

Some of them have served apprenticeships with Mom and Grandmom, and some of them collect cookbooks.

However, some cooks may want to spice up those old standbys, and the Siebert Fifth Grade reading classes offer some intriguing advice on how to cook a turkey.

Bethany Boland's paper was chosen from Mrs. Coxsey's room. Ursula Williams represents Mrs. Bilby's room, and Melanie Griffin does the honors for Mrs. Kelm's group.

Bethany's recipe is reproduced elsewhere, and copies of Melanie's and Ursula's follow:

Melanie advises: "First of all you find a big pan to cook the turkey in. Next you turn on the oven to 350 or 400. You should cook the turkey about three or four hours. While cooking get some spices and flavoring ready. When turkey is thru cooking sprinkle salt, butter, pepper, and other such. (Putting these spices on is of course optional.) Finally put the turkey on the table and have a Thanksgiving celebration!"

Ursula says: "A good way to cook a turkey is: First, get everything you need to use, such as spices, utensils, etc. Second, after you have the turkey in the pan, set the oven for 500. Then, put spices or stuffing, anything desired, on or into the turkey. After the oven is ready, pop the turkey into the oven. Wait for about 4 or 5 hours, and then take it out. Last, put pepper and salt on the turkey, and then set the table with pretty dishes and silverware, and napkins. Last, your ready to serve your turkey and have a wonderful time!"

Snippets of information from other chefs include, "...put some pineapple on the turkey." I never have, but perhaps I'll try it as another youngster recommends "...apples, cherries and other vegetables."

But to use the format followed by most of these cooks, begin with the turkey. One enterprising fellow reported he shot a wild turkey and put it in the pan. No other actions were mentioned prior to plopping the turkey in the pan and cooking in a 500 degree oven for three and one-half hours.

However, these are Space Agers. Only three or four mentioned that it might be necessary to un-stuff before stuffing. I have not figured out this: "First you stuff the turkey until everything is out."

The festive birds varied greatly in weight. One hefty turkey of four pounds was slated for 5 hours in a 450 oven. A five-pounder faced the same 5 hours, "...then you spice it and baste it and cook it for 3 more hours."

Turkey weight was not mentioned in one recipe, but the cook says, "This size turkey will serve about 12 people include your relatives."

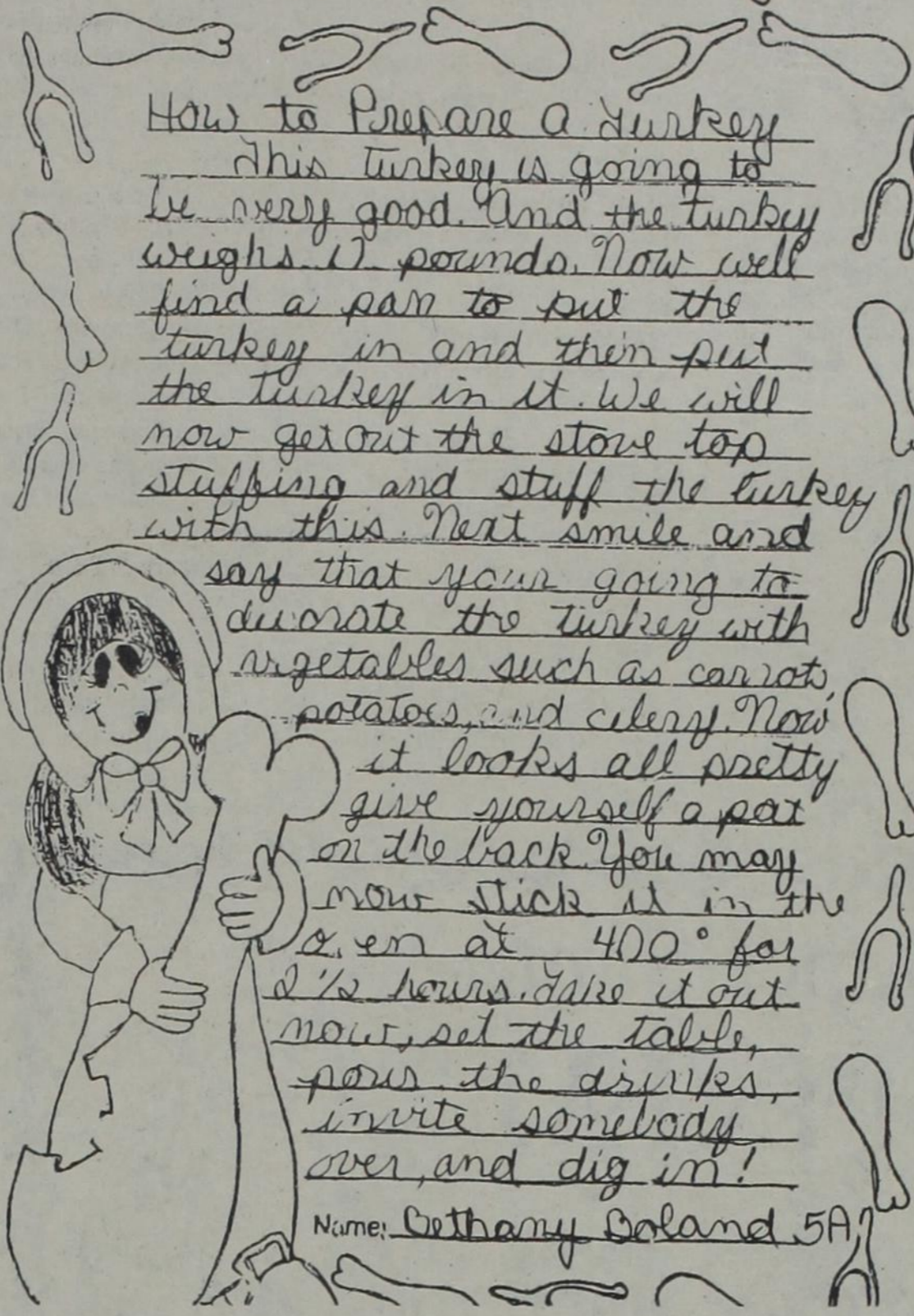

It is too bad that space limitations bar printing all the papers on, "How To Cook a Turkey," but perhaps it is just as well that these chefs do have a few more years to work on culinary crafts.

The papers were neat, quite legible, and creative enough to indicate that parents do not have to fear "rubber-stamping" for Eastland's youngsters.
