

Goodfellows Not Receiving As Much Funding As Needed Here

The Goodfellows of Cisco have just not received the number of donations they had hoped to receive for this year's benefit for the needy. With the deadline for applications set at noon Tuesday, 53 applications had been turned in by 10 a.m.

That is the same number of applications received by the Goodfellows last year, and more were probably turned in between 10 and 12 noon. So, the number of applicants will likely be more than the number last year, but the donations are way down.

As of Tuesday morning, only a little over \$2,000 had been turned in to the Goodfellows. Last year they had over \$5,000 to purchase food and toys for the families which applied.

This year, they will have to operate with less than half as much money and still try to help the same number of persons. As you well know, the only thing the Goodfellows can do is cut down on how much help the applicants will receive.

An applications committee has been reviewing all the applications and only those approved by the committee will receive help this year, due to the small amount of funds. But, even those families may not receive much more than one meal's worth of food.

Toys may have to be forgotten this year, unless a more substantial amount of donations comes in between now and December 23. Goodfellows director Jim Jones stated at a recent board meeting that one of the most gratifying examples of the Goodfellows help was seen when toys were given out to the children for Christmas.

He said he hates to see that part of the program be phased out since it means so much to the youngsters and their parents. However, with less money to work on this year, the Goodfellows will definitely have to make some cuts in their proposed program.

One of the applications received by the Goodfellows says, "This is my grand-

mother who is 84 years old and not well. She is in a wheel chair most of the time and in the hospital pretty often. She lives only on Social Security, SSI, and food stamps."

Another applicant, who has a 2-year old granddaughter living with them, states, "I only receive Social Security. My income is only \$140.00 per month. Our gas bill is so high and my light bill. All my water pipes are busted. We have no way of fixing them because of cost. But I hope you will be able to help us. Thank you very much."

One lady writes about her family of three (with "one on the way"), "My husband is out of work and has been out of work since the 25th of

November and haven't been able to find a job. He's still looking for a job and we have a baby soon. We have our bills of house, hospital, and utilities, and need groceries, clothing for the children, and we just don't have the money not even to buy Christmas for the children. We have no money coming in from no where. Will sure thank the Goodfellows for their response. May God bless you all."

Another mother (who has four children) writes, "Because of lack of money to buy food and things. By the time we pay our rent and bills there is barely enough money to buy food and other things."

Still another application says, "My husband is disab-

led and is waiting for Social Security and SSI. He has been approved but just takes 60 days and that will be after January, sometimes in February. I only make \$212.00 a month and draw \$195.00 on one child that her father passed away. I have five in our family. Thanks for your help."

All solicitation for funds is being made through The Cisco Press and everyone is urged to help the families above, as well as all the others who turned in applications. All donations are tax deductible.

Mr. Salwen, as an attorney, probably wrote most of the drug abuse legislation which has passed in the past few years.

Rick Salwen is Associate General Counsel of E.D.S., the Dallas date processing company founded by Ross Perot. Rick was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and spent most of his childhood years in New England. After service in the Air Force, he earned both his bachelors degree and law degree at the University of Washington in Seattle.

Prior to joining E.D.S., Rich had worked as an attorney in private practice; served on the staff of the U.S. Court of Appeals in San Francisco, California; worked as legal counsel for the Federal Aviation Administration in Seattle, Washington; and performed as a part-time law school professor.

Rick is actively involved in the fight against drug abuse, serving as a member of the Texans' War on Drugs Committee, and the Governor's Task Force on Inhalant Abuse, appointed by Governor Mark White of Texas.

Rick also serves on the Boards of Directors of the Greater Dallas Crime Commission, the Texas Good Roads/Transportation Association, the Coalition for Better Transportation, and the North Dallas Chamber of Commerce.

He is 42 years of age, and is married, with two children, aged 14 and 12.

Planned Sunday

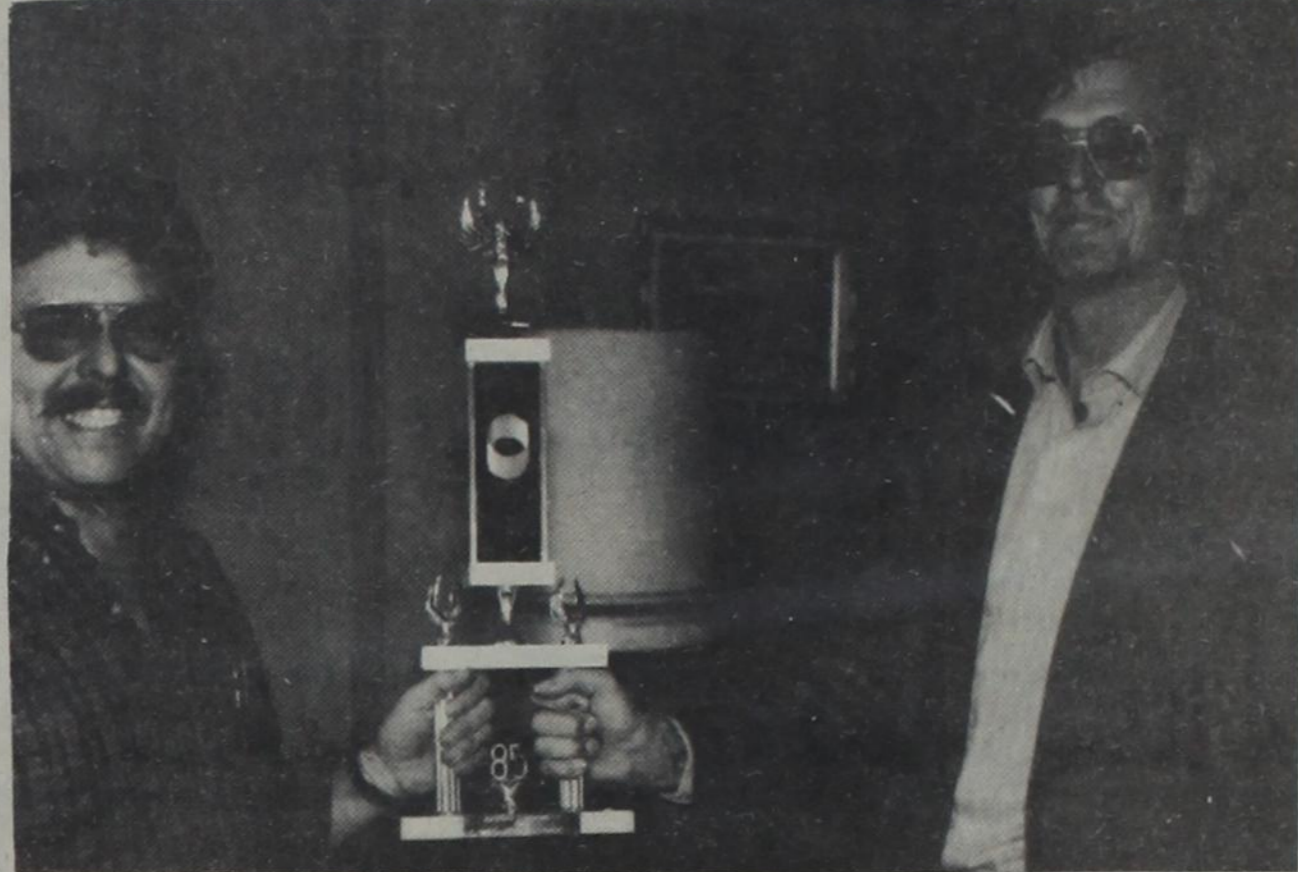
"Down from His Glory," a Christmas cantata by John W. Peterson, will be presented by the choir of the First Baptist Church during the morning service Sunday.

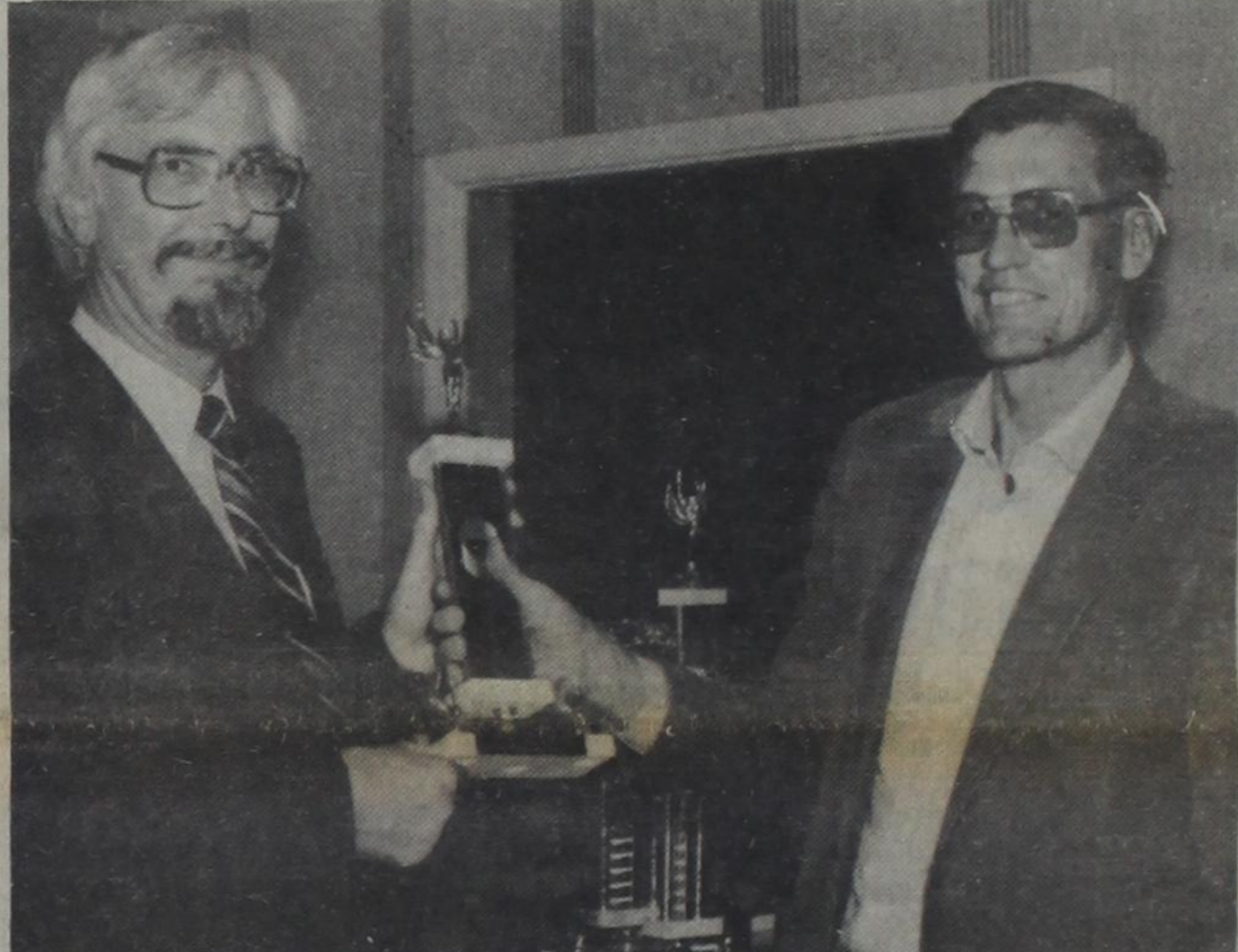
The Sunday evening program will feature the children's choir of the church.

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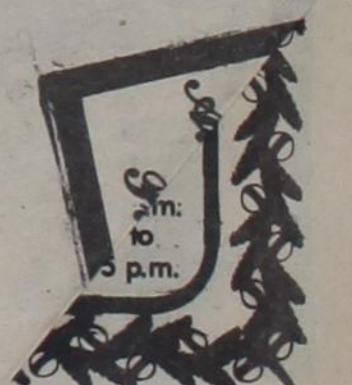

Drilling Bits

The Eastland Regular Field gained a new producer when Dramer Development completed the No. 4-A Sibley six miles south-southeast of Ranger.

The well indicated ability to flow 440,000 CF natural gas per day on a 16/64-in. choke. The absolute open flow rating was 1,300,000 CF/D. It was taken to an 890-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Wolfcampin Formation, 823 to 843 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is located in the William Van Norman Survey, A-545.

The No. 3 V.A. Childers, a 1,600-ft. developmental well, is scheduled to be drilled in the Eastland Regular Field. Southwest Oil Exploration of Abilene is the operator. The well will be spudded in an 80-acre lease two miles west of Nimrod.

CAPITOL UPDATE

Please allow me to do a brief follow-up on the very controversial mandatory seatbelt law and its apparent net affect. As you will recall, this legislation became effective on September 1, 1985, and the Department of Public Safety has indicated they would commence enforcement on December 1, 1985.

Since the media has recently reported that up to 75 percent of people, when surveyed, professed no knowledge of any such seatbelt law, I suppose I should state, for those of you who have been "out of touch" since the last session of the Legislature, that I refer to the law making seatbelt use mandatory for front seat passengers in all cars and in pickups with a load rate capacity of less than 1500 pounds.

Polls, surveys and test samples would indicate that a surprisingly large segment of the population quite simply ignores the seatbelt law. As would be expected, the incidence of use is much higher in urban areas than in rural areas, with some surveys showing a figure less than 5 percent use in some rural areas of the State.

Col. James Adams, Director of the Department of Public Safety, has promised

a "fate worse than death" to those persons stopped by his

troopers without a seatbelt. I wouldn't be surprised if a few of the "old hardheads," like you and me, get a ticket before we learn our lesson. I just cannot believe, and never have been able to believe, that DPS is going to be able to effectively enforce the legislation. Since most people want to abide by the law, I suspect it will be at least as well accepted as any other unpalatable mandate of the State.

Seatbelts will save your life. Seatbelts have already reduced your automobile insurance premiums. It will be most interesting to see what develops between now and the next session of the Legislature by way of repeal or alteration of the law. As I have told you before, my experience has been that it is a great deal easier to get a law passed than to be rid of one.

We would be interested in hearing your comments on the effect the seatbelt law has had on you. But remember, seatbelts, like liver, are good for you.

Listen to those TV ads while you watch the pretty pictures.

That 14 carat gold proposition probably has "wash" or "HEG" somewhere in it. "Electroplated" is a thicker word than a lot of the 14 carats mentioned. Do you know about "points," "facets," and "wt." used in connection with those "genuine diamonds?"

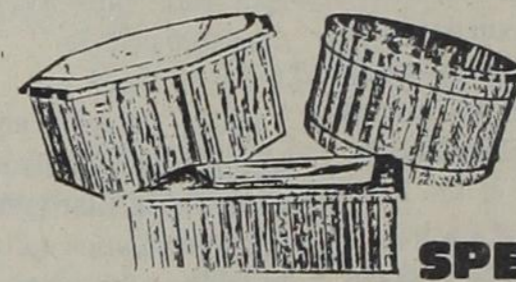

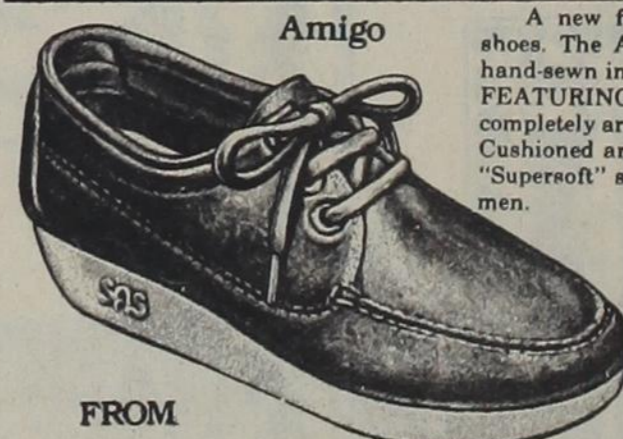

EASTLAND

Sponsors are the People Against Dangerous Drugs (P.A.D.D. Committee) in cooperation with the Eastland County Law Enforcement Association and the Ministerial Alliance. Featured at the banquet will be speakers Rick Salwen, Bob Bailey and Marilyn Golightly, all involved with the State War On Drugs. The public is urged to attend.

Districts for the election of representatives of the Silver Haired Legislature have been designated in the 19-county West Central Texas Area. Eastland County is in a district with Comanche, Brown, Coleman and Runnels.  Production from the big wildcat blowout well southeast of Ranger, has now been brought under control. The well is the No. One Jones, with Richey & Co. of Fort Worth as the operator. At one time the well was flowing over 9,700 barrels of oil and 11 million cubic feet of gas per day from a depth of 3,600 ft. The light from the gas flare could be seen for 50 miles around. County Commissioners gave permission during the court session Dec. 9, for Pride Oil Co. to put a pipeline under a county road and carry off the oil. The Texas Railroad Commission is expected to cut the daily allowable on the well to around 80 barrels.

Bank Stockholders

Hearing December 13

A hearing on a \$10 million lawsuit by stockholders of the First National Bank of Gorman against First State Bank of Abilene has been set for Friday, Dec. 13 in the 91st District Court in Eastland.

Stockholders filing suit are T.L. Jay, Jr., W.F. Jay, Billy Jay Harrison, Michael D. McCormick, Jerry W. Warren and Phillip J. Harrison.

The suit requests the Court to find that the notes held by the First State Bank are uncollectable, alleging that First State concealed the true financial condition of the Gorman Bank when the group purchased 84% of the stock in 1983.

The suit alleges the Bank lost more than \$700,000 on three bad notes as a result.

The suit also claims that three men, Leslie Vance, Jim Parker, and Joe Ben Koonce, signed notes in the amount of \$750,000 to First State Bank for a small share of the stock in the Gorman Bank.

A temporary restraining order against First State

Bank is presently in effect, forbidding the Bank from taking steps to foreclose on notes totaling more than \$2.6 million against the major stockholders and \$750,000 against the three minor stockholders. It also forbids any advertising by the Abilene Bank that the Gorman Bank may be for sale.

The suit accuses First State Bank of threatening to foreclose on all Gorman Bank stock the Abilene Bank holds. This stock enabled the Gorman stockholders to have a controlling interest in the Gorman Bank.

The suit further states that First State has alleged the Vance group is in default, and that First State has threatened to foreclose on 100% of the bank stock if the

Vance Group's notes are not paid in full. Damages are being sought in an amount "in excess of jurisdictional limits of the

Court", exemplary damages of "not less than \$10 million", and "not less than \$100,000 for attorney fees."

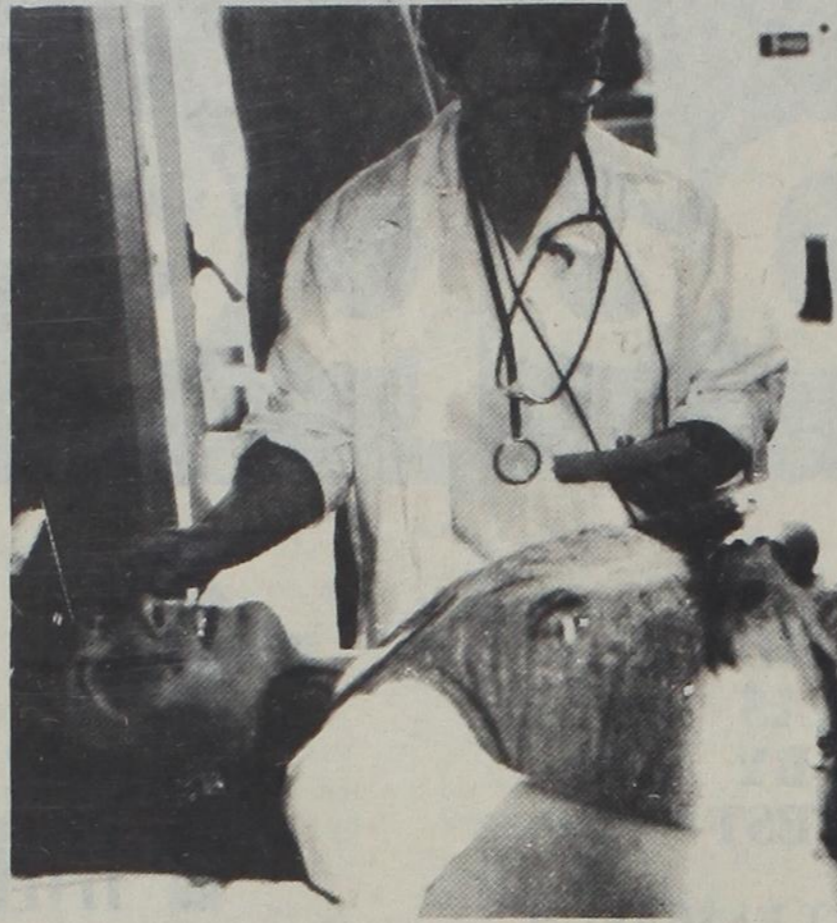
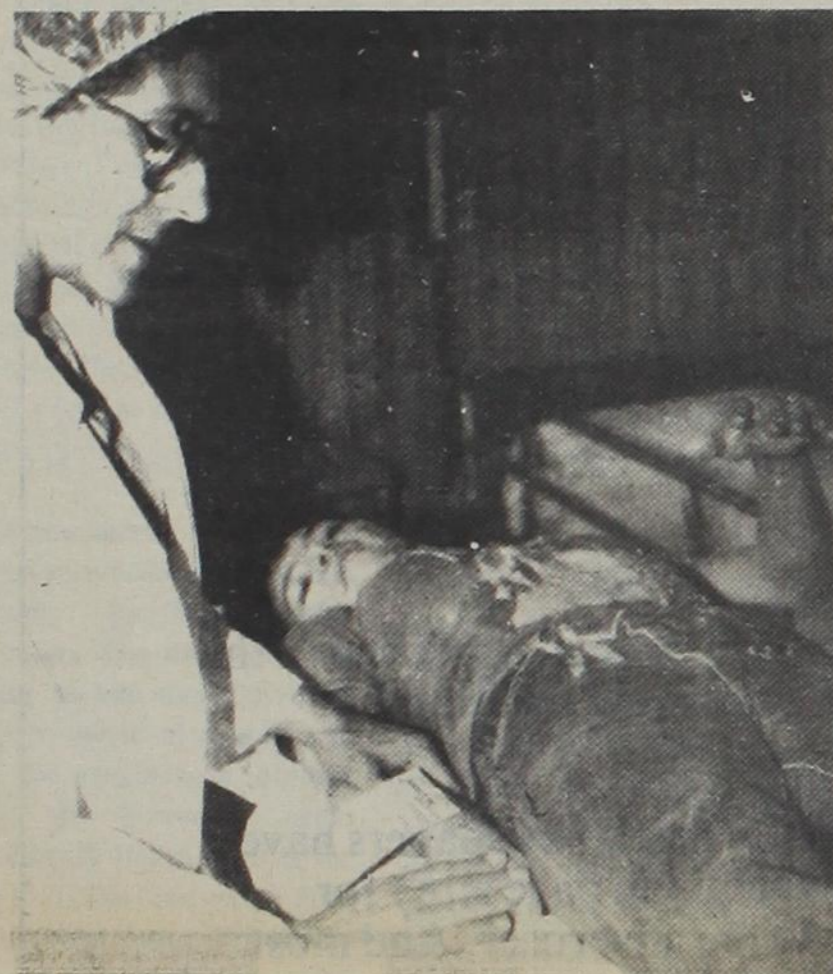
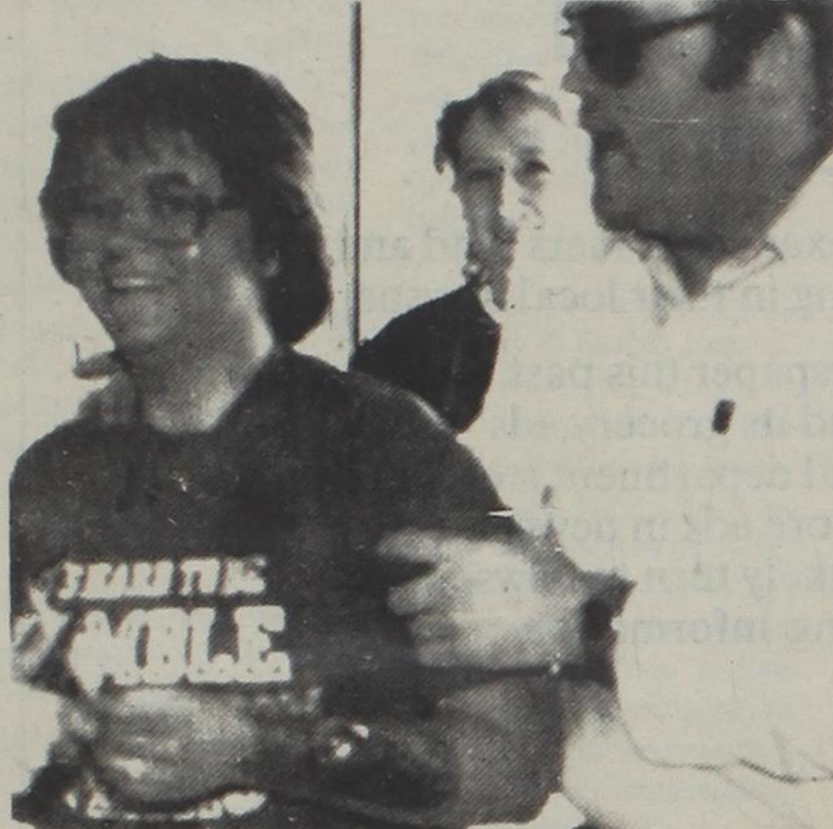
'Disaster' Drill Is Held Friday

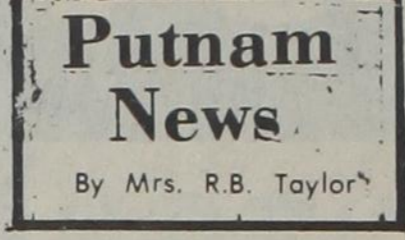
He was born in Callahan County and attended school in the Hart Community and Moran.

Also the ring that was lost that I wrote about last week, well it has been found and thank you for your looking for the ring it was greatly appreciated.

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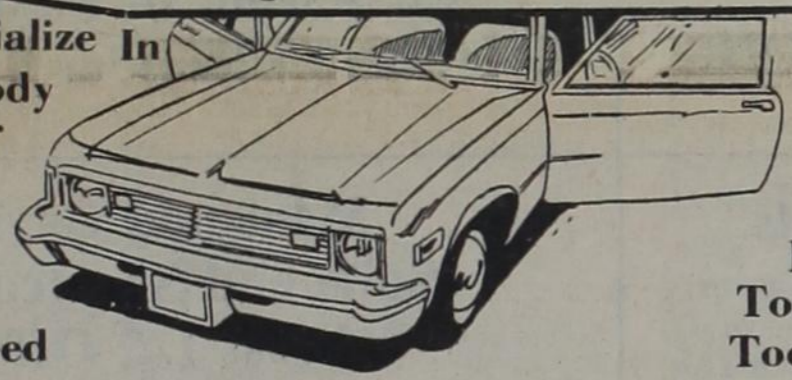
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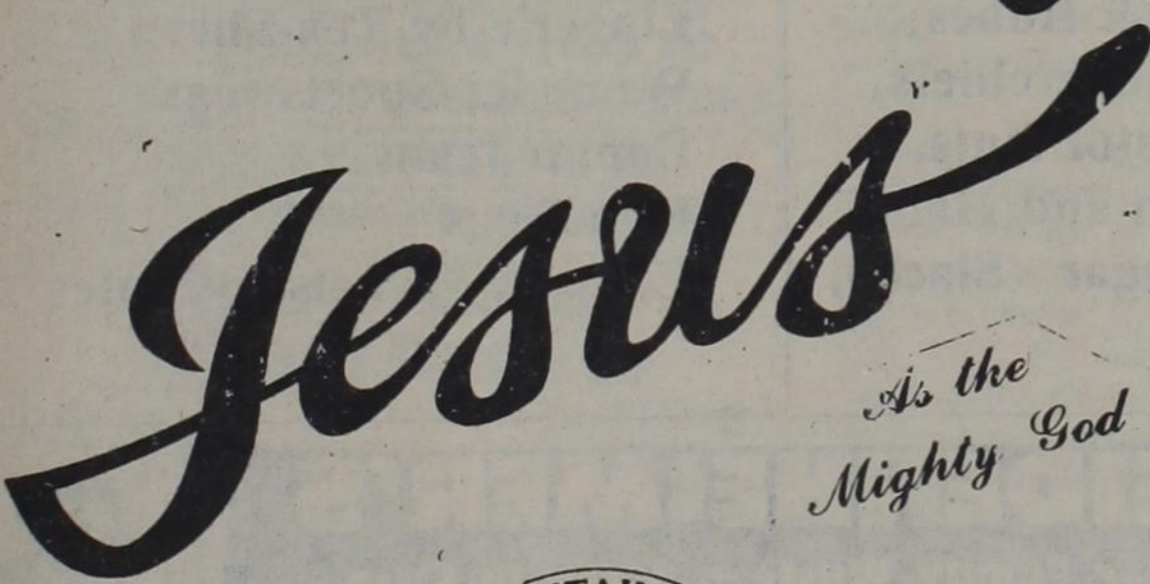

fail will have an opportunity to take the test again, Mr. Puryear said.

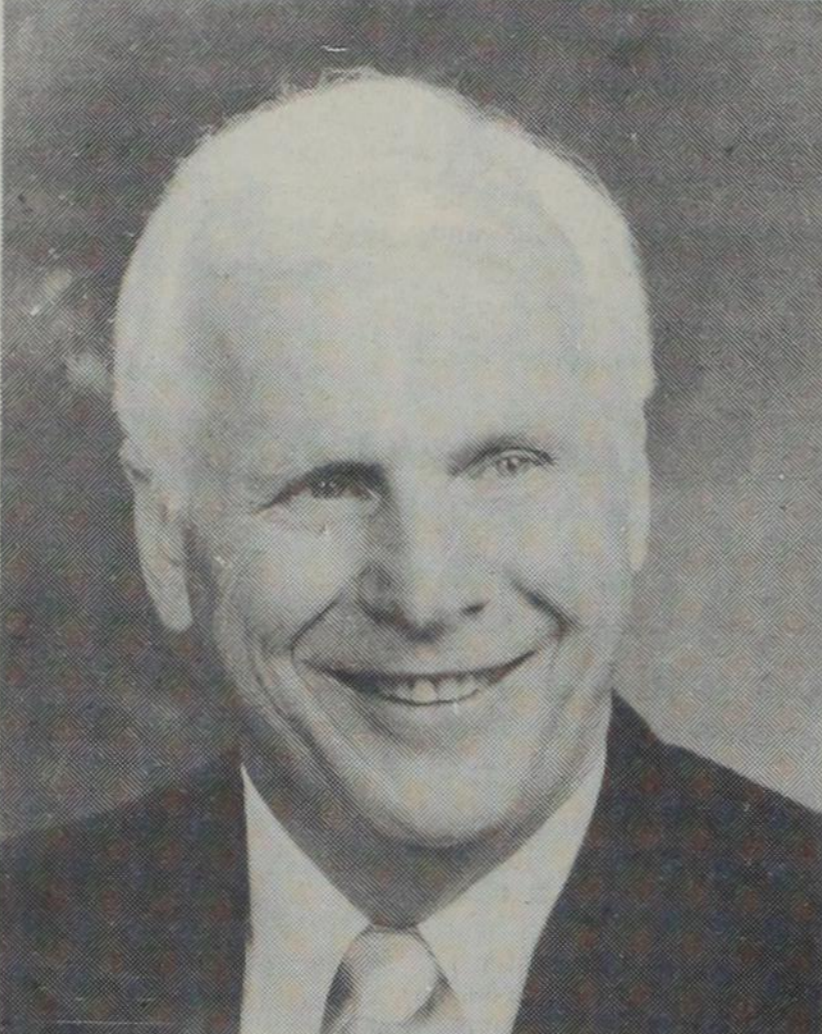

Ends Crop
Insurance**

GEORGETOWN
December 10 ends the 1985 crop year insurance period for corn and grain sorghum in Eastland, Texas and insured by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC), or by a private company reinsured by FCIC, according to Ardell Kalmbach, a representative for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

"Any notice of loss must be given no later than 30 days after total destruction of the unit, completion of harvest, or December 10, whichever occurs earlier," according to Kalmbach.

The producer who anticipates a claim should notify his or her crop insurance agent immediately.

"Under the terms of the policy, any acreage on which harvest will not be completed must be left intact until an inspection is made. Any claim for indemnity may be rejected if these loss reporting requirements are not met," Kalmbach stated.

 1 cup butter or oleo - 4 egg yolks
 1 tsp. vanilla
 2½ cup sifted all-purpose flour
 1 tsp. soda
 ½ tsp. salt
 1 cup buttermilk
 4 egg whites stiffly beaten (May use 2½ cups cake flour)

Melt chocolate in boiling water. Cool. Cream butter and sugar until fluffy. Add yolks, one at a time beat well after each. Blend in vanilla and chocolate. Sift flour with soda and salt, add alternately with buttermilk to chocolate mixture, beating after each addition until smooth. Fold in beaten egg white. Pour in three 9" layer pans, lined on bottom with brown or wax paper. Bake 350° for 30 to 35 minutes. Cool. Frost.

COCONUT-PECAN FROSTING ON GERMAN CHOCOLATE CAKE

Combine 1 cup evaporated milk, 1 cup sugar - 3 slightly beaten egg yolks, ½ cup butter or oleo, 1 tsp. vanilla. Cook and stir over medium heat until thickened about 2 minutes. County Commissioners Still Debating Precinct 2

Eastland County Commissioners were not able to agree on the choosing of a Justice of the Peace for Precinct 2 during the meetings on Monday, Dec. 9.

Present at the day-long sessions were Richard Robinson, Pct. 1; L.T. Owen, Pct. 3; and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. Jack Blackwell, commissioner of Pct. 2, was absent due to illness. Mrs. Blackwell sat in as an observer during the morning sessions, and a number of other citizens were in the courtroom. County Judge Scott Bailey presided.

The vacancy for the J.P. office, Pct. 2 has existed since the resignation of Luther Maxwell of Ranger on Nov. 25. A list of people who have expressed interest for the position was considered during the morning session and also during an Executive session in the afternoon.

Those applying for position were Zelma M. Tackett, Alfred Bush, Donna May Justice, Truman B. Miller, Howard W. (Jack) Veal, Arie Sharp, and Clyde Kerr. Several of these were in the courtroom.

District Attorney Emory Walton urged the court to name a Justice of the Peace for the Precinct as soon as possible. "There are times when I need a J.P. and can't find one," he said. He stated that he had once called Judge Lyerla, Pct. 1, out to do three inquests in a short while - one in Ranger, one in Cisco, and one in Rising Star.

The Commissioners expressed concern about the

Pct. 2 J.P. office records and furnishings, which was reported to be held in an office rented by Maxwell Oct. 1.

Commissioners said they never authorized Maxwell to sign a rent agreement with the owner of the property, Turman Miller. They voted to pay the rent, through December, however, and made plans to move the furnishings to the Courthouse.

Mrs. Jack Blackwell had reportedly made an attempt to obtain county property, but had been unable to do so.

In other business, County Auditor Emma Morris reported that a Social Security representative had informed her that anyone using a county vehicle must pay \$3 per day - no exceptions.

She also recommended the implementation of daily cash flow deposits in county

offices. This is in accordance with recent legislation, and would be effective Jan. 1. The Commissioners approved this plan.

Two pipeline crossings were approved during the morning sessions. One was for a gas line across a county road about five miles southeast of Eastland, requested by Flatwood Gas Company.

The other was for Pride Pipeline to lay a line to carry oil across the county rd. 474 from the big producing well five miles southeast of Ranger. Trucks have been hard pressed to carry away the oil from this well - now called the Ora B. Jones.

During the afternoon meeting Commissioners met with Ken Parker, a C.P.A. who recently completed an outside audit on county offices. Parker outlined steps to prevent theft of county

funds in departments such as the tax collectors office.

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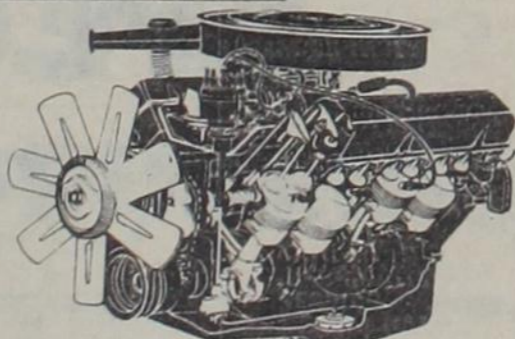

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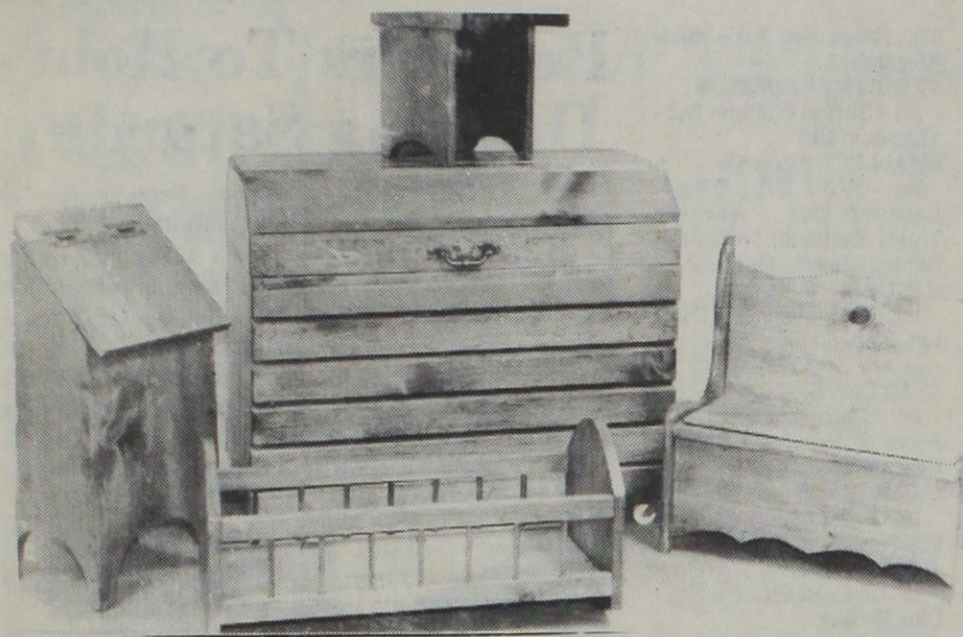

Northview Development Center at 401 W. Moss in Eastland has a workshop that turns out some of the best looking woodwork items around.

The items include a trunk that measures 29"x24"x18"; a potato bin; toy bench; doll cradle in 2 sizes; microwave stand that is 30" high x30"x18" or 24" wide.

These items are all made

by some of the residents at the center and not only does this program bring in money to the center and residents it also serves as a training program for the residents involved.

The program provides training for the residents by offering them the opportunity to develop better "hands on" and eye to hand coordination.

The 49 residents involved in this program are using this dual opportunity to learn woodworking skills and to learn to lead a normal active way of life.

The residence learn sim-

ple woodworking tasks like hand sanding, painting and eventually move up to working with some of the power tools. There are 3 staff members that assist with the training. One of the members is the administrator of the program and is assisted by 2 trainers.

The residents work 6 hours a day Monday through Fri-

day with staggered hours so that each only works about 1 or 2 days per week. Some resident work more or less hours depending on the interest and capabilities. Each resident is paid for their work based on \$3.35 per hour and their capabilities.

The workshop has been classified as a non-profit corporation and most of the

money goes right back into the program.

The workshop also accepts donations of cash, supplies, etc and all are tax deductible.
