CHICAGO, April 27 .- Police and physicians are attempting to reconstruct the grewsome murder of a young girl found burned on the highway near here. The girl was apparently thrown from an auto and three bullets fired into her head, and then fire fed by gasoline and oil burned the body to a crisp. She was between fifteen and twenty years of age. Both legs and one arm had been pulled from their sockets a hole had been punched in her side and this filled with gasoline and ignited. The crime is declared to have been the most brutal in years, surpassing even the murder of Bobbie Franks.

Fear is the cause of most other evils, too. Love is a greater force, when once aroused. "Perfect love casteth out fear." But Christendom is still far from this Christian ideal. It is still a world of fear, and therefore a world of cruelty. It is something, though, to have the key to a better world. Some day humanity will know how to use it.


