# **Action Due Soon** By Texas House

Senate Bill 253, creating a hospital district in the Cisco area, was approved by the Texas Senate by unanimous vote Monday and sent to the House of Representatives for final action, according to word here from Senator Tom Creighton of this district.

The bill was introduced and steered through to final passage by Senator Creighton in

less than half a day.

The hospital district will be made up of Precinct 4, the Cisco area, and must receive favorable vote from voters of the area before anything can be done toward building a new hospital. The bill shows that residents of the district will vote on the measure on April 3rd.

Named as temporary directors for the hospital are Sutton Crofts, J. B. Hagan, Jay Richardson, J. L. Stafford and R. A. Hammett. Five permanent directors are to be named in the election of district voters. The bill provides that they be property owners.

Mayor John Webb reported that "we'll need to begin running with the ball as soon as the governor.

Full details of the program will be announced as soon as the measure becomes law.




