# **BLOW ON HEAD CAUSES DEATH**

FORT WORTH, Oct. 29. uised and battered body of Mrs. illy Hamilton, 40 years old, was found today in the bedroom of her three-room home here. Three fingers of her hand had been bitten or torn off. There were other signs of a terrific struggle Death resulted from a blow on the

head, a coroner's verdict said. Mrs. Hamilton had filed suit last July for one-half of the \$206,000 estate of Charles Rotsky, prominent land owner who died July 10. She claimed to be his common law wife The suit had not come to trial.

Copies of papers filed in the suit were found immersed in a tub of water at the rear of the home. A trunk in Mrs. Hamilton's room apparently had been pried open and its contents scattered about the

A bloody hammer and a meat celaver were found in the kitchen. Pete Garza, cafe man who supplied Mrs. Hamilton her breakfasts found the body. When she failed to order food that morning he went to investigate.

His knock was unanswered. dog whined under the house. "I knew then something was wrong. I went around to the back of the house and found the door open. Then I went in," said Garza. Physicians believed Mrs. Hamilton was murdered about midnight.





#### THE ROCKEFELLER FOUNDATION.

The annual report of the Rockefeller Foundation, contained in a volume of over 400 pages, has just been issued. It reveals that during the year 1931 the organization, devoted exclusively to philanthropic work, spent \$18,737,967.90; in the five fields of public service into which its interests are directed. These fields include public health, medical, social and natural sciences.

In the field of public health last year the Rockefeller Foundation spent \$3,096,361.75. Its work in this division was international in scope. Principally during the year it was centered in the tropics with particular emphasis laid

upon combatting the yellow fever menace.

The generosity of the Rockefellers has made possible great strides forward in the war against disease. Of itself the medical profession is necessarily limited to a treatment of the victims of these epidemics but such institutions as the Rockefeller Foundation have placed in the hands of heroic men and women the means by which they can pursue the scourges beyond their manifestations to sources, and by their studies in preventive work save thousands, perhaps millions of lives which would otherwise be lost or blighted.

Say what we please about the rich, the wealth of America has been distinguished by magnificent services that have been too often passed over despite the luster they have added to American character. The contributions of the Rockefellers to this work numbers in dollars far above the half billion mark. There is hardly a person in this nation whose life has not been made more secure, who has not in some indirect but none the less positive way benefitted from the knowledge that this philanthropy has made possible. Most of the serums which doctors now employ in their work can trace their origin or perfection to the researches which have been conducted under the auspices of the Rockefeller foundation or similar institutions which have been established and maintained outside the venal purview.

We owe some debts that we can pay only in gratitude.

The revenues now are tied up approximately 12 years in paying off the bond issue for the group of about 12 buildings made possible under the bond

ssue, nine of them on the campus at Austin. Further, the available revenues are now divided, one-

third to A. & M. college. The university now has authority to issue bonds for building purposes, and to buy them in from its general fund. To cancel that authority is the purpose of the pending con-

stitutional amondment. The only fear that this salutary authority might be misused would come from the idea that some future board of re-

gents would disregard the welfare of the university. The board, with nine members, acquires three new regents each two years, so that no majority change in its personnel is possible in a shorter period than four years.

Since A. & M. has elected to share part of the available fund, it can get no future buildings by appropriation. The present building programs in the two institutions may meet


