Hononlulu, members of the expedition turned over large coral blocks to capture their quarry. One of the most unusual speci-

mens in the collection is the surgeon fish. It carries, sheathed at either side of its tail, a pair of keen, knifelike spines that can be opened out and used with deadly effect.

The lion fish, stinging fish, and scorpion fish likewise carry poison filled spines. In contrast with these were the brilliant and harmless butterfly. parrot, and squirrel fish; the trigger

and file fish, and the colorful

amphiprion that lives with the sea anemone.

McALLEN, July 10 - Three new companies started work on construction projects costing approxi-mately \$700,000 in the lower Rio Grande Valley as a result of further development of Hidalgo county's Samfordyce oil field.

Contract was let by T. Frank Murchison and his associates herd for construction of a 90-mile oil pipeline from the Samfordyce field f southwestern Hidalgo county to Port Isabel, first of the Valley's two new deep water ports on the gulf of Mexico to be available for use

The line will be five and a half inches in diameter, will use dresser couplings in making connections, thereby hastening construction and will have an estimated daily capacity of 10,000 barrels of crude.

Two pumping stations will be used, one at the field to start the oil on its way to tidewater and the other at the middle of the line. Esimated cost of the line is \$325,000. Murchison stated, and completion is expected about September 1. The pipeline will be operated by the newly organized Valley Pipeline company, in which Murchison and E. M. Closuit will be associated. H. H. Hensley, vice president and general manager of the company, has already moved to McAllen and

will be in direct charge of the line. Selection of a site for field storage tanks and the primary pumping unit will be made at Samfordyce shortly, Murchison announced. Two 10.000-barrel tanks and four 5.000barrel tanks, a total of 40,000 barrels of field storage, will be built.
