Over \$1000 Is Taken In Thornton Mill Robbery

Burglars broke open money safe and took more than \$1,000 at the Thornton Feed Mill of South Avenue D in Cisco Monday night, according to a report by Police Chief S. E. Parkinson.

Entering the building through a back window, the

burglars chiseled the knob off the safe and successfully opened it. Feed mill employees said the loss would exceed \$1,000. It was understood that it was partly covered by insurance.

The police station received a call at 10:07 p.m. Monday that two men had just been seen running away from the mill. Patrolman Charlie Moad investigated and discovered the robbery. He said he had passed there shortly before without noticing any lights or anything suspicious. The street sweeper was working in that area at the time, he added.

Two young men, one from Cottonwood and one of Cisco, were picked up and questioned but released.

Sheriff L. E. Sublett and Deputy Shook and Highway Patrol Sergeant R. W. Sosebee joined Chief Parkinson and local police in the investigation. They checked for finger prints and other evidence.

The horse's foot struck Gene just below an eye. The young man was taken to Abilene

Monday for examination by a specialist. It was decided that there was no real damage to his eye but that the bruise was a deep and severe one.

Both eyes were covered by bandages, and hospital attendants said it would be Wednesday or Thursday before the bandages would be removed. He was expected to remain in the hospital most of the week.

Gene is a member of the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department and of the Jaycees. He and his wife, Paula, are the parents of two children and are well known here.

Contractors Roy Cozart and Gerald Jackson are doing the work. Plans call for the work to be completed in two or three weeks.

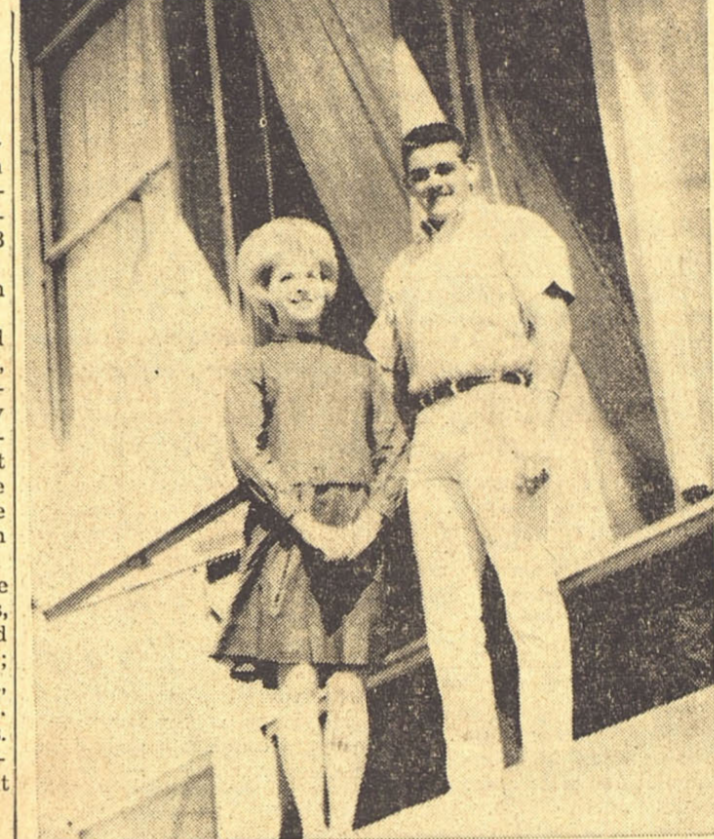
