

YANKS IN THE HILLS; BRITISH ARE COMING UP **Union Labor Lobby Most** Powerful at State Capitol Says John Lee Smith

AUSTIN, Feb. 18 .- The union labor lobby fighting the antiracket bill is the most powerful at the state capitol, it was charged here yesterday by Lieut. Gov. John Lee Smith in a bitter blast at the opponents of the measure.

"Literally dozens of labor lobby ists are here fighting House Bill No. 100 for no other reason than that this bill seeks to regulate labor unions, and by such regulations prevent the unconscionable labor rackets which have preyed on labor men in every defense plant in Texas," Smith said. "It would see that labor unions make a proper accounting of all fees taken in, both as to their source and the manner in which they are expended.

'The oil industry is regulated by law; so are the railroads, insurance companies and public utilities. Every form of private corporation, large and small, is subject to regulation by law, from state banks to trucking companies. Even the individual trucker is regulated by strict statutes. What manner of men are these tycoons of the labox monopoly that they are better than other men and should not submit to proper regulation? Why should not their books be open to the scrutiny of the state in the same way that those of an insurance matron supervision, Carlos J. company are? 

AMERICANS DID FOR BFT

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, North Africa, Feb. 18.-German armored forces, slashing to within 14 miles of the Algerian border, have driven American troops from three more towns, and the Berlin radio broadcast an announcement today that the high command now considers the Tunisian offensive ended.

The first reaction here at Allied headquarters to the Berlin announcement was that Marshal Erwin Rommel was not willing to risk a further advance westward in the face of the threat of the British Eighth Army which is rolling up toward his flank from the south.

American troops, evacuating the towns of Kasserine, Feriana and Sbeitla, retired to strong positions in the 4000-foot hills west of the triangle formed by the three communities. United States casualties were reported to have been heavy and our forces were believed to have abandoned a considerable amount of equipment.

The drive which resulted in the capture of Feriana enabled the Germans almost to cut clear across the waist of Tunisia. Feriana is 14 miles from the Algerian border.

Some American troops already have reached the hills west of Feriana, it was said, and now are busy regrouping their forces.
