He also admits that they were ejected from the C. & N. E. train in the Cisco yards yesterday. Flowers stated that they had been seeking work.

Taking the risk ourselves has been our policy for years. Buying only goods which insofar as we can discover are well made and well worth the money we have to ask for them. Taking the burden of the error off your shoulders if anything should reveal itself as not quite up to our representation of it.
