A lot of money? It certainly is. That's more than \$300

for every man, woman and child in the land. But most experts agree that we'll have to spend at least that much in the next 10 years on our highways.

Because of the importance attached to our road needs, a National Highway Conference will be held in Washington December 8-9 under the sponsorship of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

It is expected that the conference will develope definite recommendations as to how our highway program should be financed, what the role of the Federal government should be in supplying funds for highway construction, and what should be done about proposals for giving the states exclusive jurisdiction over taxes on gasoline

In preparation for the December conference, Chamber staff experts have begun exploratory studies into all phases of the complex highway problem.

Under present policy, the Chamber advocates the limiting of Federal highway to roads used primarily for traffic in interstate commerce or those which are vital to our national security.



Such an attitude on the part of the public is rather startling to thinking people. Surely the guiltiest criminal has a right to a fair trial by the law of the land. Such a trial he cannot have without a competent attorney to see that a fair jury is selected and that only lawful evidence is introduced against him.





As it was, he bought the Clyde Enterprise on April 1, 1917, on a borrowed down-payment from 14-tf-c George M. Kerr, who had established it in 1912.

> "But the war made business good and I paid it out shortly after the war was over," he added. If he had not come Clyde would never had had him three times as its mayor, either.

Butler has the distinction of 37-1-c having brought the first linotype (typesetting machine) to Callahan County in 1924. Also the honor of having installed and operated the first electric power driven motor in the county.

> He became a printer's devil (beginner in a newspaper office) rather late in life - at age of 30. But for nearly half a century, after that, with a gap or so here and there, he has been a newspaper publisher or editor.

"My newspaper career has been 35-tf-c without any unusual happenings," the modest publisher explained.

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





Diet Curb Hits Texas Deer Herd

Some losses to Central Texas deer herds have been traced to toration for the Game and Fish Commission

He said the fatalities have been limited to areas missed by scattered showers which have revived many ranges during the last six weeks.

The Director said recent studies had centered around a ranch twenty deer carcasses were found. One stricken buck, a five pointer in the velvet, was taken to Texas A & M where Dr. R. D.
