DIVORCEE IS UNDER ARREST IN DROWNING

MIAMI, Okla., July 16.—Sheriff Jesse Lambert, of Sweetwater, Texas, left here today for Texas with Mrs. H. L. Condit, 24-year-old divorcee arrested for questioning in connection with the death of Mrs. L. M. Parks, of Sweetwater.

In an investigation of letters between the dead woman's husband and Mrs. Condit Sheriff Lambert said he picked up a clue implicating the woman.

She was arrested at the farm home of her father, Logan Stone, near Fairland, and brought to the county jail here.

Sheriff Lambert said Parks had been charged with murder and that he planned to file a charge of accessory to the crime against Mrs. Condit. He said his investigation revealed Mrs. Parks was drowned earlier this month in an alleged plot to collect \$15,000 in life insurance.

The divorcee lived in Sweetwater until recently. Her letters to Parks were intercepted at the Sweetwater post office and when read to him in the San Angelo, Texas, jail caused Parks to admit relations with her, officers said.

District Attorney George Mahon accompanied Sheriff Lambert here. The woman waived extradition.

Parks is a 57-year-old soft drink bottler. He was transferred from Sweetwater to San Angelo for safe keeping. He contended his wife drowned in a fishing accident.

The voting box for the east Cisco precinct will be located in the front of the Home Furnishings company on D avenue through courtesy of Will Brown, proprietor. Chairman Will St. John of the precinct announced. He has not announced his election judges and clerks as yet.

DALLAS, July 16.—Examining trial for Mrs. Rena Greer, 36, charged with murder in connection with the slaying of her husband yesterday may see a fight between defense and state attorneys over freeing the woman.

Her attorney, R. L. Sullivan, indicated today he would ask immediate freedom on a nominal bond. Such a move is certain to bring a stiff refusal from the state's attorneys, it was said.

Mrs. Greer, pretty and blonde-haired was taken today to the mortuary where her husband's body was taken. She appeared more composed and cried less frequently after the visit.

Turmoil Strikes Mining District

SOME QUESTIONS ABOUT CANNING ANSWERED

By RUTH RAMEY Home Demonstration Agent In answer to the questions about home canned foods and some of the results of the canning in tin, the following statements from Miss Lois Blair, Nutrition Specialist, College Station, Texas, the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the National Canners Association. Will be of interest to all.

Copy from Bulletin 111—A. National Canners Association: "Food cans are made of sheet iron, coated with a thin layer of tin. Some acid foods, such as grapefruit, peaches, pineapples and tomatoes, if left in a can when exposed to the air, tend to act on the metal of the can.

"Dissolved iron may give the contents of the can a slightly astringent or 'metallic' taste. Any tin dissolved in the food would have no taste, and even if all the tin on the inside of the can were dissolved, the amount of tin which the food would contain would be small, and there is no evidence that such tin compounds as may be present in canned foods are harmful."

"The U. S. Department of Agriculture has recently made a study of the effects of feeding canned foods containing known amounts of tin. The results of this work have been summarized as follows by the Bureau of Chemistry and Soils:

"Our own experimental work involving the ingestion of far larger amounts of tin than any previously reported, and supported by the experimental evidence of other investigators, leads us to the conclusion that tin, in the amounts ordinarily found in canned foods and in the quantity which would be ingested in the ordinary individual diet is for all practical purposes eliminated and is not productive of harmful effects to the consumer of canned foods."

Copy from National Canners' Association Bulletin "Stop Wondering. Here are Facts.": "Does rust on a can indicate spoilage? No, unless the rust has penetrated the can and caused a leak. What does a hissing sound mean when the can is opened? A hissing sound when the can is opened usually by the air rushing in to fill the vacuum in the can and the sound is made by the air rushing in to fill the vacuum. If the can is bulged, the hissing sound is made by outburst of gas from the can."

AUSTIN, July 16.—State Treasurer Charles Lockhart today announced calling in for payment of \$1,200,000 general revenue state warrants. Confederate pension warrants are being paid up to the end of October, 1931.

\$600,000 TO BE SPENT UPON HIGHWAY ONE

AUSTIN, July 16.—The state highway department today announced allotment of \$603,633 for road work of which more than \$610,000 will be spent on highway No. 1 in West Texas. The work on it includes widening in El Paso county from Ascarate to Ysleta; scarifying and double bituminous surfacing across Midland county with the exception of 4 1-2 miles near Warfield; widening in Ector county; widening and bituminous surfacing in Crane county, Martin county and Ward county as far as Barstow.

CHICAGO TEACHERS ON WARPATH.

Chicago is the second American city in point of population and wealth. Four hundred unpaid school teachers set under a scorching sun in Chicago Soldiers field and pledged to boycott all firms which are in arrears in taxpaying. They carried banners at the entrances of the tax delinquent business places denouncing them as "shirkers of public duty."

"THE THINGS THAT HE HAS DONE"

Editor Charles H. Newell of the Texarkana Daily Press was identified in an executive capacity with the Dallas Dispatch for many years. He was recognized as one of the outstanding young newspapermen of the Southwest when he became the editor and publisher of The Press.

"It seems to me that the people who are talking about Governor Sterling really do not understand the things he has done. The greatest thing that he has done is that he has, as stated by you in your editorials, given Texas an honest administration during these years of depression."

Governor Sterling has steadily maintained the ship of state on an even keel and while he has not tried to pull off any brilliant stunts he has been firm in the administration of our affairs. He has not advocated many things to the legislature and he has not quarreled with the legislature, but when the time came he flatly vetoed many of the objectionable bills that were passed, especially some items in the appropriations bills that he thought he could do without in these times of stress.

This was the foreword to the Carney letter. As an intelligent Texan he recognizes the fact that while it is for the lawmakers to enact it is for the governor to recommend and also veto measures which are not for the public weal and to delete items from appropriations bills that do not conform to the revenue in sight.

All Texans are interested in protecting the natural resources of the commonwealth. That is, all Texans who believe in honest and effective government, in responsible and not proxy government. Judge Carney stresses this, relative to Sterling and the legislature:

"The only fight he had with the legislature was when they refused to pass a bill authorizing the state to drill for oil in the bed of the Sabine river. This bill was turned down by the state legislature, and then Governor Sterling showed the stuff that was in him by sending the bill back to the legislature and telling them in vigorous language what they should do about it."

"Nor was this move a move made in the interests of the big oil companies because the successful bidders were small independent concerns. This act alone on the part of the Governor Sterling refutes the claim made by some of his opponents that he was in league with the big oil companies."

"The big oil companies opposed this bill bitterly as they wanted to keep down the production of oil and owning the adjacent lands next to the Sabine river wanted to drain out all the oil belonging to the state from under the bed of the Sabine for their own use."

AMERICANS ARE HOARDING TWO BILLIONS.

There are many noted economists in the American world. Robert Warren is one of their number. He appeared before the Virginia Institute of Public Affairs and made the astonishing declaration that \$500,000,000 in "centuries" and "grands" has been withdrawn from circulation in the United States by members of the underworld since Col. Alphonse Capone was arrested and sent to prison.

Well, who are the hoarders in Texas? Who are the owners of the big bills ranging from \$100 to \$10,000? Where did Robert Warren get his inside information? Two billion dollars is a lot of money. Evidence is evidence; bunk is bunk. There is a small army of economists the world over who were thoroughly discredited after the coming of the crash in 1929 and have been discredited ever since.

JOHN BULL AND THE GOLD STANDARD.

Great Britain has no intention of returning to the gold standard in the immediate future. Directors of the World bank urged a return to the gold standard as the best avail-

able monetary mechanism. Montague Norman, the John Pierpont Morgan of the British empire, was responsible for the adoption of the World bank resolution. Neville Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, smashed the proposal. He appeared before the British parliament, declared that the World bank statement had no immediate bearing on the British government or any other government.

Through the Editor's Spectacles

Eastland county had a more important part in the democratic national convention at Chicago than has been publicly recognized. Talking with W. H. Kittrell, Sr., Saturday morning, I learned that three of the men who were dominant in the convention were on the list of delegates from Eastland county. They were Maury Hughes, national committeeman; Silliman Evans, a member of the committee on rules and regulations, second committee in importance; and W. H. Kittrell, Jr., secretary of the Texas delegation.

W. H. Sr. was a delegate but did not attend. Will St. John, said Mr. Kittrell, was responsible for placing the three first named on the Eastland county group at the state convention. Considering the determinative part that Texas played in the nomination of Roosevelt, the democrats who attended the national convention under the guidon of Eastland county took the county name into the first row of the front rank of the national concave. Moreover, Bill Kittrell, Jr., who is a diplomat from the whorl of his hair to his toenails and one of the most influential of the state's young democrats, is an Eastland county product. He is as efficient and persuasive as he is self-effacing. He has the rare and admirable faculty of busting right into the big middle of things and making the folks glad he came.

Something starts. You look around and Bill, Jr., is at your elbow with the goods.

Right now W. H. Jr. is managing the congress-at-large, Place No. 2, campaign of Joe W. Bailey, Jr., and young Joe, the son of an illustrious father, could not have secured a more able and efficient manager had he continued to search until yet. Fortunately he did not have to search.

Young Bill and Young Joe have been fast friends for years, just as Mr. Kittrell, Sr. and the late Joe Bailey, Sr. were lifelong friends.

Incidentally, I should remark that Silliman Evans in close to this county, having married a Cisco girl, the daughter of Mrs. L. H. McCrear.

Commendation is due the work of County Commissioner Bert Britain in obtaining consideration of a petition for state designation of the Leery cut-off to Highway 67. Mr. Britain has been working industriously for several months in an effort to have this unholy stretch of road taken over, rebuilt and maintained by the state and he has been notified that a hearing on the matter will be conducted by the state commission August 2.

There are several reasons why this stretch of road which has fallen into a condition worse than a plain dirt road simply because the county is financially unable to reconstruct it, should be taken over by the state.

First, with the highway developments that has gone on south of Cisco it assumes great importance in a transstate route running from Wichita Falls to Brownwood and on south. Traffic following this route must either suffer the inconvenience of having to ease over this nine-mile stretch at a great loss of time or adding ten miles to the route by going by way of Eastland.

As pertains especially to Cisco the road cuts through some of the finest trade territory of the city. By reason of its condition the business and commercial interests of this

city are losing their rightful share of the trade this territory provides. If Mr. Britain and the chamber of commerce can succeed in their efforts they will have performed a service that will be of major benefit.

I liked the spirit that was displayed at the smoker sponsored by the Lions club Friday evening. The complaint that Cisco is dead was proved more of a bugbear, a sort of morbid mental state brought on by failure to exercise the muscles of community initiative, by the 100 or more business and professional men who gathered on the roof garden of the Laguna hotel to talk over community problems and seek to hammer out some constructive, workable platform upon which to battle in common for a common cause.

Before anything can be accomplished outside of the weather and the blues, the inspiration to work must be instilled into Cisco people. The meeting-Friday evening chose the right leader for such a movement. Jake Bearman may not be much to look at but Jake is one of these bulldog, determined type of fellows who can drill a dry hole, skid his rig a couple of feet and drill another well without blinking. He'll hound the eternal life out of a lazy man or get him down to scratching pay dirt.

Those who put Jake in the chair Friday evening know that and they can't expect him to carry all the load. He won't do it. He'll put it over by community cooperation and the quicker he's given that the quicker the campaign will show results.

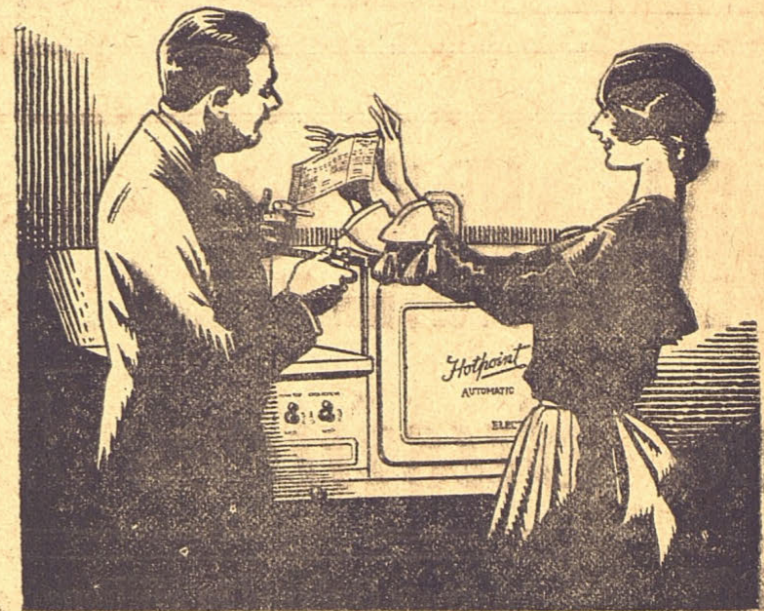
A thought for the program committee: Let's have something tangible to do, some goal in sight when these meetings are held.

### WHISPERING IS EXPLAINED BY W. H. McDONALD

To the Citizens of Eastland county: During the past several days, a whispered campaign has been carried on behind my back, in an effort to make the voters believe that my accounts with the state have been crooked. No direct charge has been made against me, but the matter has been intimated as though it were a great secret. I feel that the public and my many friends are entitled to a statement of the facts. Because this veiled charge is an eleven-hour report coming just before the primaries, I will not be able to see many of the voters in person and explain, and therefore, I am making the statement in writing.

For years and years, district clerks have charged and collected as fees, eight dollars in each habeas corpus case, the same in juvenile cases and thirty five cents a page for transcripts. Since I have been in office I have only collected the same fees as have my predecessors and other district clerks over the state. The attorney general has recently ruled that practically all fees heretofore collected by county officials were erroneous. For instance, clerks now get twenty eight cents per page for transcripts, eighty cents in each habeas corpus case, and not a cent in juvenile cases. These changes were called to my attention and I immediately took the matter up with the state comptroller. My accounts had been duly approved, accepted by the comptroller, and paid by the state treasurer. After these accounts were re-audited in accordance with the attorney general's interpretation of the fee laws, the corrections amounted to the sum of \$3,339.90, which amount I paid at a very great financial sacrifice, when money was hard to raise, by surrendering certain state warrants I had on hand and by paying the balance in cash.

The assistant state auditor tells me that similar corrections have been made, or will be made, by practically every county official in Texas, who receives part of his fees from the state. I am one of fourteen district clerks who have actually returned cash to cover these corrections.

I have only done in this instance what I thought was right and in keeping with common honesty. My records are here in the court house, including copies of all accounts which have been collected by me from the state, and are subject to inspection at any time. The original accounts are at Austin in the office of the state comptroller, and are open to inspection there. I do not have a thing to hide from any one. I have no apology to make for obeying the regulations of state officials. I can not, and have not received one cent above the salary which the law fixes for my job. Each year I have been in office, I have reported to Eastland county, excess fees I have collected over and above my maximum salary and the salaries of my deputies and other office expenses. I could have no possible motive in collecting illegal or excessive fees because it would be no money to me. I would only have to pay it to the county in excess fees.

On account of the many duties incumbent upon me as your district clerk, I have been unable to make as active a campaign as I would like to make and have been unable to call upon a great many of you. Therefore, I sincerely trust that you will take this message as a personal solicitation of your vote and influence on July 23rd, and I promise you that if re-elected, I will render you the most efficient, courteous and honest administration possible.
