

PASSAIC, N. J., Dec. 18 -Investigation today revealed a youth's struggle against poverty which finand himself because he believed it "the best thing to do."



# 540 MILLIONS RFC FUNDS TO

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 18 -The Reconstruction Finance corporation has authorized \$540,00,000 for freeing of frozen deposits in closed banks under its \$1,000,000,000 bank asset liquidation plan, Jesse Jones, chairman, said today.

At the same time, Jones revealed that the RFC had authorized purchases of capital stock and notes in 3.160 banks at a total cost of \$608,-000,000. That figure compared with total unrestricted banking institutions in the country numbering 14,

The preferred stock and capital note purchased of the RFC, Jones said "will not run much over \$1,-000,000,000 although there is no limit to the amount we can purchase.' Jones said that he expected to get

this money into the hands of the small depositors "between now and Christmas". In connection with the progress

in banking troubles, Jones said that repayments to the Reconstruction Finance corporation from past loans had now crossed the \$1,000,000,000 mark and were coming at the rate of \$2,500,000 daily.



Minor federal judges have had their wings clipped. The supreme court of the United States has ruled federal judges cannot tell juries that accused persons have been proved guilty. Federal Judge Lewis Fitzhenry of Illinois was the offender in this instance. Henry Murdock was sent to trial before the Illinois judge on a charge of failing to give information to federal income tax officials. During his instructions to the jury, Jurist Fitzhenry said he thought Murdock 'had been proved guilty." Murdock appealed to the court of last resort and the decision which is a curb on the wide power exercised by federal judges was announced. The court of last resort reversed the verdict with one of the most important rulings made in recent years by Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes and his associates.





## SISTER MARY'S RECIPES

DERHAPS the custom of serving nuts at the end of holiday dinners is a survival of the pioneer days when hickory nuts, walnuts and butternuts were gathered from the forest and treasured as a special treat for festive occa-sions. It took strong hands and skill to crack these hard shelled nuts, but the meats were sweet

and eagerly picked out.
Today our nuts are usually served to us ready to eat, salted or spiced as the case may be, and we still regard them as a special treat and a favorite "tid-bit."

All nuts with a tough outer skin like almonds must be blanched before salting. To blanch nuts, pour over boiling water to more than cover them—after shelling, of course—and let stand five or ten minutes or until the skins slip easily. Drain and cover with cold water. Rub or pinch off the skins. Drain as thoroughly as possible in a colander and then spread on a dry linen towel. Place another towel over them and pat dry. If convenient let stand several hours. Peanuts for salting should be purchased raw.

Any good cooking oil is used for deep-fat frying. Butter is excellent for roasting and olive oil gives a delicate flavor used for either deep-fat or pan frying for roasting. To prepage puts for

Excellent nuts are available at all candy shops and most of the "corner drug stores," but some of us like to salt our own and make them just as salty as we ourselves like them.

There are three ways to accomplish the same end—by roasting in the oven, pan frying and deepfat frying. For all nuts except peanuts the oven process produces a more crisp and tender nut than either of the other methods.

Blanch Before Salting
All nuts with a tough outer skin like almonds must be blanched before salting. To blanch nuts, Excellent nuts are available at fat as possible. Spread prepared

gives a delicate flavor used for either deep-fat or pan frying or roasting. To prepare nuts for roasting, "paint" the inside of a bowl with oil or melted butter. Put a few nuts in the bowl and shake until each nut is lightly coated with fat. Continue adding fat as necessary until all the muts are coated, but use as little




Urged by President to Put Low Tax on Liquor

## For Sound Dollar




