A number of high-ranking personalities in the world of entertainment are experiencing some embarrassing moments in the courts of Uncle Sam. It is not the prospect of saving, therefore, which seduced the honest instinct. It is something of curious hue in human nature, an outcropping of the bad which contrives to make a study of that nature one of the most intriguing of occupations.

Before we wax warmly patriotic and condemn the evil in high places, let us remember the time we went to Juarez and dared do a bit of smuggling on our own perch hook. These luminaries of ours merely angled for bigger game with a bigger hook. They did it for the same reason that the rest of us scoundrels do it. They, being easily able to afford the distinuishing price, were not satisfied with the distinction of price, no doubt, but sought a more dangerous distinction —that of having outwitted the power that is.

There is nothing uncommon about that. The instinct is experienced by almost everybody. Some even try to outwit the Almighty. Most of the smaller fry, however, confine their poaching activities to shooting quail out of season, catching forbidden fish and drinking liquor for pleasure on a doctor's prescription for a cold. The instinct to beat the government is so common that, measured by Mr. Wallace's ideals about the majority, it is politically not a crime.
