Dear Fellow Citizens of the Cisco area:

As most of you undoubtedly know by now, quite a number of families of our community are in a very severe economic crisis at the present time. Employees of our local nursing home have now gone approximately one month without a paycheck. For many of these families, their payroll check from the nursing home is their only source of support for themselves and their families. Among them are single mothers with children as well as male heads of families as sole supporters. The needs of these families are right now at an emergency and very urgent state.

The nursing home began operating under new ownership and management on November 1. The new owners are committed to meeting all obligations, including payroll, effective that date. But the November checks will not be coming for a time, and the employees suffering the loss of October pay are presently in stringent circumstances for payment of the bare necessities of food, rent, utilities, and even gasoline for travelling back and forth to work.

These employees are being very commendably courageous and giving of themselves in continuing to show up for work and care for the patients in the nursing home, in spite of no pay check for some weeks. We cannot thank them enough for this positive and cooperative spirit.

We also wish to thank former mayor Roy Cartee for his devoting practically full time the past few days in seeking the best interest of the employees of the nursing center as well as the residents. He has made numerous contacts and/or met personally with local, county, and state personnel, as well as representatives of the new owners, in seeking assistance in correcting the situation.

Now I would like to urge all citizens of Cisco and the surrounding area to join with me in supporting the efforts that are being made locally to provide emergency food and monetary help for these people who have met with misfortune due to absolutely no fault of their own. They are dedicated, hard working people who now need our aid. Information regarding just how you can help may be found elsewhere in this publication. Please do respond as generously as you possibly can. Times like this should bring out the very best of a community spirit in all of us.

## Loboes Will Play Final Game Of Season Against Baird Friday

The Cisco High School Loboes will play their final game of the 1985 football season when they host the Baird Bears here this Friday night at Chesley Field. Kick-off in the District 11-AA game will be at 7:30 p.m.

Cisco's Junior High teams will be playing a combined 7th and 8th grade game in Baird Thursday night beginning at 6 p.m.

Baird and Cisco varsity teams are both tied in their season and district standings. Both teams are 3-6 for the season and 2-4 in district.

In district play, Cisco has scored 83 points while giving

up 160. Baird has scored 64 and given up 183. For the season Cisco has scored 126 points and given up 248, while Baird has scored 84 and given up 250.

Baird is coming off of a 61-to-0 loss to Eastland while Cisco had a 41-to-6 win over Jim Ned.

In last week's game at Jim Ned, the host Indians scored first on an 18-yard run by Eddy Allen. The extra point kick failed, giving Jim Ned a 6-to-0 lead with 3:50 left in the first quarter.

Cisco scored six times in the remainder of the game and four of those scores were

the result of bad punt attempts on Jim Ned's fourth down and the fifth was set up by a fumble recovery. Only the last score was the result of a sustained drive.

Cisco scored its first touchdown on a 10-yard run by Steve Abbott. A run for two extra points failed, tying the score at 6-to-6 with 11:21 left in the second quarter.

Abbott scored again on a two-yard run later in the quarter. Abbott also carried the ball into the end zone on the conversion play for two extra points. With 8:42 left in the second quarter, Cisco took a 14-to-6 lead.

A little over four minutes later, Abbott recovered a bad snap from Jim Ned in the end zone to give Cisco another touchdown. The run for two extra points failed, for a score of 20-to-6 in the second quarter.

Cisco added its final points of the first half when Bryan Nichols scored on a three yard run. A pass attempt for two extra points failed for a half-time score of 26-to-6 with 1:47 remaining in the second quarter.

In the second half of play, Jeff Dennis scored on a two-yard run with 1:12 left in the third quarter. A run by Abbott netted two extra points making the score 34-to-6.

Abbott put Cisco's final touchdown on the

scoreboard in the last quarter of play on a four-yard run. James Deadman kicked the extra point, making the final score 41-to-6 with 5:46 left in the game.

Steve Abbott led Cisco rushers with 14 carries for 76 yards and Roy Boykin had 19 carries for 63 yards. Other rushers and their yardage were Brian Wagon, 6 carries for 19 yards; Jarrod Jeffcoat, 2 carries for 1 yard; Trae Peacock, 1 carry for 7 yards; James Berry, 1 carry, 2 yards; Bryan Nichols, 2 carries, 8 yards; Jeff Dennis, 1 carry, 2 yards; Larry Fields, 2 carries, 8 yards; and Kody Wallace, 3 carries, (-5) yards.

Jim Ned's rushers were Dennis Dacus with 15 carries for 72 yards; Eddy Allen, 24 carries for 27 yards; Brad Hutchinson, 10 carries for 18 yards; and Trey Guffy, 1 carry, 2 yards.

Cisco quarterback Jarrod Jeffcoat had 1 completion out of 7 passing attempts for 23 yards. He also had three interceptions. Cisco's substitute quarterback Doug Witt had his only pass attempt intercepted by Jim Ned.

Quarterback Eddy Allen completed 2 of 17 attempts for Jim Ned for 15 yards. Dennis Dacus had 0 completions out of 1 attempt.

Ricky Chambers was Cisco's only receiver with 1 reception for 23 yards.

Jim Ned had two receivers in Kirk Martin with 1 reception for 10 yards and Jared Clever with 1 reception for 5 yards.

Defensive standouts for Cisco were Roy Boykin, Steve Abbott, Ronnie Scheuren, Bill White, Robert Rains, Jeff Dennis, James Deadman, Bryan Nichols, Curtis Taylor, Pete DeLeon, and James Berry.

Standouts on the Jim Ned defense were Dennis Dacus, Matt McMillon, Eddy Allen, Russ Hayward, Marc Sansom, Mark McMillon, and Jared Clever.

## Wranglers Defeat Kilgore, 41-to-34

A hard fought 41-to-34 victory over the Kilgore Junior College Rangers here last Saturday night enabled the Wranglers of Cisco Junior College to remain in the Texas Junior College Athletic Conference race as the 1985 season was nearing the end.

The Wranglers will meet Blinn JC here at 3 p.m. Saturday as the feature of the annual homecoming for CJC Ex-Students and in the final conference game.

Keith Maxwell, freshman defensive back from Marlin, suffered a mild concussion and was taken to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital late in the game. He remained hospitalized Sunday and was taken to Abilene Monday for examination by specialists.

After trailing 13-to-6 at half time, the Wranglers roared back to put 28 points on the board in the final two quarters and earn the victory. James Dixon, freshman running back from Vernon, took the third quarter kickoff back 90 yards for a touchdown to put the Wranglers back in the ball game, knotting the count at 13-13.

It was a furious offensive battle in the final two periods with both teams chalking up scores. Cisco had a 15-point lead midway in the final stanza but Kilgore, led by their fine quarterback, Clifford Thurmond, pulled to within seven points with two minutes left.

With a minute left, Kilgore had the ball and completed a long pass, and then Cisco intercepted a long pass and held on to preserve the victory.

The Wranglers had 389 yards total offense with 20 first downs. QB Mark Filling, at the throttle most of the way, completed 11 of 25

passes for 152 yards and one touchdown. David Dacus, freshman quarterback, was in briefly and threw four times, completing two passes for 76 yards and one touchdown. QB Neal Kemper had two completions in six passing attempts for 78 yards and a touchdown.

Kilgore's rugged defense contained the Wrangler running game on most offense plays. David Smith, the team's leading runner, was held to 49 yards on 10 carries. Randy Boone had 40 yards in nine carries.

The Kilgore team had 199 yards passing and 190 yards rushing for 21 first downs.

End Philip Walton caught two TD passes for 76 and 55 yards, and End Melvin Peterson caught a 11-yard TD pass.

David West was the leading Wrangler defensive lineman with 11 tackles, two fumble recoveries and two quarterback sacks. John Buesing, sophomore defen-

sive end, was also outstanding on the defense as was John Booty, sophomore defensive back.

Coach Rick Frazier said the game "was a good win for us - one that our boys really earned with their second half effort." He added that Dixon's second half kickoff return for a touchdown "set the tone for our comeback."

Kilgore got off to a fast start in the first half, hitting a pass for a long gain on the first play and driving to the Cisco 15 before being stopped. A field goal gave the visitors a 3-0 lead.

Navarro County was a winner over Tyler last weekend to give Tyler and Navarro 4-1 conference records. Navarro still must play Henderson County and Kilgore, and Tyler has Kilgore to play. Cisco is 3-2 in conference play and 6-2 for the year with Blinn and Northeast Oklahoma left to play.

# Imported Fire Ant Infestation Is Found In County

An imported fire ant infestation has been confirmed in Eastland County according to County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon. The ant mounds were found in the 100 block of South Daugherty in Eastland.

They are well established with 25 to 30 active mounds, says Gordon.

The city of Eastland and

affected land owners are taking steps to eradicate the ants before they spread to other areas.

Gordon sent the ant specimen to Entomologist at Texas A&M and to Texas Department of Agriculture officials. They were confirmed as the imported fire ant. A team of Texas Department of Agriculture officials will be in Eastland, Friday,

November 8 to assess and treat the infestation. Prior to this time no established fire ant mounds had been reported in Eastland County.

The imported fire ant, now considered the most harmful ant pest in North America, is reddish-brown in color and about a quarter of an inch long. It is known both for its venomous sting and its mound building activity.

In 1918, when the fire ant arrived in Alabama aboard a South American freighter, it brought none of its natural enemies with it. In less than three human generations, it has spread west to cover half of Texas and across the South.

Once fire ants infest an area heavily that land becomes virtually

unusable. The ant colonies form mounds as high as two to three feet, with diameters of three feet or more. An infested acre may contain as many as 300 to 500 such mounds, each with up to three-quarters of a million ants. If the mounds are disturbed, the ants will attack the cause inflicting multiple stings and injecting their venom into the victims, whether human or animal. Fire ants are indiscriminate in choosing sites for their mounds. Any land, urban, suburban or rural, will do.

Mounds are found on farmland or in pastures, on lawns, parks, or in home gardens, or playgrounds, golf courses, camp grounds and even cemeteries.

Imported fire ant venom is more complex and dangerous than bee venom, including that of the so-called "killer bees." Medical treatment is often required by those bitten and severe allergic reactions have been reported in about three out of every hundred cases. Some deaths have been reported. Even those not allergic will suffer from burning and itching sores or welts.

This ant damages young plants by boring holes in roots, tubers, stalks and buds. They may attack and kill unprotected animals

such as newborn calves and pigs and newly hatched quail and poultry.

Each mound is the breeding ground for dozens of new colonies.

When a mound matures, winged males and females are produced, which fly from the nest and mate. A fertilized queen either flies or is blown to a new site, where she burrows into the ground and starts laying eggs. These hatch into worker ants which build the new mound. Unless controlled the process continues until the entire area is infested.

Gordon says it will take everyone's cooperation to stop these ants and prevent their spread. All known mounds are being treated, but each property owner

must be alert to mounds on their property, and treat them immediately. Gordon says he needs to know of any other areas of infestation, as soon as possible.

Entomologists report that the best control treatment at this time of year is individual mound treatment with chlorpyrifos drench.

Chlorpyrifos is the active chemical in a number of brand name insecticides. It is known as Dursban or Lorsban or as Fire Ant Killer. Amdro is a fire ant bait that is effective, but works best in warmer weather.

The Extension Service has a publication available to anyone upon request. The title is "Fire Ants and Their Control."

## Electricity

### Will Decrease Slightly Here

The price of electricity for residential and commercial customers of West Texas Utilities Co. will decrease slightly in November as the company's winter rates go into effect.

Beginning with November billings, base rates will be reduced by 3/4 cent per kilowatt-hour. Residential base rates will drop from 3.97 per kilowatt-hour to 3.22, while commercial base rates will drop from 4.18 to 3.43 cents per KWh.

Result of the base rate decrease and slight adjustment in the fuel cost factor will be an 8.2 percent reduction in costs for residential customers. For example, a customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours will be charged \$6.56 less than for the same amount under the summer rates.

The summer-winter rate differential for the two classes of customers was established by the Public Utility Commission of Texas during negotiations in WTU's rate case during the fall of 1984. Seasonal rate differentials have been used by many companies for many years. The main reason is that the cost of providing service is higher during the peak usage season, or summer months when air-conditioners are in use.

Winter rates will be in effect from Nov. 1 through April 1986.

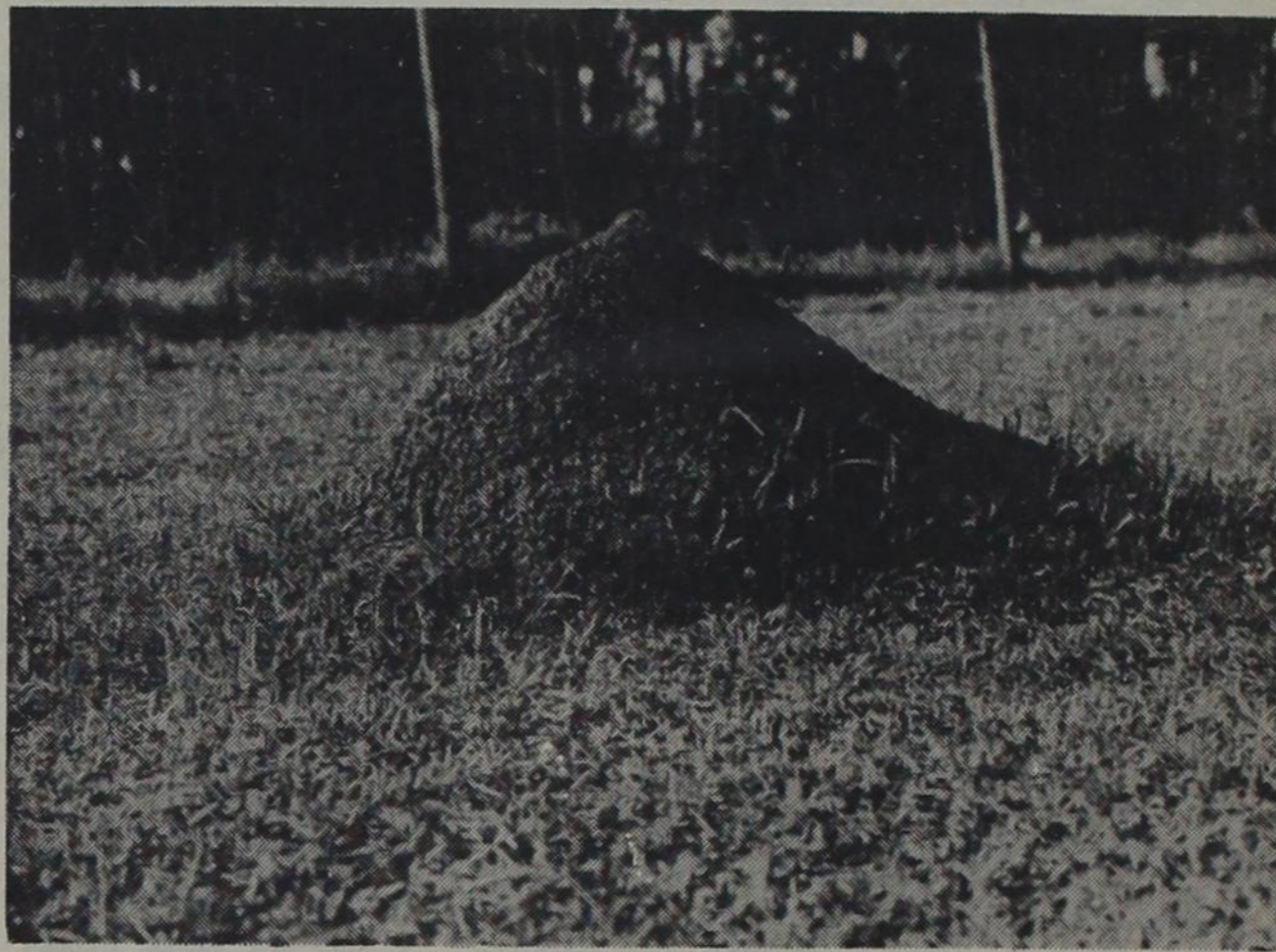
men lost their season opener, 93-to-85, at the hands of the tough Western Texas Westerners in Snyder Monday night.

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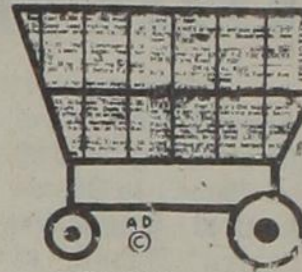

Safe 'n' Tasty Guide to Overnight Camping! The crackle and glow of a fire under starlit skies appeals to everyone who has been camping at least once in their life. Camping means something different to everyone whether it's sleeping under the stars, cooking over an open fire, or just enjoying the outdoors.

A camping trip will help you develop new skills while you have fun and make memories. With a little planning, a few outdoor techniques, and some inexpensive

basic equipment, you'll enjoy overnight outdoor experiences.

For a simple experience and fun, try these recipes out.

- Cannonball Meatloaf
1 pound hamburger
1 egg
1/2 teaspoon salt
dash of pepper
1/2 cup bread or cracker crumbs
4 large onions

Combine everything but onions and mix thoroughly. Cut onions horizontally in half, then scoop out centers

from both halves of each onion. Fill both halves with hamburger mixture; then refit onion halves together. Wrap in heavy duty aluminum foil using drugstore wrap to prevent leakage. Place on coals and cook 15 to 20 minutes, turning once.

### Banana Boats

- 4 bananas
1/4 cup milk chocolate chips
1/2 cup miniature marshmallows
Cut a lengthwise wedge from a banana, taking care not to cut all the way through

the fruit. Fold back the wedge-shaped peeling and remove the banana part of the wedge. Fill the wedge with milk chocolate chips and miniature marshmallows. Wrap in heavy duty aluminum foil, leaving the wedge opening uncovered. Then place on coals for 10 minutes, until marshmallows puff up and the chocolate melts. Serve immediately.

As we approach the holidays, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service poultry specialists predict that there should be adequate supplies of turkey for the holiday seasons but prices may be a little higher at retail than last year. Retail prices of turkey for the holiday season are hard to predict because many stores use turkey to attract shoppers to their store. Basted, national brand turkey was usually in the 90 cents to \$1.00 range. Prices this year may be about 10 cents per pound higher than for the same type of turkey last year.

Turkey is highly nutritious and low in calories. A serving of white meat has 157

calories and dark meat is higher with 187 calories. RECIPE FOR THE WEEK: The holiday season traditionally means turkey. Sometimes we need some new ideas to use left over turkey in our family meals. Those of you with pizza loving kids clip and save this recipe.

### TURKEY PIZZA

- 2 cups chopped cooked turkey
8-ounce package refrigerated crescent rolls
1 cup frozen hash brown potatoes
1 cup grated sharp Cheddar cheese
5 eggs
1/4 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon salt

2 fresh tomatoes, cut into 1/2-inch wedges
2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese.

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Separate roll dough into triangles. Place on ungreased 12-inch pizza pan with points toward the center. Press over the bottom and up sides to form a crust; seal perforations. Layer turkey, potatoes and cheese over crust in bowl, combine eggs, milk, oregano and salt. Pour over crust. Arrange tomatoes around edge. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake 25 to 30 minutes until golden brown. To serve, cut into wedges.

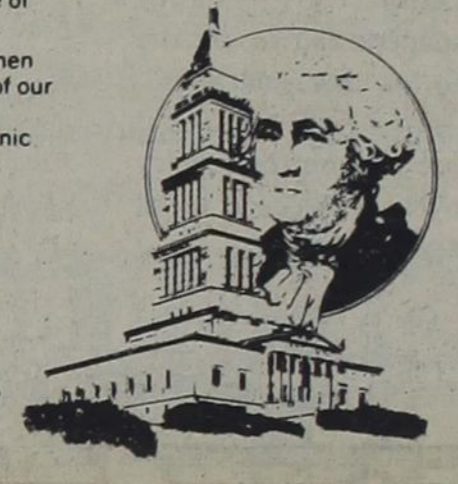

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# U. S. Visas Denied Thai Nationals In Coup

"I always knew about the 'power of the press,'" says Lela Latch Lloyd of Cisco, "But it has been brought home to me in an especially vivid way recently."

"My sister Mary Carey and I had letters published in the Eastland County newspapers after our nephew Bill Latch was killed in Bangkok, Thailand on Sept. 9."

"We asked all interested persons to write Congressmen and Senators in Washington, D.C. to request that the people responsible for the death of Bill and the other N.B.C. correspondent, Neal Davis, be denied political asylum in the United States."

Through various channels, Mrs. Lloyd explains, the family had heard that leaders of the ill-fated coup had escaped to Singapore and were waiting for entrance to this country. One officer already had a visa.

"The response to our letters was terrific," Mrs. Lloyd says. "I understand that a number of letters were written to Washington."

Favorable replies came from Senator Lloyd Bentsen, from the office of Vice President Bush, and Senator Phil Gramm.

Final word on the matter has arrived with a second letter from Senator Gramm to Mrs. Lloyd. He enclosed a letter from the State Department, and also a copy of laws governing classes of aliens ineligible to receive visas.

The State Department letter announced that Colonel Manoon Roopakjorn and his nephew, Manas Roopakjorn, have been denied visas to the United States. They were denied admission under Section 212 (a) (28) under a law denying visas to aliens who are anarchists.

These letters follow:  
Dear Ms. Lloyd:

The Department of State has provided me the enclosed final response to my inquiry on your behalf. I hope this information is useful to you.

I appreciate having the opportunity to represent you in the United States Senate. If I can be of further assistance to you, please do not hesitate to contact me.

Dear Senator Gramm:

Thank you for your letter of October 4 on behalf of Mrs. Lela Latch Lloyd who is concerned about the

possibility of Colonel Manoon Roopakjorn (Manoon Rupekachorn) and his relative, Mr. Manas Roopakjorn (Manot Rupekachorn) obtaining visas or political asylum to reside in the United States.

Both Colonel and Mr. Roopakjorn have been found ineligible for visas to the United States under Section 212(a)(28)(F) of the Immigration and Nationality Act. This section of the law is cited in the enclosure.

Although Colonel Roopakjorn previously had a valid nonimmigrant visa in his passport, that visa was invalidated when he found ineligible under Section 212(a)(28). The Immigration and Naturalization Service, which has jurisdiction over the admission of aliens into the United States, has been informed of Colonel and Mr. Roopakjorn's ineligibilities.

I hope this information is useful to you.

# Capitol Update

# Fishing Outdoors

The adage "believe nothing you hear and only half of what you see" certainly has application in regard to judging the results of activities of the State Legislature.

The first such instance, that many of you have contacted me about, is the termination of some positions in the Agricultural Extension Service that furnished all counties with a county agent, home demonstration agent and support staff. The Extension Service administration appears to be justifying staff reductions by blaming the legislature in its last session for severe cutting of the Extension Service's budget. That is not true.

The fact of the matter is the Extension Service received exactly the same appropriation out of the 69th Legislature as it received in the 68th Session. The difference is that the administration of the Extension Service has apparently made the determination to divert funds from field staffing to some other area. I do not know what other area the funds are intended for but I intend to make every effort to find out.

In another instance, many, many of my constituents have written concerning the demise of small schools. The culprit for the demise of small schools is thought to be the Legislature and its passage of H.B. 72. That is not true.

With very few exceptions, H.B. 72 injected more state aid funds into small school districts than they had ever realized before. As a matter of fact, H.B. 72 contains a funding formula that actually gives additionally state money to schools under 1600 ADA. The smaller the

school, the more additional funds. Whoever has told you H.B. 72 is killing small schools just simply told you wrong.

The prospect for small school is, admittedly, bleak at best but that is because of curriculum requirements passed in 1981, and only now coming into full implementation, and because it simply is more expensive to operate a school, per child, for a school of 150 children than for a school of 500. Obviously, a teacher can teach 20 children for the same that he or she can teach eight. It does not take an intellectual giant to arrive at these conclusions.

Small schools will continue to endure so long as the local property tax base is willing to support them or if the Legislature ever becomes willing to seriously approach reform of the ad valorem method of school finance. Do not hold your breath waiting for that to happen.

In both of these instances, I have discussed, the Legislature is serving as a handy whipping boy and the real issues are thereby avoided.

In most instances, such as these, if the object of blame appears to be readily evident, you are probably working with a mistaken set of facts.

AUSTIN—Good range conditions in most of Texas' deer country should not deter hunters from harvesting antlerless deer during the upcoming deer season, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials believe.

Horace Gore, white-tailed deer program leader, said deer populations still are too high in the Edwards Plateau, South Texas and several other areas of the state. "Hunters tend to believe that taking antlerless deer is not needed or necessary during a year when the deer are so well-fed," Gore said, "but an overpopulated herd can get into real trouble when times get tougher."

The deer season is Nov. 9-Jan. 5 in most Texas counties, and antlerless deer hunting permits will be issued in counties where deer populations are high. Gore pointed out that an extra antlerless deer tag on the 1985-86 hunting license will allow hunters to take as many as four antlerless deer during the season, provided they have access to property with an ample number of permits.

Hunters in six South Texas counties have an extra time period in which to take antlerless deer. A special antlerless-only season is Oct. 26-Nov. 10 in Duval, Dim-

mitt, Maverick, Webb, Zapata and Zavala Counties. Gore said continued overpopulation of deer caused long-term damage to the habitat. During dry years this translates into smaller body sizes, poor antler development and low fawn survival. In extreme cases, it can precipitate die-offs of mature animals.

"Last hunting season hunters took more than 100,000 antlerless deer for the first time, which is good," said Gore, "but it is still well below the harvest we need to avoid future problems."

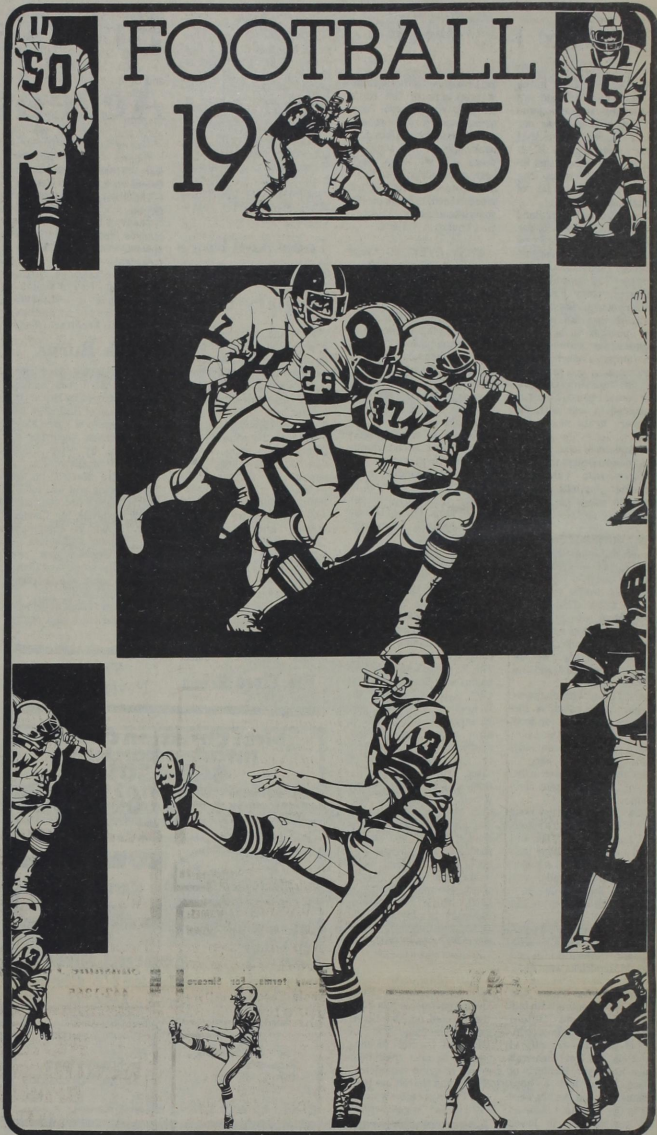

# Breckenridge Company's Bid Is Accepted By Board Of Trustees

Thompson Construction Company of Breckenridge was the low and successful bidder for a contract to build an addition to Intermediate School when the board of trustees of the Cisco Public Schools opened bids at a special meeting last Thursday night.

The Breckenridge firm's bid, lowest of eight submitted, amounted to \$768,132.00, Supt. Ray Saunders reported. Architect Tom

Huckaby attended the meeting and supervised the bid opening.

Mr. Huckaby told the board that he expected to have contracts prepared for approval and signing at their regular meeting next Monday night at the high school library. The Breckenridge

company told the board that they would start work soon after the contract signing, probably within a week or ten days.

The plans and specifications call for 12 class rooms, rest rooms, a cafeteria and a library with a total of approximately 18,000 square

feet of floor space. Mr. Saunders said that "we hope to have the project completed in time for the 1986-87 school year beginning in September, 1986."

The contract provides for 300 working days. The building addition will be of brick and masonry construction.

In other action, the board opened bids to provide insurance coverage for some \$6,600,000 on school buildings and property. Two bids were submitted and Ledbetter Insurance Agency of Cisco was the low bidder in the amount of \$14,800.

# Drilling Bits

At a location five miles south-southeast of Ranger, Robert E. Byrne has finalized a new oil producer in Eastland County's Adams Field.

The well is designated as the No. 6 Duffer "A", pumping at the rate of 78 barrels per day.

Location is in the S.N. Mathias Survey, A-376. Bottomed at 3,653 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Lower Duffer Formation, 3,395 to 3,430 feet into the hole.

Eastland County's North Mangum Field gained a new producer when Northridge Corp. completed the No. 1 Stansell-Harrelson Unit three miles southeast of Cisco.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of 19 barrels per day. It was taken to a 3,781-ft. bottom and will produce from perforations 3,268 to 3,308 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in the H&TC Survey, A-236.

Ridge Oil of Breckenridge has filed for permit to drill the No. 2 Webb, a 3,700-ft. wildcat well four miles east of Eastland. Location is in a 213-acre lease in Eastland County's HT&B Survey, Sec. 1, Blk. 1.

A gas producer has been brought on line in the Eastland Regular Field, with Dramar Development Co. as the operator.

Located seven miles east-southeast of Eastland, the well is in the William Van Norman Survey, A-545. It is designated as the No. 2-A Sibley.

On a 16/64 choke, it flowed 130,000 CF gas per day. It was rated at 198,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

The well bottomed at 949 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Cisco Sand Formation, 856 to 874 feet into the hole.

Circle Exploration has filed first production figures on two gas wells in Eastland County's Linde Field. Drillsites are about five miles northwest of

Desdemona in the David S. Richardson Survey, A-414.

The No. 1-A Watkins indicated ability to flow 39,000 CF gas daily on an 8/64 choke. It was rated at 51,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

The No. 2-A Watkins will flow 238,000 CF gas per day on a 16/64 choke. The absolute open flow rating came in at 340,000 CFD.

The wells will produce from perforations in the Frye Formation, ranging from 487 to 587 feet into the hole. Total depths were 587 & 554 feet, respectively.

The No. 1 Texaco has been finalized by Sand Valley Exploration & Development Co. It is a developmental well in the Topper Field, one mile southeast of Nimrod. Drillsite is in Eastland County's H&TC Survey, A-177.

Daily potential of six barrels was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 1,426-ft. bottom. Production will be from perforations in the Adams Branch Formation, 1,369 to 1,371 feet into the wellbore.

Two 1,000-ft. developmental wells are planned by Circle Exploration of Odessa at drillsites about four miles northwest of Desdemona, Eastland County. The locations are in a 240-acre lease in the David S. Richardson Survey, A-414. Wells' designations are the Nos. 1-A & 2-A Lambert.

An Eastland-based operator has staked location for the No. 1 Edna Crowell, a developmental well to be located three miles east-southeast of Eastland. With projected total depth of 1,700 feet, the well is in a 50-acre lease in the Eastland Regular Field, McLennan CSL Survey, A-367. The operator is Crowell Brothers.

Expanding Energy of Midland has revealed plans to drill a 1,800-ft. developmental well in the Tindall Field. The operator has 160 acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's H&TC Survey, A-295 and

has designated the venture as the No. 5 Tindall. Drillsite is two miles northeast of Eastland.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 5 L.S. Ross, a 2,000-ft. developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field. The operation will be located four miles north of Eastland in a 160-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-752. The operator is Northridge Corp. of Duncanville.

The No. 2 Ogle, a 4,000-ft. developmental well, is scheduled to be drilled in Eastland County's Morencio Field. Snow Oil of Fort Worth is the operator. The well will be spudded in a 132-acre lease five miles south-southeast of Carbon in the D&DAL Survey, A-1037.

A Breckenridge-based operator has staked location for the No. 1 Taylor Unit, a developmental well to be located one mile east of Ranger. With projected total depth of 3,900 feet, the well is in a 231-acre lease in the Eastland Regular Field, James Lellea Survey, A-360. The operator is Ridge Oil Co.

Sand Valley Exploration & Development Co. of Lubbock has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Michael F. Brown, a 1,300-ft. developmental well three miles south-southeast of Nimrod. Location is in a 215-acre lease in the Eastland Regular Field, H&TC Survey, A-1983.

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for the No. 1 Eves, a developmental venture of Santex Exploration in the Eastland Regular Field. Spudded Sept. 6, the well had reached 1,650 feet total depth. Drillsite was one mile northwest of Carbon in the H&TC Survey, A-290.

At a location three miles west-southwest of Crystal Falls, Eldorado Oil & Gas has finalized a new oil producer in Stephens County's Stribling Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Robertson "S", pumping at the rate of 42

barrels daily.

Location is in the Peter Norton Survey. Bottomed at 3,700 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Caddo Lime Formation, 3,680 to 3,690 feet into the hole.

A gas producer has been brought on line in Stephens County's WP Field, with Weatherbee Petroleum as the operator.

Located two miles north of Gunsight, the well is in the T&P Survey. It is designated as the No. 1 Toland.

On a 17/64 choke, it flowed 472,000 CF gas per day. It was rated at 1,340,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

The well bottomed at 4,300 feet and will produce open flow from a perforated interval in the Conglomerate Formation, 3,675 to 3,685 feet into the hole.

The well indicated ability to flow at the rate of 15 barrels of oil daily on a 10/64

choke. It was taken to a 4,200-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Conglomerate Formation, 4,000 to 4,010 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in the AB&M Survey.

Martin Petroleum of Graham has filed for permit to drill the No. 2 T.S. Ranch, a 4,700-ft. wildcat well two miles northwest of Oran. Location is in a 320-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's TE&L Survey.

Two 3,650-ft. wildcat wells are planned by GSG Royalty of Freeport at drillsites about one-half mile south of Grafrod, Palo Pinto County. The locations are in a 25 and 54-acre lease in the TE&L Survey. Wells' designations are the No. 1 M.A. Green "B" and the No. 1 J.J. Mills "B".

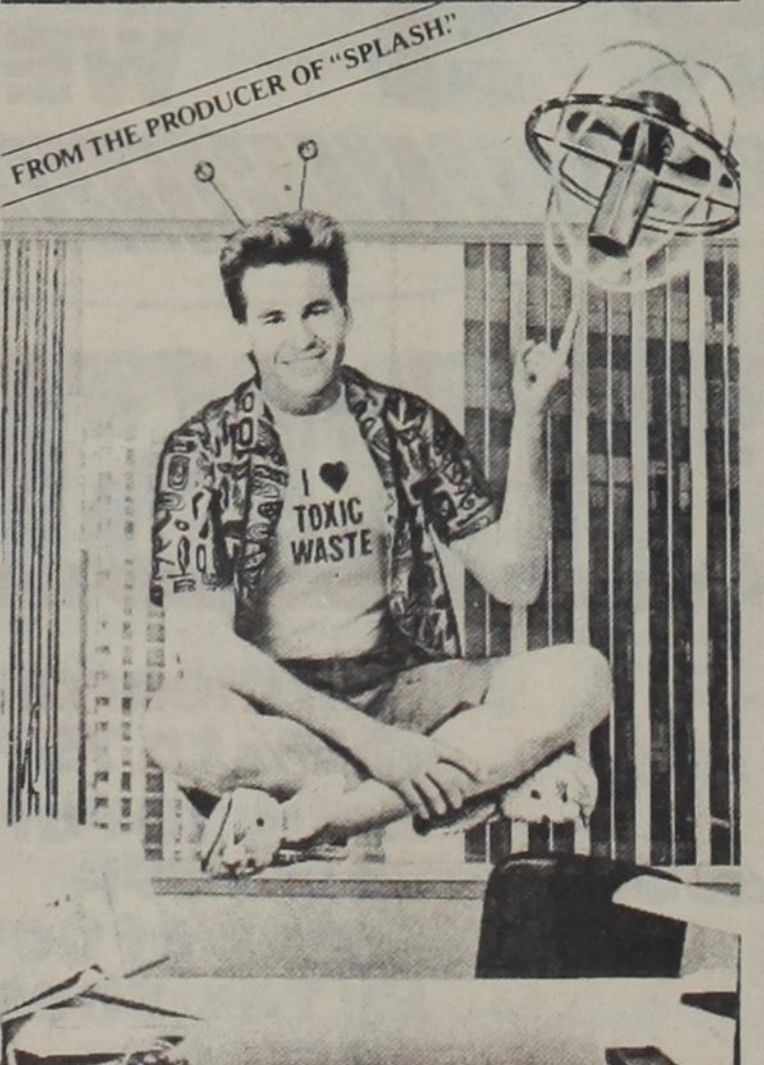
