Dear Fellow Citizens of the Cisco area:

As most of you undoubtedly know by now, quite a number of families of our community are in a very severe economic crisis at the present time. Employees of our local nursing home have now gone appfoximately one month without a paycheck. For many of these families, their payroll check from the nursing home is their only source of support for themselves and their families. Among them are single mothers with children as well as male heads of families as sole supporters. The needs of these families are right now at an emergency and very urgent state.

The nursing home began operating under new ownership and management on November 1. The new owners are committed to meeting all obligations, including payroll, effective that date. But the November checks will not be coming for a time, and the employees suffering the loss of October pay are presently in stringent circumstances for payment of the bare necessities of food, rent, utilities, and even gasoline for travelling back and forth to

These employees are being very commendably courageous and giving of themselves in continuing to show up for work and care for the patients in the nursing home, in spite of no pay check for some weeks. We cannot thank them enough for this positive and cooperative spirit.

We also wish to thank former mayor Roy Cartee for his devoting practically full time the past few days in seeking the best interest of the employees of the nursing center as well as the residents. He has made numerous contacts and/or met personally with local, county, and state personnel, as well as representatives of the new owners, in seeking assistance in correcting the

Now I would like to urge all citizens of Cisco and the surrounding area to so join with me in supporting the efforts that are being made locally to provide emergency food and monetary help for these people who have met with misfortune due to absolutely no fault of their own. They are dedicated, hard working people who now need our aid. Information regarding just how you can help may be found elsewhere in this publication. Please do respond as generously as you possibly can. Times like this should bring out the very best of a community spirit in all of us.



# Wranglers Defeat Kilgore, 41-to-34

A hard fought 41-to-34 victory over the Kilgore Junior College Rangers here last Saturday night enabled the Wranglers of Cisco Junior College to remain in the Texas Junior College Athletic Conference race as the 1985 season was nearing the end.

The Wranglers will meet Blinn JC here at 3 p.m. Saturday as the feature of the annual homecoming for CJC Ex-Students and in the final conference game.

Keith Maxwell, freshman defensive back from Marlin, suffered a mild concussion and was taken to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital late in the game. He remained hospitalized Sunday and was taken to Abilene Monday for examination by specialists.

After trailing 13-to-6 at half time, the Wranglers roared back to put 28 points on the board in the final two quarters and earn the victory. James Dixon, freshman running back from Vernon, took the third quarter kickoff back 90 yards for a touchdown to put the Wranglers back in the ball game, knotting the count at 13-13.

It was a furious offensive battle in the final two periods with both teams chalking up scores. Cisco had a 15-point lead midway in the final stanza but Kilgore, led by their fine quarterback, Clifton Thurmond, pulled to within seven points with two minutes left.

With a minute left, Kilgore had the ball and completed a long pass, and then Cisco intercepted a long pass and held on to preserve the victory.

The Wranglers had 389 yards total offense with 20 first downs. QB Mark Filling, at the throttle most of the way, completed 11 of 25

passes for 152 yards and one touchdown. David Dacus, freshman quarterback, was in breifly and threw four times, completing two passes for 76 yards and one touchdown. QB Neal Kemper had two completions in six passing attempts for 78 yards and a

touchdown. Kilgore's rugged defense contained the Wrangler running game on most offense plays. David Smith, the team's leading runner, was held to 49 yards on 10 carries. Randy Boone had 40 yards in nine carries.

The Kilgore team had 199 yards passing and 190 yards rushing for 21 first downs. End Philip Walton caught two TD passes for 76 and 55 yards, and End Melvin Peterson caught a 11-yard TD pass.

David West was the leading Wrangler defensive lineman with 11 tackles, two fumble recoveries and two quarterback sacks. John Buesing, sophomore defen-

sive end, was also outstanding on the defense as was John Booty, sophomore defensive back.

Coach Rick Frazier said the game "was a good win for us - one that our boys really earned with their second half effort." He added that Dixon's second half kickoff return for a touchdown "set the tone for our comeback."

Kilgore got off to a fast start in the first half, hitting a pass for a long gain on the first play and driving to the Cisco 15 before being stopped. A field goal gave the visitors a 3-0 lead.

Navarro County was a winner over Tyler last weekend to give Tyler and Navarro 4-1 conference records. Navarro still must play Henderson County and Kilgore, and Tyler has Kilgore to play. Cisco is 3-2 in conference play and 6-2 for the year with Blinn and Northeast Oklahoma left to

# Imported Fire Ant Infestation Is Found In County

An imported fire ant infestation has been confirmed in Eastland County according to County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon. The ant mounds were found in the 100 block of South Daugherty in Eastland.

They are well established with 25 to 30 active mounds, says Gordon.

The city of Eastland and

affected land owners are taking steps to eradicate the ants before they spread to other areas.

Gordon sent the ant specimen to Entomologist at Texas A&M and to Texas Department of Agriculture officials. They were confirmed as the imported fire ant. A team of Texas Department of Agriculture officials will be in Eastland, Friday,

November 8 to asses and treat the infestation. Prior to this time no established fire ant mounds had been reported in Eastland County.

The imported fire ant, now considered the most harmful ant pest in North America, is reddish-brown in color and about a quarter of an inch long. It is known both for its venomous sting and its mound building activity.

An infested acre may contain as many as 300 to 500 such mounds, each with up to three-quarters of a million ants. If the mounds are disturbed, the ants will attack the cause inflicting multiple stings and injecting their venom into the victims, whether human or animal. Fire ants are indiscriminate in choosing sites for their mounds. Any land, urban,

and even cemeteries. Imported fire ant venom is more complex and dangerous than bee venom, including that of the socalled "killer bees." Medical treatment is often required by those bitten and severe allergic reactions have been reported in about three out of every hundred cases. Some deaths have been reported. Even those not allergic will suffer from burning and itching sores or welts.

This ant damages young plants by boring holes in roots, tubers, stalks and buds. They may attack and kill unprotected animals such as newborn calves and pigs and newly hatched quail and poultry.

Each mound is the breeding ground for dozens of new colonies.

When a mound mastures, winged males and females are produced, which fly from the nest and mate. A fertilized queen either flies or is blown to a new site, where she burrows into the ground and starts laying eggs. These hatch into worker ants which build the new mound. Unless controlled the process continues until the entire area is infested.

Gordon says it will take everyone's cooperation to stop these ants and prevent their spread. All known mounds are being treated. but each property owner

must be alert to mounds on their property, and treat them immediately. Gordon says he needs to know of any other areas of infestation, as

soon as possible. Entomologists report that the best control treatment at this time of year is individual mound treatment

with chlorpyrifos drench. Chlorpyrifos is the active chemical in a number of brand name insecticides. It is known as Dursban or Lorsban or as Fire Ant Killer. Amdro is a fire ant bait that is effective, but works best in warmer weather.

The Extension Service has a publication available to anyone upon request. The title is "Fire Ants and Their Control."

Will Decrease Slightly Here

The price of electricity for residential and commercial customers of West Texas Untilities Co. will decrease slightly in November as the company's winter rates go into effect.

Beginning with November billings, base rates will be reduced by 3/4 cent per kilowatt-hour. Residential base rates will drop from 3.97 per kilowatt-hour to 3.22, while commerical base rates will drop from 4.18 to 3.43 cents per KWh.

Result of the base rate decrease and slight adjustment in the fuel cost factor will be an 8.2 percent reduction in costs for residential customers. For example, a customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours will be charged \$6.56 less than for the same amount under the summer rates.

The summer-winter rate differential for the two classes of customers was established by the Public **Utility Commission of Texas** during negotiations in WTU's rate case during the fall of 1984. Seasonal rate differentials have been used by many companies for many years. The main reason is that the cost of providing service is higher during the peak usage season, or summer months when airconditioners are in use.

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

Agricultural Extension Service poultry specialists predict that there should be adequate supplies of turkey for the holiday seasons but prices may be a little higher at retail than last year. Retail prices of turkey for the holiday season are hard to predict because many stores use turkey to attract shoppers to their store. Basted, national brand turkey was usually in the 90 cents to \$1.00 range. Prices this year may be about 10 cents per pound higher than for the same type of turkey last year.



# U. S. Visas Denied Thai

# Nationals In Coup

"I always knew about the 'power of the press'," says Lela Latch Lloyd of Cisco. "But it has been brought home to me in an especially vivid way recently.

and I had letters published in the Eastland County newspapers after our nephew Bill Latch was killed in Bangkok, Thailand on Sept. 9.

"We asked all interested persons to write Congressmen and Senators in Washington, D.C. to request that the people responsible for the death of Bill and the other N.B.C. correspondent, Neal Davis, be denied political assylum in the United States.

Through various channels, Mrs. Lloyd explains, the family had heard that leaders of the ill-fated coup had escaped to Singapore and were waiting for entrance to this country. One officer already had a visa.

"The response to our letters was terrific," Mrs. Lloyd says. "I understand that a number of letters were written to Washington."

Favorable replies came from Senator Lloyd Bentsen, from the office of Vice President Bush, and Senator Phil

Final word on the matter has arrived with a second letter from Senator Gramm to Mrs. Lloyd. He enclosed a letter from the State Department, and also a copy of laws governing classes of aliens ineligible to receive visas.

The State Department letter announced that Colonel Manoon Roopkajorn and his nephew, Manas Roopkajorn, have been denied visas to the United States. They were denied admission under Section 212 (a) (28) under a law denying visas to aliens who are anarchists.

These letters follow: Dear Ms. Lloyd:

Both Colonel and Mr. Roopkajorn have been found ineligible for visas to the United States under Section 212(a)(28)(F) of the Immigration and Nationality Act. This section of the law is cited in the enclosure.

Although Colonel Roopkajorn previously had a valid nonimmigrant visa in his passport, that visa was invalidated when he found ineligible under Section 212(a)(28). The Immigrantion and Naturalization Service, which has jurisdiction over the admission of aliens into the United States, has been informed of Colonel and Mr. Roopkajorn's ineligibilities.

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
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
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
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# Capitol Update

by Jim Parker

The adage "believe nothing you hear and only half of what you see" certainly has application in regard to judging the results of activities of the State Legislature.

The first such instance, that many of you have contacted me about, is the termination of some positions in the Agricultural Extension Service that furnished all counties with a county agent, home demonstration agent and support staff. The Extension Service administration appears to be justifying staff reductions by blaming the legislature in its last session for severe cutting of the Extension Service's budget. That is not true.

The fact of the matter is the Extension Service received exactly the same appropriation out of the 69th Legislature as it received in the 68th Session. The difference is that the administration of the Extension Service has apparently made the determination to divert funds from field staffing to some other area. I do not know what other area the funds are intended for but I intend to make every effort to find out.

In another instance, many, many of my constituents have written concerning the demise of small schools. The culprit for the demise of small schools is thought to be the Legislature and its passage of H.B. 72. That is not true.

With very few exceptions, H.B. 72 injected more state aid funds into small school districts than they had ever realized before. As a matter of fact, H.B. 72 contains a funding formula that actually gives additionally state money to schools under 1600 ADA. The smaller the

school, the more additional funds. Whoever has told you H.B. 72 is killing small schools just simply told you

The prospect for small school is, admittedly, bleak at best but that is because of curriculum requirements passed in 1981, and only now coming into full implementation, and because it simply is more expensive to operate a school, per child, for a school of 150 children than for a school of 500. Obviously, a teacher can teach 20 children for the same that he or she can teach eight. It does not take an intellectual giant to arrive at these con-

Small schools will continue to endure so long as the local property tax base is willing to support them or if the Legislature ever becomes willing to seriously approach reform of the ad valorem method of school finance. Do not hold your breath waiting for that to happen.

AUSTIN-Good range conditions in most of Texas' deer country should not deter hunters from harvesting antlerless deer during the upcoming deer season, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials believe.

Horace Gore, white-tailed deer program leader, said deer populations still are too high in the Edwards Plateau, South Texas and several other areas of the state. "Hunters tend to believe that taking antlerless deer is not needed or necessary during a year when the deer are so wellfed," Gore said, "but an overpopulated herd can get into real trouble when times get tougher."

90 Day Lay-A-Way

The deer season is Nov. 9-Jan. 5 in most Texas counties, and antlerless deer hunting permits will be issued in counties where deer populations are high. Gore pointed out that an extra antlerless deer tag on the 1985-86 hunting license will allow hunters to take as many as four antlerless deer during the season, provided they have access to property with an ample number of per-

Hunters in six South Texas counties have an extra time period in which to take antlerless deer. A special antlerless-only season is Oct. 26-Nov. 10 in Duval, Dim-

mitt, Maverick, Webb, Zapata and Zavala Counties. Gore said continued overpopulation of deer caused long-term damage to the habitat. During dry years this translates into smaller body sizes, poor antler development and low fawn survival. In extreme cases, it can precipitate die-offs of mature animals.

'Last hunting season hunters took more than 100,000 antlerless deer for the first time, which is good," said Gore, "but it is still well below the harvest we need to avoid future pro-
