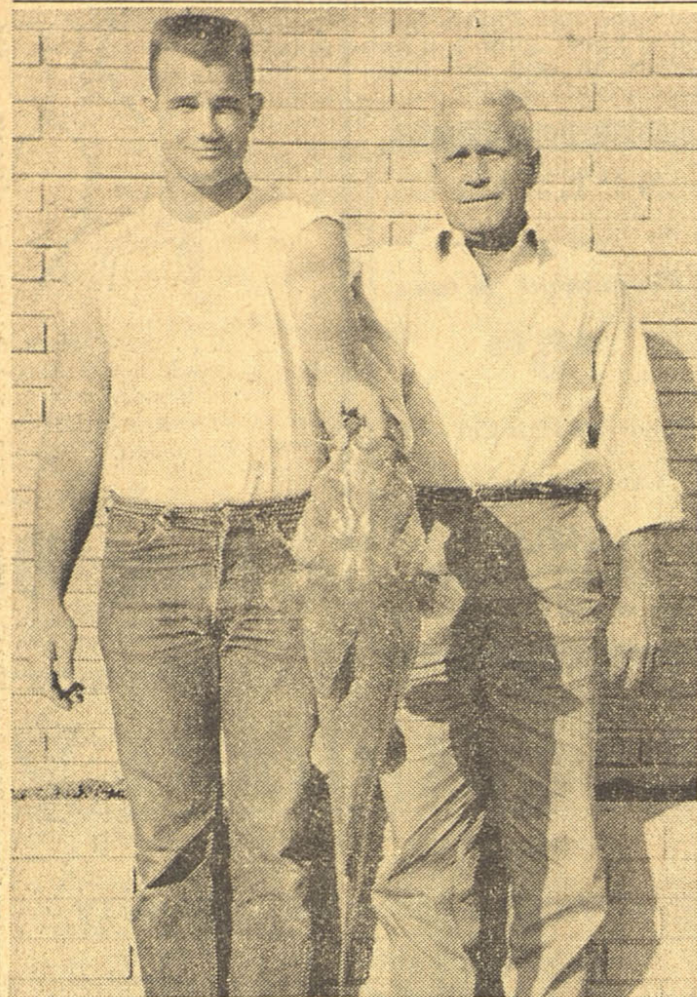

Lake Pool Opens For New Season Next Saturday

Plans are underway to open the Lake Cisco swimming pool on Saturday, May 1, according to Manager Lawrence Thompson. The pool usually opens a month ahead of most pools for the benefit of hundreds of school students who visit Lake Cisco each spring.

Mr. Thompson said the pool and bathhouse were being remodeled and cleaned for the new season. A new concrete walk is being poured from the entrance gate to the deep diving board area.

Nick Nicklas, formerly of the Savoy Cafe, will operate the pool food and drink concession again this year. Mr. Thompson said his staff of lifeguards would be complete in the next few days.

GS VOLUNTEERS COMPLETE TWO-DAY TRAINING COURSE

Mrs. Austin Flint, leader of Junior Girl Scout Troop 52, and Mrs. R. V. Lehmborg, leader of Cadette Troop 55, have completed the troop camp training held at the Girl Scout Camp Wood Lake near Brownwood.

Thirteen other adult volunteers from all over the Heart of Texas Girl Scout Council took the two-day training program, which included hiking, knot tying, lashing, tent pitching, and bed rolling. Each patrol had assigned kapers (a German word meaning a temporary responsibility) such as scooping out-of-doors, cleaning up, fire building, and preparing a

patrol which cooked the supper consisting of creole burgers with all the trimmings. Mrs. Flint and her patrol were responsible for the camp fire and program.

Second day activities included kapers, a "Scout's Own Ceremony," a skills tournament, instructions on health and safety, and a closing flag ceremony.

Upon completion of the training program, Mrs. Lehmborg stated that she was especially impressed by the well-planned Girl Scout way of camping and the organization. Fellowship with workers from other communities and the exchange of ideas were particularly enjoyed by Mrs. Flint, she said.

Notary Public Requirements Spelled Out by State Official

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1967, must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between May 1, 1965 and May 15, 1965, inclusive.

Martin emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk before May 20, 1965. Application during this period will assure that the appointment will be made in sufficient time for the applicant to qualify at the beginning of the new term.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.

Regular Program Is Not Affected

The approval by the Texas Education Agency of Cisco Junior College as an Area Technical - Vocational School in addition to its status as an academic two-year college has been announced by G. C. Hogue, president of the college.

The approval will result in an expansion of present courses offered under the Technical-Vocational division of the college, directed by L. E. Jenkins, and training within a greater number of vocational fields will be offered. Courses to be offered next fall include electronic data processing, drafting technology, vocational nursing, office occupations, and offset photo-lithography.

Cisco Junior College is also one of the colleges recently approved to participate in the work-study program under the Economic Opportunity Act, and students who need financial assistance either to pursue technical-vocational training or academic education are eligible. There are presently 66 students in the program at CJC with an average earning of \$70 per month, Mr. Jenkins said.

During this summer there will be 25 jobs available at the college, 15 jobs with the City of Cisco, and 15 jobs with Eastland County. Rates for all jobs will be \$1.25 per hour, and students may work 15 hours a week during school and as many as 40 hours during the summer, with earnings to be applied to expenses at CJC next fall. Some 115 students will be enrolled in this program next fall, according to the present outlook.

"The work-study program will be a great benefit to students desiring either vocational or academic education," Mr. Hogue stated, "and it will enable them to pay their way as they pursue their chosen fields."

Mr. Hogue also emphasized that the approval of CJC as a Technical - Vocational School will not lessen the academic program of the college but will enable it to broaden its curriculum and offer a broader field of education.

"Students under the Technical-Vocational program will be encouraged also to take academic courses," he said. "All courses will be keyed with accredited senior colleges, and some although not all courses will be transferable."

Beginning next fall an expansion of the current drafting technology course will enable a student to complete enough work within two years to hire out as a senior draftsman, Mr. Jenkins said.

A new concept in office occupations will also be inaugurated with the curriculum consisting of a one-year program for office clerical workers and one-year program for stenographer clerical workers. A certificate will be awarded for completion of two semesters of work in either program.

Students may receive an associate in science degree on successful completion of a two-year secretarial science course, which will include advanced stenography, typing, business law, speed typing, dactylography, and shorthand.

to processing, and secretarial procedure.

An associate science degree will be awarded for completion of a two-year accounting course which will offer such subjects as modern math, cost accounting, data processing, business law, introduction to economics, tax accounting, and auditing.

A survey of large companies in the five major cities of Texas shows that the projected need of persons trained in office occupations is 28,000 in the next two years in these cities alone, Mr. Jenkins said. CJC is the only junior college to date between Fort Worth and El Paso which will be offering offset photo lithography technology next fall, Mr. Jenkins stated. First rate lab and equipment will be used under the qualified instructors.

Plans are being made to expand the automotive mechanics course to 20 hours a week and to offer a summer course to students 15 years or older.

A second school of vocational nursing, to be known as the Cisco Junior College Graham Branch, has been approved by the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners and will begin May 3 in Graham. Clinical periods will be held at the three participating hospitals in Breckenridge, Graham, and Jacksboro. Tuition for the full 52-week course is \$120 and may be paid \$10 per month. Books, uniforms, equipment, etc., are approximately \$85. A stipend of \$10 per month is paid for the first three months, \$40 for the second three months, and \$60 per month for the last three months by the participating hospitals.

Mrs. Ventita Mitchell, RN, is instructor for the present class at CJC which began Feb. 1 with 17 students enrolled. The last graduating class recently passed the state board exam ranking 15th among 93 schools taking the exam, with one CJC student ranking among the top ten.

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Social Security Number Goes Up In This County

Monthly old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits in Eastland County now top \$244,600, R. R. Tuley Jr., District Manager of Social Security in Abilene, said today on releasing his annual benefit data report.

The new monthly figure represents an increase of 6 percent over the corresponding period last year.

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"This increase can be attributed to the changes in the law in recent years, as well as to the growth of our aged population," Tuley said. This money stimulates county business; most of it is spent for food, clothing, and shelter.

"There is no longer any doubt. Social security benefits are helping to stabilize the income and spending power of many residents in this county."

Monthly benefits first became payable in January 1940, and they have continued without interruption for years, accompanied by a steady growth in the number of beneficiaries. Tuley noted that as of December 31, 1964, some 4,250 countians were collecting over \$2,935,400 annually from social security.

More people in Eastland County, he said, could draw social security benefits if they knew more about the law, and for that reason they are urged to visit or call the local social security office whenever they have a question concerning their benefits or responsibilities.

As of January 1965, in the nation at large, almost 20 million beneficiaries were receiving payments at the rate of \$16 billion per month.

The average monthly old-age retirement benefit in January was \$77.57 for all states, while in the State of Texas the average was \$69.43, Tuley said.

The following table shows the number and amount of each type of monthly benefit paid in Eastland County, as of December 31, 1964:

The year 1965 marks several milestones in the history of social security. The January 1965 benefit payment marked the 300th month of payment since monthly benefits first became payable in January 1940. The number of monthly benefits currently being paid will reach the 20 million mark in 1965. In addition, August is the 30th anniversary of the signing of the Social Security Act by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Tuley added.

Fund Still Short In County Screw Worm Program

Two thirds of the \$3,100 quota in the current screw worm eradication fund drive has been collected from Eastland County ranchers and livestock men, according to Oscar Schaefer, Cook, chairman of the animal health committee.

Glyn Gilliam, Ranger banker and treasurer for the committee, recently informed Schaefer that he had sent a check for \$1,921.87 to the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, Dallas, sponsor for the screw worm elimination program in the state.

"We are grateful for the many contributions on this program," Schaefer said.

"This is one of the finest programs that we have ever had in the livestock business and I am confident that we will go over the top in the fund raising campaign," he continued.

Many ranchers have said that the savings in time, labor, wear and tear on the cars and pickup trucks, gas, oil

and medications as well as freedom from the frustrations of looking for, catching and doctoring 'wormy' animals has been tremendous in Eastland and all other counties in the state.

Reports from the various

banks indicate that Eastland has reported a total of \$271.15 collected for the fund. Others are Cisco \$372.87; Gorman with \$629.20; Rising Star \$435.24 and Ranger \$426.66.

Schaefer gave thanks to all committees who have worked

to make the drive successful. He urged those who have not been contacted for their contribution to take it to their bank in the next several days. Any bank in the county will accept the contribution he said.

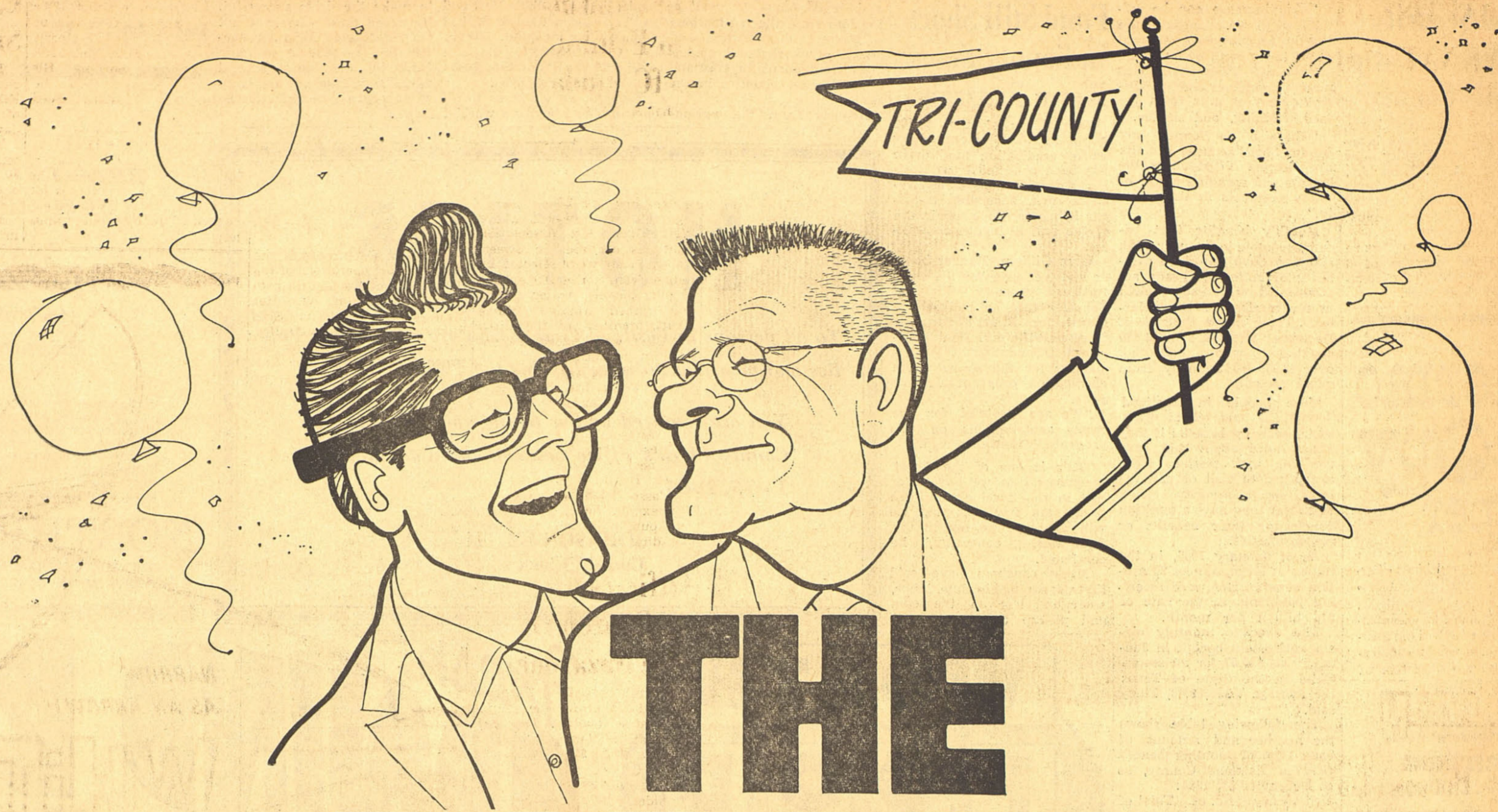
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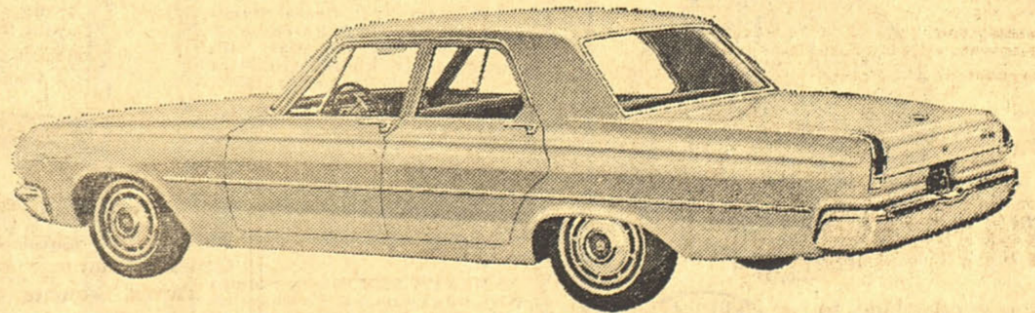
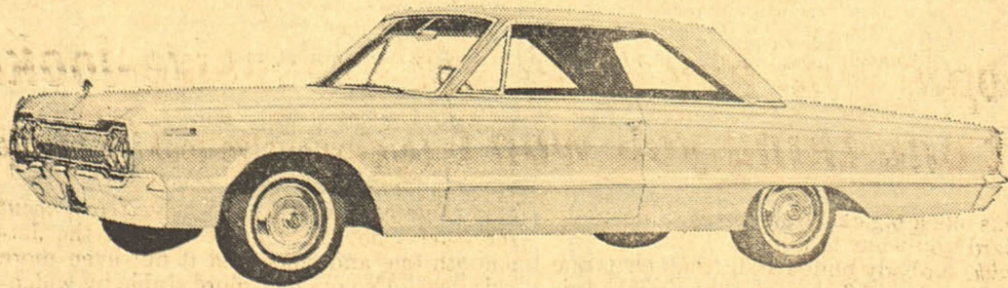
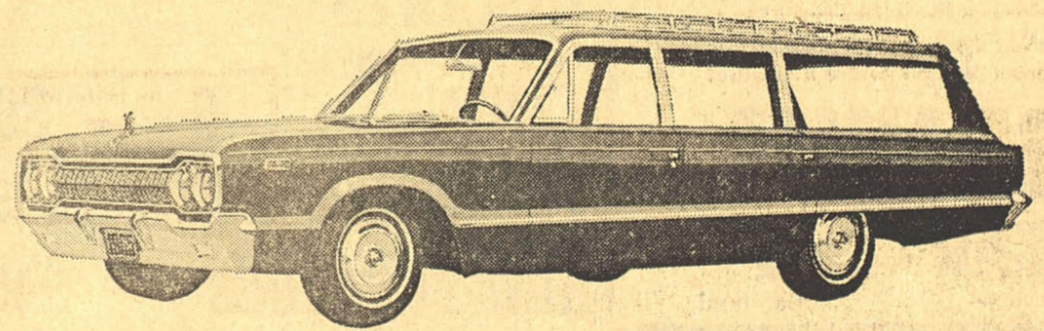
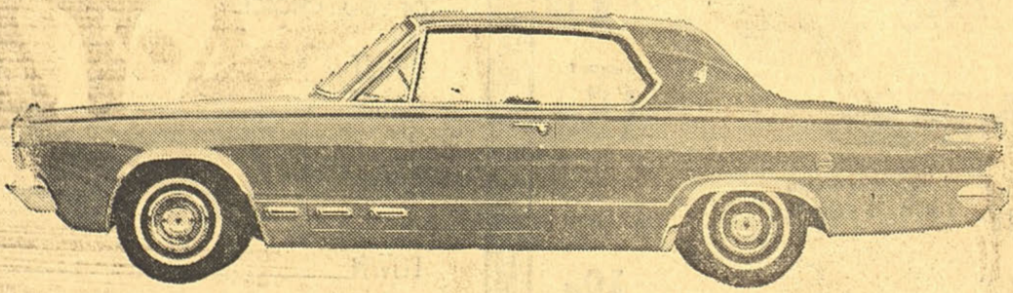


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FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH WILL OBSERVE NAT'L LIBRARY WEEK

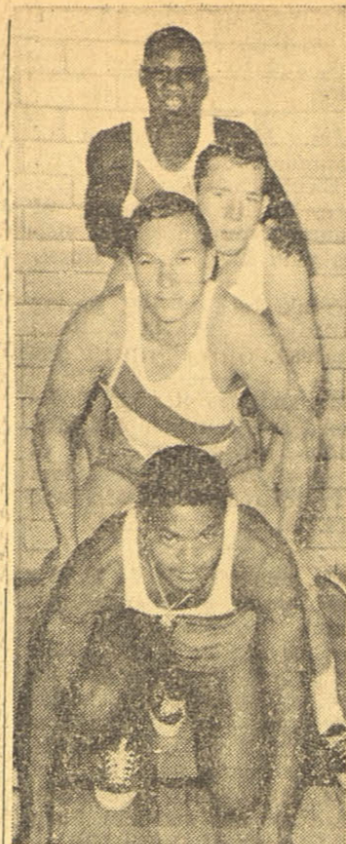

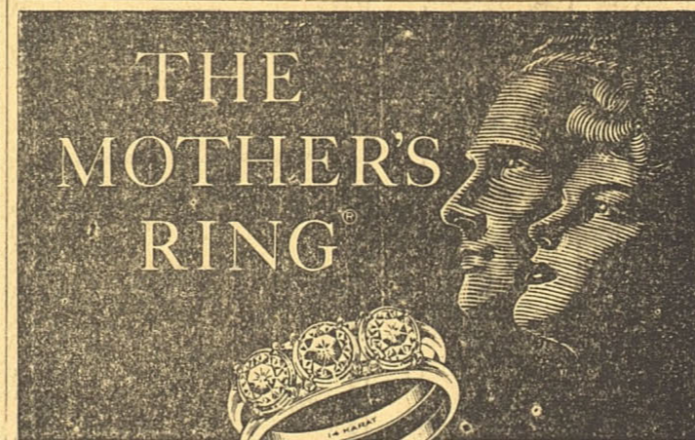
Abilene High Choir Concert Here Wednesday

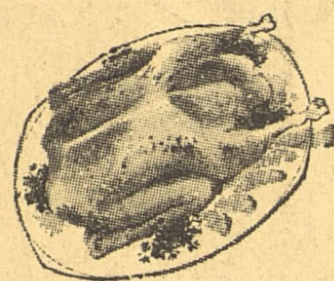

REPORT ON COUNTY FINANCES FOR 1963 and 1964

Article 1665, revised Civil Statutes of Texas requires that an annual financial report be made each April, copies of which shall be filed with the Commissioners Court and the District Judge of the County. Each time an annual audit is delivered to the Commissioners Court and the District Judge, the County Auditor shall send a report to the bonding company of each district, county and precinct officer showing the condition of that particular office (Acts 1955, 54th Leg.).

The above mentioned report was duly filed with the Eastland County Commissioners Court on Monday, April 12, 1965. As your County Judge and Budget Officer, I feel that the public might appreciate some comparisons and comment on this report and the financial condition of Eastland County for the past two years. These comparisons will be based upon the expenditure of funds and the payment of bonded indebtedness which concerns County-wide funds and no attempt is made to discuss receipts or disbursements for the individual precinct road and bridge funds.

On January 1, 1963 cash in all funds \$274,119.55; bonded indebtedness \$56,000.00, net \$218,119.55.

On January 1, 1964 cash in all funds \$220,925.53; bonded indebtedness \$41,000.00, net \$179,925.53.

On January 1, 1965 cash in all funds \$204,064.24; bonded indebtedness \$26,000.00, net \$178,064.24.

These figures reflect \$40,055.31 less net than was on hand on January 1, 1963. During the past 2 years Eastland County has been called upon to furnish right of way for the building of State Highways in the total amount of \$38,875.59. This sum reflects the actual net expenditure from the County-wide road and bridge fund over and above the amount shared by the State Highway Department. This right of way was used for State Highway 6 and 206 and the obligation to spend this money was incurred prior to January 1, 1963. Eastland County has always been willing to shoulder its fair share of State Highway right of way purchases. Other expenses which were over and above normal operating expenses include items such as a new photocopy machine costing something over \$10,000.00, to be used by the County Clerk's Office, ballot boxes, a camera for the Sheriff's Department, office furniture, air conditioners requested by various county offices. The total amount spent for these items for the past two years was \$12,743.19. While these items were costly they are still practically new and will provide good service for many years to come.

Also a number of costly elections were paid for by Eastland County as well as a rather large sum of money spent to cover the County's cost of holding lengthy criminal hearings in this county as well as \$1,683.54 paid Palo Pinto County for change of venue trial. During the years of 1963 and 1964 Eastland County has paid \$30,000.00 on its bonded indebtedness.

In conclusion, the County-wide net worth appears to be less on January 1, 1965 but the County has something to show for its money. The purchase of extensive right of way, expenditures for capital out lay, unusual expenses and criminal trials account for considerably more than that sum. Also our debt has been reduced from \$56,000.00 to \$26,000.00.

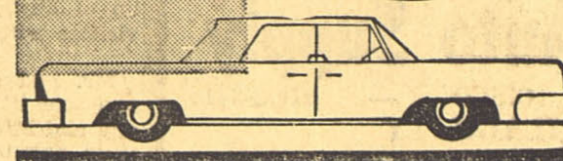
It is my sincere hope and desire that every tax payer will become familiar with the financial operations of our county. These records are open for inspection and a quarterly statement is published in one of the County papers every three months. Eastland County has an 80c per \$100.00 tax rate based on some of the lowest property values in the State of Texas.
