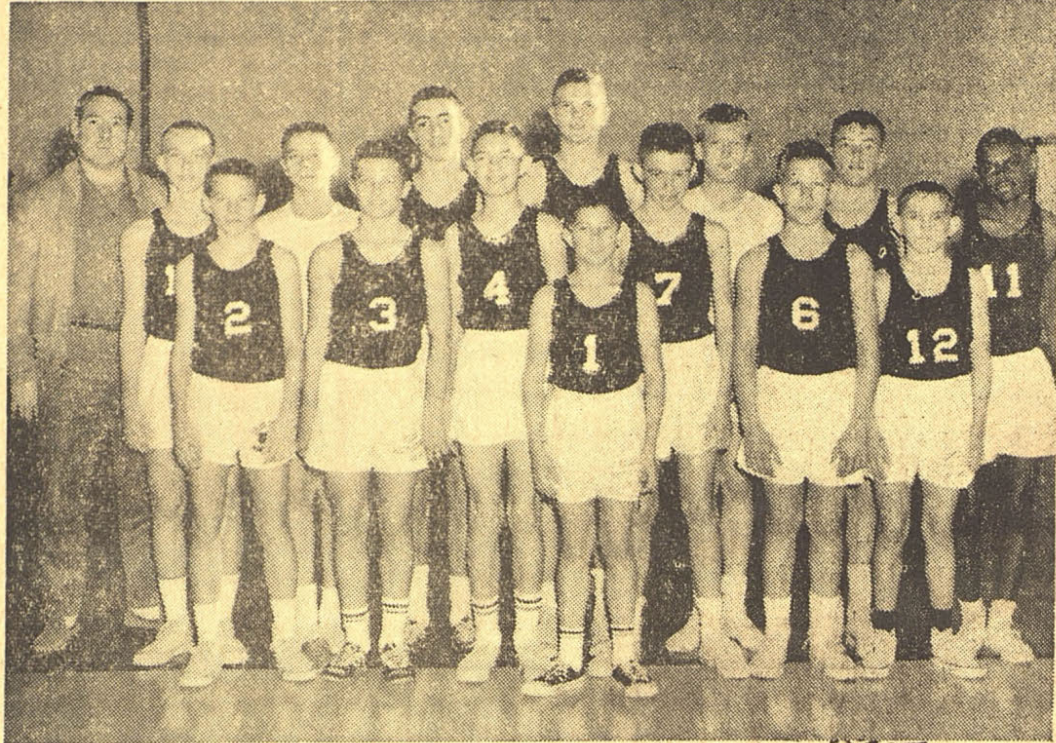

Services will be directed by the Rev. Almon Martin, pastor of the First Christian Church, and burial will be in the Oakwood Cemetery.

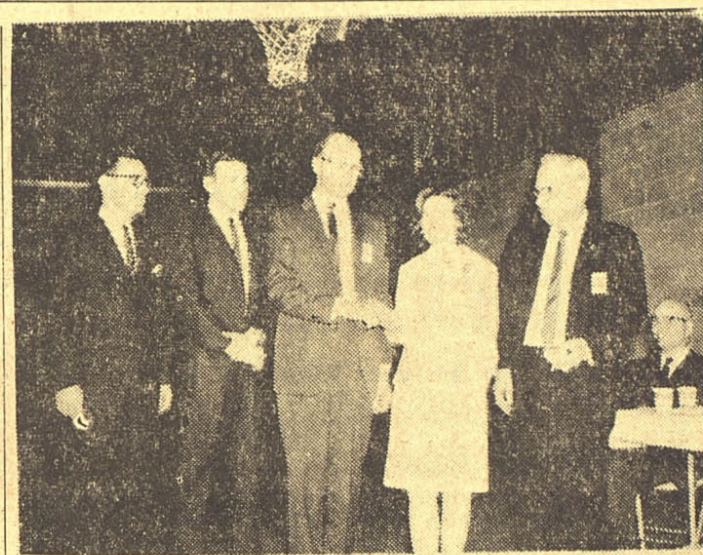

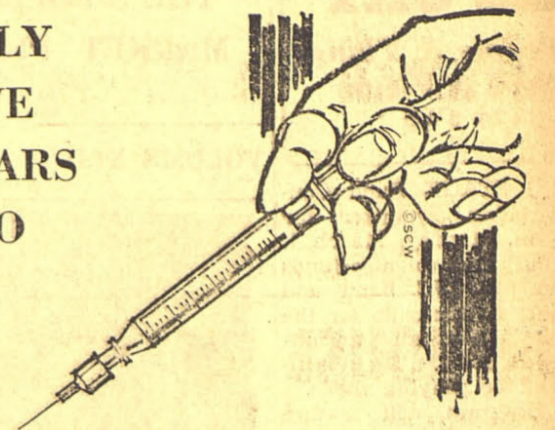

## Letters TO THE EDITOR

Ventura, Calif.  
February 10, 1965

Editor:

In my last letter I wrote about the big island of Hawaii which just about completed our tour excepting some smaller ones of our 50th State. Molokai, the fifth largest island, is called the "friendly isle," also sometimes called the "lonely isle" because they can boast of just over five thousand people. In most instances tourists by-pass the island in favor of the first four. It is only about twenty-five miles from Honolulu, and air service is good. Its shore line is very rugged and some land between the rugged hills and the ocean can be reached only by boats. Water is one of Molokai's problems but this is being solved by a large water development project. Ranching and pineapple growing are its principal industries.

At Kalaupapa, which is a peninsula jutting-out from the North shore, is located a colony for people suffering from Hansen's disease. King Kamehameha V selected the site and for over one hundred years it was a place of much misery and heartbreak, and almost closed to the outside world. Today conditions are very good and visitors are welcome at the settlement. This settlement may have helped build the large continuous cemetery stretched along the shore from the airport to Kalaupapa.

We did not go to Lanai, the "pineapple island." The Dole Hawaiian Pineapple Company owns practically all the island, which is one of great production for this well known company. Most of the 2,250 people are employed by Dole and live in Lanai City. It is about seventeen miles long and thirteen wide. We tried to see the Dole plant in Honolulu, which is always open to visitors, but were told the plant was shut-down because bad weather had kept the barges from bringing the pineapples from Lanai. We were told that many days 1,300,000 pineapples are loaded into the barges. That's lots of juice and canned pineapple. By the way visitors at the Dole plant are invited to drink all they can of fresh, cool pineapple juice drawn from several faucets along the office wall.

It seems there is a "homing instinct" in all of us, so when our final tour was complete, the question was asked, "When do we plan to go home?" The answer to the question was a trip to the Pan American office in Waikiki. Air service to Hawaii from the mainland and return is good. Travelers to the Northwest can fly by Northwest Air Lines to Seattle, Pan American and United have several flights daily to San Francisco and Los Angeles, and extra flights are arranged when there is a need. Canada, Australia, Japan and Britain have daily flights from Honolulu by their own air service companies. Flights from Honolulu to Tokyo, Hongkong and Singapore are announced in three languages; English, Japanese and Chinese. The Honolulu airport is a busy place and is truly the cross-roads between the East and West.

I asked for space on the PanAm flight leaving at 2:30 Tuesday afternoon, February 9. The young lady at the desk began hitting keys on an electronic gadget and immediately the machine began writing an answer. She asked the class of service and the number of seats I wanted. I told her and she again punched the keys and then the answer came back. She smiled and said, "Mr. Jackson, your seats have been confirmed." So quick and easy I could hardly believe this job was completed. The next question "How do you wish to pay for the tickets?" The only way I knew tickets could be sold to a fellow four thousand miles from home, so I replied, "Cash."

We sailed from Los Angeles to Honolulu on the Matson Lines, Lurline, in four and one-half days. We returned via PanAm jet in four and one-half hours. Both trips were wonderful, and if one has time let me suggest one way via ship. Air travel to Hawaii from the mainland is not expensive since one way for one person is only \$100.00. More expensive service is available. There are hotels and places to eat for every pocketbook, and each person can make that decision. Many folks will tell you not to go anywhere in the islands unless you have reservations.

This is not true because the only reservations we made were for transportation to Honolulu and return.

I found many interesting, friendly and helpful people in each place that we visited, and in every instance were glad we stopped there. One does not see the real Hawaii by staying in Waikiki because it is strictly for the tourist. In our case we took too many clothes for the trip, and I'm sure this is true with most everyone. All our baggage weighed in at 85 pounds for the flight home, including typewriter. One person is allowed forty-four pounds. We made the island trips with one small airline bag and we found it fun not to be bothered with a lot of gear.

Our 50th State has made remarkable progress since WW II and building continues at a brisk pace at this time. You will find traffic heavy in Honolulu at peak periods like Dallas or Houston. Don't take a lot of extras on your trip because you can buy all your favorite brands in each island. Don't use the expression "back in the States" when talking to a citizen of Hawaii. It is wiser to refer to the "Mainland." Hawaii is proud of her statehood.

We flew in at about 30,000 feet, all relaxed and comfortable. The crew kept us informed about weather conditions. Several cloud formations gave us a few minor bumps but mostly uneventful. It is a beautiful sight to ride high above heavy white clouds on a moonlight night. Makes one think of heavy snow on the mountain top.

The final beautiful sight was flying over Los Angeles with millions of lights shimmering below and seeming to welcome you home. As far as one can see is this fantasy of light. It cannot be described adequately with words.

It is good to be back in California. It will be better to be back in my hometown. Aloha for now. See you in about a week.

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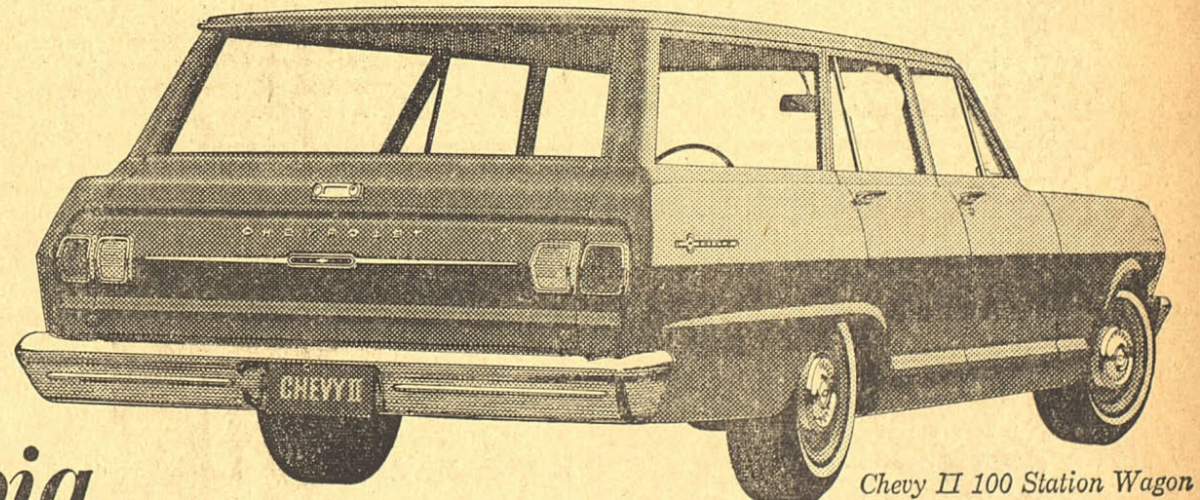
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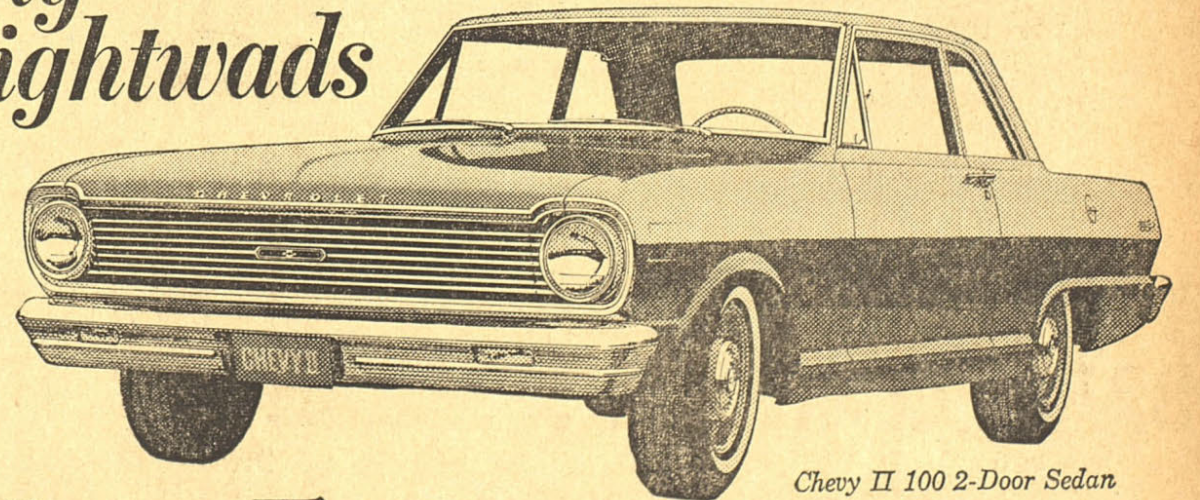
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
