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Birdbaths: Wooing Wildlife With Wetness

many wildlife lovers faithfully tend to the needs for food and shelter (seed. suet, birdhouses and evergreens) and forget the easiest service: the provision of water. Perhaps they sincerely believe that wildlife naturally finds ponds and streams to drink from and bathe in. But, of course, there are often few such natural water sources in most urban and suburban areas.

Since water is as vital to wildlife as it is to human life, providing a source close to home is one sure-fire way to draw wildlife to your yard. Let's, for the moment, by-pass the more complicated possible water provisions

(ponds, pools and fountains) and talk about the simplest source birdbaths:


Any shallow container will do from a 1/2-inch deep, 6-8 inch wide saucer (such as a flower pot base) to a traditional 2-21 y-foot pedestal-mounted birdbath (light enough in weight to be easily tilted to clean). Fill it with plain tap water (no additives, please!). Since it's useful for both drinking and bathing, keep it clean, hosing it with a pressure nozzle and or using a small. scrub brush every 2 or 3 days.

If one birdbath can make some wildlife feel welcome, think what several different kinds of birdbaths can draw to your yard! The bath-taking birds may particularly like the pedestalmounted bath that sits in the sun near protecting foliage (for escape in case a predator shows up). The toad will probably opt for the bath set in the flower bed or in the shade of low ground cover. The chipmunk and other wary animals may enjoy a water source What kind of wildlife will be drawn only if it's well-concealed among or in shrubbery. Besides serving wildlife well. a variety of birdbaths adds to your own pleasure of daily viewing several reflective small pools of water dotting your personal landscape.

The cause of vitiligo may involved heredity because 20 to 30 percent of those affected have family members with the disorder. New evidence suggests that an abnormal immune response by the body causes it to damage and kill its own melanin-producing cells.

If a light-skinned person has vitiligo and avoids suntanning, the disorder is hardly noticeable and treatment is not necessary. Understandably, people with dark skin usually are more concerned about treating the white patches. The possible embarrassment of being look at or talked about can result in serious psychological pro-

Special makeup, stains, and dyes can darken the white area. Beyond cosmetics, two treatments are available to obtain uniform skin color. One uses a drug to make the affected cells produce melanin over a two- to five-year period, which obviously requires pa-

The other treatment takes the opposite approach of destroying all cells that produce melanin. Eliminating all pigment means a person must avoid direct sunlight or use a strong sunscreen for





Texas, Bravo Battery was tested under the Army Training Evaluation Program (ARTEP) by evaluators from Ft. Hood's 2nd Armored Division, The ARTEP is a 72 hour non-stop field problem designed to test every aspect of a unit's ability to fight on the modern battlefield. In order to achieve a satisfactory rating, an artillery battery must complete a minimum of 80 percent of all gunnery tasks, receive satisfactory ratings of 80 percent or better in tactical operations, and pass 100 percent of all

86.7 percent. B Battery completed 89.7 percent of all gunnery tasks, 84 percent in tactics, and 100 percent in special operations for an overall score of 91.7 percent. A score of 90 or better is considered outstan-

ding.

Among the tasks included in the ARTEP are chemical warfare defensive operations, delivery of field artillery fires on both planned targets and targets of opportunity, tacktical convoys, and battery defenses. Upon validation of the ARTEP by the U.S. Army Forces Command (FORSCOM), the battery will be awarded a C-2 rating. This means that the unit is combat ready with less than 30 days training re-

quired after mobilization. This is the same combat readiness rating given to most stateside Active Army units. The battery commander, Captain John Morre of Lewisville, stated, "The individual effort and teamwork displayed by every man in the battery during eh

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
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

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WHAT'S NEW In Medicine

The old cliche is "Mind over Matter" - but when it comes to good health, mind and body both matter.

A study by the California Hospital Association in 1976 revealed that 80% or more of all hospitalizations are directly related to lifestyleun-healthy diets, lack of physcial exercise, smoking, drug and alcohol abuse and accidents. These habits can be traced back to difficulties in coping with lifestyle.

Psychosomatic illiness such as hypertension, ulcers, headaches, back pain, even diseases such as diabetes can be a result of not dealing with mental health problems effectively.

The sytoms of both diabetes and hypoglycemia, which are physcial disorders, include depression, anxiety, paranoia and sudden mood swings, according to the American Diabetes Association. In addition, the American Heart Association lists stress as a risk factor in heart attack and stroke and recommends physical exercise as a way to releive stress.

The mind/body relationship all goes back to the body's "Fight or Flight" response. When we are under stress, a mental reaction to stimulus, the body also reacts. The muscles contract, and it may be difficult to sleep, there may be eat, and drugs and alcohol

In fact, the President's Council on Fitness says fitness'...relates to how you look and how you feel, and because the body is not a compartment seperate from the mind, it relates to how you feel mentally as well as physically.'

Wellness programs that have proliferated across the country are helping to increase awareness of the realationship between physical and mental health. Although difficult to measure, employee wellness programs inevitably claim to increase productivity, improve morale and reduce absenteeism.

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

#### New Budget Studied At County Meeting

Eastland County Commissioners held lengthy meetings Monday, July 8, and major items of business were attempts to formulate a budget the County can afford. The current budget is running around two and onehalf million dollars annually, and various new demands are upon it.

Present at the meetings in Commissioner's Courtroom was Comm. Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. County Judge Scott Bailey presid-

First on the agenda were requests for pipeline crossings of County roads. Approval was granted to Allstate Petroleum to cross County Rd. 239 in Pct. 3 with a pipeline.

Approval was also granted for Ray Ritchie Co. to cross County Rd. 104 in Pct. 4 with a gas line. This crossing is north of Cisco on Hwy. 6 at the first dirt road north of Lake Cisco dam.

Another request was approved for a pipeline crossing in Pct. 2 in the southeast corner of the County. This was brought by Sun-Key Oil Co. for County Rd. 495. The location was described as being north of Howard Cemetery and south of Rattlesnake Mountain.

A request was approved for a line-itme budget amendment for District Clerk Mary Jane Brown. This was for part-time help in her office.

The structural evaluation on the Courthouse was in, and it was reported that the building had considerable damage. This was apparently from the May 24 blast. The Commissioners discussed possible ways to repair the

damage listed, which included walls in the County Extension offices, the ASCS office, and a floor crack in the Tax Collectors office. Windows and dangling light fixtures

have been repaired.

At this time the Commissioners recevied the remainder of the annual county budget requests, stating that they would like to "round them up" by August and have everything in place by the deadline of Oct. 1.

The Child Welfare Department requested \$2,000 instead of the \$1,000 in the past. This appeared to get a favorable reception.

County Sheriff Don Underwood then presented the Court with his budget for the 1985-86 fiscal year. Among the requests was an additional jailer and two additional deputies, which he stated would reduce overtime pay. His budget, as proposed, would run around \$375,000 annually. Last year's budget was \$243,000.

The Commissioners indicated that before they could approve any large rise in expenditures from any of the county departments they would need more information from Eastland County Tax Appraiser Steve Thomas and the tax rolls. This would determine the income they county could ex-

Judge Scott Bailey menioned the new ten-percent levy the county will have to pay on indigent health care, as legislated in Austin recently. This must be taken into account.

The Commissioners inspected the damaged area of the Courthouse at the end of the morning session.

In the afternoon meeting there was considerable work on items of the budget. A number of items listed, however, did not appear to be necessities. The Commissioners stated that the county apparently owes for these purchases, but the money needed to be found before the bills were paid.

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
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## In Highway Construction

Yes, Virginia, you can have a say in where and how a highway is built.

Contrary to popular perception, highway construction projects are not dreamed up by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation on its own. In reality, they have their beginnings in requests by local city and county elected officials. Sometimes they have their origins with private sector groups, such neighborhood associations. But all are based on demonstrated needs.

(ED. NOTE: Why don't Eastland County and City officials "ask for" for a major highway through here from the Panhandle to the Coast?)

Although department planners make every effort to evaluate local needs and to match local projects to local situations, occasionally a project will turn out to have an unexpected, perhaps unsuspected, imact. And frequently this is brought to the planners' attention through the public involvement process.

"It has always been the policy of this department to be responsive to the transportation needs of the people of Texas," said DHT Engineer-Director Mark Goode, "and the public involvement process is one way we can assure the people that that we are listen-

Simply stated, the process is the means by which the department planners seek to gain public input - ideas, viewpoints, recommendations - on highway and public transportation projects which have been requested by local officials or private citizens.

Informal, public meetings are scheduled when a prostages, often before a route is even determined, to give local residents and businessmen an opportunity to learn about the project and express their views.

Citizens are encouraged to participate in the planning process and they often bring to light special needs or useful ideas. Following the

meeting, department engineers carefully study the statements, giving each full and fair consideration, and frequently incorporating ideas into plans and designs.

Once planning is fairly ject is still in the formative well along and workable project alternatives have been developed, the public is again invited to participate in the process. This is done by advertising an "opportunity for public hearing" in the news media.

If a citizen requests that a public hearing be held, the time and place of the hearing is widely publicized to en-

courage maximum participation. The public hearing is more formal than a public meeting and follows a format required by the federal government.

answer questions about the project. The audience has the opportunity to make statements - as many as it takes to air out the subject. The proceedings are recorded verbatim and become part of the project records.





And so, the next day, at 11:30 a.m., we joined him and the two couples for the


ceremony there.

Captain Wu knows his business, takes it seriously and does an excellent job at it. This is clearly the first impression one gets about him.

He spent the first 40 years of his life in China. He said he had been Captain of the S.s. Constitution for 38 years so I reasoned he had to be at least 78 years of age, which he certainly didn't look or

Asked if he had a family, he replied that he had once been married, but that now he is marreid to the Constitu-

He told that he rises each morning at 5:30; takes care of the ship business; walks two miles a day; handles all ship protocol; attends 8:00 evening dinner; hosts one party each evening before dinner for pictures; attends and participates at times in the 10 p.m. show each evening; and then usually caps the evening off by appearing at the "top of the ship" Starlight Lounge. Their excellent vocal stylist pianist Rene Paulo, breaks out in the Captain's favorite, Liebestraum, each time he comes in.

The soft-spoken Captain emphasizes and reemphsizes the safety of the ship. He doesn't feel cruise ships are made for stability as they once were, as when the Constitution was built.

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
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
The new ones, he says, are beautiful, with beautiful dining views but not nearly as smooth sailing.

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
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## COUNTY HISTORY...

DESDEMONA

Blair's Fort seems to have been the fore-runner of Desdemona. W.C. McGough, in his unpublished memoirs now in the possession of his widow, gives the following account of its building and occupants. 

AUSTIN - Economy-minded state officials were joyful last week when the Navy announced it would build the much sought after homeport for a new battleship at Corpus Christi.

The Houston-Galveston area, which had survived cuts to make it to the final three, will also get several attendant ships in its area as the U.S. builds a 600-ship Navy.

The Texas Legislature this spring appropriated \$25 million for improvements to the Corpus Christi base site to help lure the Navy base to the Lone Star State.

Jobs and money from the Navy construction are expected to spill over to the entire state, including annual spending of \$174 million and 7,140 permanent jobs for a total economic impact for Texas of onequarter of a billion dollars.

Specifically, the Navy will put the battleship USS Wisconsin, a missile carrier, a missile destrover, a minesweeper and aircraft carrier at Corpus Christi.

And a Defense Department report indicates other Pentagon spending in Texas will total more than \$32 billion this

Saturn Project

Meanwhile, Texas still awaits word on whether General Motors Corp. will select this state as the site of the new Saturn plant.

Other state legislatures still in session are developing their incentives to GM, which will probably make the announcement sometime in mid-July. The Texas Legislature approved a package of service incentives which included new roads and transportation facilities. Sherman, Texas is

thought to be a prime site. U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, though, said last week that a lack of positive signals from GM is discouraging.

But GM officials said when a decision has been reached, they will personally notify top officials of some three dozen states before making a public announcement.


