The failure of the grain farmer and elevator managers to deduct the two pounds per thousand and membership dues its he primary reason for the trouble.

The GSPA board of directors met in Amarillo recently and developed its most aggresive program and the largest program and largest program and leadership has come at a time when it is least able to do so because of apparent farmer or renewal of dues, Harp added "Even though we

In fact, without additional farmer and agril-business support, much of the existing association programs will be curtailed or completely.







The important thing is that tourists themselves should make the year a success by their effort to understand the people of the countries they tour. If they secceed in promoting world friendliness, they will make the \$11 billion spen for intercountry travel last year seem a wise investment. The sum should be greatly increased in 1967 through UN's sponsorship of a year-which files on its banner the slogan, "Tourism, Passport to Peace."
