## Auto License Plates For 1962 Now on Sale

Auto license plates for 1962 are now on sale at the Callahan County courthouse, it was reported Thursday by Albert Lovell, tax assessor-collector. Mr. Lovell said that license plates were also available at the office of A. J. McCuin, Cross Plains.

Mr. Lovell pointed out that the Texas Title Act requires that the auto or truck owner present his certificate of title and the previous registration receipt before a new license can be issued.

He urged all owners of cars and trucks to check to be sure they had the required papers in their possession. In the event the title certificate has been lost, a form may be secured at the collectors office and for 25c a duplicate will be issued. It usually takes about a week to get the duplicate from the Texas Highway Department.

Sgt. Vaughan, 42, was born at Union City, Tenn., on May 22, 1919. He died on Jan. 9, 1962 and was buried Jan. 12, at Fort Benning Cemetery with full military honors. Military personnel served as pallbearers.

He entered the Army in 1938, and at the time of his death, was serving with the 35th Ordnance Detachment, a small arms repair unit attached to the 7th Ordnance Battalion. Among his decorations were the Distinguished Service Cross, Silver Star Medal, Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross, Bronze Star Medal, Air Medal with four Oak Leaf Clusters and the Purple Heart with one Oak Leaf Cluster.

In addition to his sister, Mrs. Wylie in Baird, Sgt. Vaughan is survived by his wife of Phenix City; a daughter, Sharon, who lives in Florida, and a brother, Paul T. Vaughan of Detroit, Mich.

## Sen. Tom Creighton Seeks Re-Election

Senator Creighton recently was elected Chairman of the Election Law Study Committee, which has as its purpose the modernization and revision of the Texas Election Code.

## Advance Payments On Grain Feed

Producers who participate in the 1962 Feed Grain Program are entitled to payments for diverting acreage from production of corn and grain sorghum, according to Tommie Harris, chairman, County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. Up to half of the estimated payment to be earned may be paid in advance when the producer signs up under the program.

Chairman Harris said this program provisions should be of substantial benefit to growers who can use some extra ready cash during the spring planting season. Signup for the program runs from February 5 through March 30.

The program offers payments to producers for diversion of feed grain cropland to approved soil conserving uses. The program is voluntary, but farmers who cooperate must divert a minimum acreage in order to be eligible for price support on the normal production of their 1962 crop corn and grain sorghum acreage.

Farm payment rates will vary according to the farm's productivity in relation to the county acreage productivity and the number of acres diverted.

The minimum acreage for diversion from corn or grain sorghum will be figured from the "farm base" which is determined from the average acreage on the farm used in producing the crop in 1959-60. The minimum reduction is 20 per cent of the base. Farmers who are interested in participating in the 1962 feed grain program should get in touch with the county ASCS office at their earliest convenience.

## New Contracts Awarded School Administrators Monday Night

New contracts were awarded to the administrators of Baird schools Monday night, as school board members met for the regular monthly meeting.

Board President Roy Gilbreath reported that a new three year contract was given School Superintendent L. B. Howard, and a two year contract extensions were given Ed Cotton, high school principal, and Winn Talley, grade school principal.

President Gilbreath also reported that Coach Vernon Townsend was given an extension of one year to his present contract, giving him two years after the end of the present school year.

Following the meeting, Supt. Howard announced that the board had approved a Driver

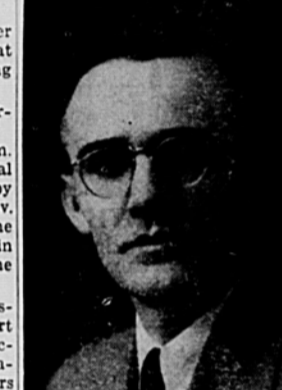

## Citizens Purchase \$164,460 in Bonds

During 1961, citizens of Callahan County purchased \$164,460.00 in Savings Bonds. This represents 78.3 percent of the county's sales goal.

This announcement was made by Howard E. Farmer, Chairman of the Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee.

The total bond purchases in Texas during 1961 were \$155,694,292 which represents 94.3 percent of the goal for the state. Sales for 1961 represent approximately 2 percent increase over 1960 for the state.

Nationally, 1961 bond sales were 4 percent above 1960 at the same time, but were 10 percent below 1960.

# COUNTY OFFICE CONTESTS DEVELOP

Several contested races for county offices will add spice to the political picture for Callahan County during the year. A report released Tuesday morning by County Democratic Chairman A. E. Dyer Jr., following the deadline for announcements, showed that hot races could be expected for the county and district clerk post, the county judges job and for several precinct offices.

Three candidates had filed for both the clerks' post and the judges job. Clerk candidates include Beatrice Deal, Royce White and Sarah M. McCowen. Mrs. Deal is a deputy in the sheriff's office and Mr. White is an accountant with Check Chevrolet in Baird. Mrs. McCowen is a resident of Cross Plains.

Lowell Boyd, Baird groceryman, is a candidate for the post of county judge. He ran a close

race for the spot in the last election. Other candidates for Judge Farmer's job are C. Lee Smith of Eula and Byron Richardson of Cross Plains.

In another interesting race, Scott Bailey of Cisco and Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge are to tangle for the recently created 63rd district of the Texas House of Representatives. Mr. Bailey is now serving the Eastland, Callahan, Shackelford County district, and Gibbens is serving the district of Bailey's three counties. The two districts were combined following the 1960 census because of a loss of population by both districts.

Another race of interest in the county is for the post of county commissioner of Precinct No. 4, which includes the Cross Plains area. Chairman Dyer said that 11 men had officially filed for the job.

Callahan County Tax Assessor Collector Albert Lovell said this week that 2,008 county residents had paid their 1962 poll taxes and that 30 youths who had reached their 21st birthday had applied for exemptions. This compares with 1,443 paid in 1961 and 2,128 in 1960.

The poll tax payments were broken down by communities as follows: Baird, 531; Cottonwood, 42; Belle Plain, 8; Clyde, 462; Cross Plains, 535; Admiral 27; Putnam, 125; Eula, 113; Dudley, 22; Atwell, 21; Lanham, 12; Opheim, 54; Rowden, 23 and Denton Valley, 33. Exemptions for 21-year olds were as follows: Baird 10; Clyde, 9; Cross Plains, 4; Putnam 5 and Eula 2.

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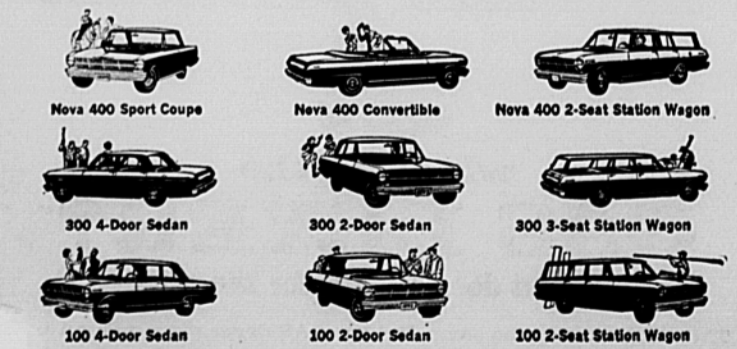
