RANGER MAN IS OUT FOR TAX ASSESSOR W. J. Herrington of Ranger who is better known as Bill Herrington authorizes the Daily News to announce his candidacy for the office of Tax Assessor. Mr. Herrington has been in school work in this county for the last seven years. He is at present principal of the Central Ward school in Ranger. In connection with his announcement Mr. Herrington issues the following statement: "I hereby announce my candidacy for county tax assessor, subject to the action of the Democratic primaries. "I was born and reared in Eastland county, and have been connected with the schools of this county for seven years. For the past three years I have been with the Ranger schools, serving one year as principal of Tiffin Ward and the last two years as principal of Central Ward.
