Hosting the reception will be the mayor and other Stenholm coordinators from

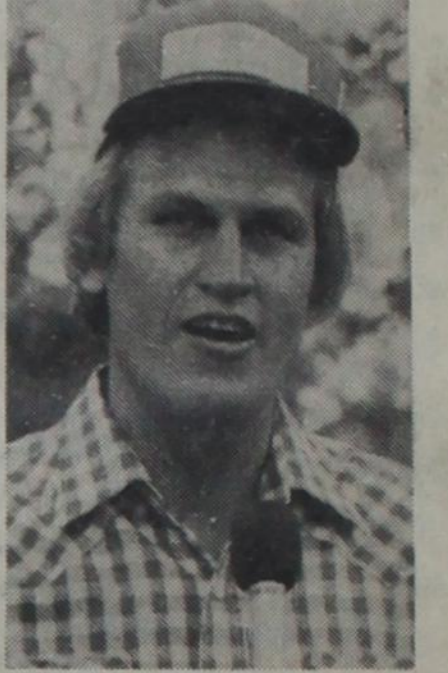
Cisco, including Dick Woolley, W.B. Wright Jr., Truman Kirk, Mabel Fletcher, and Brad Kimbrough.

Miniature Golf Tourney Set Here

The Kiwanis Club of Cisco, which operates the Miniature Golf Course at Lake Cisco Park, announces details of the summer Tournament, which will be held during regular hours on June 29, 30, and July 5, 6, and 7.

Anyone playing during those days is eligible to enter. The course is open at 4 p.m., Friday, Saturday, and Sunday.

Four special golf trophies are offered to those who play during the Tournament and turn in a signed card. No special fees will be charged to enter. Regular admission is \$1.00 for adults; those under 12 years, 50 cents.

The trophies will be awarded as follows:

(1) Singles trophy - ladies and (2) Singles trophy - men/boys. Turn in a signed/witnessed score card by the 10 p.m. deadline Sunday night, July 7. Low score wins; a tie will be broken by matching hole-by-hole scores on the tied cards.

(3) Blind Bogey trophy: You do not need to score well to win. The winner will be determined by a number

drawing. The Blind Bogey number drawn will be subtracted from your score; if the result is PAR (59) you have a winner. Ties will be broken as mentioned above.

Team Trophy (Low Ball): A team may have two, three or four players. Turn in a signed/witnessed score card by the 10 p.m., Sunday night deadline. The teams low-ball score card is then made up for the 18 holes using only one of the member's score (the lowest) for each hole. Thus the team low-ball score may be 30 or so.

If two or three teams are tied, the trophy will be awarded by matching hole-by-hole scores on the low-ball card.

These special trophies and runner-up prizes will be awarded the weekend following the Tournament.

The Kiwanis Club, which operates the golf course as a community service, invites the public out to this cool, pleasant setting for a lot of fun for all ages. The course will be well lighted in the evenings, and a number of players are expected to attend.

Mobley Restoration Work To Begin Within 10 Days

Work on restoration of the old Mobley Hotel as the first of the world-wide Hilton chain is expected to begin within ten days, President Eris Ritchie of the Conrad Hilton Memorial Park and Community Center announced Thursday.

The center's board of directors held a three and a half hour meeting last Tuesday with Architect Gordon Marchant who was given authority to finalize a construction contract. Board officials and the architect had held several meetings with the contractor, Mr. Ritchie said.

Bids for a construction contract were opened a month ago but action was withheld as the low bid was considered too high, Mr. Ritchie said. In the meetings with the contractor, some changes were made in the plans "to take out frills, and we have reached the point where we will be able to accomplish what we desire with the funds at our disposal," he added.

Mr. Ritchie said the board was exploring ideas to raise additional money that will go

into the corporation's perpetual care fund for the restored Hilton Mobley.

The Conrad Hilton Foundation has appropriated the sum of 1.2 million dollars for the Cisco project. The foundation purchased the Mobley building from the University

of Houston Foundation and the structure has been deeded to the Cisco corporation, a non-profit organization.

Mr. Ritchie said plans call for the architect to return for a meeting probably on July 3rd after final details worked out June 26th are completed.

One Of Four Burglary Suspects Makes Bond

One of the four men arrested on charges of burglarizing Cisco buildings and homes has been released from the county jail after posting a \$10,000 bond, according to records at the sheriff's office Friday.

Darrell Wayne Boyd, 25, was released Wednesday after making bond, the report showed. Still in jail Friday morning were Gary Don Walker, 24, Jerry Cross, 18, and Charles Ray Northcutt, 18. Their bonds were set at \$10,000 each.

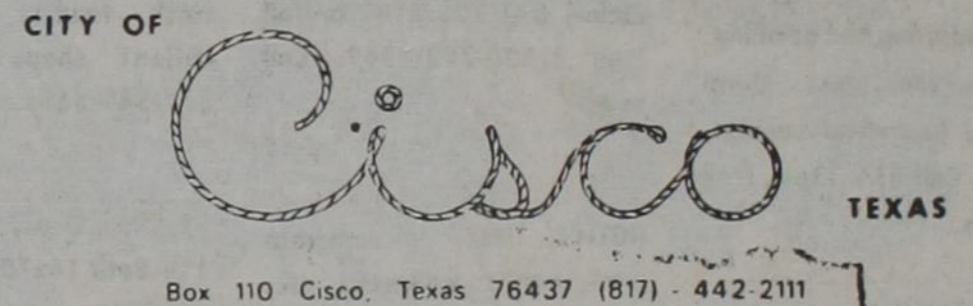
Detective Sergeant Tom Barrett reported that local police were continuing their investigation and that addi-

tional property missing after the break-ins has been recovered. Chief Billy Rains and Policeman R.D. Kirkland are working with Mr. Barrett in the investigation. Mr. Kirkland, formerly employed as a detective by the Electra Police Department, joined the Cisco police force in April.

Mr. Barrett said there is a possibility that all or part of the four suspects will be given polygraph tests at a later date. Police still expect to make one or more additional arrests.

The police department reported that "everything was quiet with no arrests" during the past week.

Dear Citizens of Cisco:

Ambulance service for a community is something we rarely think about seriously until such time as we need it desperately. Then, in many cases, no dollar value could be placed on our being able to pick up a telephone, and in a short time have an emergency vehicle manned by trained personnel at our doorstep.

Four years ago this summer, the City Council elected to provide a franchise to Patterson Ambulance Service to operate in the City of Cisco, with the service to be funded primarily through a subscription membership program. Despite a declining membership, Patterson Ambulance has been able to continue operation without one cent of subsidy through tax dollars from the City of Cisco.

It is again time for all of us to buy or renew our annual membership subscriptions from the ambulance service. Membership subscriptions will be sold throughout the month of July. Homemaking Hints

Planning to go on a vacation? Have you ever been guilty of gaining 5-10 pounds while on vacation? While eating out is not in itself bad, it does create special problems in terms of weight control such as planning for meals away from home, selecting restaurants that offer low calorie food choices and selecting wisely from the menu.

When possible choose a restaurant with a varied menu. establishments featuring a variety of menu items as salads, broiled meats and lighter entrees are preferable to those specializing in fried foods

and foods prepared in sauces and gravies.

Cafeterias, oriental restaurants and soup and salad bars serve food well suited to the calorie conscious eater.

Cafeterias offer a variety of foods to mix and match as you please. Order whatever suits your calorie-conscious diet, such as all vegetables or a salad plate. Remember that baked or broiled lean beef, poultry or fish are your best selections. Stay away from fried meats and vegetables.

Oriental restaurants serve low calorie vegetable dishes and stir fried entrees that

are prepared using small amounts of fat.

Soup and salad bars are a wise choice if you make careful selections. Salad dressings can add up to 100 calories per tablespoon. Cream soups contain more calories than soups with clear broth. Butter or margarine added to bread is another source of extra calories. One tablespoon of butter or margarine adds 100 calories to that piece of bread or baked potato.

Many people eat meals at fast food restaurants. Fast food establishments have limited menus and generally specialize in fried foods, milk shakes, and other high-calorie selections. Even in fast-food restaurants you make lower calorie choices. The following tips will help cut calories:

- Select broiled or grilled meat. If it is breaded and fried, remove the breading.
- Add generous servings of lettuce and tomatoes. These add nutrients-few calories.
- Patronize the salad bar. Oil and vinegar is a good low-calorie dressing.
- Avoid fried potatoes and onion rings.
- Drink skim Milk instead of milk shakes. Orange juice is

available and is high in Vitamin C and low in calories. Diet beverages, coffee, tea and water are food choices.

Avoid thick tartar sauces or mayonnaise-based dressings. Use mustard for flavor without the added calories.

Have a good vacation and make low-calorie eating a part of your daily life for good nutrition and good health.

Recipe for the Week

Cucumbers are now in season. From the many calls I have been getting for pickle recipes, I know many of you have an abundant supply.

The Texas Agriculture Extension Service has available two free bulletins on pickling. The names of these publications are "Quick Pickles and Relishes" and "Brined Pickles". To receive a copy, call Janet Thomas, Eastland County Extension Home Economist, at 629-2222.

Sweet Crisp Pickles

- 7 pounds medium-sized cucumbers
- 2 cups slaked lime
- 2 gallons water
- 2 quarts vinegar
- 4½ pounds sugar
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 1 teaspoon mixed pickling spices
- 1 teaspoon whole cloves
- 1 teaspoon celery seed

Slice cucumbers in ¼-inch slices. Place cucumbers in an enameled pan or a crock. Cover with solution of lime and water (get lime from grocery store). Soak for 24 hours. Rinse pickles through several changes of cold water. Cover with fresh cold water and soak for 3 hours. Drain.

Make mixture of other ingredients. Add cucumbers and let stand overnight. The next day, boil for 40 minutes, pack into hot sterilized jars, and seal. (This recipe may also be used for sliced green tomatoes or for watermelon rind.) Process in boiling water bath for 5 minutes.

Resident and non-resident Texas hunting licenses will cost more in 1985-86 as a result of action by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission last week.

Commission Chairman Ed Cox Jr. said the commission members all regretted having to raise license fees, but additional revenue is required to maintain Parks and Wildlife Department functions during the coming year.

The most dramatic increases were for nonresidents hunting licenses, with the general nonresident license price raised from \$100.75 to \$200 and the nonresident small game license from the current \$37.75 to \$75.

Staff members told the commission that the increased fees bring the cost of Texas nonresident licenses more in line with those in other states, and especially those states which provide the bulk of hunters visiting Texas.

All the increases will be effective Sept. 1, 1985. Licenses for the 1985-85 seasons will be available from department offices and retail outlets by August, officials said.

Other license fees increased are: resident combination hunting/fishing from \$12 to \$15; resident hunting, \$8 to \$10; resident hunting exempt, \$5 to \$6; hunting duplicate, \$5 to \$6, and temporary nonresident fishing, \$7 to \$8.

The \$8 resident fishing license fee will remain unchanged for 1985-85, as will the \$15 nonresident annual fishing license. However, staff members said additional revenue is expected from a \$5 saltwater fishing stamp and a \$5 freshwater trout stamp authorized by the Texas Legislature this year.

Council Considers Four-Way Stop Along West 13th

Decisions to place four-way stop signs at the intersection of West 13th and Avenue N, as well as placing a number of stop signs along Avenue E, were tabled until July 9 by the Cisco City Council during their regular meeting Tuesday night.

City Manager Moore was instructed to draw up an emergency ordinance concerning the four-way stop

and bring it back to the council. The need for a four-stop was decided due to numerous accidents at that intersection.

Presently, along Avenue N, there are yield signs at West 13th and West 14th. The new ordinance, if approved, will do away with the yield signs at both intersections.

At the intersection of West 13th and Avenue N, they will

be replaced with the four-way stop, but at 14th and Avenue N, there will be no sign on Avenue N. Instead, stop signs will be erected along West 14th.

Since the ordinance will be in emergency form, it will only need one reading and approval by the council to go into effect.

On Tuesday night's agenda was an ordinance calling

for the placement of stop signs at intersections along Avenue E from West 3rd Street to West 13th. The council seemed in agreement that West 14th and West 17th intersections should also be included in the ordinance.

City Manager Moore was instructed to revise the ordinance and its approval was tabled until the next regular council meeting.

The council also agreed to change the city's sanitation pickup schedules, on a 60-day trial basis, to do away with Saturday service. Those customers who presently get service on Wednesdays and Saturdays will be combined with the customers receiving service on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

City Manager Moore said, "I feel we can provide as good, if not better, service." He said the employees feel it will be no problem to combine the two routes.

The new schedule will go into effect "on or about August 1."

The council approved the first reading of an ordinance providing that Olson Street for one-half block north and south of East 10th Street be vacated, abandoned and closed. The ordinance will have to undergo one more

reading before it will go into effect, if approved.

The testing of soil on an 81.5 acre tract of land for potential use as a landfill site was not very favorable, according to city manager Moore. He said the tests showed that only about 12 acres of the area would be suitable for a landfill.

He recommended the council begin pursuing another site.

In other action, Mr. Moore informed the council that the month of May was a "heavy cash flow month" for the city, since it involved three pay days.

He also said the water tower re-painting project and the water distribution projects are both coming along nicely. The tower's exterior is almost finished and contractors were saying they would be finished by Friday.

City crews are seal coating Avenue L from West 8th Street to the I-20 access road. Mr. Moore said he is establishing a priority list for streets to be seal coated this year and he will submit it to the council for approval at a later date.

He said he has interviewed two persons about the possibility of being a "fixed base operator" at the Cisco

airport. He said one of the individuals seems promising and he hopes to be able to address the council at the July 9 meeting with a proposal.

City Hall needs to consider some type of security measures to be provided. Moore said the Police Department has already been secured with steel doors being placed at the en-

trances.

City office employees have been advised to look desks at night and make sure all windows are closed and locked. Mr. Moore said he would like to look at securing the upstairs portion of the building and placing some type of barred doors at the front and back entrances.

Mayor Eris Ritchie told

him to make a proposal and place it on the agenda for future consideration.

Council members Bobby Ingram, Joe Besselaar, Bill Roberts, Brad Kimbrough, and Linton Batteas were present for the meeting, along with Mayor Ritchie. Roy Dennis was the only member absent.

Street Dept. Begins Paving

The City Street Department has begun a summer paving program on Avenue L, repaving from Eighth Street south for several blocks, City Manager Mike Moore reported. Plans call for Avenue L to be repaved to connect with the pavement at I-20 access road, he added.

After work on Avenue L is completed, paving work is expected to move to the northwest part of town to refinish paved streets. Work on east side streets also is expected in the summer program.

Mr. Moore said the city hopes to include 50 or 60 blocks of streets in the 1985 summer program. A similar amount of paving work was

accomplished by Supervisor Frank Young's crew last year.

The street work is financed in part by income from oil royalties from city-owned lands.

Forty Percent Of State's Residents May Have Diabetes

As many as 40 per cent of the state's more than 15,000,000 residents may be suffering from diabetes in some form, according to Herb Owens, Abilene, in a talk last Wednesday noon at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club.

"Diabetes is known as the 'hidden' disease," Mr. Owens said. "Unless the sufferer's condition becomes serious, he or she may not know they have it."

Mr. Owens noted that there are two types of diabetes. Type I affects mostly children and young people and it can be controlled with insulin injections, he said. Type II affects adults and senior citizens who often lose limbs, suffer from heart

ailments or other chronic conditions, he added.

Mr. Owens said that 370,000 persons die in the United States each year from diabetes.

The speaker, a prominent Abilene Lion and a past district governor, appeared here in a statewide diabetes awareness program sponsored by Texas Lions. The clubs of the state carry on a summer program at their Kerrville Camp for Crippled and Diabetic Children each year.

The Texas Legislature approved plans for a statewide educational program in the diabetes awareness movement in 1983. The state's mortality rate from the disease has dropped from 16

to 12 per 1,000 population during the past 10 years, Mr. Owens said.

Jerry McBeth served as program chairman and introduced the speaker.

Small sucking insects, known as aphids or sometimes called "Plant lice", are causing a lot of problems throughout Eastland County. A variety of aphid species are attacking garden vegetables, especially watermelons and cantaloupes. However, the best known aphid is the yellow pecan aphid or "honeydew aphids." They moved in about a month early this year.

The honey dew aphid gets your attention when you park a car under an infested tree. The honey dew or sugar water is excreted by the aphids.

After feeding in large number for about 2-3 weeks their population usually falls off just as quickly as it appeared.

The primary mode of damage is from leaf shading by a mold that grows over the upper surface of affected leaves. As the yellow aphid feeds on the underside of leaves, the sticky liquid falls down through the tree and is deposited on the upper leaf surface of leaves over which

the aphids feed. Under high humidity a "sooty mold" fungus grows on the honey dew to form a dark gray to black covering over the upper leaf surface. This effectively blocks the sunlight from the leaf, reducing photosynthesis.

Leaves make food for all parts of the tree. Without the normal function of leaves all other parts of the tree suffer. This means losses to both the current year's crop in the form of packing and filling nuts, and to next year's crop in the form of reduced carbohydrates available for storage in roots, limbs, and buds.

Sometimes a good hard rain such as we had last week will wash aphids from trees. But, the surest control is achieved by spraying with Guthion, Zolone, De-Fend, Pydrin or Malathion.

Hay was in great demand in Eastland County last winter following one of the worst hay crops ever in 1984. This year hay production is an extreme in the opposite direction. Everywhere I drive in Eastland County I

see hay baled in the fields and more hay being cut. The rain last week provided moisture for another cutting of most hay crops.

A large portion of the sorghum hybrid hay I see has been left too long. As hay plants mature, crude protein digestibility, palatability and animal performance decline. Harvest sudan and hybrids in the early boot stage. If the hay is not cut until heads are in bloom, one half the protein is lost. Bermuda grass hay should be cut when three to four weeks old or before seeds heads begin to appear.

Low quality hay will be hard to sell this year, while there is still demand for good quality hay.

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West Texans Look at Hawaii

At the Bon Voyage party, the staff predicted we'd come back barefoot, suntanned and in grass skirts! In fact, we are a little darker than when we left, and we didn't wear a necktie home but generally we adopted the Hawaiian "Hang Loose" spirit without going completely "native." One of us learned to do a pretty fair hula.

Although it was a business trip (financial seminar and travel coverage), it was also our 25th wedding anniversary celebration, and the culmination of our long-held hope of "someday doing the Hawaii bit." And we did it complete with the re-pledging of our wedding vows administered by a ship's captain off the coast of Kona in the Pacific.

We boarded an American DC10 (widebody Thursday 4:15 p.m. narrow seats) flight from D/FW, and flew toward the sun, with an hour's layover in Los Angeles, arriving in Honolulu at 9:15, gaining five hours in time. Since we had booked with Exxon Travel Club in a fly package, we were met at the airport with the traditional lei-greeting (as are the thousands of Americans and Japanese who flock in there), and transported to a Waikiki hotel for a couple of days prior to our Saturday

ship boarding. Friday, we Graylined to the north side of the island to visit the Polynesian Cultural Center, where the Latter Day Saints have established an elaborate amusement center which provides employment for students at the nearby Brigham Young campus. The various Polynesian island cultures and history are depicted in authentic villages with demonstrations of crafts, entertainment and musicals showing the early lifestyles of the natives, as well as an elaborate evening 90-minute show which is made up primarily of native dances, native music (loud, loud drums), and a spectacular, closing fire-handling act that would be a hit in a Barnum and Bailey circus. We accepted the representation as being authentic recreations of the pagan practices of these island natives, before Christianity and progress hit their shores.

With a Saturday noon pickup from our Hawaiian Regent Hotel, for Oahu Island tour, we weren't able to do Pearl Harbor, but saved it to do at the end of the cruise. Like every other tourist there on their first visit, we were amazed at the lush tropical vegetation and marveled that the plants which we baby year 'round (taking them in and out with seasons), grow wild as weeds in our 50th state. (Oh,

for those who wonder: we walked Waikiki Beach, but didn't don a swim suit. The water is blue, the sun hot, the sand white and packed with people).

Our tour took us around the famous Diamond Head area where the small home lots go from \$150,000 to twice that, and where many celebrities call home. Naturally, to us West Texans, it was a treat to see bananas, coconuts, papayas, mangos, kiwi fruit and flowers and foliage of every description growing everywhere.

We were proud when we got to the Honolulu pier, under the famous Aloha Tower, to see our ship, the S.S. Constitution, one of only two American flagships, both, American Hawaii Cruises, and set to cruise the islands for seven days and nights.

Here again we were given the traditional lei greeting as we boarded the giant, white ship, and escorted to our stateroom on the upper deck, located below the sun and promenade of the nine-deck ship, which has quite a history.

Pulling out of Honolulu Harbor late Saturday we couldn't help but think of all the American servicemen who passed that way before us - going and coming from the various conflicts around the world. We felt a little guilty being so comfortable,



knowing how they endured, making it possible. We sailed all day Sunday, circling Molokai (the former leper-colony island), around Lanai and Makena, before docking a Maui Monday morning.

We'd thought that there would be long hours of lazy loafing, but with all the activities that are available aboard one of these floating giants, it's hard to find time just to goof off. Would you believe, that not once did we ever just laze away an afternoon in a deck chair. There were just too many interesting people to visit.

things to do, places to see and generally be occupied with. It was delightful change of pace and restful though, and even in spite of the chunking of diets as the ship's elaborate foodservice people tempted us with every imaginable treat, we kept so busy that we didn't really gain an ounce; maybe lost a little.

A number of people here who have been a number of times, go back only to one island - and it's usually Maui, which we'll try to tell about next.

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Drilling Bits

Flowing 972,000 CF of gas per day, the No. 1 Alice E. Allen Heirs was completed successfully in the Eastland Regular Field by Jones Co.

Drillsite is eight miles north-northeast of Desdemona.

It was drilled to 3,660-ft. total depth and will produce from an interval in the Marble Falls Lime Formation 3,131 to 3,137 feet into the wellbore. Production tests were run on a 16/64-in. choke, and the absolute open flow rating was 1,590,000 CFD.

The location is in a lease in the M.J. Robinson Survey, A-1819.

A Mineral Wells-based operator has staked location for the No. 1 Henderson, a 650-ft. developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field. The well will be in a 108-acre

lease in the Harvey Kendrick Survey, A-340. The operator is Baggett Exploration.

Mark H. E-linwood of Roanoke has filed for permit to drill the No. 3 Hamilton, a 2,000-ft. wildcat well one mile southwest of Nimrod, Eastland County. Location is in an 82-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-184.

A new producer has been brought on line in Eastland County's Sabana Field, with Northridge Corp. as the operator.

Located four miles south-southwest of Romney, the well is in a lease in the Thomas J. Fennell Survey, A-106. It is designated as the No. 1 C.W. Cauley.

The well indicated ability to pump 22 barrels of oil per day. It bottomed at 3,480 feet

and will produce from a perforated interval in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,006 to 3,033 feet into the wellbore.

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for the No. 1 B.D. Hagan, a wildcat venture of Bill C. Burns in Eastland County's H&TC Survey, A-166. Spudded March 11, the well had reached 1,240 feet total depth. Drillsite was four miles north-northeast of Romney.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 4 H.L. Mauldin, a 2,000-ft. developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field. The operation will be located one mile north of Scranton in a 320-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-192. The operator is HLM Oil of Abilene.

The Eastland Regular Field gained two new producers when Blanco Industries, Inc. completed the Nos. 9 & 10 J.T. Alford No. 2 two miles north-northwest of Rising Star.

The wells indicated ability to pump oil at the combined rate of nine barrels per day. Total depths were 1,134 and 1,136 feet, respectively. They will produce from perforations in the Patio Sand Formation, ranging from 1,018 to 1,071 feet into the wellbore.

The operations are located in the ETRR Survey, Section 26, Block 2.

Michael D. Brown has given up his efforts to make a producer out of the No. 1 J.D. Pittman. It was a developmental try in Eastland County's Scranton Field. Drillsite was two miles north of Scranton. Spudded April 30, the well had reached a total depth of 1,698 feet. It will be plugged and abandoned.

Director Of Eastland County MHMR Work Center Retires After 10½ Years

Idella Taylor of Cisco, Director of the Eastland County MHMR Work Center for the past 10½ years, announced her retirement this week. Friday, June 28 was her last day at the Center, which is located at 306 West Plummer in Eastland.

Assisting in the Workshop on that day was Jo Ashworth of May, who will serve as Mrs. Taylor's replacement until a permanent Director is chosen. Miss Ashworth is employed by the Central Texas MHMR Center in Brownwood, and under her leadership the facility here will continue to offer training and work opportunities for the handicapped.

When Mrs. Taylor began her work in Feb., 1975 the Eastland County Work Center was only about a year old. It was launched in 1974 with the help of Cisco Junior College, which furnished the first location. In Feb. 1977 the Center was moved to Olden, then to the building on Plummer Street in October of that year.

In April, 1983 the facility was dedicated as the "Berta Hardin Johnson Work Center" in honor of a devoted volunteer. The Johnson son, Hayden Lee, attended the Center before he and Mrs. Johnson lost their lives in a tragic accident.

During all the years of her work Mrs. Taylor has had very few days off due to illness.

In all kinds of weather she has driven a van about 40 miles per day to pick up clients. At times she has had as many as 15 training in the facility, and different types of paid work has been turned out. Currently there are seven enrolled in the Center.

The group has worked for Kohler Mfg. Co., Schuster Co. (a wholesale floral company) and others. When work was not available the workers learned various crafts such as ceramics and crocheting. For a long time the Center held an on-going Rummage Sale to assist in its funding.

A number of the people Mrs. Taylor has worked with have gone on to Halfway Houses or progressive living situations. Two presently hold jobs in the community.

"This work has been interesting, rewarding and fulfilling," Mrs. Taylor says. "I wouldn't take anything for the years I have spent here. I felt it was time to take out and do some things on my own, however."

Her plans include spending more time with her mother, Mrs. Mary Barnhill of Cisco, and her sons Jim Dolgener of Denton, Bob Dolgener of Ruidoso, New Mexico and their families.

"But I won't forget the people here in the Center," Mrs. Taylor says. "I'll always have a special feeling for this work."

The most famous case is that of the couple who put two future children on ice, then were wiped out in a plane crash.

Are these undeveloped children heirs? Should they be borne by (born to) surrogate parents? Who, or what, is the guardian of such embryos?

If the parents who furnish the wherewithal for the embryo merely change their minds (instead of getting killed) about defrosting the embryo and having a full-term infant, is this abortion?

How practical is it for a couple in their forties to bring up a baby from an embryo put on "Hold" in their twenties? My mind refuses to believe it would be the same individual the same couple would conceive twenty years later. Would the child's age be counted from birth or from conception?
